Federation Corner



I was fortunate to have entered folkdancing when it was not uncommon to fill venues to overflowing with young, energetic dancers. After graduating from college, a workmate, Pauline Illin (now Klak), suggested that I try folkdancing at the Long Beach JCC. She was enthusiastic about the

teacher and, knowing that I liked folk music, felt that I would enjoy the class. After experiencing **Donna Tripp**'s teaching there, I was hooked, and became a "3-Day a week" dancer in Long Beach and Orange County. Weekends were spent going to festivals and workshops, and even performing with Borino Kolo Folk Ensemble, under the direction of **Bora Gajicki**.

All of this dancing must have given me some selfconfidence, as I soon decided to move away from my secure job with the county, and try my hand at a more rural lifestyle. Being city born and bred, this was hardly a return to my roots, but more of a Whole Earth Catalog/Mother Earth News/Organic Gardening transformation. This went well for many years, but folkdancing suffered, reduced to a yearly trek to Pullman, Washington for their annual festival, along with occasional attempts to start small groups of likeminded souls. The highlight of those dancing days was having a teacher from Seattle, ten hours away, come to our local Grange hall to instruct 25 or so mostly inexperienced dancers in ethnic heritage and dance basics. That teacher was **Dennis Boxell**, and it was a great joy watching him work with people who knew nothing about him and seeing the excitement that they got from gaining a greater understanding about dance.

Dance continued being a minor part of my life, however, until I returned to Orange County in 2007. I looked up Donna again, and she steered me to the Federation website, where I soon was dancing with Laguna Folkdancers on Sunday evenings. It was not too much later that I was approached about taking over the Presidency of Laguna FD. I was flattered, never having been involved in anything of this sort before. I did have the presence of mind to ask if it involved any actual work. I was assured that it did not, and that all I had to do was run the monthly meetings. This sounded fine with me, and three years later I am still doing it. Somewhere along the way, Laura **Bremer** and I became the chairs for the Laguna Festival, which actually does involve work. I urge you to attend the festival this year, as we will have David Carman's story continues on p. 18...

Cream sugar and eggs. Add peel, sift dry ingredients, then add gradually, mixing.

Powered sugar, juice of 1 lemon to liquify. Dip pfeffernus in frosting when warm from oven. Store for 1 month, yes, to await softening: to absorb ambient moisture - otherwise a rocklike consistency when cooled.

PERSIMMON PUDDING 2005

The best dessert:

Sift together:

1 cup flour

1/4 tsp. each nutmeg, cloves

1/2 tsp. each cinnamon, ginger

1/2 tsp. each salt, soda

Mix (in blender or food processor):

1 cup persimmons (2 - 3)

1/2 cup milk

1 tsp. vanilla

3/4 cup sugar

2 eggs

1/4 cup unsalted butter, melted

Add blended mix to dry mix and stir well.

1/2 cup raisins and/or chopped nuts may be added. Pour into a buttered 9x9" baking pan or mold.

Bake at 300F for 1 hour, or place in water bath and bake 350 for 50 min. or cook in water bath on top of stove, approx. 50 min.

Serve warm or cold, with whipped cream, ice cream, or hard sauce.

Combine chips, milk, sugar, salt in top of double boiler. Cook over hot water until blended and smooth. Cool slightly. Add yolks 1 at a time, beating well after each. Blend in vanilla. Beat egg whites until stiff. Fold into chocolate. Pour into shell, cool in refrigerator. Serve topped with whipped cream.

Note: This recipe contains raw eggs.

A somewhat lighter 2 layer variation.

Pour only $\frac{1}{2}$ the chocolate mixture into the pie shell. Whip $\frac{1}{2}$ cup cream until it forms soft peaks. Fold into remaining chocolate mixture. Pour on top of chocolate layer already in pie shell. Cool in refrigerator. Can serve topped with whipped cream.

Ethnic Food

Originally we used a recipe from *The Settlement Cookbook*. Later we used (and still do) an almost identical recipe from *Love and Knishes* by Sara Kasdan. **Ingredients:**

2 cups peeled, grated and drained raw potatoes (about 2 1/2 lbs.)

