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

As my tenure as Federation President comes to a close. I look back on two great years. It seems as though they just flew by. Although there were no new programs instituted, all of our regular functions were carried out in a truly professional

manner. This always occurs because of the dedication and involvement of many people.

To each person who helped at a Federation or club event, thank you – your commitment is keeping international folk dancing alive. In particular to the various committee chairs and members - you are the working core of the Federation and your dedication is appreciated. Many thanks to Richard and Donna Killian and the members of the Ethnic Express for an outstanding Statewide 2001. We all had a wonderful weekend as well as making a profit for the Federation.

The officers of the two terms were a tremendous aid in accomplishing the successes during the years of my service. Thank you all. Sylvia Stachura as Vice-President went way beyond the limited duties of her office and really performed the duties of Publicity Director as well as being a source of advice at all times. I want to give special recognition to my wife Lynn, who held down both secretarial positions and was special advisor/aide/go-fer to the President. The Federation will never know all of the things she has done.

One of the real rewards has been the opportunity of making friends with Gordon and Carol Wall. Gordon has established accounting books which will allow us to match our expenditures to the budget, and Carol did outstanding work on the annual membership directory. Their input at council meetings and their friendship made the President's job ever so much easier.

As a Federation, we owe special thanks to Julith Neff, without whom we would be in dire straits. After serving a tour as President, she came back for a second dose, then took on the Historian position when

it went begging. When I was desperate to find a new insurance chair, she took that job also. Without you, Julith, the Federation would never have been able to accomplish its goals. Thank you.

It was very pleasant to work with **Linda Stuart** as Sergeant-at-Arms. She and **Albert Penington** attended all of our meetings and represented San Diego's point of view. It's nice when the Federation can keep a diverse approach and not become regional.

As always, we owe a debt to **Beverly and Irwin Barr** for the tremendous amount of work they do on the various projects of the Federation and for being our front people as "Keepers of the Phone." Camp Hess Kramer has had a large increase in attendance in the last few years, due to their efforts.

We must also recognize **Dorothy Daw and Marge Gajicki**, not only for their work on the Costume Committee, but for their involvement on other committees, such as Dorothy's continuous dedication to Research and Standards.

Other special people these last two years were Lila Aurich, who chaired our Finance Committee, keeping the Federation in excellent shape; Forrest Gilmore, who, after retiring as Treasurer, become involved in the archive/offices/storage problem, which has resisted solution for the past two years; Karen Wilson-Bell, already the North-South Coordinator, took on Scholarship when Carol Smith retired; and Georgina Sham, who ran our Video Committee with a minimum of fuss.

There is an exceptional group of people who answered the call when the long-standing Scene editors retired and took up the task of publishing the Scene. To Jay and Jill Michtom, Steve Davis and Jatila van der Veen, Richard Duree, Steve Himel, Gerda Ben-Zeev, Forrest Gilmore, Sandy Helperin, Beverly and Irwin Barr, Gerri and Bob Alexander – thank you, not only for an outstanding publication, but also for the numerous events you planned and presented over the last two years. You have been more active than many of the member clubs.

A final thank you to **Marilynn Pixler**, Past President, who as chair of the Nominating Committee, sold me on this job and then was so helpful during the transition in office. Also special thanks to **Marshall Cates**, Past President, who convinced me to become active in Federation business and has been a constant mentor, friend and one who could be depended upon to take on any task that needed doing.

As I look back, I see a very disturbing trend. Many events are experiencing decreasing attendance and the groups sponsoring them are having more and more difficulty in getting the participation necessary to shape the event. This has resulted in cancellation of some events, notably the Julyfest in San Diego. I know that there are many factors responsible for a lack of participation. The aging of our folk dance population is a paramount cause. We lose dedicated workers to both illness and death (we lost five in the last year in Pasadena), which is exacerbated by the loss (at least temporarily) of those dancers' life partner. However, we still have dancers at our regular club meetings. Somehow, we must reach the newer dancers and convince them that the infrastructure of the international dance community needs help.

The Federation also needs help. First, we must fill our officer slate. The lack of a Director of Publicity is part of the problem. I am dancing today because of a newspaper article which was placed years ago by the Director of Publicity. This office has been dormant for five years. Now we are also faced with a vacancy in the office of either Vice-President or Secretary. The participation of members is important, not only for the duties they perform, but the wisdom, counsel and input they bring to the planning process of the council meetings.

It is not just the need of officers that is starving the Federation. As of today, only 11 clubs out of 34 are listed as participating. That means that 23 club delegates have missed 3 consecutive meetings since they last attended 2 meetings in a row. Without this device, the Federation would never be able to field a quorum and conduct any business. What a shame!

In the November 2001 Scene, Julith Neff wrote an outstanding appeal from the Nominating Committee for help in finding officers. She received zero response. She also recounted the benefits of the Federation to individual clubs. The first item was insurance. It seems that many non-participating clubs have joined for that single purpose. I submit that if the Federation founders for lack of participation, clubs won't have any place to obtain insurance, which may require them to disband.

End of soapbox! I'll be around working as Historian and helping Marshall Cates with Statewide 2003 because I love dancing and dancers. Thanks to all of you for two great years.

