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

When these are all collected, we try to see how they will fit into our next issue. Due to printing considerations, we are required to have issues in multiples of four pages. That means condensing or eliminating articles on the one hand, or scrounging up items at the last minute to get to the required number of pages. We are heavily involved in e-mailing the rest of the committee, keeping all informed, and trying to resolve sticky problems; and when we have our periodic meetings, we chair them. Beverly Barr teaching a dance at Westwood Coop and asked her teach a class in Pacific Palisades. Deanne told Beverly that she enjoyed watching her dance and her feet were so easy to follow. Beverly had been dancing for only a few years, and was rather new to Westwood Coop, but had already been asked to do some teaching for the club. Beverly accepted the challenge and with the help of her husband, Irwin (a non-dancer at the time) started teaching on Friday nights. Irwin took over the responsibility of the music. which he still does. It was called Family Folk Dancing and parents came with their children to learn folk dancing. The concept was great and a wonderful time was had by all. The parents were having so much fun and loved the dancing so much, that they started leaving the children home with baby sitters and came to dance for their own recreational pleasure.

The group grew and grew, but with many requests to move from Pacific Palisades so that people in the city would not have to travel so far. After about two years we moved to Brockton School in W.L.A. The group suddenly exploded with many more folk dancers attending regularly. One night there were so many people that Beverly jokingly said "I wonder if a tour bus dropped people off here". Dancers were now coming

difficulty in coming in to W.L.A. For several years in the - Steve Davis mid to late 1970s, we met on Friday nights at Webster Junior High School, but returned to our home at Brockton School. The group grew into a big happy extended family of folk dancers.



#### Letter from Iliana Bozhanova Dear friends!!!

I pray all of you are alive and you have not lost friends and relatives in this hell... WHY????? WHY all these people had to die without guilt??? It is monstrous!!!! It is difficult to believe and understand WHY???

We watch CNN and this terrible crash again and again, but there is nothing more sad and horrible than all these people in New York, holding the photos of their lost relatives and friends....

Virginia, we are sorry about your cousin....Eniko. your Ron is a lucky person!!! We are happy about you!!!! We are very, very happy for Micki-oh, my dear, your home was very close to the hell......

God, give all of us wisdom and peace!!!!!!!!! With sadness and love, Iliana and family, from Bulgaria

#### THE CHINA POBLANA

One of the most beloved stories of Mexico revolves around that of the China Poblana. It goes back to 1684, when the Mexican seas were infected with pirates. A Chinese boat was on its way from Manila to Acapulco when it was stopped by an English band of pirates. On the boat was a very beautiful Chinese princess named Mina, and she was taken prisoner along with all her valuable cargo and possessions

The chief of the pirates was not interested in her, so he sold her in Mexico to a merchant who was sailing to Acapulco. In Acapulco, she was sold to Captain Miguel Sousa as a slave. He took her to his city of Puebla, where he was a respected and wealthy merchant.

Captain Sousa cared deeply for Mina and he gave her jewels and treasures and had her baptized. She was given the name of Catarina de San Juan after a young girl who had just died, the daughter of a friend.

As time passed, Catarina was put under the care of Mother Superior and her Father Confessor for her education. She became a very devout Christian and

led a very pure and simple life. She was said to have sold the pearls that Captain Sousa had given her to buy clothes for the poor children and the rest of her iewels she gave to the church.

Never again did she wear anything that wasn't the most simple and plain. Most of the time she was seen wearing a plain red flannel skirt, shirt and rebozo. In the winter she wore a humble goatskin cloak.

Catarina's physical and spiritual beauty was so appealing that all the other girls in the convent wanted to be exactly like her, and copied her dress, complete with the red flannel skirt, white blouse and rebozo, folded over their shoulders and crossed in front.

One Christmas night, Catarina sat in the convent yard listening to the sounds and waiting to go to Mass. Out of the night there appeared the Virgin of the Sorrows, "Catarina," said The Virgin, "You have given so selflessly to all the children and you have been so faithful and loyal to God that I am going to give you a reward for your unselfishness. You will go to sleep now, and wake when the bells ring. You will find a reward in that you will be able to cure and, also, you will see a sign that I have been here to be with you."

When the bells rang, Catarina awoke. The Virgin had really been there, for her skirt was no longer plain, but it was embroidered with intricate designs in beads and sequins. The blouse was also embroidered.

