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

I also used to dance at the Intersection, driving down from UC Santa Barbara with my dance friends on a Saturday night, dancing until midnight, stopping at Cantors for a late night snack, and getting back at 3:00 in the morning a perfectly normal night for folk dance junkies. I was able to relive those feelings and experiences at the Reunion, along with seeing myself (and others who were there) on a video tape from the 1984 Intersection New Years Party (the last night). What a treat!

I also knew Dean Linscott. I first met him in 1976, when I drove up to Mendocino Folklore Camp for the first time and spent Friday evening dancing with the Kopachka Dancers in Mill Valley (and was an overnight guest in his home). I would see him almost every summer after that at Folklore Camp.

These two unrelated events reinforce the viewpoint that the spirit of folk dancing lives on, and is supported by the life long dedication of leaders like Dean Linscott and the hundreds of folk dancers at the Reunion.

I look forward to our next reunion, wherever it is.



Dean Linscott



Dean Linscott, son of long-time folk dance leaders Mark and Wilma Linscott of Bakersfield. grew up with folk dancing in his blood and learned more as a student at UCLA. He performed with the Gandy Dancers in Los Angeles and became its co-director. He also was a member of the Cigany Dancers (aka, Dolina Cigany) of San Diego. Dean moved to the San

Francisco Bay area in the summer of 1964 to take a position as Professor of Microbiology at the UCSF Medical School and searched for a single group in which he could continue dancing and performing Balkan and Central European dances. Then came a move to Mill Valley, after which he formed and taught a new folk dance group, the Kopachka Dancers, with about 30 dancers. Within six months, the group had their first performance under their belts. In 1971, the ensemble gave their first full-length concert to a sellout crowd of more than a thousand people.

After attending Madelynne Greene's Mendocino Folklore Camp in 1966, Dean started a family dance camp in Sonoma's Valley of the Moon, inviting ethnic and master instructors to teach. A main thrust of the camp was to teach the song words to the dances being taught and to have folklore sessions. He also was codirector of the Mendocino Folklore Camp for 17 years and made his last teaching appearance there in 2002. Dean continued to be involved in leading folk dance classes for families, young people, and even one for men only. He taught at folkdance camps and the Statewide festival, where the Kopachka Dancers performed Dances Dean has taught include Balun. Baztan-

Dantza. Døla Masurka, Hornfiffen, Islandsk Skottis, La Cotriade, Malhão, Mândrele, Ragassat Es-San'a, Ringländer från Hede, St. Gilgen Figurentanz, Trei Pâzeste de Oltenia, Trilisesti, and Vira Valseado. Dean passed away March 24, and has left a huge gap in the folk dance world. Many of us owe a great deal of gratitude to him for his years of participation and leadership. A memorial dance is planned in Mill Valley in the near future.

In the early 70's I would drive in from Tucson for the weekend, dance at the Intersection, and drive back in time for work on Monday morning. Ethnic Music

HASSAPIKOS (Greek)

This was the dance of the Butcher's Guild of Constantinople during the Byzantine period, and was then known as *Makellarikos*, from the "pure" word for butcher. The dance remained popular in Constantinople and western Asia Minor for centuries until the 1922 change, after which it was absorbed by *rembetika* music and became panhellenic.

In modern times, the dance has also become popular with sailors and is thus sometimes called *Naftiko* in ports. Thanks to the movie "Zorba the Greek," it has become the best known Greek dance in the world. There are countless variations and no two groups of dancers do the same routine. The dance is done with a hand-to-shoulder hold, and the dancers may improvise the order of the variations, communicating with taps on the shoulders of the adjacent dancer.

