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## San Diego Folk Dancing

This month's covert story covers the scope and breadth of folk dancing in San Diego. Thanks to Bob Barckley for an excellent overview. Dancers traveling to San Diego are encouraged to visit one of the groups.

#### FOLK DANCE IN SAN DIEGO-THEN AND NOW

In 1952, Paul Pritchard, writing for LET'S DANCE called San Diego one of the brightest places in the Southland for folk dancing. Forty-seven years later, Ron Houston writing for the Society of Folk Dance Historians' Report, called San Diego a tremendous community that provides great dancing opportunities.

It all started 53 years ago when the Scandinavians got together and invited other national groups to join them for dancing. The San Diego Folk Dancers organized and began classes and Sunday program dancing in Balboa Park in 1947.

Now San Diego is blessed with two major venues for international dance. In Balboa Park, twelve clubs are members of an umbrella group called the International Dance Association of San Diego County (IDA). Five of the clubs are international and the others are specialized - Scottish Highland, Scottish Country, Cajun/ Zydeco, English Morris, Irish, Contra and Ballroom. Most of the classes and the regular Sunday afternoon program dance are held in the beautiful and spacious ballroom of the Balboa Park Club building.

The other major venue is the Folk Dance Center, a non-profit organization with very comfortable rooms on 30th St. about four miles from the Park. The Center is host to classes in international (mostly line dance), Israeli, Scandinavian, Belly dance, Vintage Ballroom,

and Hungarian each week. The highlight of the week is the Saturday night special event dance party. (The history and background on the Folk Dance Center will be the subject of a future story.)

The long development and the continuing popularity of - Steve Davis folk dancing in San Diego is due in no small part to the many forgotten people who served as officers in the clubs and spent endless hour attending meetings. preparing food, party decorations, helping with equipment etc. Dancers tend to overlook the importance of these routine duties to the success of any organization

> San Diego has also been favored by the crucial contribution of many good teachers over the years. Several of the earliest teachers are still with us and retain an active involvement with their clubs even after retirement from teaching.



Vivian Woll began teaching in 1950 and founded the Cabrillo Folk Dancers in 1954. She continued to teach a beginners class and an advanced class until her retirement in 1985. She also led an accomplished performance group of young dancers. In 1953 she was Vivian Woll in 1980 named to a committee to run

the IdvIIwild Folk Dance camp and from 1972 to 1982 she was the Chairperson of that popular camp. When the Parks and Recreation Department felt the need for a liaison group composed of all the dance clubs in Balboa Park, Marie Fielding, a square dance teacher and an employee of the Department, gave Vivian a copy of the Square Dance by-laws and asked her to modify them and organize what became the IDA. Since her retirement, Vivian has been invited to return at times to re-teach a neglected dance. In February 2000 she was honored at the Cabrillo Anniversary Party. Pat Coe and Joe Sigona taught the Cabrillo classes from 1985 until taken over by the current teachers.

Evelyn Prewett arrived in San Diego in 1950 after dancing in King City for several years. She started teaching for the San Diego Folk Dancers in 1951 and continued until moving to Guam in 1955. While in Guam, she worked in civil service positions and as a housing manager, and taught regular folk dance classes at the officers club at Anderson AF Base.

Evelyn's work took her to Sacramento in 1965, where she taught folk dance at three different clubs. She retired from the civil service in 1971 and took up painting, but did not neglect folk dancing. When she returned to San Diego in 1975, she soon resumed teaching for the San Diego Folk Dancers until retiring in 1989. At this time she is teaching a Senior dance group and continuing painting, which has won her honors at several senior shows.



Alice Stirling started dancing with the Chula Vista Folklanders in 1957 and became a folk dance teacher for the city schools in 1960 and with the San Diego Folk Dancers in 1966. In 1978 she organized the San Diego International Folk Dance Club and became its first teacher. She continued with that group until her retirement in

Alice & Archie (1999) 1999, and still teaches a senior dance group. The Folk Dance Federation of California, South, has seen a lot of Alice. She served a term as secretary, as vice president and two terms as president (1967-69). She attended her first Statewide festival in 1959 and her 41st consecutive Statewide in 1999 in San Diego. She organized a folk dance weekend cam in the Cuygamacas for 21 years, the July Fest for 6 years and the folk dance day at the Del Mar Fair for many years. Alice and her husband Archie continue active involvement with their club and are now busy organizing the July Fest for this year.

