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Westwind

Westwind , The Los Angeles International Folk **Ensemble** just celebrated their 50th anniversary as a folk dance performing group. They re-united as part of this years' Laguna Festival. Here is the story of their early beginnings.

WESTWIND: THE FIRST FIVE YEARS

By Robin Evanchuk and Leslye Janusz With Vince Evanchuk and Victor Pierce

I. The Beginning

The Westwind concept appeared and began growing between the winter of 1959 and January, February and March of 1960. During this period well-known folk singer and ethnomusicologist Michael Janusz organized and began rehearsing a group called "The Los Angeles International Folk Chorus." At first, the group contained people who were mainly interested in folk songs and folk music but by the end of February, 1960 contact began with others who were interested not only in music but in multiple artistic skills and traditions and many of these people also joined the chorus. The larger chorus began practicing at the Ash Grove and later found a more spacious location at the Westside Jewish Community Center where they had given their first performance earlier in December, 1959.

In March of 1960 Vince and Robin Evanchuk received a surprise weekend visit from Don Landauer, a member of the Chorus as well as co-director with his wife Lyn for the Yosemite Workshop folk dancers located in Pasadena, California. Don had an interesting idea he wanted to discuss. He saw a possible way of joining folk arts such as music, dance, song, and costume into one large group beginning with the multitalented crowd that had already come together in the Los Angeles International Chorus. Since the recent influx of U.S. tours of performing companies from other countries seemed to be so successful, he wondered why the chorus couldn't do the same thing. Don hadn't yet spoken to Mike about his proposal but since Michael, Vince and Robin were preparing an early afternoon folk music and dance presentation in Fullerton the next weekend he asked if his idea might be discussed with Michael after the performance.

The evening after the performance, Don's proposal was discussed at length and toward the end of the conversation Mike's memorable words were: "Well." think it's time to start a group like this. If we don't,

someone else will." Truer words were never spoken! The creation of the group began at that moment and it would be Mike's job as Artistic Director to introduce the idea to all members of the chorus. When Michael presented Don's idea there was a distinct lack of enthusiasm within the membership. In due course however, they all agreed to at least give the concept a try. By slowly adding a dance or two, then adding a bit of movement for the singers at venues that had enough space, the group became comfortable with the changes. Though costumes had not yet been introduced, at the beginning of 1961 folk singers, folk dancers and folk musicians developed into a solid group under the direction of Mike Janusz, Artistic Director with aid from Robin and Vince Evanchuk in the Dance Section and later Victor Pierce as Orchestra Director with Mike's wife Leslie Janusz as Registrar of the group.

II. Finding a New Name

The naming of the company took place after a rehearsal in early 1961 during a group discussion at the home of Ron Segal, who kindly fed a very tired and hungry crowd. Various names were put on the table and each submission went from suitable, adequate, tolerable and "so so" to absurd, outlandish and just plain nonsense. One of the singers simply suggested his own name: "The Sid Berland Folk Ensemble!" Everyone thought it was very funny. Choosing a name was a long way from being successful when Mike said he had a pretty good idea for a name, "How about 'Westwind'?" "Westwind," he told them, "is the prevailing wind and in California often called the "Santana," the "Santa Anna" the "Devil Wind and the "Big Wind." Perfect! There was very little doubt or disagreement. The majority loved its special characteristics and so, "Westwind, The Los Angeles International Folk Ensemble" at last had its character. personality and its name.

III. Westwind Performances 1961 and 1962

During the early rehearsals of the group the dancers were at ease and only became a bit worried when told they might have to sing during various presentations. It's true some dancers maintained they had always been unable to sing a note and so were just told to form words silently and pretend to sing. The chorus however was just the reverse. They were relaxed when singing but uneasy when Vince introduced movement

into their performance. Vince was encouraging and kept things simple and straightforward, giving the singers basic movements that all could do. Finally they were also faced with new possibilities of costume making and stage presence.

The first performance in 1961 was in various sections of the UCLA Folk Festival produced by Edwin M. Pearl and directed by Prof. D. K. Wilgus. The group performed on Saturday, March 28th and 29th of 1961. The selected work was the American Running Set with Stu Jamieson and partner Robin Evanchuk, Ukrainian Dance with Vince Evanchuk and finally, Sacred Music as well as Music of Eastern Europe under the direction of Artistic Director Mike Janusz. In all three sections the musicians, singers and dancers worked well together and some in the audience began asking how to join Westwind.