2 eggs, beaten

1 tsp. salt

1 heaping tbsp. matzo meal (or flour) pinch of baking powder

Method:

Combine all and mix well. Heat 1/4" - 1/2" oil in the pan to about 350 degrees (oil should be about 1/2 pancake high when pan is filled with pancakes). Drop large spoonfuls of potato mixture into the pan (whatever size spoonful to make about 3"-4" diameter pancakes). Do not press the pancakes. Fry until browned on bottom then turn over and fry until second side is browned. Remove from pan. Best if eaten immediately. Can be kept warm on a pan in a low temperature oven. Serve with sour cream or applesauce or both.

Serves 2-4 as main dish depending on how hungry and how much they like latkes.

Recipe can be doubled, tripled, quadrupled, 2.5'd or whatever.

A few notes:

A few years ago, I tried the food processor again. A two-step process works well and is much faster (and maybe messier) than hand grating. First use the grating disk to make potato shreds. Then use the knife blade to pulverize the potato shreds into small uniform pieces. Do in batches, emptying each batch into the bowl of water to keep from turning brown.

Optional: Add grated onion to the mix.

CARAMEL POPCORN

24 cups popped corn 2 cups packed brown sugar 1 cup butter 1/2 cup light corn syrup 1/2 tsp. salt 2 tbsp. molasses 3/4 tsp. baking soda

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1 1/2 tsp. vanilla

0-2 cups salted nuts (peanuts, cashews, mixed, etc.)
Preheat oven to 250 degrees. Put popcorn and nuts in large roasting pan and set aside.

In 3 qt. saucepan mix brown sugar, butter, corn syrup, salt and molasses. Cook over medium heat, stirring occasionally until it comes to a full boil (8-12 minutes). Continue cooking, stirring occasionally, until it reaches 238 degrees (2-6 minutes). Remove from heat. Stir in baking soda and vanilla. Pour over popcorn and stir until all popcorn is coated. Bake 45 minutes, stirring after about 20 minutes. Remove from oven, place popcorn on waxed paper, cool completely. Break into pieces. Store in tightly covered container. Makes 24 cups.

ORANGE PEEL CANDY:

Peel oranges carefully in slender lunes. Boil and discard water - repeat. Boil in simple syrup, lift out or drain, roll in sugar and let dry.

PFEFFERNUS

Prepared without liquid except egg, and in some recipes molasses. Formed into balls, baked, then rolled in powdered sugar while warm. They must be made in advance, sprinkled with rum or brandy, and allowed to absorb moisture from the air over time (one month) to soften.

Ingredients:

2 3/4 cup sugar

4 eggs

1/4 tsp. anise extract

1/2 cup lemon peel - wow! I think that means candied.

3/4 cup citron

4 cups flour

3 tsp. cinnamon

1 tsp. mace

1 tsp. nutmeg

1 tsp. cloves

1/2 tsp. allspice

1 tsp. salt

Here are a number of recipes suitable for the holidavs

MOTHER'S STOLLEN

Ingredients:

8 cups of flour

2 cups lukewarm milk

1 tsp. salt

2 cakes or 2 packages dry yeast

1 cup sugar

4 whole eggs

1/2 tsp. nutmeg

1 lb. butter, softened

1 cup raisins

1 cup candied cherries and pineapple

1/4 cup rum (optional)

1/2 lb. (2 cups) slivered or chopped almonds

Grated rind of one lemon

1/2 cup each - orange peel and citron, cut fine

Method:

Mix yeast, milk and stir in 1 cup flour. Let rise in warm place until bubbly. (If you use dry yeast, dissolve in 1/4 cup of warm, not hot, water before you add to above.) Cream butter with sugar, add eggs one at a time and beat well. Add lemon rind and salt. Combine the two mixtures in a large bowl, add flour, nutmeg and beat. Then turn on a floured board and knead until smooth and elastic. Use additional flour so dough does not stick. Sprinkle flour over fruit. Mix and add to the dough with nuts and rum. Put in greased bowl and let rise until double in bulk. Toss on floured board. Divide into 3 loaves. Roll out slightly, spread top with melted butter, press down the center and fold over double. Brush top with melted butter. Let rise until double. Bake 45 to 50 minutes at 350. Frost with plain icing and decorate.

When I was growing up in Milwaukee this was our traditional Christmas morning breakfast. I asked my mom for the recipe and when she sent it, it came with the warning - start early - this takes all day! Since it makes 3 loaves, you can give one or two as gifts, if you choose.

