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

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Federation Corner



My wife, Jill, and I started folk dancing in 1983, when we signed up for a series of beginner and intermediate lessons taught by the late Gene and Nann Lovejoy in Thousand Oaks. Their enthusiasm was infectious, and in a short while, we joined the Conejo Valley Folk Dancers, where we have

been nearly every Monday evening since.

I became the Insurance Chair for the Federation in July 1999, replacing Julith Neff upon her elevation to President. The primary function of this job is to provide liaison between the Federation's Member Clubs and the company that underwrites the insurance program.

All Member Clubs are required to have liability and accident medical insurance, which helps protect them from financial loss due to any injuries, property damage, or litigation that might result from participation in Club or Federation sponsored dances. Almost all the Clubs meet this requirement by purchasing the insurance that is available through the Federation; any Club that elects not to participate in this program must provide proof of coverage from another source.

The Federation insurance covers a Club's regularly scheduled (e.g., weekly) dance activities. Additional dance events or changes in dance location are also covered as long as the Club notifies the Insurance Chair in advance, using forms that are included in the Club's annual renewal packet and, when completed, should be sent to the Insurance Chair several weeks before the planned event. WARNING: Federation insurance does not cover dances held at private residences - for these, check the homeowner's policy; it might provide coverage.

In the event of a covered accident or any third-party claims against your Club, immediately notify the Insurance Chair, who will help you prepare and submit the necessary information to the insurance company.

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West Valley Folk Dancers



West Valley Folk Dancers Exhibition Group Lila Aurich, Fred O"Brian, Bunny Hogan, Jill Michtom, Joan Waller, Monica Zordich, Jay Michtom

This month's cover story focuses one of the longest lasting Federation groups, the West Valley Folk Dancers.

Although the West Valley Folk Dancers (WVFD) were founded in October of 1959 with three couples, the membership quickly numbered thirty in the first year.

Four of the early members are still dancing with the group. In fact, **Walter Philipp** served on the first Board of Directors in 1960 and is an important participant today. Other members for forty years include Lottie Philipp, and Lila and Walter Aurich.

Active in the Folk Dance Federation South community, members participate individually. Lila Aurich served as Folk Dance Federation President. Others have represented the club to the Federation council over the years. **Karen Fink** and **Jim Hanna** were Treasurers, **Jill Michtom** was Recording Secretary for eight years, and **Burt Scholin** was President of Federation North.

The WVFD put on its first festival in 1970 at Universal Studios and has continued to sponsor festivals in various San Fernando Valley venues. They will hold a Beginner's Festival on Sunday, October 29, at Woodley Park in Van Nuys. Look for balloons marking the site. Information is available on the enclosed flyer.

The group originally started in the Canoga Elementary School auditorium, which it eventually outgrew, experienced a variety of LAUSD and LA Recreation and Parks gymnasiums before finding their present home in the Senior Center at 7326 Jordon Ave. in

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Canoga Park. It is a pleasant facility with a nice wooden floor, ample parking adjacent to the building and all the amenities that the club needs. The club meets there regularly every Friday from 7:30 to 10:15.

Celebrations of club milestones and holidays are an important part of the WVFD calendar. Parties may be held in the Senior Center which lends itself to festive activities as well as at other venues for more important events. To make things really festive, we're lucky to have **Bunny Hogan** who can change a drab gym into a fairy castle in no time flat. For seventeen years their Installation party has been held in the lovely garden of **Beverly and Michael Faben** who have provided a romantic setting and (mostly) balmy weather for all of these occasions.

Since 1962, the club has had an exhibition group. The first exhibition was staged at the Budwieser Brewery where 12 dances were performed and one or two dances taught to the guests present. Over the years the exhibition group has performed for philanthropic causes, church groups, retirement homes, and at functions for organizations such as the AAUW. The pattern is typically the same as it was in 1962, with a combination of exhibition and teaching. The driving force underlying this adjunct group is multifaceted, including doing service in their community, the need to keep folk dancing alive and pass it on to others, the challenge of the material and the exhilaration of being in front of an audience.

