Serbian Wedding Customs

Last month's Scene featured an article about Rom weddings. Here is one about Serbian wedding customs for comparison and contrast.

This article appeared in the July 2004 issue of Northwest Folkdancer, and is reproduced with permission.

SVADBA! A wedding in Serbia

Even in this modern age of computers, cell phones, and big screen TVs, a wedding in a Serbian village follows many of the old traditions. Although marriages are usually no longer arranged, as they were in the past, marriage is still seen as a contract between two families. The bride is not just marrying the groom, but is marrying into the household, since it is still the norm for the young married couple to continue to live with the groom's family. If the girl is an only child and the boy has other brothers, they will usually go to live with the bride's family. So, the characteristics of the marrying couple are carefully considered by their families.

In the past, most weddings were held in the fall, after the harvest was in and before the Christmas Lent began. Now, however, they are held almost any season, but according to Church canon, cannot be held during any of the Lenten fasts of the Orthodox Church. There are four main fasts, each of several weeks duration. For three weeks before the wedding, the bans are read in the church. Traditionally, a couple of weeks before the wedding, a formal betrothal ceremony is held at the church.

A few days before the wedding, the father goes about the village officially inviting the guests. He carries with him a flower-and-ribbon-decorated round wooden brandy flask and ceremoniously offers a sip of *sljivovica* to the head of the house. He carries with him a woven bag, to which each invited guest pins a small gift, such as a handkerchief or small towel.

On the day of the wedding, the groom's guests gather in the yard of his parent's house, where a big (rented) tent is set up. They are served a light breakfast and drinks before setting off in procession to get the bride. In the past, they would have gone with carriages, with long towels and flowers attached to the horses' bridles. Now the towels and flowers are attached to the windshield wipers of the cars! The procession is led by the *vojvoda*, wearing a tall conical decorated paper hat, followed or accompanied by the flag bearer, who carries a large Serbian flag extending out the car window. The rest of the procession follows, with much blowing of horns.

When the wedding party reaches the girl's home, they must first 'earn' the right to enter the yard. A tall pole with an apple impaled on the top stands beside the gate. The apple must be shot down before the groom's party can enter the yard. Then the party enters, greeted by live music. They are seated at long tables, where they are served food and drinks. Corsages of rosemary and small artificial flowers, tied with the Serbian tri-

color, are pinned onto each guest by the sisters, cousins, and girlfriends of the bride. They receive a few coins in exchange. Gifts are taken to the bride, who remains in the house. She is led out to the accompaniment of gunshots, and put into the care of the best man, who has a white sash tied across his chest and who is her guardian until the marriage ceremony. When the meal is over, they set off for the church.

During the Orthodox wedding service, the bride and groom stand before the priest, along with the godfather and the chief witness. They hold tall candles decorated with flowers. As a part of the ceremony, the bride and groom's hands are tied together. Golden wedding crowns are placed on their heads, and all four people circle the altar three times. They sip ceremonial wine from a golden goblet. The whole service is rather long, as it is a wedding liturgy.

The bride, groom, godfather, witness, and close family members then go to the municipal building to register the marriage. The majority of the guests proceed to the groom's home for the wedding feast. An archway of flowers has been built over the main gate, through which the guests enter, accompanied by music. Again they are seated at long tables under a big tent, where they are served drinks and enjoy the music while waiting for the arrival of the newlyweds. When they arrive, the bride is given a baby boy to kiss three times, to ensure that she will bear sons. She sits in her mother-in-law's lap to show respect and deference to her. Before she can enter the house, she tosses wheat grains in four directions and must throw a round wooden sieve with wheat grains in it onto the roof, to bring fertility and prosperity to the household. Then the wedding feast begins. The newlyweds and their immediate families are seated at the head table. There are numerous toasts to the young couple. A large round loaf of bread is carried from quest to quest, each of whom places money on it as a gift to the newlyweds. The main dish is always roast pig, often plus roast lamb. Wedding sauerkraut (svadbarski kupus) is also traditional. There are many courses, and the feast goes on for many hours. Music is played almost constantly, and kolo dancing winds between the tables. When it is time for dessert, in addition to the wedding cake, many of the women guests have brought a cake also, which is incorporated into the dessert course.

The bride and groom retire into the house, but the celebration may go on for many more hours. The next day, the party continues for the closer relatives, who return for more feasting. The two families now become 'friends' (prijatelji), a close relationship of respect and friendship.