I remember the first performing group I was in, The Polkateers, we named it ourselves, the Mouseketeers were real big back then. We did Caballito Blanco, Hopak, Jota Aragonesa, Hawaiian and more. I was 12. I remember the first adult dance group I was in, Madelynne Greene's Workshop, in San Francisco. I had to wait until I was taller than the shortest lady in the group, God Bless Teddy Walterbeik. I was 15. I remember all of the different groups with whom I danced in San Francisco.

I remember all the clubs, festivals, camps and statewides I went to. I remember my first kiss. Statewide, San Jose. I remember my first broken heart. Kopackas, Mill Valley. I remember sneaking my first beer, Kolo Festival, Russian Hall. I remember getting busted by a lot more than just my mother. I remember the last two years of the old Santa Barbara Camp. Everybody thought I was one of the San Diego kids. remember the first year of San Diego Camp. I remember ducking Bea Mitchell to cut curfew at Stockton.

I remember the first time I taught a dance. Taught it to Belles and Beaux. Guest teaching for my mother. I remember my first choreography. San Mateo College, a Bulgarian Suite. The students loved the dance, hated my directing.

This month we are pleased to feature Billy I remember my first professional tour, the Don wore three different shirts through the show; here we - Jay Michtom started the show with all three on.

> I remember moving to Los Angeles and joining AMAN. First show, Westchester High School. I had been in the group 6 weeks and was dancing 6 suites. I was in heaven. Next show, Wilshire Ebell, for two nights; next year, Dorothy Chandler Pavilion, the Music Center Show. I remember Tony Shay asking me to start a small group. The group had twelve dancers and musicians to perform at schools and smaller venues. I remember the joy of being a professional dancer, three shows a day, \$10.00 a show.

> I'll always remember, and be grateful to the people that helped me settle in L.A. Avis Tarvin and her son Barry, the first place I lived here. I called them from Santa Barbara, out of the blue, and they welcomed me with open arms. Then Barry Glass, he's the one that asked me to come to L.A., I think I shocked him when I showed up. Both he and his parents were a tremendous support. Moved in with Barry and Michael Alexander and AMAN became my life.

> I remember meeting my wife Susie for the first time. A teenager in Ojai, working at the Ojai Valley Inn Stables. She had spunk. She happened to folk dance a bit at the Arts Center on Friday nights. We dated for two years and she finally moved to L.A. with me, became AMAN's tall women's director. She then helped Tony start AVAZ, later directed singing for AMAN and sang with Nevenka. Been married 23 years. Though she has occasionally lost patience with me, she has never lost faith in me.

> I remember retiring from performing, I think at the top of my game. Went to college and within two years was teaching dance in schools. I have been doing it ever since. The first classes were with the desks stacked in the corner. Then I spent over 15 years teaching in a bungalow, now I have a full studio. The first kids were called "The Hot Shots", now I have several generations of TANZA. The first kids loved it, so do the current ones.

Dancers Speak

Ed. Note: This section is for readers opinions on folk dance subjects. Your articles on these, or other subjects are most welcome.

FOLK DANCING AS IT IS TODAY

This is written reluctantly, but not without a great deal of encouragement from correspondents across the country. It will not please many, and I expect to hear about it from everywhere, but if the shoe fits. . .

It's common knowledge that today folk dance is but a hollow shell of itself from the "glory days" of the 1960s and 1970s. Gone are the festivals with hundreds and hundreds of dancers and packed houses for brilliant dance concerts performed by large and welltrained amateur folk ensembles. Gone are the twentyplus squares dancing Windmueller or the 50-plus couples dancing Schuhplattler Laendler. Gone are energetic lines of 20-plus dancers performing a creditable Shopsko Horo.

Also gone are most of the men. They've either guit dancing or run off to dance something else besides folk dance. You'll find them in tango classes, swing dance clubs, contras, salsa clubs - almost anywhere except in folk dance clubs.

What's left? I'll tell you what's left. Folk dance, at least in my neck of the woods, is a series of lines of gray-haired ladies following one or another gray-haired lady around the floor in a series of dances they learned from someone in 15 minutes and about which they know nothing and can't tell from any of the other 30 dances they'll dance that night.

They've seized control of the International Folk Dance movement and reshaped it to fit their own selfcentered view of folk dance. Men have become an irritant to them; couple dances are shunned because they don't want to dance face to face with someone.

Maybe it's the men's fault for being too lazy to learn to dance well and lead well. Maybe it's because folk dancers learned to copy and imitate and regurgitate dances rather than dance them. For whatever reason, folk dance, as it now exists, is no place for a serious dancer.

I was told one too many times that a particular dance I requested couldn't be played until late in the evening when most of the people there had left. It wasn't seemly that only three or four couples would be on the floor while everyone else watched, but it was

fine for a Balkan dance with two people dancing while everyone else watched.

I am angry that my 40 years of folk dance, with all the contributions I've made over those 40 years, have been taken away from me by a group of controlling, self-centered and untalented lightweights. I fear that it won't be too long until I, too, bid a sad farewell to folk dance and take up something more interesting.



I remember one of the kids who organized it hired at my school and ending up Sean's 7th grade math teacher.

My latest memory is the 6th grader who came up to me this year and asked me if I remembered her mother who was in my class in 1980.

I can almost remember when I started my book on teaching what I teach to kids. Many of you have heard me talk about it, many of you are tired of me saying, "It's almost done." Well, it's done! Celebration of Diversity: Multicultural Experience through the Art of Dance is finished and available as this magazine goes to press. It is self-published for this first edition.