IV. Westwind Expansion

From the summer of 1961 to the end of 1962 Westwind was engaged in an extensive buildup of repertoire. There were performances in the Santa Monica and Pasadena Co-Ops as well as presentations at Folk Festivals for LA City College and Ojai. The group also performed at the Banjo and Fiddle Contest, the Valley-Cities Jewish Community Center and at an A.A.U.N. Function at Steve Allen's home. Over and above the increase in performances the beginning era of Westwind included on October 10th of 1962 the first issue of "The Windjammer" the official publication of the group which was distributed to its members after rehearsal. The Windjammer staff consisted of: Neal Sandler, Carol Sandler, Katie Sanders, Leslye Janusz, David Pierce and Pearl Rottenberg.

In September of 1962 Robin Evanchuk and Ruth Garber embarked on a fieldwork trip to New York visiting the Shaker community located in the "South Family" of New Lebanon. With the help of Stu Jamison and his wife Gloria they were introduced by letter to Mr. and Mrs. Jerome Count, the directors of the Shaker Village Work Group Summer Camp for teenagers. The Counts were willing to give all the help they could and invited Robin and Ruth as well as Ann and Lee Helser to visit the Shaker community now owned by the Count family. Robin began working on dance information and Ruth on costumes. The clothing and patterns Ruth made for the Westwind Shaker Service were outstanding and the music and movement began for

Robin a detailed investigation that has lasted for most of her life. Robin has spent over forty years working to put flesh and blood on an otherwise branded group of individuals usually considered to be "religious furniture makers" that worship in a strange way and speak in a style from the past. Her work proved valuable to Westwind as the group very recently won an Isadora Duncan award for Robin's carefully updated Shaker performance.



At the same time the Shaker fieldwork was progressing Vince Evanchuk and Don Green were on their own field trip to the Ukraine, Moldava and Georgia. At that time these countries were still part of the USSR and they were not allowed to simply wander to any area they wished. Nevertheless, they thoroughly enjoyed their stay and acquired dance notes, music, costumes, books, photos, miscellaneous folklore information and lots and lots of wonderful wines. Don and Vince delivered to Westwind a large assortment of data to work with in the coming years.

On October 14th of the same year the company presented Emil Cossetto's *Ladarke* which Michael described in the program as, "...a suite in four movements based on songs of the maiden carolers on St. John's Day (the summer solstice) in Croatia." He added, "The piece is a remnant of an ancient pagan rite propitiating the deity of fertility and love, Lado." The choreographer for the suite was Elsie Dunin. Usually in three sections, Westwind was given a forth section by Cossetto which was a special song giving thanks to the household. Many considered it one of the most beautiful portions of the music.

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Westwind

December of 1962 also was a busy month. On the second of December the dances *Kosmet* and *Rugovo* were performed at the Santa Monica Civic Auditorium during the Long Beach Folk Festival. On the fifteenth. Westwind joined the Los Angeles Mandolin Orchestra Concert with Sea Chanties, portions of Vince's "Ukrainian Wedding" which was still being worked on, Mike directing Shape Note Hymns and the East Texas Knockdown staged by Robin. Mike declared it a very good show with a very appreciative audience. Finally, on the twenty third of December the chorus did the KPFK Christmas Radio Show singing Christmas Carols from all over the world.

V. Westwind - 1963 and 1964

From November of 1962 to the middle of 1963 Westwind had increased its membership from 46 to 63 with 12 new associate members and/or part-time performers. Because they needed more space they moved rehearsals to Temple Sharei Tefila. Members were able to pay their rehearsal rent by doing a performance for the Temple every few months. Money received for performances increased and enlarged Westwind's ability to purchase items needed for performances such as instruments and costumes. Another excellent performance was done at Hollywood High School. Besides March and August which were months that gave everyone a well deserved rest presentations took place two or three times each month. These included the Monterrey Folk Song Festival, the Kolo Festival, and another A.A.U.N. show at the home of Gordon McRae. The company also did a concert for the American Association for Afro-American Relations toward the end of 1963.

The group was growing faster than we could have imagined. The regular one night per week rehearsal was changed to two with the directors looking at the possibility of three. New repertoire was constantly being added including dances such as the Ukrainian Horovod, Children's Play Parties, Georgian Dances, and the Russian City Quadrilles. Singers were in rehearsal for new Shape Note Hymns, Georgian Songs, and traditional songs of numerous countries and seasons of the year. Directors were meeting at least one night a week and sometimes more. The musicians were working on their own instrumental presentations as well as accompanying the dances and songs. Even more staff was needed and added. Jennifer Thomas was now director of Public Relations. Marsha Shore

and Mallory Pearce became the Technical Supervisors of the directorial staff that managed lighting, sound and costume production. Happily for all, from the first of April of 1964 the payment of dues to Westwind was discontinued. The company's income from performances finally became sufficient to allow these fees to be dropped. Our Honorary Sponsors were Bess Lomax Hawes, Sam Hinton, Councilman, Billy G. Mills, State Senator Thomas Rees, Dr. Alma Hawkins, Dr. Annaliese Laundau, Edwin M. Pearl, Herschel Bernardi and Marsha Hunt- Presnell.