It is difficult to summarize what keeps this club vibrant and flourishing, but a strong love of the diversity represented by the music and dance of the countries in their repertoire and of dancing is certainly a part of it. Most importantly, the West Valley Folk Dancers are a group of folks who have been together long enough to watch one another's children grow up and who over time have developed powerful bonds of friendship and camaraderie.

"It's the people! They're the reason I continue to come back," a new member was overheard to remark one Friday evening. She sums up the attitude of many members, new and long term whether they are still actively dancing or come to watch others and see old friends.



Yemenite Dancing – Part I

Lisa Codman Arkin is an Assistant Professor of Ethnic Dance living in Eugene Oregon. She started her folk dance career as a teenager in Santa Barbara, dancing with her parents Flora and Harold Codman. She received her Bachelor's and Master's degrees, with a Dance and Education emphasis, at UCLA, where she studied with one of the foremost Yemenite dancers and choreographers, Margalit Ovid.

Due to strict segregation imposed by their Arab neighbors and their geographic isolation from other Jewish communities, the Yemenite Jews maintained a unique culture, unlike that of other Middle Eastern Jewish groups. Aspects of their attire, language, dance, and melodies are thought to preserve ancient traditions that date back

Yemenite Men in Jerusalem thousands of years.

How did this community of Jews come to settle in Yemen? It would seem probable that, after the destruction of the First Temple in Judea in 586 B.C.E. exiled Jews wandered along the 'Spice Road,' an important trade route that crossed the entire Arab Peninsula from modern day Eilat in Israel to Aden, Yemen.

In Yemen, wanderers found opportunities for establishing productive livelihoods. Gradually, with the rise of Islam, the Yemenite Jewish settlements were severed from their brethren cultures in Judea. Further legal restrictions in Yemen, which imposed cultural and physical separation between Moslems and Jews, helped to isolate Jewish traditions from surrounding influences.

However, when the State of Israel was established in 1948, the flight of tens of thousands of emigrants ensued culminating in Operation Magic Carpet. This massive airlift, sponsored by the Israeli government, brought 55,000 new Yemenite immigrants to Israel for re-settlement. With them came a rich heritage of ancient dances, music and folklore outstanding for its vitality and distinctive features. At the time of Operation magic Carpet, the dance of the Yemenite Jews was a treasure of rare dance material that drew upon centuries of traditions. It was remarkable for its originality and the fact that it had remained untouched by Western influence for generations.

Since that time the Yemenite Jewish community has exerted a strong influence on modern day Israel, particularly in the areas of music, dance, and the decorative arts. Their deep spiritual expressivity appealed to contemporary Israelis struggling to reconnect with their biblical roots. Many Yemenite songs are verses from ancient texts or are sung in Aramaic, a language long lost to speakers of Hebrew.

The dance is a syncretization of Arabic, Indian, and ancient religious traditions. In this way, Yemenite Jewish music and dance is completely different than other Middle Eastern cultures. This rich heritage was recognized and integrated into Israeli culture resulting in a profound influence on what we have come to know as Israeli folk music and dance.

MUSIC. Jews lived as one of the lowest socioeconomic castes in a oppresive, sectarian Yemenite society and as such were subjected to numerous restrictions on their activities. For example, Jews were not allowed to ride on animals or to wear clothing that could be confused with Arab garb.

Some generations ago, Jews had to request permission from the Sheikh in order to observe all religious celebrations, and even when permission was granted they were not allowed to make noise. Musical expression was severely limited at all times. In this century, during the reign of the strict Shi'a sect, a ban was imposed on all musical instruments. Accordingly, the Yemenite Jews developed a musical style that relied solely on the voice and percussive instrumentation limited primarily to hand clapping or striking copper trays, tin cans, and other household items that could be played in secret.

