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Teacher's Corner



Athan Karras' name is synonymous with Greek dance. After dancing with major dance companies and researching Greek dance as an exponent of his career, he has successfully produced and presented folklore programs and events in the U.S. and Canada.

Athan is featured in many folk-dance manuals and is represented in the recently produced multi-cultural video by Human Kinetics. Currently, he is an instructor of Greek Dance and Culture at *Loyola Marymount University* (Fridays 7:15-10:00, info: (310) 338-1971). He is the U.S. coordinator for *Mazoxi*, an annual Greek dance conference held on the Island of Crete, which he helped organize with Kety Karekia Fragiadakis and Andreas Fragiadakis (*see Calendar for details*). In the early sixties, he founded the Intersection Folk Dance Center in Los Angeles, which subsequently became the landmark of folk cultures and a unique center for Greek music and dance.

Athan has paved the way for performers in the U.S. and was instrumental in bringing the Parthenon Dancers of Greece to the U.S. and Canada for several tours. He has conducted tours to Greece taking groups to dance festivals along with visits to ancient sites. He has also produced and presented several major Greek Festivals at UC Berkeley, UCLA, and Loyola Marymount University and created ethnic folklore programs for the Southern California Heritage Society. He was also the founder and served as Director of Laografia International Greek Folklore Society.

Athan has appeared on Broadway, television, and in motion pictures-starring in one of the first Greek-American films, *Dark Odyssey*, now available on DVD. He is the author of numerous articles on Greek dance and music that have appeared in several major ethnic and national publications. Currently, he has a regular column on dance in the monthly periodical The Hellenic Journal. He has successfully compiled several recordings and dance videos to further widen the scope of Greek folk music and dance appreciation.

Athan is a board member and advisor for several folk dance groups and foundations, and the recipient of many humanitarian awards for his continuing involvement in Greek Dance.

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Kypseli Greek Folk Dancers



KYPSELI GREEK FOLK DANCE CENTER

In 1985, shortly after the closing of the highly popular Intersection Café in the Silverlake area, a group of San Gabriel Greek dance devotees--Dick Angelos, Ed and Betty Krenz, Pat McClaren, Vicki Miller and Kimon Vogassarris--created a new dance meeting center to fill the void. "Kypseli," as it was soon to be called, means "beehive" in Greek, a place to gather. Housed in Vasa (now Skandia) Hall in Pasadena, the new Friday night Greek dance venue came complete with a huge room for dancing, hardwood floors, a stage and spacious kitchen facilities. Launched on January 18, 1985, and soon to celebrate its 19th year of operation, Kypseli first offered Greek tunes for dancing played on a portable cassette player. Within a short time, the original six founders added the talented Louise and Jozef Bilman to their ranks, offering both beginning and intermediate dance instruction to the interested public.

The dance "bees" flocked to this honey of a place. Over the years hundreds of Southern California folk dancers have become regular attendees. Today Kypseli has a rotating staff of regular teachers-Louise Bilman, Joan Friedberg, Arturo del Rio, Pat Karamanougian, Anne Sirota and Mike Smith. Kypseli also hosts professional dance teachers such as Dennis Boxell, Mary Coros, Joe Graziosi and Yvonne Hunt. Adding additional expertise are local young Greek dance directors who are themselves award-winners at the annual Greek Orthodox Youth Folk Dance and Choral Festival (FDF) mounted each year by the Western Diocese of the Greek Orthodox Church.

In Greece there are literally hundreds of regional village dances extant in such regions as Macedonia, Thrace, Epirus and Roumeli, among refugees from Pontos and other mainland areas, as well as in the various island groups – Dodecanese, Cycladic, Ionian, and others, plus nearby Cyprus. Add to all of these several "modern" taverna dances and the resulting dance repertoire is huge, perhaps the largest to be found in the folk dance world. Kypseli strives to teach and perpetuate a large number of these dances through its teaching and open dancing each week. Equipment is much improved these days, and Kypseli plays its numerous selections on highly sophisticated CD equipment and some of its regular dance selections are available for purchase on in-house CDs.

