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Federation Corner

I received a call asking me to write a column listing the accomplishments of the Federation during my two years as president. The first (and in the beginning the only) thing that came to mind was Strawberry Statewide. It produced lots of positive comments and a profit. Federation North and our

Federation have jointly set up a single Statewide website, so we now have a permanent site for future Statewides, both North and South.

As I looked back over previous minutes and spoke to other board members I discovered that we actually have accomplished quite a bit. We were able to create a subsidy available to clubs who want to put on a festival but are hampered by the high cost of available facilities. West Valley Folk Dancers took advantage of this stipend to host Autumn in the Valley last October. We hope this will become an annual event.

We also voted to increase the amount available for scholarships so more people will be able to attend camps and help bring back fresh new dances that we all enjoy.

Gordon Wall is developing a system and has made a start on transferring our video tape library to DVD.

The archived syllabi have been moved to **Marshall Cates'** home where we had a sorting party to put them in alphabetical order so they are more easily available to teachers. Eventually Marshall hopes to have them all on his computer so they will be only a mouse click away.

We have welcomed three new member clubs: Rainbow Senior Club in Rosemead, Asteria Greek Dance Club in West L.A., and Scandinavian Dancers of Ventura and Santa Barbara Counties.

We have accomplished this while maintaining an adequate reserve and a positive cash flow.

As this goes to press there is a new board waiting to be installed. Gordon Wall will be taking over as President. Other board members are: Valerie Daley, Vice President, Charlotte Edginton and Lynn Bingle, Co-Secretaries, Rick Bingle, Treasurer, Steve Himel, Membership, Sylvia Stachura, Publicity, and Robert Jowitt, Historian. I thank all of them for so graciously agreeing to serve for the following year.

Loui Tucker



Loui Tucker arrived in San Jose, California, in 1971 ju and, drawing on a high Y school and college to background in modern ru dance, quickly found her co way into local dance p circles. She started with international folk dancing, and at one point, for an exhausting four months,

nights a week and found at least one dance party a week to attend - while working full-time. "I wanted to learn every dance in the repertoire yesterday!"

Within a few years, she discovered a particular fondness and affinity for the dances of Israel, and began to specialize. Over the years, she has also dabbled in square dance, belly dance, contras, and ballroom dance.

Marcel Vinokur was one of her early teachers and a major influence when she decided to start her own dance classes. She still models her teaching schedule and all-request dance programs after his style.

Loui continues to be both a generalist and a specialist. Along with her popular international folk dance class on Thursday nights in Saratoga, California, which celebrates its 28th anniversary this spring (2008), she teaches an Israeli dance class on Mondays in Sunnyvale, which recently celebrated its 25th anniversary (2007). Her expertise in Israeli dance has made it possible for her to teach at Stockton Dance Camp, Camp Hess Kramer, the Camellia Festival, the Festival of the Oaks, as well as other workshops and events.

Having her feet on both Israeli and international dance floors gives her an unusual perspective on both types of dance, and she frequently finds herself defending each of them against attacks by the other. After learning a Bulgarian dance and a Serbian dance at a festival, an Israeli dancer will say, 'Oh, those international folk dances are all too easy and so repetitive, one simple pattern done over and over and over!' Based on the half-dozen Israeli dancer will say, 'I'm not that interested in learning Israeli dances because they just are not complex enough for my taste, and they all look and sound pretty much the same.' "It amazes me that dancers will make snap judgments about a dance form with insufficient input. You wouldn't say 'Italian food is all pasta, oregano, and tomato sauce' based on a few trips to a local restaurant, but dancers will judge a dance style based on a handful of dances or one night of dancing at a party."



In the 1990s Loui wrote many dance-related articles for The Grapevine, a newsletter devoted to Israeli folk dance. One of those articles was "Are You a Danceaholic?" Once it was posted on the internet, it quickly took on a life of its own. It was translated into at least four languages, adapted and added to for several other types of dance, and edited for production on a t-shirt!

Loui currently writes for Let's Dance magazine, and her articles are frequently reprinted in other dancerelated publications. Most recently she wrote a series of articles about how to start, grow, and maintain a dance group. Her latest project was soliciting input on a bumper-sticker slogan, and then having the bumperstickers designed, produced, and distributed to international folk dancers for free. Loui is currently serving a two-year term as Vice President of the Northern California Folk Dance Federation. Loui is also an active member of the National Folk Organization and maintains its website.



Loui Tucker

LOUI'S SARATOGA CLUB

It was a dark and clear Thursday night in mid-February when I reached Saratoga. Finally, about ten minutes to eight, Gypsy, my usually reliable navigator announced "Arriving at address one - eight - eight seven - zero, on right." I looked around and saw a small driveway and a small sign for the Serbian Church. Well back from the road was a building. I turned into the driveway and parked. Here I was (only a few minutes late) - after driving most of the day and almost 400 miles - at Loui Tucker's Thursday Night International Dance Class.

