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
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### **Folk Dance Scene**



The Pasadena Folk Dance Co-Op was founded in 1942. and was the first formed of the seven founding clubs of the Folkdance Federation. South. Its first president. Allen Pelton, was also the first president of the Federation, South. In the early years it was a true Co-Op, with a cooperative day-care, cooperative food buying and during World War II it also functioned as a USO. From the beginning the Co-Op was associated with CalTech. They met on the campus and many of its early leaders were associated with CalTech. Most, if not all, of the dances were couple dances with a heavy dose of Scandinavian.

In the 50's the group split in two. One group, the precursor to the current Pasadena Folkdance Co-Op. moved off campus and became more international. The other group continued as a CalTech group.

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# Ethnic Music – Misirlou

The following article was excerpted from the 1994 Folk Dance Problem Solver, (c) Ron Houston and the Society of Folk Dance Historians. Readers' comments are welcome

### **BACKGROUND:**

"Is Misirlou Greek?"

"Well, a Greek-American re-choreographed the Cretan prototype, making it Greek by parentage and early development. Another Greek-American selected music written by a Greek, making it Greek by design and marriage. And Greeks around the world and especially in Buffalo have taken it as their own, making it Greek by adoption."

"Okay, it's Greek!"

"But it wasn't created in Greece! And those students weren't creating a product of Greek culture! And the music has absolutely nothing to do with Greece. Just read the words! It isn't a Greek Syrto, it's a Latin Beguine with an Arabian theme!"

"Okay, it's not Greek!"

The question of whether Misirlou is Greek or recreational, folk or popular, depends on the use to which you put it and on your definitions of "Greek" and "folk." So I suggest we call Misirlou a Greek dance for purposes of classification, but not for purposes of description. That way, you can locate the dance by searching for Greek dances, read the background, and decide for yourself. **ORIGIN OF MISIRLOU:** 

Quoting Brunhilde Dorsh (no, she's not Greek):

"In 1945, the Duquesne University Folk Dancers, were asked to participate in a music-and-dance program to honor America's allies of World War II. The program was titled: "Music and Dance of Poland, Greece, Czechoslovakia and Jugoslavia" and was arranged by the Tuesday Musical Club of Pittsburgh. knew no Greek dances, but the group discovered two girls on the campus who were of Greek background. Both knew something about Greek folk dances and one could play the piano. (We had no records at that time.) Before long we had learned the Hasapikos and Kritikos. However, there was no piano music for the Kritikos. In desperation one day, we got a copy of "Misirlou" - an Arabian Serenade by Roubanis. This music came as close to the right kind of music as anything we could find, and so we adapted the dance to this tune.

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When we first performed this dance as "Kritikos" on March 6, 1945, I carefully explained to the audience that the dance had been adapted. After the program the group suggested using it as a "theme dance" on other programs, and thus it began to move off-campus and into the larger folk dance world. Monty Mayo, leader of a group in Pittsburgh at that time, introduced it in New York. Michael Herman first listed it in his catalogue as "Pittsburgh Greek," and eventually suggested calling it "Misirlou" to avoid confusion with the genuine Kritikos. I introduced this dance at Oglebay Park during Labor Day weekend of 1948.

As the dance has gone its way, interesting "folk lore" has attached itself. For example, the Girl Scouts in this area call it the "Snake Dance." A student at Duquesne. who had never seen the title of this dance in print, once wrote me for information concerning the availability of this record and referred to this dance as "Miserv Lou." We still get a good laugh out of that and at times refer to it that way ourselves.

Here endeth then, the story of Misirlou. " BUT THE STORY CONTINUETH, BRUNHILDE:

Anne Pittman learned Misirlou at Oglebay and introduced it to Southern California in the early 1950s. and this Beguine lilted along, changing but little. In the late 1950s, the Armenian community of Southern California either adopted or inspired the linked-littlefingers handhold, set the dance to Armenian renditions of that Latin Misirlou, and inspired a new family of dances, the Armenian Miserlou,

### **MISIRLOU HITS THE BIG-TIME:**

In 1960, Never On Sunday became the first foreign song to win an Academy Award and spent 14 weeks on the Top Ten list. And what does this have to do with Misirlou? Well. Bob Wischnick learned Misirlou from Buffalo-area Greeks (sound familiar?), allegedly added two Hasapiko-like variations to the Misirlou step, called it Hasa Misu, and set it to Never On Sunday. The name, perhaps derived from Hasapiko and Misirlou, later became Hasamisu and was said to represent the "real" Greek dance from which Misirlou was derived.