Another addition to Westwind was a group of youngsters doing "Children's Play Parties." This was a sequence of Songs and dances of the Appalachian area. These singing and dancing games are currently performed mostly by children. However, at an earlier time it was the only dance form acceptable to churches in this region. A large percentage of this Westwind Children's Section lived on Pico Place in Santa Monica. Several were also the children of adult Westwind performers. Their ages began at about 4 and climbed to 11 or 12 years of age. One upsetting memory and ultimately, one of the sweetest was of a large wooden fence which presented the children balancing and walking on it at the beginning of the suite. In one performance, the fence suddenly collapsed, sending all performers toppling to the floor. Happily, none of the children were hurt and only one little guy of 4 or 5 years old began to cry and ran off the stage. After making sure he had no bad injuries by talking to him (while the fence was being fixed) he was finally convinced to return to the others and give it another try. He was given thunderous applause when he walked back and took his place, and he loved it! Some of the Westwinders are still in touch with these children, who now tell this story to children of their own.

VI. Westwind - 1964

In April of 1964 at the Wilshire-Ebell Theater with producers D.W. Limbocker and H.P. Walsleben "Westwind in Concert" was presented. The two hour concert had special titled segments beginning with: 1.) "The Hills and Plains," 2.) "The City" which contained an R&B segment adapted for the concert stage and incorporated modern Rhythm and Blues music, songs and dances into the more traditional folk scene as legitimate folk traditions directed by Charles Smith, Mike Janusz and Robin Evanchuk and 3.) "1850--New

the music, removing the good dancer across the line category are our numerous folk dance teachers, who will cause the "Sight Dancer" to come to a screeching halt.

And then, there are musicians, who memorize the score of the music and do not require any music improvise and make music of their own. They play by sheets to play, same as there are dancers who can do all the correct steps, even if they were the only ones in music or improvise on it to produce good sounds. It is the room. Since many times I fall into the "Sight very difficult to perform with such musicians, since Dancer" group I am grateful for the dancers who know one never knows what will come next. The same way the score.

Some beginner musicians, dare I call them musicians, who no matter what the score is or how the instruments are tuned cannot produce acceptable music. They require extensive coaching and practice, to maybe some day play good music. Some dancers, many times beginners, struggle with the steps and no amount of looking across the line, or following behind the line helps them doing the dance. Same as with musicians, coaching and practice holds a hope for what type of dancer you are, but on how much you them to be good dancers.

Composers, on the other hand, hear the music in their heads and compose their own music, or combine various themes to produce a song. Dancers in that

combine original steps into well defined patterns that match a piece of music and teach us all how to dance.

Lastly there are the creative musicians who ear and instinctively are able to either copy a piece of there are dancers who improvise, taking steps from other dances that might match the beat of the song being played and dance to the beat of their own drummer. This works sometime, if done at the head of the line, but is very disruptive if done in the middle of the line, when all are doing the same steps. When done solo or in free style couples such dancing can be quite beautiful.

It is not important what type of musician you are or enjoy what you are doing.

Lebanon, New York." This last section in the opening half contained the 15 minute first (and at that time unmodified) version of the Shaker Service.



After the intermission the final segments were: 1.) "From the Danube to the Caucasus -The Country and the City," 2.) "Nizhnij-Novgorod-At the Turn of the Century" and finally, section 3.) "The Customs Of Our Ancestors" which included Vince Evanchuk's now completed Ukrainian Wedding based on the weddings in South-Western Galicia with the choral and musical arrangements by Michael Janusz and Victor Pierce. The concert was truly successful and heralded an invitation to Westwind from former head of NBC Television Pat Weaver now working on advancing plans to introduce "STV" (Subscription Television) to America.

VII. The Westwind "Split" and the STV **Television Show**

The recollections of the hard times in Westwind that took place over forty years ago have very little to do with the way most of the former members get along today. Many of us are chatting on FaceBook and other sites on the internet. The 50th Anniversary party of Vince and Robin Evanchuk was loaded with the "Westwinders" of the early years. A few have passed away but not before most of us had reconnected in one way or another and it is fascinating to hear about what each one is doing.

