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Teacher's Corner

Ed.Note: In keeping with this month's issue highlighting Ragtime dance, below is a biography of Richard Powers, the well-known teacher of Ragtime and other social and vintage dances.



Richard Powers (at left. with sons Nathaniel and Evan) is one of the country's foremost experts on the history of early American and European social dance. This type of dance has been called "Vintage Dance" since 1980. when Richard coined the term. He has been researching and reconstructing historic social dances for more than twenty-five years. Richard's grandfather taught dance at Virginia Polytechnic Institute. His parents met at a swing dance, but his whole generation

skipped couple dancing. He spent his undergraduate years at Purdue, where he earned a degree in engineering. At Stanford, he was a student in the early years of the product design program. He also was one of the first students to pursue an individually designed major. He graduated from Stanford in 1970 with a master's in design and creative process.

He moved to Cincinnati, Ohio, where he worked for a consulting firm and did freelance design work for other companies. He holds seven U.S. and international patents, including one for the spray-pump nozzle that screws onto bottles of window cleaner. While in Cincinnati, he founded an artists collective and studied calligraphy, then tai chi and kendo.

Richard became a full-time instructor at Stanford University's Dance Division, having joined the faculty in 1992. He was selected by the Centennial Issue of Stanford Magazine as one of Stanford University's most notable graduates of its first century and, in 1999, was awarded the Lloyd W. Dinkelspiel Award for distinctive and exceptional contributions to education at Stanford University. [continued on page 7]

The History of Ragtime Dance

The beginning and end of the so-called "Ragtime Era" can be measured almost to the day - a 20-year period beginning with Scott Joplin's *Maple Leaf Rag* in 1898, and ending with the tragic death of Vernon Castle in 1918.

It all began when a scrupulously honest salesman by the name of John Stillwell Stark, who made his living selling anything he could to the farm community around Sedalia, Missouri, discovered a new and exciting form of music pouring out of a saloon in the thriving red-light district. It was Scott Joplin playing his creation, *Maple Leaf Rag.* Stark had an idea and signed Joplin to a contract, paying him a penny for every sheet of Joplin's music that he could publish.

This wise and honest business arrangement ensured Joplin's fame and fortune and set the music world on a new course that was to lead American culture into the new 20th Century. The new "Ragtime" music was an instant hit and spread across the north and eastern U.S. in a frenzy of regional styles. Even jazz, developed in New Orleans, far from the recording studios of the east, was a local form of Ragtime which took its own route to fame following World War I and the rise of the "Roaring 20s."

With thousands of composers creating the new Ragtime music everywhere, it quickly followed that someone would dance to it. And dance they did - funky dances, popular with the lower classes (and the upper classes, too, when they could sneak into them). Animal dances were early favorites, with now-famous names like *Turkey Trot* and *Grizzly Bear*, gleefully and unabashedly mimicking the imagined frolics of their namesakes.

America had a new middle class emerging about then, thanks largely to Presidents Roosevelt and Taft, whose trust-busting campaigns allowed new competition and created new wealth where there had been none before. These "nouveau riche" wanted nothing to do with the antics of those from whom they had so recently been a part and sought vainly for something to suit their new station in life.

And they waited. For what, they did not know, until it happened in the form of a fresh, young couple who had made their mark in Paris as nightclub dancers with a sophisticated new style of dance. They were Vernon and Irene Castle. They arrived in 1911, and they took America by storm.

The Castles were everything the new middle class was waiting for - sophisticated, stylish, handsome, charismatic - perfect. Their dance was smooth, dignified and graceful and everyone could look good doing it. As their fame spread, they toured the country, giving lessons and performances from Chicago to Miami to New York. Vernon's fee for teaching some of the country's wealthiest people topped \$100 per hour, an incredible figure in 1914 - or anytime, equivalent to \$800 per hour today. The Castles amassed - and spent - a tremendous fortune. Irene Castle set women's fashions for decades and caused major changes when she shortened both her skirt and her hair. Hundreds of thousands of women followed suit and, for the first time in modern history, women showed their ankles.

Vernon immediately introduced the dance movement of backing the lady - something that could not be done in a floor-length skirt - and women have danced backward ever since.

The list of Ragtime dances created and introduced by the Castles is remarkable and many of them are still with us in one form or another.

The *One-Step*, so-called because it takes one step on each beat, was the most popular, with an exhilarating, driving quick-tempo. The dance evolved into the Peabody in the Twenties and later into the Quick-Step.

The sultry and "immoral" tango was polished by the Castles into a playful, flirtatious dance that was perfectly acceptable to the new dance world and it has evolved ever since into an important part of the American ballroom dance repertoire.

The polka likewise received a make-over by the Castles. Films of them performing the dance indicate a remarkable similarity to the so-called "Polish polka" as found in cities like Chicago and Detroit and Cleveland but nowhere in Europe.