Kayso Soghomnian and his wife Angie arrived in San Diego in 1975 from Fresno where they were long time folk dancers. They enjoyed the dancing here and began teaching a class in the North Park Recreation Center in 1977. One year later the class organized as the Kayso Dancers, moved to Balboa Park and joined the IDA. Kayso was active in the IDA, served a term as Federation historian, and also acted as the unofficial video cameraman. At the time of his retirement in 1994 he was teaching three different classes weekly: Country Western, Balkan line dance and his Kayso International Club. After retirement, Kayso and Angie traveled extensively in the U.S. and Canada, returning to San Diego in 1996. He continues his painting, but is no longer involved with the South West Art Association. Several of his large paintings of folk dancers are still displayed at their special events.

Several other groups and teachers should be mentioned as contributors to the San Diego folk dance picture. Elizabeth Ullrich came from Germany in 1927 at the age of 26, began teaching folk dance in San Diego in the early 1950's, and soon afterward founded the Chula Vista Folklanders.

Elizabeth also taught exercise classes before anyone had heard of aerobic dancing and at a fairly advanced age she introduced the hula hoop to her class. Her group gave many exhibitions including an early one at Disneyland. She was active in the Federation and hosted meetings of that group at her Oktoberfests in Chula Vista. She continued teaching some dance and exercise classes until her death in 1986 at age 87. Lisel's Waltzer is a dance composed and performed in her honor by the Gesundheit performing group. The founders and several members of that group started dancing in her classes.

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# San Diego Folk Dancing

Vytautas (Vyts) Beliajus lived in San Diego from 1953 to 1958. He formed his own Viltis group to perform Lithuanian dances and also taught occasionally for the other clubs.

John Hancock, Ray Garcia, Steve Henderson, Arleigh Yewchan and Maude Sykes all taught for the The newest of the five clubs is the Performing Folk San Diego Folk Dancers at one time or another. The first three also organized their own groups. **John** Hancock's Hungarian Cyganys performed to considerable acclaim for many years. Ray Garcia had a highly respected group called Las Pulgas. Steve **Henderson** and his wife **Judie** organized the Gesundheit German performing group, which is still active.

Dick Oaks and Gordon Engler started dancing with the Cabrillo club and later became noted dance teachers elsewhere.

At this time, the five international clubs in Balboa Park are all alive and well (although, perhaps, not as vigorous as they once were). The oldest club, the San Diego Folk Dancers, meet on Monday nights with Kin **Ho** teaching intermediate to advanced line dancing. The Tuesday night Cabrillo class is taught by Lu and Georgina Sham with line dancing early in the evening and then mostly couple dancing. The Thursday night Cabrillo class is taught by Jack and Ellen Vandover and is a similar mixture of dances, but is at a beginner to intermediate level. The two classes alternate in

offering a first hour of class for newcomers. Joe **Sigona** is now teaching both the Kayso class on Fridaymornings and the San Diego International Folk Dance Club class on Wednesday nights. Both classes offer a mixture of line and couple dancing.

Dancers of Balboa Park which was organized in 1990 by Val and Jim Waddingham. It is now under the direction of David Odenwalder with classes on Wednesday nights. The group performs often on the House of Pacific Relations outdoor stage in Balboa Park as well as for other groups. Once a year the club is responsible for a full folk dance concert in the Casa del Prado theater. Several other dance groups are invited to join in the presentation of the two hour concert.

San Diego folk dancers have plenty of great opportunities to dance but that does not mean that they have no problems. The average age of the dancers is increasing and the number of dancers is decreasing. Classes now average 20 to 30 in contrast to the 50 to 100 participants around 1970. This trend seems to be nationwide based on the data reported in the Society of Folk Dance Historians' Directory.

Various plans have been tried to recruit new dancers. The biggest effort came in 1997. A full summer of special events were planned to celebrate 50 years of dancing in Balboa Park. There were three full festival Sundays and a minor event planned for each Sunday program. A series of beginner classes were offered on Saturday mornings. All five international clubs participated in these activities, and the IDA also supported the effort. Unfortunately, the clubs gained very few new members as the result of these efforts, perhaps because of lack of good publicity. The media were not fully supportive. Many dancers have become pessi-mistic that anything would revive interest in folk dance.

Most dancers continue to enjoy the activity and welcome the occasional newcomer. Many attend more than one class per week plus the Sunday afternoon dance program. Thanks to excellent teachers the classes are upbeat, vigorous and joyful. People are friendly and caring. All are thankful for the blessings of folk dancing in San Diego.

#### Of Love, Marriage and Babies

In our dance repertory there are dances, new and old, which we dance with particular enjoyment. Perhaps we are attracted to their haunting melody, maybe we find the movements more interesting than those of other dances, or perhaps the attachment stems from the heart. We dance and listen to the music, and when the music ends, inertia keeps us in silent dreaming. Many moments pass until we return back to the real world. Such is the case with three of the Romanian dances in our repertory: Joc în Patru, Hora Miresii, and Joc de Leagane. They deal with - what else? - love, marriage, and babies. There is no historical connection between these dances; they are just examples of dances falling in this "special" category. Here are the words, translation and some background notes.