Forty years later these performers are not sitting in rocking chairs. It appears that those that put their

energy in Westwind's folk music, song and dance are doing some amazing things. Traveling to other countries is understandably very popular with this crowd as well as singing and dancing which most still perform either in groups or for their own pleasure. One only has to get on the internet to have a look at some of the projects they are into. Interestingly, for the directors it was just this kind of energy that gave us the strength to leave Westwind and let it go to those that wanted to stay with it. At one special Director's Meeting Mike announced that after the STV film finished, he was ready to move on. So were Victor and Vince. Victor and Mike were cutting a new album, Vince was busy at JPL sending all kinds of things into outer space, Leslye had lots to do including directing "Nashi Dyevushki," her singing group. When it came to Robin, she announced her intentions to return to UCLA to get a degree in Folklore. All these other things had been waiting for a time-out to begin and, so it did.

The directors of Westwind faithfully finished the STV film under another name and as most of us remember STV was voted out in a political election and the nearly finished TV show spent around thirty years in a film vault in New Jersey. From there NBC removed it from the vault and along with a variety of old films ours was either destroyed or cut up and shelved for stock footage. We're still searching for parts of the film in order to share it and perhaps we will find some of it in

The guestion "What have you been doing?" seems to be generally the most frequent one. So in closing we decided to give updates on the five of us for we will never forget those wild and wonderful years.

Michael Janusz - The First Artistic Director of Westwind

After leaving Westwind Michael continued with a shape note hymn chorus. He also formed various small vocal groups that performed at the Ash Grove and other venues. Some of these groups were: Chet Vero Nas, and Die Freiliche Kaptzonim. He also sang with "The new Road Singers," and "Mike Janusz and the Zmaimen" (Barry Fisher, Stu Brotman and Victor Pierce.) Later, he began writing English words to traditional Eastern European melodies and in time, began writing original songs using bits and pieces of traditional music from Mexico to Africa and Europe. With his own compositions he formed a group called, Morning of the World that recorded for Elektra Records. When the Ash Grove closed he still performed

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solo at various venues such as McCabe's and the Troubadour.

After moving with his family to Hanford, California in 1978 Michael became ill with a rare pre-senile dementia called "Pic's Disease." He passed away from the disease on July 18, 1981. He is survived by his wife Leslye, and daughters Daniella and Halina. Daniella is married and has become a major knitter, knitting beautiful pieces for friends and family. She sings with Halina on occasion when they perform some of Mike's original songs. She is also raising two very talented daughters. Halina still sings with Mother Jones Band with their third CD just out. She has started her own project called "Sugar Mountain" with two other women, doing more traditional folk music and rock. "Like father like daughters (and granddaughters!")

Leslye Janusz - The first Registrar and Historian of Westwind

Leslye, wife of Michael Janusz went on to direct the women's singing group "Nashi Dyevushki" and still dabbles in singing with her children or with friends. She is involved with community and local political activities after semi-retiring from years of directing early childhood programs like Head Start and teaching early childhood classes at several colleges. She also founded and ran a business for seventeen years called "Teachers On Reserve, Inc.," a teacher substitute and placement agency. Currently she is the Director of Religious Education for the Sierra Foothills Unitarian Universalists, a part-time position. Leslye also won a Starring role as "Sarah McKendree Bonham" in Molly Newman and Barbara Damashek's beautiful Musical Drama "Quilters" in April of 1962 at the Dewitt Theater in Auburn, California.

Victor Pierce - Director of the Westwind Orchestra After Westwind Victor continued to accompany Mike in performances, and arranged his original compositions for the folk/popular vocal quartet "The Morning of the World." That group came very close to getting a record deal with the Electra/Nonesuch Recording Company. Though that did not go through the music still went on with his participation in "Mike Janusz and the Zmaimen." Vic and Ellen's children have also followed Victors interest with their own musical talents. Second to oldest, Jeffrey is becoming an accomplished Conga and Timbali player and played on the last two CD's with Halina Janusz and Mother Jones. Son David plays a fine guitar.

Vince Evanchuk - Director of Dance

After leaving Westwind Vince spent his time working at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL) as a Space Systems Engineer. He worked on the design, development, construction, and operation of spacecraft that went to all of the planets in our solar system with the exception of Pluto which is now no longer a planet. During this same time as well as after his retirement he began to develop an interest in art. Especially, the art of acrylics. He has taken art classes and has also begun working in digital photography. He and wife Robin have purchased a six acre mini-ranch and will eventually raise goats for milk, cheese and meat. He still enjoys the occasional dance, but at seventy two years of age he has to admit it does become a bit easier said than done.

