I served as Vice President of the Federation, I am now a member of the Folk Dance Scene Committee, and I also work closely with my wife, Beverly, on the fall Camp Hess Kramer Institute Weekend. The responsibility of the music falls into my hands at many of the events. Beverly and I are very involved in folk dance activities and I enjoy the jobs that I am doing, but most of all I enjoy the folk dancing and the friends that I have made in the folk dance community.

I kind of started dancing when Beverly started teaching at the Pacific Palisades Recreation Center on Friday evenings in 1971. I went with Beverly to class to help with the music and slowly worked my way into the line and started learning to dance. In 1972, Beverly wanted to go to San Diego Camp and talked me into going. I was barely dancing. I went with the idea of participating in all the fun things, but had no intention of attending classes. I ended up taking all the classes and really got hooked. I became a member of Westwood Coop while at San Diego Camp that first year.

We moved our Friday class from Pacific Palisades to Brockton School in W. L.A., in 1973, and changed the name to West Los Angeles Folk Dancers and we are still there on Monday and Friday nights. This year is the 30th anniversary of our Friday night class. I am still hooked on the dancing and the people.

Ethnic Food

These cookies by Sandy Helperin were featured at the Folkdance Scene party on March 24, and we are pleased to feature the recipes for our readers' pleasure this month.

GALLETAS de BODA (MEXICAN WEDDING COOKIES)



Also known as snowballs in the United States, kipfel in Austria, and kourambiethes in Greece.

2 1/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour

1/4 teaspoon salt

1 cup unsalted butter or substitute, softened

1 1/2 cups sifted confectioner's sugar

1 1/4 teaspoons vanilla extract

3/4 cup finely chopped nuts

Stir the flour and salt together in a medium bowl. In a large bowl, with a wooden spoon, mix the butter and 1/2 cup confectioners' sugar until smooth. Stir in the vanilla and the flour mixture and blend. Add the nuts.

Cover and refrigerate 2 hours or overnight. Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Shape dough 1/2" balls. Place on ungreased baking sheets, an inch apart, and bake one sheet at a time for 8 to 10 minutes. The balls should be set, but not brown.

Place the remaining 1 cup of confectioners' sugar in a bowl. Cool the cookies on a wire rack for 2 to 4 minutes, then roll each in the sugar, to coat. Cool completely on wire racks. Makes about 4 dozen cookies.

LEMON-TIPPED PISTACHIO BISCOTTI (ITALY)

5 tablespoons butter or substitute

1/2 cup sugar

1 1/2 teaspoons grated lemon peel

2 eggs

1 teaspoon vanilla

2 cups flour

2 teaspoons baking powder

1 cup salted, shelled, roasted pistachios,

coarsely chopped

In a large bowl, beat butter, sugar and lemon peel. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well. Stir in the vanilla. Mix flour and baking powder in another bowl, and add to butter mixture, blending thoroughly. Mix in the pistachios. Divide dough in half and on a lightly floured board, shape each into a log, 1 1/2" in diameter. Place on greased cookie sheets, 3" apart and flatten slightly. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes. Remove from cookie sheets and cut crosswise in 1/2" slices. Lay on cookie sheets and bake 10 minutes more. Cool on wire racks. Ice 1" on one end of each.

Lemon Icina

1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar

1/2 tablespoon lemon peel

1 to 1 1/2 tablespoons lemon juice

Mix 1 cup sifted powdered (confectioner's) sugar with 1/2 tablespoon grated lemon peel and 1 to 11/2 tablespoons of lemon juice.

RUSSIAN-POLISH STRUDEL COOKIES (JEWISH)

This recipe has been handed down in my family and remains a favorite. When you cut the loaves into slices you will invariably get lots of crumbs, but those are the cook's reward, and are not to be wasted!

4 cups flour (approximately)

3/4 to 1 cup sugar (depending on how sweet you like your cookies)

3 teaspoon baking powder

1/2 pound butter or substitute

3 lightly beaten eggs

juice of 1/2 orange and rind (more juice if needed)

Fillina:

vegetable oil

jelly or jam

raisins

shredded coconut, nuts, etc.