Because the dance is always accompanied by the human voice, the songs and their lyrics greatly shape the nature of the dance. The song and its expressive dance are inseparable.


There are very eloquent curses designed for guys who do that. But, where appropriate, the underarm turn can be a lovely dance figure. There are several different such turns: man's right hand, woman's left hand / man's right hand, woman's right hand / man's left hand / woman's right hand / woman turns clockwise / woman turns counterclockwise, etc.

Let's look at the "Man's Right - Woman's Left hand figure. This figure is one of the most common and one of the most frequently ruined.

First, the man should have his right palm up, the woman palm down. The man swings his right arm backward and up, flexing his wrist downward so that his fingers point toward the floor and turning the woman's hand and forearm parallel to the floor, her thumb pointing to the floor. The man's right forearm is parallel to the floor and higher than her hairdo!

The man then extricates his first and last fingers from the lady's hand, leaving her the two middle fingers. The woman curls her fingers loosely around the man's two fingers and holds her arm steady, creating a kind of "hinge" with the hand grip. The gentleman leads the turn with a gentle "Push-pull" circular movement Folk Dance Scene Committee around her halo, as though polishing it.



Summer Fruit Coffee Cake

This recipe is being reprinted from last month because, much to our chagrin, we found (gasp!) fatal errors.

– Jatila

3 cups of fresh fruit (plums, peeled peaches, berries)
2 tablespoons quick cooking tapioca
1-2 tablespoons lemon juice
1 tablespoon vanilla
2 cups sugar

2 cups sugar 1 cup sour cream 2 eggs

2 1/2 cups self-rising flour 1/2 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon baking soda

1 1/4 teaspoons baking powder

10 tablespoons butter or butter substitute plus 2 tablespoons melted butter

1 tablespoon cinnamon

Gently mix fruit with tapioca, lemon juice, vanilla and 1/4 cup sugar. Stir sour cream and baking soda in a small bowl until foamy, and let rest.

Sift flour, baking powder and salt in a large mixing bowl. Stir in 1 1/2 cups sugar and then add butter and cut into flour mixture, as you would for a pie crust-until it resembles coarse

meal. Beat eggs until foamy and stir into sour cream mixture. Add the egg-sour cream mixture to the flour, and mix well.
 Butter a springform pan and line the bottom of the pan with parchment paper that has been buttered. Spoon about 2/3 of the batter into the pan and spread it evenly. Spoon fruit over the batter and cover with spoonfuls of the remaining batter. Spread the batter over the fruit carefully. The fruit need not be completely covered.

Mix 1/4 cup sugar with the cinnamon and sprinkle over the batter. Drizzle the melted butter over the cinnamon-sugar. Bake at 375 degrees at least one hour. Test with a toothpick-the cake will be done when the toothpick comes out clean. Cool cake in the pan for about 10 minutes, and then gently insert a knife around the edges of the cake before releasing the sides of the pan. Cool the cake completely before removing the bottom of the pan and taking off the parchment paper. Serve at room temperature.

Note: this cake could be adapted to winter fruit, such as apples or pears. I would slice and saute the fruit in a small amount of butter or butter substitute for a short time and use less sugar for apples or pears.





When they returned to California they lived in Santa Maria for 2 years and danced with Audrey Silva's international group, as well as teaching their own German/Austrian group. In 1959 they were invited to teach at Stockton Folk Dance Camp for the first time.

They returned to Los Angeles and stayed for the next 10 years at which time they were off to Maryland. They taught many times at San Diego and Idyllwild Folk Dance Camps as well as Stockton.

Morry and Nancy have six children. Many California folk dancers may remember Michael who did some teaching and Nina who also was an international folk dancer. Richard still lives in the Pasadena area and dances with the various groups there.

Bob Satten, who was a close friend of the Gelmans, recalls having a very nice experience visiting their dance group in 1985 in the Baltimore area.