Catarina's dress became the national costume for Mexico and it is worn by the girls and women to this day on fiesta days, especially when dancing the Jarabe Tapatio. The China Poblana costume has lasted throughout the centuries and Catarina's own dress is preserved in the State Museum in Puebla.

Not much is known about the later years in Catarina's life, but it is said that when Catarina died. the church officials carried her coffin on their shoulders and the people in the state mourned the woman who had given so much of herself to the poor and sick.

It is no wonder that the people, when speaking of Catarina, refer to her as China Poblana, the little Chinese woman of Puebla.

It should be noted that there are many different legends of China Poblana, but the important thread that runs throughout is the fact that Catarina was a person who cared greatly for the poor and the sick.

# Choreogeography

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### GREECE

No other country in the Balkan Peninsula draws as much interest from westerners as Greece - for several reasons. Not only is it the "Cradle of Western Civilization", with astounding ruins proving the magnificence of its "Golden Age", the country is a major destination for tourists seeking the exotic sights and sounds of its land and people.

Perhaps this fascination of Greece evolves from the writings of Western European travelers as long ago as the 16th Century, continually embellished by those who came later. The Romantic Age of the mid 19th Century colored the stories even more, with tales of the Greeks and their Turkish occupiers. Europeans - and Americans - envisioned a place of romance and history and exotic traditions.

Folk dancers are perhaps a bit more realistic than that; after all, they are interested in the dance and music of Greece just as they are of any other country. But many who do not dance and have never heard of a "syrtos" find their aesthetic buttons pushed by the multifaceted sounds of Greek music. It is small wonder that motion pictures of Greece, "Zorba", "Never on Sunday" and others are remembered mostly for their wonderful music which falls favorably on western ears.

Greece is one of the most diverse countries of Europe, having perhaps more coastline than any country of its size anywhere. The sea intrudes deeply into the interior and a provides a living to a large number of the people. Rugged interior mountains divide isolated valleys and rocky soils yield little to the farmer or the herdsman over much of the land, long since denuded of trees by Venetian ship builders centuries ago. Sheep and goats and olives seem to be the major agricultural products.

The ethnic regions of Macedonia and Thrace spread their southern areas into northern Greece. Gentle Epirus and rocky Thessaly complete the northern part of the country; Central Greece extends south and ends in a point with Athens and its port city of Piraeus. Extending to the west, the slender Isthmus of Corinth leads to the ancient site of Sparta - the Peloponnesus, now turned into an artificial island by the Corinth Canal.

The balance of the Greek world is comprised of its many justly famous islands, each with its own distinct

culture: Crete, Kafilonia, Rhodes, Lesbos - names which evoke echoes of ancient gods and heroes.

Dance permeated Greek society throughout its history, though modern industrial life has destroyed and altered much of it. Dances we think of as "Panhellenic" have spread over the country only recently with mass communication and migration to the cities. Formerly, each tiny village and valley had its own dances with its own musicians and songs.

It is truly unfair to both reader and writer to attempt to describe the complexity of Greek dance in so small a space. One can only be amazed by the unending flow of dances brought to us by Greek teachers. It is worthwhile, however, to identify a few of the dances most frequently encountered and to take a look at what they represent.

Vari Hasapikos ("heavy" hasapikos) was originally known as the "fisherman's dance" and is traditionally danced by two or three men, each improvising the dance as he leads it, dancing in his own movement style, followed with perfect imitation by his fellows. When leaders change, so does the dance - often dramatically - as the new leader dances his favorite figures in his own personal style. The dance is one of the most intimate of all folk dances, it is shared by these two or three men and it would be unthinkable for another to join them.

Hasaposerviko is the "light" hasapikos, moving quickly and lightly to the right in a more open and welcoming dance.

Of course, syrtos and kalamatianos are well-known to Greeks and folk dancers alike and differ primarily in rhythm; the syrtos ("dragging") is in an even 2/4 meter, while the kalamatianos is a livelier 7/16 rhythm.

Tsamikos is an interesting dance, appreciated more by the dedicated dancer than the beginner for its hypnotic, yet seemingly uninteresting figure. Watch, carefully, for you will see the dancers from the rural mountains lift the leg high for each step, while those from the city will skim across the smooth floor in a quick, almost nervous movement.

Take a good look at a Greek class. Watch for the schedule of Greek festivals coming soon and join in the fun and fascination of Greek dance.
