#### SPRINGTIME IN THE MEADOW

May may be a slow month in some quarters, but certainly not in those of the folk dance world. Lots of events are coming up, and first and foremost in the Federation South's calendar is the official festival of the month, the second annual Springtime in the Meadow, to be held in Griffith Park, Los Angeles, on Sunday afternoon, May 19, noon to 5 p.m.

Our back cover has a map, and on the other side you'll find the complete dance program. The Festival will be in approximately the same spot as last year, except there will not be the small stage - dancing will be entirely on the grass, with lots of room to move around. Besides the participation dance program, there will be live music during the first "line dance hour", furnished by the Westwind International Ensemble, and exhibitions are scheduled to be performed by a Tahitian dance group from Laguna Beach and a Philippine young people's group, also from Orange County. In addition, Los Rancheros will present a suite of dances from Mexico. Two others have been contacted but, as we write this, have not been confirmed.

This festival is hosted by the Federation, South as a whole rather than by an individual club, and is co-sponsored by the Los Angeles Department of Recreation and Parks. Avis Tarvin is festival chairman, representing the Federation, while Bill Vestal is the representative and co-ordinator from the Department. Admission is free.

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#### "STATEWIDE" - SAN JOSE

The annual big event for folk dancers throughout California is the Statewide Festival held during the Memorial Day weekend. This year, the Folk Dance Federation of California (North) will be hosting in San Jose, starting with a warm-up program on Friday, May 24, and concluding with a picnic on Monday, May 27.

Nearly all of the activities will take place in the Civic Auditorium. Exceptions will be the Installation Dinner on Sunday evening, and any other prompt or impromptu meetings, will will be at the convention headquarters, the Le Baron Hotel - and the picnic on Monday, location as yet not known by us.

With no additions or changes come to light since our last issue, we will give a quick run-down on what the schedule looks like as of now. A flyer is to be included in the back, but in case it doesn't arrive, we'll repeat some data here. Friday night begins with a pre-party festival at 8 p.m., followed by an afterparty from midnight until 2 a.m. . . Saturday starts with an institute, featuring Eugene Ciejka teaching a Polish dance, and Ned and Marian Gault who will teach Swiss dances, 1-4:30 p.m. The evening will be a repeat of Friday night's schedule with a festival followed by an afterparty. . . On Sunday there will be a festival in the afternoon, 1-5 p.m., followed by a cocktail hour, 5-6, and the dinner, 6-8 p.m., these last two at the Le Baron. There will be more dancing back at the auditorium, 8-12, and another afterparty. . . Monday, as we've said, will feature a picnic. (\*\*)

Registration badges will be required for all events, and to pre-register you must have your fee in by May 10. This amount (\$5 or \$5.50 - see flyer) covers all the festivals and parties, but does not cover the institute or the dinner and cocktail party. The cost of the institute is \$2, and of the dinner \$6.30. After May 10, the registration will be \$7.50, and the institute \$2.50. Dinner reservations remain the same, but must be made before 6 p.m. on Friday evening, May 24. Pre-registration chairmen are Jerry and Helen Porter, 5801 Mendoza Drive, Oakland, CA 94611.

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#### IDYLLWILD BACCHANAL

The annual Bacchanal presented by the Idyllwild Committee will be held on Sunday, May 12, from 1 to 5 p.m. at the West Hollywood Park Playground, 647 San Vicente Blvd. in West Hollywood. This time the theme is "The Year of the Tiger", and though you may not be a tiger, you should have a good time nevertheless. Dancing a-plenty, of course, and there will be refreshments available, and prizes too (not sure what the prizes are for, however).

This will be the warmer-upper for the Idyllwild Conference folk dance camp to be held in the San Jacinto Mountains on the ISOMATA campus late in June. Read about this event elsewhere in this issue. It is co-sponsored by the Folk Dance Federation of California, South. If you were planning to take your mother out for dinner on Mother's Day, why not make a full program of it and take her to the Bacchanal in the afternoon, too?

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#### THE DUQUESNE "TAMMIES"

The Duquesne University Tamburitzans Institute of Folk Arts will be sending its famous folk ensemble, the Duquesne Tamburitzans (oftimes referred to as the Tammies) to Southern Californis during the middle of May. Didn't we say May was busy-busy? This is one of the most outstanding folk ensembles in the United States. It specializes in folk dance, music and song of the Eastern European and Slavic countries, but makes a few sorties into other areas as well.

During its existence, the Tamburitzan ensemble has travelled triumphantly in such countries as Yugoslavia, Greece, Czechoslovakia, Bulgaria, Romania, Poland, the USSR, Italy, France, Canada and Latin America. They won a gold medal for excellence in Bulgaria, and the press in Yugoslavia wrote in high praise of the accomplishments of the group and on their ability to portray Balkan dances. The Tammies dress in brilliant and authentic costumes, and sing with the rich and lusty voices of the peasant folk of each land represented by their dances. All participants are full-time students at Duquesne University in Pittsburgh, and must maintain high scholastic grades in order to belong to the group.

In the metropolitan Los Angeles area we have three performances listed. The first is at Knott's Berry Farm, Buena Park, in the John Wayne Theatre on Thursday evening, May 16. These is an interesting flyer along with this issue of "Scene" which could be of benefit to those clubs planning a visit as a group. Mr. Pavlovic, who is promoting this appearance, is endeavoring to help raise funds for the St. Joseph's Hill of Hope in Brea, a project which eventually will contain a hospital, monastery, home for the aged, etc., for people of every race, creed, age and means. All proceeds beyond actual expenses of presenting the show will go to the Hill of Hope program.