Special events are frequent. Over the years numerous Greek dance ensembles (both bouzoukia and regional bands) have played at such notable evenings as the annual anniversary celebration, Protomayia, Cretan Glendia, summer panegyria, holiday parties, birthday celebrations and other themed events. Each year for several weeks starting in early January, costumed dance groups who are competing at the annual President's Weekend FDF competition come to perform at Kypseli, adding youthful exuberance to each evening, their parents delighted to see the children mingling with adult folk dancers and all dancing with abandon.

Beyond dance, Kypseli is also a wonderful, sociable place to meet people and make lasting friendships. Many Kypseli regulars travel to Greece together, sharing not only their love of dance but also their immersion in Greek culture. Kypseli's mere existence also serves to disseminate Greek dance in the Southern California community to keep many esoteric dances alive.

Kypseli operates every Friday evening. Dance instruction is offered from 8 to 9 pm, with open dancing until 11:30 pm. Dances taught during class are repeated later on in the evening. Admission is \$5 on regular nights, \$8 to \$10 for special teachers, and more for live music/food events. Beginners (and intermediate and advanced dancers) are welcomed enthusiastically.

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Greek Traditions in Music & Dance

The tradition of music in Greece goes back thousands of years. It is part of a national heritage treasured by the Greek people like a precious heirloom from ancient Greece, since this divine gift was entrusted to them by Apollo and the patron Muse, Terpsichore, presided over their dances.

To this very day, music is an inseparable part of Greek life. In its dances and songs, the Greek gives vent to his dramatic expression to glorify his joys, to wallow in his sorrows, and above all, to record his inspirations, the history, and the lore of his people, and to store up legends and folktales.

Greek folk music is a superb combination of elements of ancient Greek music; a theoretical basis of scales and rhythm forms, some oriental influence, perhaps as a result of the expeditions of Alexander the Great, fused together under some mannered conditions from Byzantine life and the post-Byzantium ages. It is definitely, with very few exceptions, entirely free of any of the characteristics found in Western music.

This exception can be traced particularly to the lonian Islands between Italy and Greece, and mostly due to the influence of the Venetian reign, which successively assimilated into the lifestream of European thought and art. The Ionian Islands remained under Venetian rule and influence until very late in the 19th Century.

The folk dances of Greece are accompanied by music played on traditional instruments and sometimes also with a song. The dances, for the most part, fall into



The Minoan Greek Dancers of San Francisco two classifications: the very lively Pidiktos and the more restrained Syrtos. The Pidiktos is a jumping and leaping dance, the Syrtos, a smooth flowing, dragging dance. Another category is the mixed dances where they alternate from Syrtos to Pidiktos and back again. The most common trait, however, is that they begin slow and quaint and then build to the leaping and jumping dances.

The Pidiktos, or leaping dances, are indicative of the rugged mountains of Greece. There, the life is bolder and thus the very strain of mountain life is depicted in movements, especially in the virile and stark movements of the men. The raising of the leg and the leaps in the air almost seem to rise to the need of man to challenge nature. There are expressions of a dancer, either during a dance or in describing him afterwards, as to how he leaped over the mountains in his dancing.

The Syrtos, or 'dragging' dances, are usually seen in the lowlands, on the coastal regions, and of course, on islands. These dances tend to characterize the more peaceful landscape and lyrical moods of the seashores and the tender, easy-going Aegean Sea.

In areas where there are dramatic changes in the landscape, and both qualities of the valley and the mountains are mixed, we see a peculiar mixture of both these qualities described in movement. Most Pidiktos dances are danced specifically by men, whereas the Syrtos dances are performed by both men and women.