Mix flour, sugar and baking powder together. Cut in butter. Add eggs, orange juice and orange rind. The dough should be soft but not sticky. Add more flour if necessary. Divide dough into four equal parts. Roll each into a rectangle of about 8"X10", brush with a little vegetable oil and spread with your favorite jelly or jam. Sprinkle with any combination of nuts, coconut, raisins, dried cranberries, cut up pieces of maraschino cherries, etc. Roll into a log and carefully transfer to a cookie sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for about 15 to 20 minutes or until golden brown. Let cool slightly and carefully cut into slices.

Croatian Folk Costume Workshop

Zeljko Jergan, former dancer with LADO, presented an exciting lecture peppered with anecdotes and observations from personal experience. On display were costumes from various regions of Croatia, including Baranja, Slavonija, Posavina, and Cilipi. Other display items included books, dolls, and a beautiful sample of "pashki" lace from the island of Pag.

As part of the lecture, Katica (a dancer with St. Anthony's Tamburica and Kolo Club) was dressed in a beautiful many-layered costume from Valpovo. The eyelet work on the costume was absolutely stunning.

Albuquerque Folkdancers Workshop

The Albuquerque International Folkdancers (AIFDF) had a spring workshop a few weeks ago with Irwin and Beverly Barr from Los Angeles. The idea for having the workshop originated two years ago at Camp Hess Kramer when Jane and I were inspired by the many fine dances Californians do that are virtually unknown in New Mexico. This workshop to a large degree remedied that. I should add, however, that there are a few dances done here that are not known in California: in one instance not because you don't do the dance, but simply that you wouldn't recognize the way we do it!

We have three recreational folk dance groups in (or near) Albuquerque plus one in Santa Fe and one in Los Alamos. All groups were represented at the workshop. Folk dancing in New Mexico has been continuous since the 1940's and perhaps even earlier. The AIFDF group in Albuquerque used to be one of the larger groups in the US, averaging between 100 and 120 people per week about ten years ago. It is considerably smaller than that now, but still respectable at about forty to fifty each week.

At just under sixty people, the workshop was well attended. Beverly, assisted by Irwin, expertly taught sixteen dances in all. Included were Ali Ali from

excursions. We saw whales, puffins, dolphins, bald eagles, and other wildlife. Giant glaciers, mountains, and lots of trees could all be seen from the ship. We covered many miles of coast and 10 towns without packing and unpacking suitcases - it was so easy.

INFORMATION FROM THE SMITHSONIAN



There's lots of amazing stuff in the Smithsonian catalogue, including items of interest specifically to folk dancers. Moses Asch, who founded Folkways, issued music from all over the world, with detailed liner notes. When the Smithsonian acquired the label from Asch's estate, it was with the proviso that it adhere to the original commitment to keep EVERYTHING in print.

Originally that meant you could order items on cassette, but for a number of years archival titles have been available on CD-R, and are sent out with a copy of the original notes.

The label Smithsonian Folkways Recordings was started to issue new titles as well as for reissuing in proper manufactured form some of the old Folkways recordings for which there is high demand. These are remastered and the notes updated.

Unfortunately, we've been having a lot of problems with the web site, and the part that gives you access to the archives has crashed badly. They're working on it...

Your best bet (800) 410-9815, or (202) 275-1143. Ask them to send you both the current and the archival catalogue.

Smithsonian Folkways acquired Monitor a couple of years ago, so we do have those titles that were transferred to CD, plus a limited number of the old cassette tapes.

Last correction is that we moved in the Fall. The new information is: Smithsonian Folkways Recordings Smithsonian Center for Folklife and Cultural Heritage, 750 9th Street NW, Suite 4100, Washington DC 20560-0953

We have a great archive for research - many other records other than our own, recordings made of assorted groups that have appeared at the Smithsonian Folklife Festival over the years. 