The second performance will be at Chaffey Auditorium, Chaffey College, 1245 N. Euclid Ave. in Ontario. This will be on Saturday, May 18, at 8 p.m. For reservations or information concerning this, contact Mr. Stanisić - phone (213) 672-6416 or (213) 823-3900. The final showing by the Tammies, before heading north, will be at the Pasadena Civic Auditorium. The Haverim Folk Dancers will celebrate their coming of age by holding their 13th annual folk dance festival, B'nai Mitzvah, on Saturday night, May 18. The festival will be held in the main auditorium of the Valley Cities Jewish Community Center, 13164 Burbank Blvd. in Van Nuys, across from Valley Junior College. Take the Ventura Freeway, exit at the Coldwater Canyon off-ramp, then turn north to Burbank Blvd. An excellent program of popular dances has been prepared. Refreshments consisting of fresh fruits of the season will be served. Outstanding exhibitions will be presented. The festival reflects the great care and devotion to the high standards of international folk dancing which the group pursues. A very capable festival staff is working under the chairman, Mike Wolfson. The festival begins at 8 p.m. For more detailed information see the flyer near the back of this issue. This will also be a sort of celebration for the Haverim director, Sam Mednick, who has been teaching folk dancing in the Los Angeles area for 25 years.

#### MUSIC AND DANCE ON THE GRASS

One of the spring's most pleasant events in the folk field is the annual festival, Music and Dance on the Grass, which is held the first Sunday in May each year at the Sunset Recreation Center on the UCLA campus. It is presented by the Associates of the Institute of Ethnomusicology of UCLA, and the date this year is May 5. (Cinco de Mayo should be easy to remember, but a score of nationalities besides Mexican will be represented on the program.)

No time schedule has come our way at this writing, but based on past performances, the action should start around 11 a.m. and continue until 6 p.m. or thereabouts. Ethnic foods will be available - last year they were Mexican, Philippine, Thai, Greek and Indonesian - and there is plenty of room on the shady lawns if you decide to bring your own picnic lunch. Many of the performances will be repeated during the afternoon - what you miss at the upper meadow, you can probably catch on the lower field. Dance and music of the Middle and Far East have been predominant in the past years, and we can assume that some of the excellent UCLA study and performance groups from these areas will again be seen and heard. Your donation will be appreciated and put to a good use, for the Associates raise funds in this manner (and via other activities) to help support scholarships in the study groups, assist in the importation of special instructors, secure costumes and instruments, etc. It is an entirely non-profit organization, and for more information concerning this special festival, about membership in the Associates, or on forthcoming events, call Marsha at 395-2025.

Judging by previous years, we feel that this seven hour program on a pleasant day in May would be difficult to match at any price if it were presented on a concert stage.

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#### FESTA BRASIL

From Bahia comes a folkloric troupe that depicts the saga of the black man in Brazil, from the days he was brought to the New World in slave ships; his first struggles for freedom; his primitive joys; his difficult social clumb; and his final victory - that of seeing his customs, religion and his music deeply ingrained into everyday Brazilian life. This 40-member Olodumare company of Bahia consists of the foremost Brazilian masters in their specialties, such as the capoeire fight; the candomble; the maculele dances; and the berimbau and other authentic musical instruments of this vast South American country. Climaxing the program will perhaps be the most colorful pageant in the entire world, the "Rio Carnival", complete with many fabulous prize-winning costumes from recent years.

This is the final presentation of the 1973-74 'World of Dance' series to be seen at UCLA this spring, following the Israeli, Pakistani, Yugoslav and Nigerian ensembles. The dates are Thursday, May 9, and Friday, May 10, curtain time both days at 8:30 p.m. The theatre is Royce Hall on the UCLA campus in Westwood, and ticket information and reservations may be secured by phoning the UCLA Ticket Office, or writing to 650 Westwood Plaza, Los Angeles, CA 90024.

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#### DANCE INSTITUTE

Our <u>last</u> Federation Institute was the Camp Hess Kramer Weekend and was most successful with a capacity attendance of over 100 participants. However, since we could not accomodate those on the long waiting list, and since many people cannot get away for that length of time, we decided to hold an institute right here in the city at a location convenient to most people. Thus, for our <u>next</u> institute, the four points following will give the basics you need to know: the place -West Hollywood Playground Auditorium, 647 San Vicente Blvd. between Melrose Ave and Santa Monica Blvd. in West Hollywood; the date - June 9, 1974, a Sunday afternoon, from 12:30 to 5:30 p.m.; the instructors - Shlomo Bachar and Mary Judson; the price - \$2.00.

Shlomo will be teaching several line dances and one couple dance. All are Israeli with a difference. Two of them are Ladino in background, meaning they stem from Spanish Jewry. Two dances have Chassidic melodies, referring to a religious period of North-eastern Jewry - one of them traditional and slow, the second modernized in tempo. Only one line dance (and that one being considered only as a quick review for styling purposes since it has been taught previously), typifies the present kibbutz spirit in Israel. This variety in musical expression should prove to be quite interesting. All dances appear on the one L.P. label, "I Remember".

Mary is well known for her delightful, breezy teaching and her pleasant personality. She will be teaching English group dances, her speciality. As of now, several possible choices are being considered but no final decision has been made. There may be a brief reteach, for styling mostly, of the very popular "Nonesuch" or "Picking Up Sticks", or a revival of an old, old favorite, "Newcastle", and there are several new and very interesting dances which may get the vote. (There is a better than even possibility that there will be live music, too, according to Mary when we talked to her a day or so ago.)

For the next issue of "Scene", which should still be in time to reach you before our institute, we will let you know the actual names of the dances to be taught. Several people are hard at work already to make this coming event an outstanding learning experience. See you there.
