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

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Lee Otterholt



Lee Otterholt, born in the U.S. of Norwegian-American parents, has lived and worked most of his life in Norway as a professional dancer, teacher and choreographer. In Norway he founded the Center for International Folk Dance in Oslo. He was a professor of folkloristic dance at the Norwegian National College of Ballet and the University College of Oslo and was a dance teacher at the Follo Arts High School in Norway.

Lee was responsible for the establishment of four ongoing folk dance clubs and three performing groups in Norway. He led these groups to festivals in Greece, Bulgaria, Turkey, the Middle East and Hungary. He also produced teaching materials (videos, books and CDs) for teaching folk dance to children and young people in the Norwegian school system.

The last ten years he has been active on the international scene, teaching various Balkan dances at international folk dance festivals in Europe, the US and East Asia and leading folk dance cruises to Norway, Greece, the Upper Danube, Alaska, the Lower Danube, and (2005) the Adriatic Coast of Croatia. He has a professional education in choreography and dance and, in addition to choreographing folk dance for both amateur and professional ensembles in Europe, has choreographed other forms of dance for the professional stage theaters and on national television.

Lee was one of the choreographers of the Opening Ceremony of the Winter Olympic Games in Lillehammer, Norway in 1994. He was also a dancer in the Norwegian Opera Ballet, "Carmen", Oslo, 1985. In the summer of 2004 he moved to Laguna Beach, California and now makes it his home.

Lee's teaching emphasizes style: dancing well, not just "getting the steps." Whenever he can, he also tries to bring improvisation, self-expression and spontaneity

back into the folk-dancing traditions where these elements are a central part of the tradition. And he never loses sight of the fact that we recreational folk dancers dance because it is fun, and because these dances mean something to us - just as they were fun and meant something to the village dancers before us!

THE MANY FACES OF LEE

Teacher: This is how most of us know him. We've seen him teaching delightful dances in a very clear manner, usually emphasizing styling, and making it most enjoyable to us. Often his somewhat sly humor is included, and not infrequently some vocal sound effects as well.

He will be teaching at Diamond Dance Circle in Maryland this May. And in August he will be at Mainewoods Camp, along with his wife, Hilde, who will be teaching Hawaiian dance.

Lee Otterholt

Dancer: If you're lucky, you've seen him perform. You've noticed that sometimes he's very graceful, often rather athletic, always full of spirit, and obviously enjoying it immensely. Reading his bio at the left you can see the great variety of dancing he has done - and in many parts of the world.



Choreographer: In addition to the creation of dances for stage productions and the Olympics, he also can do some very down-to-earth works. Did you see "Bus Stop" at the Laguna festival? If not, find someone who took a video of it. It is hilarious **and** very cleverly designed and well performed.

Briefly, he had his team dressed as business people, complete with attache cases and dark suits, but all doing the Kopanica step as they ran for the bus, then got on it (driven by Lee) and rode around town. The cast was complete with little-old-lady and raincoatdressed flasher.







Singer: He sings very well, and joined the band at Laguna for several songs (below with Shana Winokur).



Tour leader: He has led, and will continue to lead folkdance tours to various interesting locations, such as the Adriatic this coming June.

Dance Historian: Lee has research on dance development and history, and has produced some fascinating work about the origins of dances. He has some eye-opening ideas about why people dance the way they do. His writings are in Norwegian, so we will have to wait until he has the opportunity to re-write them in English before we can delve into them.

John Filcich Award



In February, the National Folk Organization presented John Filcich with the "Preserving Our Legacy" award. The plaque he received stated "for a lifetime of work and achievements in folk dancing and folk arts". Here is the presentation by Bruce Mitchell.

The National Folk Organization annually honors the accomplishments of a dance leader who has made a difference in the folk dance movement. The "Preserving Our Legacy Award" has been given to the founders of the NFO, Mary Bee Jensen and L. DeWayne Young and dance leaders, Andor Czompo, Morry Gelman, Vonnie Brown, Glenn Bannerman, and this year to John Filcich.

The award was presented to John Filcich by Bruce Mitchell, Vice President of the NFO at their annual banquet at the conference in Costa Mesa in February. Bruce asked the audience how many had taught folk dancing with records. Of the forty in attendance, many hands went up. The questions continued with such questions, "Did you teach with 78 records?". Then they were asked if they still owned a record. The group was next asked if they had ever owned records on the

following labels: Star, Fez, National, Horo, Lark, Express, Nina, Kolo Festival and/or Festival? At that point, Ivan Petar Filcich, better known as John was introduced to the audience.