Often said to be an ancient dance of sacrifice. Words in English

The road is dark until I meet you. Meet me in the road that I may give you my hand. Make your bed for two, for you and for me, that we may embrace each other from the start and all will be brought back to life. I embraced you, you embraced me. You took from me and I took from you. I lost myself in your eyes and in your fate. Words in Native Tongue

Chorus:

SERBIAN DANCES Povoz or Šeta

Povoz is a local term used in the villages around Belgrade to describe the wedding dance where everyone "hooks" onto his neighbor's elbow and, in a chain, proceeds to the bride's house. It is one of several variations of the popular dance Š*etnja* enjoyed by American folk dancers. It is variously called Povoz, Šeta, and Šetnja and was first notated by the Serbian ethnomusicologists, **Milica Illijin** and **Olivera Mladenovic** in their 1962 booklet, *Narodne Igre u Okolini Beograda* ("Folk dances in the region near Belgrade"). **Dennis Boxell** was a student of Milica Illijin in 1964 and also went to the village of Pinosava where he saw first hand the dances of this region. You may dance any of the above mentioned variations to the recorded music.

Pinosavka

Pinosavka is a slow version of the basic *Moravac* or U Šest type of dance common to the villages in the area just to the south of Belgrade known as Beogradska Posavina (The Sava River Valley near Belgrade). I learned it in the village of Pinosava and decided to call it "Pinosavka" (the dance from Pinosava). It really is a type of Šumadijsko kolo or Krnjevacko kolo and is the main dance of the region (see also Povoz and Moravac from the same area). I also showed, at one time, a "high energy" version of the dance performed by a group of young men, in the village of Pinosava, at a vecerinka (evening party) one Saturday evening during the winter of 1964. They were obviously showing off and danced slightly higher on their toes with energetic ankle and knee flexion. During the variation "Slip Step", they jumped into a deep knee bend on measure 8, count one, with great relish. This "high energy" version was made popular throughout the folk dance world by my long time friend in folklore, Yves Moreau, who enjoyed the dance immensely.





circle around the corporal, who was the dance master. Then, with spurs ringing, the dance would begin, soldiers repeating ever more complex dance figures led by the corporal. What an irresistible sight for the young, poor boys! It took little encouragement for them to join the dance circle, a little more from the inevitable jug of wine, perhaps trying on a soldier's sabre or shako, and the young man was heartily welcomed into a lifetime enlistment in the emperor's army! It worked for over a hundred years. Accounts of the dance, already well developed, date from 1793 in Vienna.

The verbunk is the dominant men's dance throughout much of western Hungary. In the northwest, the dance is very martial in nature, every man performing the same figures (*Kapuvari Verbunk* and *Gencsi Verbunk* are two of Czompo's popular dances of this type). Further east and south, the dance disappears, or at least its martial nature disappears, as the older ugros and herdsman's dances reappear in Somogy, Sarköz and the Great Plain. Further away, in Transylvania, the already mentioned lads' dances appear.

Lastly, the *csárdás* (char dawsh; sounds like "car wash"), the national dance of Hungary. Originating in the village *csárdá* or pub, the dance lacked respectability for generations, since no respectable girl would ever go into a *csárdá*. Like the Charleston, the dance eventually outgrew its immoral beginnings and became the dance most dear to the Hungarian heart.

The *csárdás* displays marked differences between regions, varying greatly in richness of figures, tempo

and character. The classic "profile" of the *csárdás* is a long, almost melancholy beginning, followed by a short, fiery ending in which the slower figures may be repeated or, in some areas, completely new figures may be introduced. In Rabaköz and Paloc in the north, the dance is energetic, with sharp, stamping movements. In Somogy to the south, the dance becomes much more languid and open. To the east, Szatmar County displays a csárdás with immense differences in slow and fast tempos, a rich variety of figures and the introduction of verbunk figures into the dance by the men - one of the most spectacular versions of the csárdás.

In Transylvania, still further east, the couple dances are mostly of the older form, and the term *csárdás* is usually applied to the middle section which is preceded by a very slow dance and followed by a very rapid one.

Interestingly, the word *paros* (par osh) means simply: "couple dance" and is applied to any couple dance, whether a csárdás or not. It does not identify any specific dance.

If this sounds like a lot of information, it is, but it barely scratches the surface of this most interesting and challenging ethnic dance tradition. And Hungary is only one of many with dance cultures equally worthy of such in-depth analysis. It is hoped that others will continue to apply its methods and lessons to the preservation of this most precious and fleeting of the folk arts.