Gerda Ben-Zeev

#### Joc în Patru (Dance in Four-some):

A dance from Transylvania, usually in two couple sets. **Song:** 

Trandafir cu creanga-n apa, Spunei cucului sa taca. Sa nu cante-asa frumos, Ca badita-i mânios. Si mi-e tare îngândurat, De cind noi doi ne-am lasat.

#### Translation:

Rose with the stem in the water, Please tell the cuckoo-bird to be silent

It should not sing so beautifully, Because my lover is angry;

He is also very sad, Ever since the two of us broke up...

### Hora Miresii (Hora of the Bride)

This is a wedding dance from the village of Bihor in Transylvania. It is usually danced in a line, by the unmarried girls of the village, surrounding the bride. The dance has its roots in the tradition of the region: a young bride moves with her groom to his own village and is adopted by his family, leaving behind her own family and friends - perhaps never to see them again.

#### Joc de Leagane (Dance of the Cradles)

This dance is from the region of Maramures, in northern Romania, and it is danced to honor the midwives. Midwives play a very important role in the village life, and the good health of mothers and their new-born babies is in a great measure dependent on the midwife's competence. Once a year, when winter is over, new mothers get together, along with their babies, to honor the midwife. Together they sing to their babies songs about love....., and so the cycle starts again. This particular song has a melancholic feeling: its basic theme is that of "longing" ("dor" in Romanian). The word "dor", especially in the peasants' language, does not have a well-defined meaning: it translates to longing, but it can also imply desire. love, passion. The reader is invited to substitute for the word "longing" any of the above.

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# **Dancers Speak**

#### **DANCE TIPS**

The basics of movement are the same, no matter the purpose. As one studies different movement disciplines - dance, athletics, martial arts, acting, mime, gymnastics, anything - the truth becomes more and more obvious.

That truth is that: movement must come from the "center". Old country martial arts masters, modern dance teachers, gymnastic coaches, athletes and dancers, farmers and laborers all discovered that truth, whether by design or by accident, because that truth enabled them to achieve their maximum performance, whatever that performance may be.

The Japanese martial art of aikido may have achieved the ultimate development of the skill. Who has not seen demonstrations of skilled aikido practitioners tossing multiple opponents about as if by magic?

Every time we witness a 300-pound power lifter or a seven-foot-plus high jumper or an 80-pound gymnast perform their art-sport, we witness "moving from the center". When Baryshnakov performed his 14-revolution spin in White Nights, we saw "moving from the center". When Greg Luganis performed his almost unbelievable aerial feats from three stories high into the diving pool, we saw "moving from the center."

When we see a folk dancer trying to punch a hole in the floor with every stamp of a Romanian "allunelul", we do not witness "moving from the center." When a lady dressed in an elegant antebellum ball gown is jerked into turns with square corners on them, neither she nor her partner are "moving from the center."

The skill of "moving from the center" is a very good technique to develop. Gentlemen must realize that, in most turning dances which progress along the floor, partners take turns moving ahead of each other. That's true in the waltz, the polka, two-step, schottische, etc. Each time one moves ahead of the other, a turn is created. That turn must be centered on the partner being passed.

The gentlemen are usually heavier and stronger than their partners, thus it falls to them to create the energy source for the starts, turns, spins, stops and reverses of which the dance is composed. It behooves the gentlemen, therefore, to master the many techniques of accomplishing this necessary skill, lest he be considered something less than an ideal dance partner. Gentlemen, consider that your center is the center of the turn when she passes you, and so is hers when you pass her. The outer edge of the turn is, for practical

purposes, the lady's back where your right arm is positioned to lead and support her in the turns.

So. In a clockwise turn, as in a waltz or polka, as the man moves the lady ahead of him, he pivots around his own center, providing a turning point, or anchor, for her turn, as he sweeps her ahead of him. Then, he uses her body weight as the center for his turn as he passes her. Always, both dancers keep their body weight centered, not allowing a lean into the turn or away from the partner. The "pelvic tilt", addressed last month, is of utmost importance: lift the pelvis in front and tuck under in back to relax the lower back, drop the center of gravity and place your feet forward under your partner. Couples can practice by standing in closed dance position, the man's feet apart and woman's together; the man flexes both knees and straightens them as he swings the lady to one side and rotates his upper body to support her. Then swing her back to the other side, dipping and rising. Her back should describe an arc around the man' center.

Stay centered, stay calm and share the dance. It is the stuff of which life is made.
