Circumstances moved me to L. A. about two years ago, where I found, to my delight, that I could dance as many nights as I wished.

Now I can work on two things I love best: folk dance and photography!

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The Whirling Dervish



My personal introduction to a whirling dervish occurred when I was but a little boy and learned to sing the following song:

"She's the girlfriend of the whirling dervish, She's the sweetest gal in town.

But every night, in the pale moonlight She gives him the run-around..."

It went on for many, many stanzas, but not far enough to make me wonder exactly what a whirling dervish was or did...until now. I have now learned a dervish, or Sufi, is a member of one of several Moslem ascetic orders who perform whirling dances and vigorous chanting as acts of ecstatic devotion. He (or she) would be the equivalent of a monk or friar, i.e., a religious mendicant.

Whirling began in the 13th century as a serious religious ritual dance called the *sema* performed in a special room or building called a *semahane*. The dance is performed as a prayer trance to Allah.

During the *sema*, one's soul is released from earthly ties and becomes free to commune with God. As a Sufi, you begin by silently walking around the *semahane* three times wearing a black cloak representing your tomb and all your worldly possessions. You then remove this cloak revealing a voluminous skirt representing your shrouds. You have become removed from the world and stand now with arms crossed ready to begin the turning. You have become spiritually born to truth.

As you begin rotating you pass a sheik, (head man) who is standing on a red sheep skin. He is the channel through which divine grace may be achieved. You spin smoothly, slowly, by him all the while accompanied by exotic music.

Gradually the sheik will work with each of you, guiding you to find a quiet place on the floor and to

revolve around that one point and radiate your spirit outward from that one still point. Once that still point is discovered, a calm and inner knowing is achieved. The doer disappears and only the doing remains.

You revolve counter-clockwise, (as does the earth), at about 60 revolutions a minute, representing the earth's revolutions, or possibly God.

With your left foot fixed in place you have a point of contact with the earth through which divine blessings can flow. You are now embracing all creation as you chant the name of Allah silently within your heart.

At a given point you will extend your arms. Your right palm will face up while your left palm will face down. Energy from above will enter the right palm, passing through your body, then through your left palm and into the earth. The sheik, standing among you and the others, represents the sun, and you, the planets, turning round him in the heavens.

The performance will usually include 12 musicians and 12 dancers as well as a master of ceremonies, the sheik. It is introduced by the master followed by three or four musical presentations and then a four-part whirling ceremony. The service ends with a reading from the Koran. The dervishes then retire to their rooms for meditation and further contemplation of God.

I found all this most fascinating especially since the concept of the earth's rotating around the sun (Copernican theory) was not proposed by Galileo until 1632, some 400 years after the counter-clockwise whirling began. Galileo came very close to being executed by the Inquisition after being convicted of heresy, but was instead in 1633 sentenced to "enforced residence" and was never again free to travel.

Three hundred forty-seven years later, in 1979, Pope John Paul II asked if the conviction of Galileo could be annulled. Unfortunately, this was not deemed possible since the Copernican theory itself had been banned in 1616 and there was a good chance that a new trial would still find Galileo guilty. All they could do was reverse the travel prohibition of 1633.

And so, finally, in 1992, Galileo was set free to travel once again. Meanwhile, through it all, and far beyond it all, the dervishes keep whirling, and whirling, and whirling.

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

ETHNIC MUSIC - JOHN BILEZIKJIAN WRITES OUD METHOD BOOK

The new release of the *Oud Method Book*, with accompanying CD, written and performed by **John Bilezikjian**, is currently in music stores around the world.

It is the first book of its' kind to be written, published and released to the public. The Hal Leonard Corporation of America is the largest music company in the world that publishes music course study books, having hundreds of titles in their catalog.

Mr. Bilezikjian was invited to begin work on this book that also features an accompanying audio CD and completed it in 2004. The Oud Method Book is a beginning course study that helps a student to learn this ancient musical stringed instrument along with an instructor.

The book's music is written in traditional Western music notation and also contains a brief history of the instrument from Mr. Bilezikjian's research library. The study contains scales both chromatic and diatonic as well as developmental exercises and course work necessary to learn technique on this instrument.

The CD is made so that a student can play along with an instructor or by panning a track to one side can play along with the other pre-recorded track to assist a student in his learning of this difficult musical

instrument. There is also a chapter included on Armenian and Middle-Eastern rhythms and is performed on the *Dumbeg* by Mr. Bilezikjian showing the written examples.

The last piece in the book is an original composition originally written in the early 1970's by the composer and dedicated to the master Oudist, George Mgrdichian, one of John's mentors. The composition is called *Bagatelle* and is written as an Oud duet.

