

Jaap Leegwater



Jaap Leegwater started his dance career in his native country, The Netherlands, where he earned degrees in both education and international folk dance. Fascinated with the irregular Balkan rhythms and drawn to the expressiveness of its movements, Jaap specialized in Bulgarian dance and choreography.

In 1969, he was one of the first non-Bulgarians invited to study at the State Choreographers Schools in Sofia and Plovdiv, Bulgaria.

In cooperation with the Dutch Ministry of Culture and the Bulgarian Center for Amateur Art, he carried out research on village dances in the different ethnographic regions and on the teaching of Bulgarian folk dance in the country's educational system. During his frequent trips to Bulgaria, over a period of 30 years, Jaap collected and recorded many original dances and songs learned from older people in many villages throughout the country where folklore traditions are still a way of life.

He was first introduced to the American folkdance scene by the late **Ciga Despotovic** in 1980. He gratefully recognizes the support and inspiration received from **Marianne** and **Michael Herman**, **Dennis Boxell** and **Yves Moreau** in establishing himself in Northern America professionally.

Jaap has conducted workshops and dance seminars in various countries: The Netherlands. Germany, Switzerland. Sweden, Israel, England, United States, Canada, Japan, Taiwan, and Hong Kong. He is a regular instructor at many major dance camps and organizations including Maine Folk Dance Camp. Stockton Folk Dance Camp at the University of the Pacific, Mendocino Folklore Camp, the EEFC Balkan Music and Dance Camp, Kolo Festival in San Francisco, Texas Folk Dance Camp. New Mexico August Folk Dance Camp, Santa Barbara Folk Dance Symposium, Montreal International Folk Dance Camp, Ontario Folk Dance Camp and the Bulgarian Festivals in Vancouver, B.C.

He has also staged choreographies for the following performing ensembles in North America: Les Gems des Mon Pays in Montreal, Canada, The BYU International Dance Ensemble at Brigham Young University in Provo, Utah, The Ball State University International Dance Ensemble in Indiana and The Khadra Folk Ballet in San Francisco. California.

Along with teaching dance Jaap also plays the flute. As a member of the folk dance bands Kaleb, Orkest Brandon, Ranja and Kusmet, he toured throughout The Netherlands performing and accompanying at many international folk dance festivals and workshops. Since 1988 he has been a regular member of the Bicoastal Band, the house orchestra for the Stockton Folk Dance Camp.

The trademark Folklora Balkana is a collaboration of Bulgaria specialists Yves Moreau and Jaap Leegwater in an effort to combine resources and offer quality products and programs in the field of Bulgarian dance and folklore. It was founded in 1991 by Jaap and Yves and resulted in a highly acclaimed and popular compact disc of 20 Bulgarian Folk Dance favorites called *Ajde Na Horo* (Gega GD134).

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Plato and the Bible

Plato and the Bible on the Subject of Dancing

There are numerous references to dancing in the Bible. Women go forth in music and dance in celebration of Yiftah's victory over the Amonites (above, Judges 11:34) and in celebration of David's victory over the Philistines (I Samuel 18:6). But, dancing is neither relegated to women, nor to military victories. No less a figure than King David himself, along with his men, dance before the Ark of the Lord as it is brought to Jerusalem (II Samuel 6:5).

In one of his last dialogues, *Laws*, the great Greek philosopher, Plato, fictionalizes an encounter among three men on the island of Crete discussing how one commissioner has been given the task of setting up a new city and it's laws.

In book II, the interlocutors agree that what each city needs is an annual ceremony in which all citizens are duty bound to participate in a chorus that requires singing and dancing. Plato, it seems, regarded singing and dancing as essential for a proper society. In fact, one of the characters standing in for Plato insists that the well-educated man knows how to dance. His explanation for this definition of "well-educated" is interesting.

A good dancer must be aware of rhythm and harmony, that is, his movements must fit both with the music and with his partners. The good dancer must also know the "schemata", that is the proper movements, the right steps. Accordingly, the good dancer learns to appreciate the good and despise the bad.

Hence, dancing is nothing short of moral education. A good dancer is a good citizen. A good dancer is someone who knows how to co-operate with others, to lead when necessary and to follow when appropriate. A good dancer knows what steps must be taken to assure a positive outcome. A good dancer can appreciate and judge the same qualities in others.