The remarkable *Maxixe* was to many the most interesting and challenging of all the Ragtime dances, in reality a Parisian adaptation of a Brazilian version of a Bohemian polka. Though its popularity was brief (starting with the Titanic and ending almost as soon), its rich repertoire of figures and Latin movement later evolved in Brazil into the dance we know as *Samba*.

The Half & Half, created by Vernon Castle, appears to have been an attempt to create new dance material to sell - something dance masters have done for centuries. In 5/4 time, this lyrical dance was the epitome of romance and grace. It quickly died.

There were a number of ethnic dances and music created by composers who had no clue of the origins of their music and it showed: Persian, Chinese, Russian, Polish, Hungarian and Turkish music were introduced to the Ragtime music scene - most of it bearing no resemblance to the real thing.

In spite of that, there were some very authentic ethnic dances introduced, though frequently misidentified. At least two well-known Polish dances were introduced as either Russian or Hungarian. Americans were getting cocky. They thought they knew it all.

The Castles only performed in America from 1912 to 1916. When England was pulled into World War I, Vernon, an English citizen, enlisted in the Royal Air Force. In an act of bravery, he took the front seat of a training plane as a flight instructor and died when the plane crashed. The student in the rear seat survived.

So ended the magical Ragtime Era. With the Castles no longer there to lead it, Ragtime gave way to jazz, as the New Orleans musicians spread north from New Orleans following the closure of that city's famed Storeyville red-light district.

Though the Ragtime Era ended, Ragtime music never did. There has never been a time since then that someone was not composing new music. Today, Ragtime music and dance are alive and well with Ragtime orchestras playing at Ragtime festivals across the country. California is now one of the major centers of Ragtime music and dance. Festivals up and down the state are eagerly attended by skilled musicians and dancers and by wildly appreciative audiences who happily soak up this very American art form.

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Audrey Silva (1920 - 2002)



Audrey Pezzoni Silva was born in the Oso Flaco area near Guadalupe, CA, on April 18,1920, to Livio and Mary (Madruga) Pezzoni. As a lifelong valley resident, Audrey attended Guadalupe Elementary and Santa Maria High School. Following, graduation in 1938, she married Joseph L. Silva at Mission San Luis Obispo. Audrey worked as a produce secretary for many years and in 1971, obtained her own dealer and broker agent's license from the California Dept. of Agriculture. She diligently spent many years moving Santa Maria produce to the East coast markets, a challenge she thoroughly enjoyed.

Audrey's first love was dancing, both to entertain others as well as herself. In 1954, she became involved with the International Folk Dance Association, and by 1956, was teaching folk dance for Santa Maria Parks and Recreation Dept. She was also a ballroom dance instructor for the City since 1962, and was often called "Mrs. Dance Instructor of Santa Maria." In 1977, she earned a California Community College Instructor Credential in Theatre Arts. Audrey taught Ethnic Cultural Dances of the World for the Allan Hancock College Dance Dept. and initiated Folk Dance Night. To continually sharpen her teaching skills, she spent three weeks in Romania in 1976, took master classes

in Mexico and Hawaii and was very proud of the fact that she attended University of Pacific Folk Dance Camp in Stockton for 40 years.

Audrey devoted countless hours to civic and cultural life in Santa Maria, as evidenced by her 30 years of teaching at the Monday night Folk Dance Class at the Veterans' Memorial Hall and her beloved Santa Maria Senior Strutters at the Elwin Mussell Senior Center.

She was a moving force behind the Visiting Artists Program, reaching hundreds of children in the elementary schools. Audrey was also a founding director of the Santa Maria Arts Council and former President. She was also on the Board of Directors of the Santa Maria Concert Association for more than 15 years.

[continued from page 3] Richard teaches contemporary social dance to an average of one thousand students each quarter, and directs the 70-member Stanford Vintage Dance Ensemble. Photos of the Stanford Vintage Dance Ensemble can be seen at http://dance.stanford.edu/vintage/photos.htm. He serves as the dance historian at Stanford University's Dance division and is the Stanford faculty liaison to Friends of Dance at Stanford.

During a typical academic quarter at Stanford, Richard teaches "Social Dances of North America I and II" and the "Vintage Dance Ensemble," which are part of the division's regular offerings. He also teaches three non-credit offerings sponsored by the Associated Students.

Richard is noted for founding historic dance groups (he is the founder of the award-winning Flying Cloud Academy of Vintage Dance in Cincinnati, Ohio), his choreography of dozens of stage productions and films, and for his workshops across the U.S., France, Czechoslovakia, Italy, Japan, Russia, Switzerland, and the United Kingdom. He also has led ten Waltz Weekend workshops in northwest Georgia, plus others in Seattle, Denver, Los Angeles and Juneau, Alaska.