THE HEALTH OF DANCING

There's this guy I dance with, Arnold Taylor. He has firm hands and shoulders, and his favorite eight-step swing move has this merry-go-round feel to it.

Everything in the periphery is a blur except his face, which usually bears a broad grin.

He's strong - a fact he underscores by introducing himself, with a wink, simply as "Ahnoldt." This faux Schwarzenegger's dance card is usually pretty full. And when he walks, it's more like he's swaggering to a syncopated beat.

It's easy to mistake this 78-year-old retired clergyman for a ladies man. But really, when he's on the dance floor, he's just reflecting the spiritual joy he's gotten out of his favorite form of recreation.

"What do I like most about dance? Oh, well, the sort of happy human relationship. Being with somebody and having fun," he says. Long-time dancers such as Taylor know what the medical community is starting to find some evidence of: the realization that dancing is good for you. Particularly, as it turns out, for older people.

In a recent study of nearly 500 people by the Albert Einstein Center in the Bronx, N.Y., dancing was the only regular physical activity associated with a significant decrease in the incidence of dementia, including Alzheimer's disease. Alzheimer's, which slowly degrades brain and memory function, affects 4 million Americans over the age of 60. Dementia, a broader category of diminished mental ability, affects between 6 million and 7 million.

"Dance is not purely physical in many ways; it also requires a lot of mental effort," said Joseph Verghese, the lead researcher of the study, published in June in the New England Journal of Medicine. Though many studies have explored the relationship between activity and dementia, he said, "if you review them, the (activities) that are purely physical do not seem to have any effect reducing dementia.

"Certainly among my patients (who dance), their posture is different and the way they walk is different."

Among the participants in the Verghese study, those who danced frequently - three or four times a week - showed 76 percent less incidence of dementia than those who danced once a week or not at all. The same study showed that doing puzzles, mind games and other mentally stimulating activities also reduces the incidence of dementia, but that purely physical activities - swimming, bicycling, walking, climbing stairs - had no preventive value.

Exorcising the ya-yas

The results don't surprise Jamie Platt, 53, an analyst for the Social Security Administration who gets his kicks folk dancing, Balkan, Turkish and Armenian style. "I have a very sedentary kind of job. But when I go dancing, I get my ya-yas out," said Platt. "It keeps me very vibrant. The dances that we do have very complex footwork. You have to think about the complex rhythms. So it keeps you on the ball."

But what is it about dance that might make it life- and brain-enhancing? The short answer, said Verghese: "I really don't know."

True, it involves movement, and there are dozens of studies that show - even if the Einstein Center study didn't - a positive correlation between physical exercise of all kinds and mental health. Essentially, exercise seems to jazz the brain.

Sustained aerobic activity involves not just those parts of the brain that control motor and sensory functions, but also the hippocampus - the section responsible for memory and many other cognitive functions, said Carl W.Cotman, a neuroscientist at the University of California, Irvine.

"It's surprising, because you'd think, 'What's that got to do with movement?' but it does," said Cotman, who studies the influence of exercise on the brains of rats and mice. In animals that exercise, the connections between brain cells grow stronger, and a protein (brain-derived neurotrophic factor, or BDNF) shown to improve neuron survival increases.

In addition, Cotman says - citing a finding that supports the theory that dance is better for your brain than other fitness activities - physically active animals that have an "emotional support system," such as interacting with other animals, see even more benefits in their brains.

SCOTTISH DANCE SCENE

The Ridgecrest Scottish Weekend - Plans are underway for the Ridgecrest Scottish Weekend and Outing, scheduled to be held on April 17-18 in Ridgecrest Hi Desert Dance Center. This two-day event is held biennially in conjunction with the San Gabriel Valley Branch's monthly party and the Desert Dancers' Spring Festivity. The Saturday program includes a workshop in the afternoon and the Scottish dance party in the evening.