George Lowrey presented a rather different dance (resembling the Greek Slow Hasapiko) to Never On Sunday at the 1967 Texas Camp. Quoting George's directions: "This particular version probably originated in California."

### COMMON BULGARIAN FOLKDANCE RHYTHMS

In doing research for a presentation I gave for a World Dance class at UCSB. I came across this great breakdown of popular dance rhythms at www.io.com/~hbp/folkdance/rhythms.txt.

Although the 2/4 rhythm is the most common among Bulgarian folkdance music (Pravo, Triti Puti, Tropanka, Zborenka, Reka, and others), there are also a number of irregular rhythms. As a general rule, these rhythms can be divided into slow counts (S--) consisting of 3 beats, and fast counts (Q-) consisting of 2 beats.

### RACENICA

Q-Q-S-- or: 1-2, 1-2, 1-2-3 = 7 beats/measure KOPANICA

### Q- Q- S-- Q- Q- or: 1-2, 1-2, 1-2-3, 1-2, 1-2 = 11 b/m. PAJDUSKO

Q- S-- or: 1-2, 1-2-3 = 5 beats/measure DAJCEVO

Q- Q- Q- S-- or: 1-2, 1-2, 1-2, 1-2-3 = 9 beats/meas. **CETVORNO** 

### S-- Q- Q- or: 1-2-3, 1-2, 1-2 = 7 beats/measure In addition to the pure rhythms, there are mixed rhythms such as Sedi Donka, which is a combination of the Cetvorno followed by Kopanica rhythms:

S-- Q- Q- S-- Q- Q- Q- Q- S-- Q- Q- or: 1-2-3, 1-2, 1-2, 1-2-3, 1-2, 1-2,

- + 1-2, 1-2, 1-2-3, 1-2, 1-2,
- = 7 + 7 + 11 = 25 beats/ measure.

So, the next time you dance to your favorite Bulgarian tunes, stop and see if you can really count the measure. It helps to use the S-- and Q- counting method, figuring that the S-- (slow) count takes up three beats while the Q- (quick) count takes up two beats. Prove to yourself, if you have not already done so, that Jove Male Mome, for example, really has 18 beats per measure!



The Winter Solstice Season is marked by festivals in almost every culture. Common themes are light, the appearance of a savior, and good health for the New Year. This holiday season we bring our readers four traditional foods for Hannukah, Christmas, and Kwanzaa. A very joyous and healthy Solstice Season to you all. *– iatila* 

### Potato Latkes for Hannukah

At Hannukah time it is traditional to serve potato pancakes fried in oil to symbolize the miracle that occurred when one day's worth of oil for the eternal light in the Temple actually from a variety of appealing culinary burned for eight days and nights. 12 medium potatoes 1 onion

### a dash of pepper 1 teaspoon baking powder 1/3 cup sifted flour matzo meal, or bread crumbs

2 eggs, beaten



Grate onion and potatoes. Drain off liquid, add eggs and sifted dry ingredients. Drop by tablespoonful into a skillet heated with 1/8-1/4 inch oil. Brown and turn. Serves 8-10 adults.

> 3/4 cup rice 2/3 cup sugar 4 cups milk 1 cup rich cream 1 tsp. vanilla 1/2 tsp. salt

Scald milk. Put the rice into a deep baking dish, cover with the hot milk, and bake in a moderate oven for 3 hours, or until the rice is soft. Stir occasionally during first hour to prevent sticking. If necessary, add more hot milk. When almost done, add vanilla, sugar, and cream, and finish baking.