DANCE DAY PREPARATIONS

On the 29th of April, as every year since 1982, Dance Day will be celebrated all over the world. The main purpose of Dance Day events is to attract the attention of the wider public to the art of dance. Special emphasis should be given to addressing a "new" public, people who do not follow dance events during the course of the year.

Dance Day events may be special performances, open-door courses, public rehearsals, lectures, exhibitions, articles in newspapers and magazines, dance evenings, radio and TV programs, visits, street shows, etc.

At best, events should take place in "new" places, such as streets, parks, squares, shops, factories, villages, discotheques, schools, stadiums, etc. By setting the event in original surroundings you stress the fact that this is an event dedicated to the universal family of dancers.

Karikázo

the Csangos from Gymes in northern Romania, the left-moving chain dances of Transdanubia, the women's karikázo, found throughout Transdanubia and to a lesser extent elsewhere, and in the lassü Magyar a slow turning dance of two couples found in Transylvania., plus numerous other examples found throughout the Hungarian dance region.

The karikázo, well-known to recreational folk dancers, is the most recent of the circle dances and is considered to be more of a singing game than a dance. the girls gathering and singing to pass the time while the men engage in a bout of macho drinking. The songs are accompanied by simple dance steps led by one of the singers. Different circles of women, usually of different generations, will dance different steps to the same song. The steps are improvised from within a repertoire of local dance figures and are created anew each time

Herdsmen's dances generally fall within the ugros or "jumping dance" family, also very old. Early settlers were, of necessity, both herdsmen and warriors, and were known as hajduks (hai duke). Dancing with naked swords, staffs, whips and other tools and weapons was a common, often spectacular, entertainment, noted enthusiastically by early travelers. The dances exist today and, though the sword is rarely seen, amazing dexterity with the staff is demonstrated in shepherd's dances of Somogy and horsemen's dances of the Hortobagy. Olahos is a well-known variation of the dance, found in the Great Plain and southern Tisza.

The *uaros* takes many forms and is still danced throughout Hungary. Where the newer verbunk did not become established, this is still the dominant dance for men and often for couples, as well.

April 2004

"Lad's dances" were developed from the old herdsmen's dances and are found mostly in Transylvania. They are considered to be the most highly developed of all Hungarian dances. Competitive in nature, as were many herdsmen's dances, the dance is improvised by the dancer from a local repertoire of figures and movement styles and are performed within a highly structured format which varies from place to place. The dance is marked by dynamic leg gestures, slapping patterns on boot and thigh, leaps and stamping rhythms. Once observed, no one can fail to recognize one of these spectacular dances, known variously as legényes, tempö, pontozó, sürü Maqyar and others.

Old Style Couple Dances

Martin credits the Western Renaissance of the 16th Century with the introduction of the pre-csárdás couple dances into Hungary. Many of the figures of the csárdás appeared very early, including the closeholding of the partner and rapid turning figures. The dance form is still found in Transylvania in such wellknown dances as the "Székély forgatós", and the csárdás of Mezöség. Transylvanian Romanians perform similar dances ("invirtita", "ardeleana", "breaza" and "ungureasca"), characterized by complex 7/16 rhythms and syncopated dance movements that are in stark contrast to the Hungarians' more straight forward treatment of a 4/4 rhythm.

New Style Dances

In Europe, anything 200 years old is considered "new". So it is with Martin's "New Style Dances", which he traces to the late 18th Century, with new musical motifs which are still with us.

The Hungarian male was most proud of two things: his ability to ride and his skill in dance. These factors combined to become the basis of the creation of a new dance - the verbunk (from verbun, "to recruit" in German). Those were the days of the "hussars" ("huszar" in Hungarian), the famous, brilliantly uniformed cavalry of European armies. Hungarian youth were of great interest to the Austro-Hungarian army and the verbunk dance was the recruiting device. Small detachments of soldiers, specially selected

and trained, were sent into the villages, where their uniforms drew great attention from the young men and girls alike. The sergeant would hire the local gypsy musicians to play and the soldiers would gather in a

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Choreogeography

HUNGARY

Hungary is and has been in the forefront in ethnic dance research, notation and reconstruction for several decades. We know more about the dance culture and tradition of Hungary than perhaps any single country, due to the efforts and contributions of **Dr. György Martin**, director of the Ethnomusicology Department of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences. The fortunate combination of a rich and diverse dance tradition, brilliant and concerned scientists and official government support has not simply provided us with a thorough and continuing study of Hungarian dance culture. It has provided an example and created a model for all to follow.