On Sunday, an outing to the local petroglyphs in the Coso Mountain Range on China Lake Naval Air Weapons Station will be conducted. These carved figures on volcanic rock (basalt) can be traced to over 10,000 years ago and the sites were listed in the National Register of Historic Places as Little

Petroglyph Canyon. The tour is free of charge to participants and is approximately from 9 AM to 3 PM. Unfortunately the canyon is located inside the Navy Base and, therefore, several ground rules need to be followed in order to visit the area. The security is much tighter on the base since 9/11/2001. Every one visiting the area needs to submit their request through the local POC (Frank Wu) in writing at least two weeks prior to the visit. The Scottish group is now limited to 20. No replacements can be made once the request is confirmed. Please let Frank know if you are interested in visiting the rock art area. Nevertheless, the outing to view the local ancient Indian rock arts is an interesting experience and, in particular, it's also a time the wild flowers are blooming in the desert after this year's good winter rain.

This will be our fifth biennial weekend activity and wi also celebrate the Ridgecrest Scottish class' silver Anniversary. The class started in 1979 by Dwight Fine with L.A. Branch. Dwight was our teacher until his retirement and his move out of Ridgecrest in 1992. Scottish dancing continues ever since. Dance program and fliers will be out soon. Please come and help us celebrate the occasion.

The Alexander Strathspey - Frank briefly taught the dance at Beverly Barr's Friday night class on November 21. Someone may have figured out that there is a side note associated with this dance. The dance starts with two half Right-Hand Acrosses (2 crosses or 2X), followed by a full Left-Hand Across (one cross or one X), then another two Right-Hand Acrosses (2X). Consider X as one RA or LA regardless of a full or a half, there is a total of 5X's. The X in Roman numeral is ten and five of them make 50. The dance was devised for the occasion of Gerri and Bob Alexander's Golden (50th) Anniversary.

Scottish Website - Chuck Olsen of the Orange County Branch has created a website for Scottish activity photos. There are many Scottish dance photos available for viewing from the San Gabriel Valley Branch's Scottish Luau and the Anniversary Ball, the Asilomar Weekend Workshop, the OC's Christmas Ball and the LA's Hogmanay Ball. VEGETARIAN STUFFED GRAPE LEAVES

1 jar of grape leaves, drained and rinsed 2 medium onions, finely chopped

Olive oil

Salt and pepper to taste

Water

Juice of 2 lemons

2 tablespoons parsley, chopped (cilantro can be added or substituted)

1 can tomato sauce

2 cups white beans, pre-cooked until tender

Saute the onion in 4 tablespoons of oil, until tender. Add the rice, salt and pepper, and saute briefly. Add the water to cover the bottom of the pot by about 1". and cook, covered for about 25 minutes. When nearly done, add the juice of one lemon and the parsley and continue to cook until the water is absorbed.

Fill and shape the grape leaves, with the vein side up. Fold and roll to make cigar shaped packages, tucking the ends in. Put enough pre-cooked beans on the bottom of a large pot to cover the bottom and arrange the stuffed leaves on top.

Cover the leaves with water and tomato sauce and add the juice of the second lemon and about 3 tablespoons of olive oil. Cover with extra unfilled grape leaves and add the remaining beans to the pot. Cook for about 10 minutes over medium heat, reduce heat and continue cooking for about an hour, or until the water is absorbed.

This recipe is a lot of work and takes time, but turns out well. It was tested by **Ike Hasson**, of Greek heritage, and a long time member of Westwood Co-op.

STIFAIDO

1 lb. top beef round, cut in chunks

12 little onions, whole 1 glass white wine

1 clove garlic 1 Tbs. flour

3 tomatoes, sliced 1/2 tsp. sugar (opt.)

Brown the beef in a little fat, add water and simmer till tender (about 1- 1/2 hours). Meantime, brown onions and garlic, add tomatoes. Add white wine. Mix the flour with a little of the liquid and add, stirring in well. Cook until onions are done, stirring frequently. Add the meat, and boil up. Serves 3-4.