John's history was reviewed with his birth in Fiume, Italy (now Rijeka, Croatia) in 1924. He immigrated to the U.S. when he was eight. In 1935, John's father gave him a stack of old 78 records which included music from Bulgaria, Croatia, Macedonia, and Serbia. It was at that point the John's interest in international music began.

In 1946, John's family moved to California where John first saw folk dancing. By 1947, he was actively dancing once a week in Oakland, California. All of these experiences were the foundation for John's indepth study of the origin and history of the dances, music, and language of his people.

John first attended the College of the Pacific Folk Dance Camp in 1949, the second year of the camp. He has attended ever since - 57 years- the longest tenure of anyone currently attending the Stockton Folk Dance Camp. John Filcich was one of the featured teachers at the camp for many years. Some of the favorite dances introduced by John include: Ajde Jano, Ajde Lepa Maro, Armenian Miserlou, Carlama, Kokonjeste Kolo, Couple Hasapiko, Cujes Mala, Drmes, Ersko Kolo, Kostursko Oro, Makedonka Kolo, Prekid Kolo, Sarajevka, Savila se Bela Loza, Srbijanka and Velikohis signature dance.

In 1952, John started the Kolo Festival as a benefit for his friend and well-known dance leader, **Vyts Beliajus.** The Kolo Festival has become an annual event since then.

Kolo John was a credited advisor on the feature documentary film, "American Gypsy: A Stranger In Everybody's Land".

John, with his best known Festival Records label, was a principal supplier of folk dance recordings throughout the world for many years. He started with the "Slav-Art Music Center" in Oakland. He then opened the "Festival Folk Shop" in San Francisco and later moved his business to Los Angeles where his new venture became "Festival Records". John has now closed his shop and retired - but not completely. He continues to visit many of the ethnic festivals held on the West Coast where people can purchase their favorite music and still provides materials for folk dancers at various workshops and dance camps.

John Filcich truly deserves the "Preserving Our Legacy Award" because he has made a difference.

famous hand embroidered Ukrainian towels and runners sold online and at *ebay*).

Other sources? Look for large pieces of hand embroidery at estate sales, or quality yard sales - such as those sponsored by museums. Edge them with complementary colored material, add a tie, and wear! At the Oakland Museum sale this past February, I found two pieces, one of central Asian origin, and the other, of Central American origin, although very Hungarian in style. At the same sale I picked up remnant materials with which to make their edgings and ties. Wearing the latter to a folkdance elicited the compliment that starts this article. Happy sewing, happy hunting and happy dancing!

Dancers Speak

I, on the other hand, with my old "6-banger" dance engine, require multiple musical jump starts with the jumper cables, before my dance engine kicks in. Is my dance battery low?

Needless to say, I do not get many chances to lead a dance. Besides starting on the right note and step, leading a dance is no small business. Everyone is constantly watching you and looking at your feet. If you make a mistake, it ripples down the line upsetting all the non-watchers. You have to make sure you are doing the correct steps just as they were taught. Being creative and adding your own variations can be disastrous, since some of the dancers who know the dance end up bumping into the ones following me, making the whole line stumble.

In order to lead Bavno Oro for example, you must start at the first note. If you don't you will end up in the middle of the dance on the wrong foot apologizing that we did not start the dance at the right moment. Quite embarrassing!

In some of the other dances, like the Ersko Kolo or Savila se Bela Loza, the line first moves to the right. and then to the left to be followed by dancing in place. Only the leader has the freedom to lead the line in any direction he chooses. Inevitably there is a person at the end of the line who assumes he can be the leader as well. Well two leaders don't make dancing right. By taking a sharp left when the line moves in the reverse direction, he ends up pulling the whole line so that everybody faces out during the in-place dancing portion. For me the joy of dancing is seeing all the dancers. I don't particularly enjoy dancing with the four walls. So, I have a request for all you rear-of-the-line dancers, if you are ever at the end of the line in these dances, please just continue dancing in the circle facing the center. We love to see your smiling face.

And last but not least, there are the corner cutters. Since I like to look at the dancers' faces and not at their backs when I lead the dance, I try to spread out the line in a large circle. Often the end of the line starts cutting corners and taking a shortcut toward the center. Next thing you know we are all bunched up in the middle of the room, and the leader has to make a choice of pulling the line in front or the back of the dancers or just stumbling over the last person in the line.