Robin Evanchuk - Co-Director of Dance with her husband Vince

After leaving Westwind Robin and Leslye both gave birth to beautiful baby girls named Katherine "Kate" Evanchuk and Halina "Beena" Janusz. The two daughters are still friends. When Kate was old enough Robin entered the University of California at Los Angeles Graduate School. She earned a Ph.D. in Folklore and Mythology with a specialty in dance, ritual, belief and religious folk life. She worked there as Assistant, Graduate Advisor, and taught in the Lifelong Learning Section of the University. She has also lectured at Harvard University. She and colleague Isamur Flores Pena published a book on Santería entitled Santería Garments and Altars: Speaking Without a Voice which will go into its second printing in 2011. She is also finishing a book on Liturgical Dance in mainstream religions.

Dancers Speak

I believe a major reason folk dance has been received so well by the students this year, has had to do with two important changes made: Mrs. Kaplan sought and got permission for these students to participate in street clothes rather than "dress out" in P.E. suits, and I chose individual dances to begin the unit that had upbeat music.

I taught the line dance, *Zorba*, or what we call "techno Zorba," the first day. Every single class resonated with it. They loved it! I think that opened them up to embrace the hip-hop Israeli dance, *Hineh Ma Tov*. That dance was another hit!

I now had become something of a celebrity on campus! When I arrived each morning for my first class, 2nd period, students were crossing paths getting to their next classroom. Often, when they saw me, kids would run up to me and eagerly ask if I would be teaching again with Mrs. Kaplan. Several would excitedly tell me how they had taught this or that dance to their friend or sibling. Sometimes they'd start dancing Zorba right there in the quad.



Syp Simeon became an important piece, as I could now start each class with kids scattered on the floor, and being seated helped keep them from messing with each other.

That really changed the chemistry, and got us off to a good start, with all eyes on me.

Other dances they learned were *Alunelu, Zemer Atik, Damat*, and Louisiana Saturday Night. Some of the classes also were introduced to *Setnja, Liliano Mome, Dramskoto* and *Smilyana*.

Each class had a different level of ability/rhythm/ energy, number of students, and each day had its own cadence, too.

Tuesday, 4/27, the principal came into the gym to watch, and she even participated in the dancing. WOW! A few days before, the vice principal had joined us in a circle of Alunelu. Such support was so neat!

For the 2 largest and most rowdy classes, I had the aid of a student teacher. She picked up the dances easily, and loved it. I thought she was a dancer, but she said, "No! I didn't even know this existed!"

My last day was Thursday, 4/29. Each class danced all of the dances they learned two or three times apiece. It was so cool to see such JOY in that gym! They were really having fun! Many students brought me thank you cards, and/or stayed after class to spend a few more moments with me. It felt really nice.

How wonderful it is to feel the gift you give is something so beautifully received!

DANCING WITH TWO LEFT FEET (56)



It's the music that makes dancing possible.

You can have music without the dance, but you cannot have dance without the music. We mostly dance to recorded music and occasionally get a chance to dance to a live band. I feel that without music

the dancing is no fun, unless you consider as music the drumming or silent dancing to the sounds of the steps from some remote Macedonian villages.

This made me think that there is a great similarity between dancing and music.

Some musicians cannot play the music without having the score full of intricate dots, flags and the ubiquitous five lines stretching across the pages in front of their eyes. They need to carefully look at the patterns on each page as they sight read the score to produce beautiful music. Similarly, some dancers whom I might label "Sight Dancers" need to look across the line to the leader in order to follow the steps. Looking at such a person will make you think that they are wonderful dancers, but the same way, if you removed the score from a person who sight reads

TEACHING FOLK DANCE TO 7TH GRADERS AT ANACAPA MIDDLE SCHOOL

This has been my longest trek into pubescentville in any school district yet, but by far, it has been the most successful and rewarding one I've ever had in teaching folk dance to these kids. This is my third year at this middle school teaching folk dance for a P.E. unit.

I have been teaching 2 to 4 days a week since March 29th (with one week off for Spring Break): 5 periods per day.

Unlike my own personal 12-year-old experience of 7th grade P.E., today it is not only coed, but there can be upwards of 45 students per class!

A few years ago, Mrs. Kaplan googled "folk dance in Ventura, CA," connecting with **Ann Zacker**, a local teacher/folk dancer. Ann put her in touch with me, and I volunteered to teach a yearly unit of folk dance with her.

I've found working with this grade level challenging, but this year it has been wonderfully encouraging! The students really enjoyed it, and so many of them have been very enthusiastic, even asking how to find the music.

Other years there would be a few kids in each class that liked dancing, but I also heard a lot of grumbles and groaning, especially if any hand holding was involved.