While it is not certain that the Bible echoes Plato's philosophy or even preceded it, the lesson that derives from Plato's philosophy is still apposite. Judaism, indeed the whole world needs good dancers. Miriam's spontaneous dancing after the Exodus suggests that she realized that for Israel to flourish as a freed people, they needed to learn to dance. And if any society is going to flourish, it needs to do no less. Dancing is surely not, as George Bernard Shaw put it, a vertical expression of a horizontal intention. Dancing is at the very heart of the kind of society we want to have.



The first week at CalTech he taught and cleaned up some strolling-type dances which we enjoy. He corrected some bad habits that we were starting to have, and added to some dances from previous lessons, now that we are very comfortable with them. Two musicians also came and gave a short lesson after Dennis did the dance class. They played for us for our enjoyment and came the next week a bit improved.

The second week many of his former Serbian students came and brought piles of energy, so the evening teaching went Serbian. The dances were high energy and fun; the sort that we tend to only hear about but happen at a village wedding or party. Here was a chance to experience it live! A few parents, not dancers, joined in trying. They said they had fun, but were not in the high energy section of the lines.

Up in Santa Barbara, Macedonian and Bulgarian dances were taught. The energy level was very high, the desire to learn was there. The hardest dance was *Troiru*, a difficult, but fun dance, once mastered. The *Bella Olymbia* was a different challenge because it is a ladies' dance and must be danced as ladies would, but women's ways are rarely taught correctly, if at all. A variety of leaders is best, but suddenly ladies were uncomfortable leading and seconding. These skills are not learned in an evening, but can be worked on until more ladies are comfortable leading. Women's styling

is usually overlooked, or we are just told "take smaller steps". This was an eye opener for the ladies even though the Santa Barbara men were mad that they were not a part of it. But they were doing their village part of eating, drinking, and discussing topics of the day. (Wonderful cheese, wine and chips were provided.)

Dennis' next trip will probably be in early summer. Next scheduled event at Cal Tech is Aug. 17 with **John Filcich** teaching, and the **Yeseta Brothers** playing.

SCOTS VS ENGLISH

Dear Rich (Duree),

I enjoyed your article in Scene on the origins of contra dancing, but I must disagree with the generalization of the English being more laid back than the Scots, on the basis of the character of their country dances. My involvement with Scottish country dancing spans 25 years, includes 7 visits to Scotland and atten- CONTRA DANCE ISSUE dance at 6 summer schools of the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society (RCDS) at St. Andrews. I have also become acquainted with many people of Scottish origin through country dance events and Scottish societies in this country and in Canada. I'm inclined to think all generalizations about people are wrong, but it has certainly been my impression that the Scots are, if anything, far more laid back than the English. I have found them to be good-natured, good-humored, kind, generous, unpretentious people, without the hoity-toity, lah-dee-dah elements often found among the English.

The difference in the character of the country dances is. I think, more connected with the history of the dances than with any national character. In particular, I feel it is associated with the work of the RCDS. At the time of the founding of the Society, in 1923, Scottish country dancing was on the verge of dying out and was being danced in a rather rough and rowdy manner. The founders of the Society, Miss Jean Milligan and Mrs. Isabel Stewart, felt that a higher standard for the dance would rescue it from oblivion and prevent its decay. Toward this end, they selected a style of dancing favored by mid-Victorian dancing masters, and set standards for the steps and formations incorporating this style. These standards were taught at the summer convocations at St. Andrews. Events have proved the wisdom of these ladies, as Scottish country dancing not only revived, but spread throughout the world. Today folk dancers relish so many of these dances. My own fondness for them led me to pursue Scottish Country Dancing as a specialty.

If one sees Scottish country dancing only as danced by demonstration teams, one does tend to get a "discipline of classical ballet" impression. However, the standards were set up by the Society as something to strive for, rather than as something one had to do in order to be correct. Light-weight footwear called ghillies is mandatory in order to do the steps with precision. Folk dancers rarely wear ghillies for general folk dancing, and the steps one sees at folk dance events are anything but precise. This may detract a bit from the appearance of the dance, but takes nothing from the fun, which is the most important thing. Also, if one goes to a Scottish wedding or party and sees the Eightsome Reel or Duke of Perth danced by ordinary Scottish people in ordinary footwear, one sees no third positions, but one does see a spirit and exuberance, not a polished demonstration; and definitely laid back.