Walking through the main doors, I encountered the church lobby. The website (www.LouiTucker.com) said class starts at 7:30, but I didn't hear the distinctive sound of folk dance music. So I walked across the lobby, opened and peeked through another door and saw a large room. Thirty or 40 dancers were holding hands in a semicircle on the large wooden floor and somebody (obviously not Loui) was busy showing some dance steps. Oh good! Right place, plus a good explanation for the lack of music. There were chairs and some tables around the hall. I paid my money, sat, and changed into my dance shoes. I didn't recognize the dance being taught - the teaching was fast and I arrived in the middle so I just watched. Then the music started - Ikariotikos! I did know that. As I joined the line, I thought "yes, he was teaching the second half of that when I came in."

slow and fast, easy and not so easy, line and partner, this country and that country. She throws in a quick teaching or review from time to time. She has a request board and chooses many dances from what the dancers write on the board. Most of the dancers seem to know most of the dances and have fun doing them. I knew or could follow well over half the dances done that night. I guess the village of Saratoga is not that far from my local dance village.



Loui has all the music on a laptop computer that she can control with a small handheld remote. She can easily create a list of dances to play and then be out on the floor dancing. She has also taken advantage of the computer media to shorten some dances to squeeze more dances into the allotted time.

I like dancing other places, doing what they do, if I can, or watching what they do. I get to see and do dances I don't normally do at home. This time I danced Kvar Acharei Chatzot, a nice Israeli dance that, until now, I've only done at Stockton Folk Dance Camp afterparties.

Well, it's ten o'clock now and time to guit. The church wants to go to sleep. Time to go home. Oh, but home is 400 miles south. No, I'm not guite that crazy. I go to visit a good (non-dancing) friend and then spend the weekend dancing at the San Francisco Bay Area Scandia Festival in Petaluma.

Things to do in Placerville You hitched up the wagon, gathered your victuals and journeved much of the length of California to dance the night away. But what about that down time?

You can pan for bargains. Placerville was named for the placer deposits found in the river bed between Spanish Ravine and the town plaza in the late 1840's and is part of "Gold Rush Country". Its main street shopping center hosts 190 merchants in historical 19th century buildings. Once known for its antique shops it now also boasts of specialty shops, art galleries and restaurants. The street is home to the "oldest continuously operating hardware store west of the Mississippi". It has hosted some famous shopkeepers. including Philip Armor of meat packing fame and the auto maker, John Studebaker. Also on Main Street you'll find the Bell Tower, a monument to the city's volunteer firemen. It was originally installed in 1865 after three fires in 1856 destroyed most of the business district. It is now a gathering place for parades and celebrations.

You can sluice yourself in history. Visit the Fountain-Tallman Museum in the original 1852 soda works building (524 Main Street). The museum houses artifacts of Placerville history and furnishings from a prominent citizen. Visit the El Dorado County Historical Museum (104 Placerville Drive) to browse their exhibit of native American baskets and tools and much more. Visit Gold Bug Park (one mile north of Hwy 50 on Bedford Avenue) where you can pan for gold, hike the two miles of trails, visit a stamp mill, tour a hard rock mine and spend some time at the Hattie Museum and aift shop.

If you have some extra time to spend in the area you might want to take a day and make the 12 mile trip to

Coloma, home of Marshall Gold Discovery State Park, where John Marshall made that fateful find in 1848. While there you can see a working tinsmith, blacksmith, and gunsmith. You also get another chance to pan for gold!

Michael Ginsburg's is a familiar face to many Southern California dancers as he has been a teacher at Statewide, Stockton, Laguna and Mendocino camps. He specializes in Balkan music and dance, particularly Macedonian and Gypsy. He is an expert in the complicated rhythms of Balkan music and is the director of the Zlatne Uste Balkan Brass Band of New York, Michael, a dance teacher since 1962, has an energetic and accessible teaching style, making him a popular choice for workshops and institutes.

István Szabó is known to his friends as "Kovacs". He has taught at Stockton, Mendocino, and New Mexico August Folk Dance Camps, and the California Kolo Festival,. He received his dance training at the prestigious Hungarian Ballet Institute in Budapest and received a degree in Folk Dances of Hungary and Transylvania. Kovacs successfully teaches complex, improvisational Hungarian dances to dancers of all skill levels. His partner will be Ellie Wiener.

Jim Letchworth started square dancing in the first grade in El Cerrito (just north of Berkeley) California during the late 1950's. He has been the dance master for the annual San Juan Bautista Ball for close to twenty-five years, developing a repertoire of Old California dances. These are simple, fun dances. Jim's wife, Marilyn, has been his charming assistant for at least the last fifteen years. For the last five years or so they have worked with Rachael Bennett and "Legacy" who will be playing at the Miners' Ball. Jim's philosophy of dance is for people to have fun! He writes, "When I look out across the dance floor. I am more interested in seeing smiling faces than perfect feet. ... I want the dancers to think about their great- great-grandparents and the people who lived and danced in those times: they got out on the dance floor and had fun!"