My advice is: "When folk dancing, don't cut corners."

Despite all my complaining, I really enjoy leading the dances. Where else can I get so much attention! Besides, every once in a while I get a chance to sneak in some different steps and most of you, being good dancers manage to follow me.

What matters is that we dance together and enjoy it.

DRESSED TO DANCE! III.



"What a beautiful apron!" someone exclaimed to me at a folkdance this past winter. Aprons are a great way to really add some vibrant folk design to an otherwise simple outfit. I have many, which I mix and match with happy abandon. All have some sort of handwork

associated with them. Several, for example, are those lovely hand crocheted aprons made by my mother's generation in the 1940s to the 1960s - occasionally you find them at yard sales, or thrift shops, and there is a thriving trade of them at ebay, where I have bought several, ranging from \$5-12 a piece (search words: "crocheted apron".

Another ebay purchase of mine is an apron that has a band of fine beadwork along its lower portion; its brocaded linen suggests that it originated from Eastern Europe (search words: "beaded apron"). Yet another is a Hungarian Kalocsa hand embroidered apron; at \$25 (including shipping) I probably could not have gotten it cheaper in Hungary itself (search words: "hand embroidered apron"). Very festive folk aprons made in the 1940s and 1950s by European housewives to wear when having dinner guests also make their appearance on ebay under the same search words.

A whole world of opportunities for additional beautiful aprons opens up, though, if you are prepared to do just a little sewing. I created a beautiful apron, for instance, by attaching a large white, textured lace doily that I found in the linens stack at a Salvation Army to the middle of a long white apron tie, folding it over the tie to create just the right size and shape. For a hand embroidered Romanian dishtowel, all I had to do was add the tie (and you could do the same for those

MY TRIP TO A GREEK FD COMPETITION

I just came from attending the Orthodox Church's Folk Dance Federation's yearly competition which is part celebration, part fun, part enlightenment of Orthodoxy. This was their explanation to me.

Greek churches up and down the west coast, with some guests (Boston), come together to celebrate all things Greek. Students, ages 5 to 35 compete fiercely, trying to out-do each other. Costumes are made by parents, and musicians are sometimes brought in. Judging is done by respected Greek dance teachers.

The high points for me are the *Glendis* on Friday and Saturday nights. With various groups of musicians, dancers compete. The *Glendis* are high energy; all areas of Greek dancing are represented. It's fun to get in a line with different leaders and see their style. I saw friends from Greek and non-Greek circles, and musicians from all over; Hector was playing for Downey's group, Bill Cope from Oakland, others I've seen around and enjoy. This event is like their Mardi Gras because Lent comes after and there's no dancing after that. All ages participate in the *Glendi*. It's a huge village of many villages.

This is not as cheap as many folk dance events are, but the musicians are worth the price. There is little publicity, but worth going to if possible.

DANCE DAY PREPARATIONS

On the 29th of April, as every year since 1982. Dance Day will be celebrated all over the world. The CID has prepared the following guidelines as a useful checklist for dance directors, that is persons institutionally involved in the wider field of dance: teachers, choreographers, group leaders, journalists, researchers, associations, suppliers, organizations.

Object: The main purpose of Dance Day events is to attract the attention of the wider public to dance.

Events: Dance Day events may be special performances, open-door courses, public rehearsals, lectures, exhibitions, articles in newspapers, dance evenings, radio/TV programs, visits, street shows etc.

Organizers: Events are primarily organized by dance companies, amateur groups, schools, associations and other institutions active in dance. Wherever possible, jointly organize with a non-dance institution, e.g. government agency, a public school, a municipality, a business enterprise, a trade union.

Content: Organizers have freedom to define the content of the event. Include information on the art of dance, its history, its importance to society, its character. This can be done in a short speech, a note in the program, or distributed text. By adding this, you make the event different from normal dance activities. Read a message from a prominent personality, a poem, a passage from a text by a famous author.

Coordination: To achieve maximum success, preparations should start early. Inform the media about your event. Notify an organization holding a central position at a regional level, which should publish a list of events planned for Dance Day. Entrance to events should be free, or by invitation. Location: At best, events should take place in "new" places, such as streets, parks, squares, shops, factories, villages, discotheques, schools or stadiums.

By setting the event in original surroundings you stress the fact that this is an event dedicated to the universal family of dancers.