The book is \$9.95 with an accompanying CD plus shipping and handling. ETHNIC FOOD - GREEK RECIPE

Here's a lentil soup recipe from *The Art of Greek Cookery*, by the Women of St. Paul's Greek Orthodox Church, Hempstead, Long Island, New York:

FAKI

1 lb. lentils

2 1/2 qts. water

2 med. onions, chopped

2 stalks celery, chopped

1 carrot, chopped (optional)

6 sprigs parsley, chopped

1 clove garlic, chopped

1/2 cup olive oil

1 tbsp. tomato paste

Bay leaf

Salt to taste

2 tbsp. wine or tarragon vinegar

1 1/2 tbsp. flour (optional)

3 tbsp. wine vinegar (optional)

Soak lentils in water overnight. Next day, saute vegetables and garlic in olive oil and add to lentils along with tomato paste, parsley, and bay leaf. Bring to a boil and simmer until lentils are tender. In last 15 minutes of cooking, add salt. Stir in vinegar before serving. If desired, mix flour and wine vinegar to a paste and add to soup to thicken.

6-8 servings

Note: 1/2 teaspoon oregano and 1/2 cup cooked tomatoes may be added just before soup is thickened.

World Dance Day

On the 29th of April, as every year since 1982, World Dance Day will be celebrated all over the world by the international community of dancers and dance enthusiasts.

The International Dance Council (CID) has prepared the following guidelines as a checklist for persons institutionally involved in the wider field of dance:

Object: The main purpose of Dance Day events is to attract the attention of the wider public to the art of dance. Special emphasis should be given to addressing a "new" public, people who do not follow dance events during the course of the year.

Events: Dance Day events may be special performances, open-door courses, public rehearsals, lectures, exhibitions, articles in newspapers and magazines, dance evenings, radio and TV programs, visits, street shows etc.

Organizers: Events are primarily organized by dance companies, amateur groups, schools, associations and other institutions active in dance. Wherever possible, it is better for events to be organized jointly with a non-dance institution such as a government agency, a public school, a municipality, a

business enterprise, a trade union.

Content: Organizers have full freedom to define the content of the event. Include general information on the art of dance, its history, its importance to society, its universal character with a short speech, a note in the program, or a text distributed to those present. Read a message from a prominent personality, a poem, a passage from a text by a famous author.

Coordination: In order to achieve maximum success, preparations should start early. Inform the media about your event. Notify an organization holding a central position at regional or national level, which should publish a list of events planned for Dance Day.

Entrance to events should preferably be free, or by invitation. Invite persons who do not normally attend dance events.

Location: At best, events should take place in "new" places, such as streets, parks, squares, shops, factories, villages, discotheques, schools, stadiums etc. By setting the event in original surroundings you stress the fact that this is an event dedicated to the universal family of dancers.







#### **ROMANIAN WORKSHOPS MAY 3-9**

Romanian dance teacher **Daniel Sandu** will be in Southern California May 3-9 with four workshops scheduled. The Bucharest-born dance master began dancing with Romanasul ensemble at age six and started dancing professionally with Rapsodia Romana at age 18. From 1992 to 2004, he danced with Het Internationaal Danstheater in Amsterdam, Since leaving the Danstheater he has done free-lance teaching with multiple groups in Europe and is a professor of dance at the Dansacademie in Tillburg. This is his third U.S. teaching tour, co-sponsored by Albuquerque International Folk Dance and Susquehanna Folk Music Society (Harrisburg PA).

His dance program in The Netherlands is known as "3R" with its focus on "Rhythm, Romanian and Rroma." In addition to teaching specific dances to specific music, Daniel works closely with his students to help them develop a sense of rhythm - and gain a feeling of freedom to express themselves in multiple dance forms. He is also well known for his "Romanian fusion' dance material. This involves using Romanian dance forms to alternate music - such as Hora Boogie Woogie and Maramures Funk.

## **Dancers Speak**

#### **DANCING WITH TWO LEFT FEET (13)**



I don't know much about Indian dancing, neither the American kind nor the one from India. Actually, I was never much interested in either type, and reluctantly went to the Rangoli Dance Festival 2005 at the Madrid Theatre in Canoga Park. The artistic director, Malathi

lyengar magically transformed a group of young Los Angeles teenagers into a cohesive professional dance group.

The drumbeat rhythm and some of the footwork was quite familiar, being in some way similar to some of the intricate Bulgarian dances, and I am sure, if the sitar music changed to a bagpipe, we could squeeze a fast *Racenica* out of it.

What impressed me the most is that the half dozen young girls performing on the stage in perfect coordinated movements didn't just simply dance. They were moving every part of their body, the arms moving in one direction, twisting at the wrists with hands performing a dance of their own, accentuated by finger movements. That not being enough, the head moved at the neck with the dark eyes pointing in the other direction. Several times I stopped breathing, mesmerized by the intricacy of the dances and the control and sequence of the movements.

Watching the performance made me realize what a bunch of amateurs we folk dancers are. Most of our dances involve only simple steps. We complain when some of the dances require simple arm movements and coordinating them with the steps becomes a major task. Even simple styling, such as head movements, is soon forgotten. Forget the finger or eye movements. Even a simple Armenian pinkie hold becomes too complex, and we just hold hands.