REMINISCENCES OF A FESTIVAL JUNKIE

It was another sparkling celebration - the April 6 Spring International Folk Dance Festival sponsored by Westwood Co-op. The music was delightful to the ear as folk dance music tends to be. The (mostly) graceful movements of the dancers in their colorful costumes were pleasing to the eye. The happy faces of long-time friends - and strangers as well - were rewarding for the heart. And dancing - joining in the swirling, sweeping, sometimes gentle, sometimes frantic movements around the floor - fed the soul. How could there be a better way to spend a weekend afternoon?



I have been a folk dance festival addict for most of the several decades of my folk dancing career. Festivals in Ventura, the Valley, San Diego, Laguna, and all over the L.A. Basin have been occasions of wondrous fulfillment. At times they carried extra benefit as I became acquainted with dances new to me that I could take back to Narodni, my long-time dance home. I think, for example, of *Kirya, Joc Batrineasc, Kirco na Cardak Sedese*.

Southern California Statewide Festivals have also been highlights of my dance years.

By now, many of the memories have run together or become blurred. But some remain vivid. I still see my granddaughter, at age two, being waltzed around the floor in the arms of **Ann Armstrong** at a Pasadena Festival years ago. At Statewide in Whittier, on Saturday night, the band, scheduled to start their program with *Setnja*, couldn't get their equipment to function. Finally **Sue Beem** and I decided we'd waited long enough and started singing and dancing Setnja around the gym. Soon everybody was in line behind us, singing and dancing. Afterward I said that I wanted to march into heaven that way.

Some years back I chaired a Beginners Festival in Long Beach, sponsored by Narodni. Two hundred people filled the hall and, as part of the program, were treated to teaching by **Beverly Barr, Dorothy Daw,** and **Julith Neff**, and to a contra called by **Dave Slater.** How's that for an All-Star lineup! A stranger came up to me and said: "Hi, I'm **Dick Killian**. I'm 'you' in Las Vegas."

A time came when, for two years, circumstances made it impossible for me to venture very far from home, so there were no festivals. Then followed a period of immense sadness. Finally I cajoled myself into going to the Laguna Festival and, for those few hours, my life was brightened again. Soon I became, once more, a folk dance festival junkie.

You like happy endings, right? Well, top this one. Midway through the Pasadena Festival in 2005, the next dance on the program was *Doudlebska Polka*. An attractive lady whom I didn't know was standing next to me and I said to her: "You look like a polka person." Indeed she was - and much more. With an assist from **Ellen Stern** and **Nancy Mayhew**, **Camille** and I became dance partners and, now, life partners. Hooray for folk dance festivals.

PASSION FOR DANCE

May 2008

Until Bill Pillach told me his story I thought of myself as having a passion for dance. Bill was a dance teacher at UCLA and I'd been taking classes from him for several years, especially during our week-long summer sessions at UC Santa Barbara during Folk Dance Camp weeks. Along with ballroom steps he taught us all the current dance crazes. This particular Friday evening we were on a ferry tour of San Diego harbor as the kick-off for the week's teaching at San Diego State.

Bill and I were booked to teach the weekend sessions, especially for classroom teachers, before the regular folk dance classes started on Monday. The committee had offered us this boat tour of San Diego Harbor at sundown. Bill and I stood on the prow, and

When he was a child he had a passion for dance, but his family were conservative Calvinists and dancing was forbidden. He, without telling them, got a job at the local movie theater on Saturday afternoons, taking tickets and sweeping up after the show, and with this money he took dancing lessons.

while we watched the glorious sunset he told me the

When he turned eighteen WWII was just starting and he joined the Army, registering himself as a dancer. He was immediately assigned to Irving Berlin's newly composed song and dance musical. This is the Army. *Mr. Jones.* What he remembered was that they performed on the front lines of the fighting every day of the war. Irving Berlin always travelled with them, but never spoke to any of them. What he did do for them was that the very day Armistice was announced he went to the top brass and told them, "These soldiers have been on duty on the front lines for the duration of the war. They deserve to be sent home first." Sure enough, they were immediately disbanded and sent home.

When he was dismissed from the Army he went directly to Broadway and spent the next several years dancing in the current musicals until he was in his middle thirties when he realized that he needed to have a broader life. He came out to UCLA, got his Bachelor's and Master's degrees, meanwhile teaching dance in the Phys. Ed. department.

During that time I took his classes which were always crowded. Then, when he would come to Folk Dance Camp in Santa Barbara, Bob and I always took his class, which kept us current with our six highschoolers.

Son Carl had his own experience with Bill. Carl showed up for gym one day at Santa Monica High School, 1965, and the teacher introduced Bill Pillach from UCLA, who was there to teach them the two-step and the waltz. Bill stepped forward and announced that yes, he was going to teach them the two-step and the waltz, but before that he was going to show them the newest dance craze, called the Jerk. According to Carl, the Jerk was "the nearest thing to 'doing it' that you could do standing up." Carl told us that Bill was never invited back.