In 1981, Richard founded the Flying Cloud Academy of Vintage Dance and a year later the Flying Cloud Troupe, a 30-member performing company. He also co-founded the supporting Fleeting Moments Waltz and Quickstep Orchestra. His other credits include training dancers for the 1989 film 'Glory' and choreographing the ballroom dance scenes for ABC's 'North and South' in 1985 and for PBS' 'Mrs. Perkins' Ball' in 1986.

Dances Richard has taught include: Crossstep Waltz, Skater's Tango, Bohemian National Polka, Boston 2-step, Lingering Blues, Maxixe, Castle Schottische and Walk, One-step. etc.

They examined the Crops, sang songs, danced and sampled the first beer of the season. The celebration was such a success that Ludwig issued a royal Decree making Oktober festival time in Munich.

On the Scene

16TH WORLD CONGRESS ON DANCE RESEARCH

The 16th annual Congress on Dance Research will be held at Corfu, Greece, 30 October - 3 November 2002. This is a major international event in dance scholarship, gathering every year approximately 250 specialists from 25 countries. This congress is intended primarily for professionals and is at the same time a participatory event.

The program will include: Presentation of research papers, teaching of dances, performances, demonstrations, video and film projections, discussions, and visits to places of special interest.

ANTHROPOLOGY OF DANCE

SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA SKANDIA FESTIVAL

Loretta Kelly is well-known as the foremost American performer on the Norwegian hardingfele. She has made an intensive study of both the instrument and the Norwegian language. Loretta is active as performer and teacher of the hardingfele. She has recorded two albums of traditional springar and gangar dance tunes. At Julian Loretta will be playing favorite springar tunes for the evening parties, as well as offering instruction in hardingfele.

Cedar Glen Camp provides a great wooden dance floor, lovely scenery, and a relaxed atmosphere, with wonderful music and lots of dancing. It begins informally Thursday evening, with classes starting after breakfast Friday morning.

FOLK DANCERS LEAD RAGTIME FESTIVAL

The West Coast Ragtime Festival in Sacramento the weekend before Thanksgiving has become one of the largest in the nation (see above). Several hundred dedicated lovers of Ragtime music and dance descend on the Red Roof Inn near the State Fairgrounds for three days of nonstop dance and music played by some of the finest Ragtime musicians in the world.

Three folk dance teachers are on the teaching staff this year: Bruce Mitchell, who chaired the 2002 Statewide Festival and chairs the Stockton Folk Dance Camp and has been a folk dancer since his teens and directed the Camtia Folk Ensemble of Sacramento for 40 years, directs the dance program.

The teaching is shared by **Stan Isaacs** of Palo Alto, another folk dancer of over 40 years experience and who has taught at the festival for several years, and Richard Duree of Orange County's Dunaj International Folk Ensemble, yet another 40+ year veteran of international folk dance and a regular teacher at the Sutter Creek Ragtime Festival.

It seems that folk dance has given these teachers the expertise to readily assimilate the dances of the Ragtime era and to impart them to the many dancers who have joined the "vintage" dance community. SZÁSZCSÁVÁS GYPSY FOLK ENSEMBLE

Folk Dance Scene and Dunai International Folk Ensemble have joined to bring the Szászcsávás (sas cha vash) Gypsy Folk Ensemble to Orange County. This extraordinary group of Rom musicians is one of the best-known in Hungary and comes from the village of that name in Transylvania. Their music is that of the Transylvanian Rom and the Hungarians living the southern Kalotaszeg region of northern Transylvania.

Hungarian Rom dance is guite different from that of the Hungarians for whom they provide music. Their own dance is a mixture of dances performed either as solo or in pairs. Dancers do not normally touch each other, but dance facing each other and moving around each other with a dance movement characterized by an almost internal quiver or bounce.

Though the footwork is quite simple, especially for the women, the upper body is where the dance happens - or rather the center. Arms dance freely at waist or chest level and reflect the vibrations of the body.

Men's dances allow for much more expression, and the men frequently break into momentary flashes of brilliance, with complex leg gestures, leaps, clapping and leg-slapping rhythms. It is not unusual to see a Rom lad outdancing his Hungarian neighbors in a casual verbunk competition.

The ensemble's concert will begin at 7:00 p.m., followed by a session teaching Rom dances with two dancers who will accompany the ensemble. Basic csárdás music will be played for the tanchaz, as well as some of the popular Hungarian dances from the Kalotaszeg and Mezoseg regions.

Folk dancers are encouraged to attend this event. It is located in Orange County to make it more accessible to San Diego dancers. The location is the WISEPlace in Santa Ana at 1411 N. Broadway. From the I-5 Gill Michtom freeway, exit at 17th Street and turn west. Go to the second light at Main Street: turn left and then right at 15th Street. You will see the WISEPlace gym ahead of you on the left. Turn left at the intersection with Sycamore and park either on the street or in the parking lot facing the building across Sycamore.