I don't mean to be hard on us. After all we are simple folk that "Folk Dance". We are not here to impress any audience, unless they are members of our own group. And most of all we have fun; dance a little, talk a little.

So should we do something about our dancing?

The answer is "Yes". We should always try to improve. We can start with the simple things like: holding pinkies in Armenian dancing, and eventually graduating to coordinated arm movements. Not jerking the hand next to you can greatly improve the quality of

your own and your neighbors dance experience. And guess what, by doing some of these simple things, we will have more fun.

#### A MEMORIAL FOR DICK CRUM

When this great folk dance teacher suddenly passed away last December, we knew there had to be a memorial, with singing, dancing, food and drink, and everyone. **Miamon Miller** got Throop Church in Pasadena for Saturday, March 4th.

John Filcich brought photos and records Dick had used, and many other souvenirs. The Yeseta Brothers played, as did Miamon, and a band with Bill Cope and Pat McSwyny on Bulgarian-Macedonian folk instruments. Mary Coros, who was in town, helped generously with refreshments. Bill lives near San Francisco; Mark Forry came from there, too, to play and sing and serve as master of ceremonies for reminiscing. I saw folks I hadn't seen for years.

The saying in my family is that some people only show up for weddings and funerals. Maybe your family says this too. I'm always glad people dance, but do we have to wait for an occasion?

We started by dancing to records, because Dick had made so much good recorded music available. We had two bands of musicians, never born into this folklore, who acquired it for love. There were lots of people from the Aman Ensemble days.

By the time Dick moved to Southern California, and began working with Aman, he had already been famous for twenty years, teaching all over the country.



After a while we went into the sanctuary to tell stories. The stained glass was beautiful in the afternoon sun. The women's chorus, **Nevenka**, sang.

So many of us had called him Uncle Dick that it was right to have two of his nephews from Minnesota. Some people had danced under his direction in the Duquesne University Tamburitzans. Kolya Fuchs had worked with him as a translator, at which Dick had earned his living half his life. Sanna and Mars Longden came from Chicago. John Hertz said "Let's grab that torch". Steve Murillo played Dick's record of the Argentine song La Nochera, which, years ago, Dick had said he wanted for this moment. Dick had two copies of Ruth Bornstein's book The Dancing Man; Miamon invited Ruth, who read it aloud (above).

We ended with Tamburica music. The last song and dance were *Pjevaj Mi Pjavai* and *licko kolo*. Earlier I had told how Dick once got impatient about them at a workshop. "It isn't some kind of holy rite," he said. "Just sing"

#### Chicago Spring Festival, March 17-19, 2006

What city is has more ethnic Bulgarians, Macedonians, Serbians, Bosnians, and Croatians than any other place in the world? If you said New York, you'd be close, but wrong; actually it is Chicago! And, to quote **John Kuo**, director of Ensemble Balkanske Igre and organizer-director-artistic planner and coordinator of the festival, it is a "totally immersive,

sensory-overload experience of Balkan music that is the closest thing to being in Balkans that one can get on this side of the ocean." I would have to agree, and add that John knows how to throw one helluva great party!

This was my first time attending this festival, and I would say it is like having a week of dance camp, "on steroids," compressed into two and a half days! If you want to see diaspora Balkan people of all ages, from beautiful Bosnian teenagers to graceful elderly Macedonian gentlefolk, dancing their own dances which we have come to love, this is the festival. You won't find a larger ethnic gathering anywhere in the US.

This year's festival, the 41st, featured an amazing lineup of teachers giving workshops in dance and music, and incredible musicians for the evening parties. Special guest artist Ivan Dyakov, the leading male vocalist in Macedonia, was featured at the Saturday night concert, with James Stoyanoff on clarinet and Chris Bajmakovich, the best Macedonian accordionist living in the U.S.

Representing Bulgaria were the brilliant and beautiful **Daniela Ivanova**, currently on her third U.S. tour, and **Yulian Yordanov**, a recent émigré from Bulgaria, currently living in Madison, Wisconsin. Master choreographer and teacher from Turkey, **Ahmet Luleci**, currently a resident of Boston, Mass., taught some exciting new Kurdish choreographies. My favorite dance was "Men Gülem," a women's dance from the Kars region of Turkey, that had many features in common with Azeri dance and music.

**Sani Rifati**, native of Kosovo but living in Sebastopol, California, taught Roma-style Macedonian dances with his impeccable style and sense of rhythm. One has to stand behind him as he is teaching to try to pick up his nuances of phrasing and his lightness.

Most of all, this festival is a showcase for the world-recognized master teacher for Macedonian dance, Atanas Kolarovski. At almost 80, Atanas still dances with the most grace and delicacy, simultaneously earthy yet gravity-defying, of anyone. He still goes all the way down on one leg and balances, and turns effortlessly. As John Kuo, Atanas' senior "black belt" student for over 30 years says, he has a lifetime contract to teach at this festival. Of course, I went to all his workshops and stood behind him to learn as much as I could. And I was thrilled when he gave me corrections!