Recreational folk dancers are familiar with Hungarian dance through the 30-year effort of **Andor Czompo**, who began teaching to folk dancers in the early 1960s. The Hungarian *tanchaz* (TANC haaz = "dance house") movement - a direct result of research by Martin and others - reached America in the late 1970s and this improvised dancing of traditional "dance cycles" has become one of the most advanced recreational folk dance activities.

It is past time for us to examine this wealth of dance information. Many Hungarian dance names will be familiar to folk dancers; others will be new. Martin's regional and temporal classifications will be generally followed, though the length of this study requires some deletions and adjustments.

REGIONS OF HUNGARY

Folk Dance Scene

Martin divides the country into three regions or "dance dialects". In keeping with the east to west settlement of Hungary, let's begin with the oldest, easternmost region - Transylvania (*Erdaly*: "air dai yee" in Hungarian), a forested plateau surrounded by the high Carpathian Alps, the eastern end of the Carpathian Mountains. Migrating Magyar tribes entered the region in the 10th Century from the Danube Valley to the south seeking to avoid attacks by other barbaric tribes in the area; thus, *Transylvania* (trans = "across" + sylvan = "forests"). This is the oldest region of Hungarian-speaking peoples and is part of Romania only by very recent political action.

Westward from the wooded slopes of Transylvania is the "Hungarian Basin", generally flat and treeless, drained by two north-south rivers, the Tisza and the Danube.



Csárdás Band

The "Tisza Region" contains the Alföld (Great Plain), heart of the Hungarian horse culture, and the northern mountains, site of the famous Tokaj wine.

Further west, across the Danube is the western third of the Hungarian region, *Transdanubia* ("across" + "Danube"; *Dunantul:* "doo non tool" in Hungarian), divided north and south by Lake Balaton; this is Martin's "Danube Region". The south is a land of gently rolling hills, with sheep and swine husbandry dominant. Northern Transdanubia is closest to Austria and shows the most Western influence in its dance culture. Other well-known areas of the Danube Region are Sarköz (shar kooz) along the southern Danube and Paloc (pa lotes) in the north. One must remember to include neighboring areas in Croatia and Slovakia in these ethnographic regions.

DANCE CLASSIFICATIONS

Throughout most of Hungary, the various dances in each region's repertoire are danced in a traditional sequence, a *tancrend* or "dance cycle". The most common order is: the girls' *karikázo*, the men's *verbunk*, followed by the couple *csárdás*. This tradition follows a long period of development, the heart of Martin's research.

Old Style Dances:

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Dance historians and ethnologists acknowledge the "chain" or "circle" dance as the oldest form of dance, originating in the dim, unknown past as part of tribal ritual. The form exists still, primarily in the Balkan region of Europe, insulated by the Turks from the influences of Western Renaissance which allowed development of couple dance.

In Hungarian dance, the circle and chain dance is found in several forms, including the *hajza* (hay zaw) of

The local music of Kalymnos is either violin and laouto, or tsambouna (bagpipe with 1 drone and twin chanters). The main dances are Issios, Sousta, and the Island Syrtos and Island Kalamatianos. The Olympians' director Vasili Contos, his sisters and family, and 2 or 3 dozen in the various age-group dance troupes from the church, all danced with us.

Some parents knew Kalymnian dances and others were brave enough to try. Some knew songs. We did dances from Crete and other islands too, and, to let the bagpiper rest, we played a few sets from recordings, with mainland "taverna" dances and favorite regions like Macedonia, Epirus, Thrace and Pontos.

With a full dinner, this Island Night was \$20; some of the proceeds benefitted the Olympians. Kypseli 'regular' Louise Bilman, long-time Los Angeles dance teacher and for many years an FDF judge, spends a few weeks on Kalymnos each year, so we had a soft spot in our heart for the island.