These customs are even followed in most city weddings, but perhaps in a somewhat abbreviated form. However, the Serbian wedding traditions are very much alive and strong, and are an important part of Serbian folklore.

Choreogeography of Transylvania

Few places in the Western World are as storied as Transylvania. Americans are particularly ill-informed about this beautiful region, recalling only a vague reference to an evil Count Dracula, whoever he was. For those of us who know a bit more about Europe, we know it is the ancient home of the Hungarians, now a major region of Romania and the subject of intense folkloric study.

Europe's checkered and confusing history did not neglect Transylvania, as the present population can attest. A mixture of Hungarians and Romanians exists with an uneasy tolerance in a land with its feudal roots still very evident. Small isolated villages, connected by wandering dirt roads, are populated by one or another of the two ethnic groups, rarely mixed, and the ethnicity is evident in every detail from the village names to the rooflines of the peasant cottages.

In the 10th Century, seven Magyar tribes arrived in Transylvania at the end of a long migration from the steppes of Asia through the Danube Valley over the Transylvanian Alps (thus the name: Trans = across, sylvan = forests). Under the leadership of the leader we know as Atilla the Hun, these nomadic horse people settled in the valleys of Transylvania and eventually spread westward to occupy the Hungarian Basin. For a thousand years, Transylvania remained a major region of the Hungarians as they became a part of the old Austro-Hungarian Empire.

Within the lifetime of many living today, the spoils of war took this treasured place from the Hungarians and gave it to neighboring Romania. The resulting repopulation upheavals and political suppression are well-known. As Romanians moved into Transylvania, place names were changed and many were deported. The entire Saxon population around Hermanstadt was expelled, destroying an entire culture in the process.

Walter Starkey, in his book Raggle Taggle, tells of meeting a strange little man on his travels in Transylvania in the late 1920s, who claimed to be the fabled Pied Piper of Hamlin. He claimed to have brought the children to Hermanstadt where they still lived, tall, fair and blonde in a nation of dark-haired Romanians and Hungarians.

Transylvania is a beautiful land of mountains and valleys, green meadows and dark forests. Its remote sheltered location ensured minimal influence by either the Ottomans or Western Europe, allowing a rather undisturbed, organic folkloric development. Saxons, Hungarians, and Romanians each maintained their particular identities, yet combined in a natural

interaction to create an extremely rich, identifiable Transylvanian culture.

Hungarian regions roughly divided Transylvania into *Mezöség* in the north centered around Club (formerly *Kaloszvar*), *Székélyföld* in the east and *Kalotaszeg* in the east and south. A third group, the *Csángós*, of *Székély* stock, live outside any of these regions in the high Transylvanian Alps and in *Moldavia* to the east.

The folk arts of dance, costume, music, furniture, architecture, pottery and wood carving are well developed and carefully preserved. The dance is highly organized and contains both archaic and modern dance forms among both Hungarians and Romanians. Interesting comparisons may be observed between the two, in the competitive seriousness of the Hungarians, with even rhythms and complex syncopations and the Romanian's more grouporiented performance of highly complex rhythms.

Dance cycles generally begin with highly regulated men's dances with an amazing array of athletic figures, followed by a slow, then fast couple dance, equally rich in figures characterized by rapidly spinning figures for the women. In some regions the differences between the Hungarian and Romanian dance is slight, while in others it is quite evident in both figures and rhythms.

The Csángós of the Gyimex Pass and Moldavia reveal even older forms, preserved in regions not influenced by the more modern Hungarian culture. Indeed, their dance traditions have been adopted from Moldavian and Romanian dance forms, giving them a more Balkan flavor with chain dances dominating.

The Székély of eastern Transylvania are unique even among the Hungarians, having been granted special privileges, such as the right to own land and freedom from taxation by the Hapsburgs in exchange for acting as border guards against the Ottomans just over the mountains. The Széklers to this day proudly maintain their separate identity, having adopted more modern dance motifs into their repertoire.

Many ethnologists have dedicated their entire lives to the study of one small region of Transylvanian dance and folklore. It's story would fill volumes and is still an endless reservoir of folk art treasures. As it becomes modernized in the near future, much of that folklore will naturally disappear. Folklorists and ethnologists are frantically studying the region to save as much as possible of this priceless heritage and those of us who study the dance are richer for it. To many of us, it is the ultimate dance.


