Sounds of live folk dance music filled the Ojai Art Center Saturday evening, April 24, as both beginners and experienced dancers enjoyed a spirited event. Linelle Glass of Santa Barbara provided instruction, accompanied by her band Kitchen Junket. Linelle, who grew up folk dancing (her father Buz Glass started the California Folk Dance Federation), taught beginners from 7 - 8 pm. She also taught a few intermediate dances, then rejoined the band as they continued to play music for dances familiar to most of the participants -- without instruction.

Kitchen Junket includes Carl Maganosc on keyboard, Rick Drake on mandolin, Kristina Eriksen on accordion, Sue Rudnicki on percussion, and Linelle on fiddle. The live music really made a difference. If I can think of one word to describe the gathering, I would choose joyful.

As the band packed up, Leo Smith accepted requests for dances on tapes, played on the stereo. Dancing continued to 11 p.m., closing with Ann Taylor's Silent Kolo and a spontaneous antiphonal Balkan song sung by three women with remarkable voices: Sue Rudnicki, Jana Julian and Stephanie Johnson. The dance was well-attended and we received so much positive feedback that we want to do it again!

Visit Other Federation Dance Groups: Solvang Village Folk Dancers







Ethnic Foods

In this month's Scene, we feature three savory soups for summer, adaptable for all dietary preferences, from vegan to carnivorous, depending on what broth you use as the base. Sandy Helperin prefers Hain's fat free vegetable broth and recommends Trader Joe's for their great selection of broths for all tastes.

3/4 lb. russet potatoes, peeled and chopped 1 1/2 lb. frozen petite peas 3 Tbsp chopped fresh tarragon 1/8-1/4 t. cayenne salt and pepper

Saute onions, garlic and butter in a 6 quart pan, over medium heat, for about 10 minutes. Add broth and potatoes. Cover and simmer about 20 minutes. Stir in peas and tarragon. Add cayenne to taste. Using a blender, whirl a little at a time. Return to pan and stir over high heat. Season with salt and pepper. Serves 6.

ROASTED CARROT AND GARLIC SOUP

1 1/4 lbs carrots

3 cloves garlic

1 Tbsp olive oil

salt and pepper

1 onion

3 1/2 cups vegetable broth

2 Tbsp whipping cream (optional-I omitted)

1-2 t. lemon juice

Cut carrots 1/2 " thick and toss with olive oil. Place on baking sheet and season with salt and pepper. Roast for 10 minutes at 500 degrees. Cut onion into wedges and add to carrots, stirring to coat with oil, and continue roasting about 10 more minutes. Put vegetables in a blender with broth, and puree. Pour into saucepan and heat. Add cream, if using and lemon juice, stir and serve. Serves 4

ANDALUZ GAZPACHO

3 cloves garlic, minced

1 large onion, sliced

1cucumber, diced

4 large tomatoes, peeled

2 tsp. salt

1 tsp. ground cumin seed

I/8 tsp. cayenne pepper

I/4 cup red wine vinegar

I/4 cup olive oil

1 bouillon cube

Dissolve bouillon cube in 3/4 cup hot water...pour into blender or food processor. Add garlic, onion, tomatoes and cucumber. Whirl on high speed for about ten seconds. Add salt, cumin seed, cayenne pepper, vinegar, olive oil. Whirl for additional ten seconds. Chill until icy cold.

TARRAGON PEA SOUP

11/2 lbs onions, peeled and chopped

1 Tbsp minced garlic

2 Tbsp butter or butter substitute

1 qt broth

GARNISH

1 green pepper, cut into small dice; 1 cucumber, diced; 1 ripe tomato, diced; 1 small onion, chopped fine. Place each in a bowl, separately. Also fill one bowl with I/2 lb. tiny bay shrimp and one bowl with garlic cheese croutons.