### **Oplatki: A Russian/Slovak** tradition at Christmas

Oplatki are similar to communion wafers and are very traditional in Catholic households Russia and Eastern in Slovakia. You can't make them at home, but you can order them at www.iarelative.com/ xmas/oplatki\_order.htm, where I found the description: that follows:

The start of the Traditional Christmas eve meal was always Oplatki, or Bread of Love, a thin Communionlike wafer stamped with a Christmas scene and served with honey spread upon the wafer sheet. The Oplatki is passed from person to person along with a wish and a kiss to all others sitting at the table, wishing the other a "Merry Christmas" and a "Happy New Year". The symbolism of sharing the wafer with everyone back and forth was to symbolize giving and sharing in life.

### Coconut-Sweet Potato Casserole for Kwanzaa

I selected this recipe for the Feast of Kwanzaa concoctions at amarillonet.com/stories/112996/ kwanzaa.html.

Celebrated every year from December 26 through New Year's Day, Kwanzaa is a time to commemorate African and African-American culture, while reinforcing values passed along for generations.

Kwanzaa, meaning "first fruits of the harvest," culminates in a glorious feast on December 31 that draws on a variety of cuisines. The center of the celebration is a table set with a bowl of fruits and vegetables, a straw place mat, a communal cup and a seven-branched candelabra with black, red and green candles. The feast traditionally includes recipes with sweet coconut.

2 pounds sweet potatoes, cooked, peeled and cut into 1-inch chunks (about 4 cups) 2 apples, peeled, thinly sliced 2/3 C. maple flavored pancake syrup 1/4 C. (1/2 stick) butter or margarine, melted 1/2 t. salt


2/3 C. sweetened flaked coconut

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Place sweet potatoes in greased 13x9-inch baking dish; top with apples. Mix syrup, butter and salt; pour over apples. Sprinkle with coconut; cover. Bake 30 minutes. Uncover. Bake 20 to 30 minutes or until apples are tender and coconut is lightly browned. Makes 8 servings.

The article on Montenegrin costumes does flow well and the background is covered succinctly; but there are various phrases or words that may be politically incorrect:

"the small country of Montenegro" -- Montenegro is NOT a country, it is a republic of Yugoslavia.

"The woman's scarlet chemise and surcoat..." - there is no chemise, per se, it is a white silk blouse and dark skirt and apron with a short long-sleeved jacket and long vest - the jacket and vest are of dark red velvet.

"...observed at festivals in Croatia..." - this implies that Montenegrins are Croatians; in fact, they are Serbian.

As a last comment, it would have been complementary to have had a Montenegrin costume on the cover instead of Bulgarian.

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## **Dancers Speak**



"Help Stamp out Romanian Dances"

It was a clever phrase on a T-shirt. For over three decades I have been watching folk dancers stamp out dances with reckless abandon and now see more and more often the results of that abandon.

Folk dancers are almost always guilty of neglecting technique and of being totally unaware of what they're doing to their bodies.

Folk dance was originally the dance of working folk whose bodies were accustomed to hard labor and whose movements were fashioned by the need for day-long stamina. Movements were made efficient by use of only as much energy as necessary.

The typical folk dancer moves nothing heavier than a paper weight, lifts nothing heavier than a pencil most of the time. Little time is spent learning how to toss a 75 pound hay bale onto a five-foot high trailer bed.

The average dancer has no idea how or why or where the thigh bone is connected to the knee bone. where the knee bone is connected to the leg bone or the leg bone to the foot bone. Don't be too surprised, but most professional dancers don't know those things either - the schools certainly don't teach their dance students about them.

So, when it comes time to stamp out those rhythms, our folk dancers pound the floor with everything they've got and wonder why they've developed bone spurs and arthritis and other ailments after a few years.

Stamps are made with the body. The movement is made by flexing the supporting knee and lowering the body into the stamp so that the stamping leg is flexed to take the shock. The body sits back in the "pelvic tilt" so necessary for good dance technique and the shock is dissipated easily through the flexed knee and ankle

joints. Far less energy is expended to gain far more power; much more speed is possible because the weight is not over the legs, freeing them to move. Next time you stamp the floor and feel it in your eyeballs, stop and think what you're doing to your body. There are a few people around who used to be good dancers until they stamped themselves into oblivion. With a little care and a little common sense, maybe you won't be another one. Take care of yourself. We need all the dancers we can get. - Richard Duree