MOM'S SWEET POTATO CASSEROLE

I always make this for Thanksgiving, but it would be perfect for Hanukah, Christmas, or New Year's Eve

6 large sweet potatoes

1/2 cup each brown and regular sugar

1 tablespoon cornstarch

1 cup orange juice

1 teaspoon grated orange rind

1/4 cup sherry

coarsely chopped walnuts

Cook the sweet potatoes in boiling water and then peel and slice. Place the slices in a lightly buttered 13X9X2 oven proof baking pan. Combine all the other ingredients except the sherry and nuts, and cook on the stove until thickened. Remove from heat and stir in the sherry. Pour the mixture over the sweet potatoes and bake, covered at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. Remove the cover and top with the walnuts. Bake uncovered for an additional 15 minutes.

POTATO LATKES

When I was still a kid at home, our family had potato latkes every Hannuka. There were seven of us so it took a lot of potatoes. We took turns grating them, one or two potatoes depending on size. Except Dad, he somehow managed to grate twice as many potatoes as anyone else. These latkes used very, very, very (I think that's enough very's) finely grated potatoes. After grating they are about the size of sesame seeds and not stringy or shreddy looking. That's the way we liked them; others might like latkes with shredded potatoes (that look a bit like hash browns). We used a foursided box grater and grated using the 2nd smallest holes. All this grating took some time, and grated potatoes have this nasty feature of turning brown when exposed to air. Our simple solution is to put the grated potatoes in a bowl of water until ready to use. They get drained anyhow so a bit more water to drain off doesn't hurt anything.

Mom got a food processor one year and we used it to grate the potatoes. It was really fast. We only did it once, because it made shredded potatoes instead of the finely grated variety. Dad usually fried the latkes in an electric frying pan set at 350 degrees. Top of stove - Pat Cross frying pan works, also.

Laguna Folkdancers Festival

Now is the time to buy your Passport for this year's Laguna Folkdancers Festival, to be held February 4, 5, and 6. As in years past, it will be held at Ensign Middle School in Newport Beach.

There will be plenty of activities going on almost nonstop all weekend; we have added a few new items for your dancing pleasure. Perhaps most important of all, we will have a kafana on Friday night at the same time as general dancing (programmed and request) in the gym. The kafana will be held in the school cafeteria, and will feature these bands - Drita, Dromia, Madison Avenue Folk, Veselba, & **Zimzala.** This is a much more intimate setting than the gym, and will be conducive to relaxing while listening and dancing to the bands. In the main hall, you can get to know a little about the master teachers, as each will be teaching introductory dances to get us warmed up for the weekend's workshops.

The greatest draw is, of course, the teaching. This year's festival promises to be one of the best ever. Coming back to us after a five year absence are **Cristian Florescu** and **Sonia Dion**, teaching dances of Romania. At Stockton camp this year their workshops were fantastic and well attended. Also due to such high demand, they will be staying in the area for an additional two weeks in order to give review workshops on material being taught at the festival (see On the Scene). So, come for the teaching, and then follow up at one of the many clubs offering reviews.

Our second (third?) teacher will be **Bata Marcetic** teaching dances of Serbia. It has been many years since international folkdancers in Southern California have had an opportunity to have instruction in Serbian dance from a master teacher, and Bata is one of the best. In researching teachers for the festival we contacted fellow Canadian, Yves Moreau, who was extremely enthusiastic about Bata, both in his material, and his teaching methodology. He presents exciting material in a manner that is easily understood, and has excellent knowledge of Serbian folklore and traditions. Although he has been teaching to international folkdance audiences in the East Coast (Canada and the US), he is not well known on the West Coast outside of the Serbian community.

The format for the teaching will be: short introductory teaching on Friday night, morning and afternoon workshops on Saturday, and review on Sunday.

New this year will be some changes in the programmed music. There will be an hour of just couples dances on Sunday afternoon. This will be hosted by **Richard Duree** and promises to be quite exciting, as he will bring his considerable knowledge about dance to the task of providing an opportunity to experience many different styles of dance.

With the definition of "folkdance" becoming more inclusive each year, we thought it would be fun to add a session that we are calling iDance (you dance, we all dance to ...), that is going to focus on newer dances from Europe, the near east, and beyond (the moon, if we could find dances from there). The programmer, **Lee Otterholt,** will be choosing music that is exciting, highly danceable, and with a modern flair.

Live music won't be limited to just Friday night. There will also be a band playing Saturday night and another on Sunday. Full band information should be posted on our website (www.LagunaFolkdancers.org) by the time you read this in Scene.

Our Greek lunch on Sunday was a great success last year, so we are offering that again this year. The price will be \$12 and requires reservations in advance, for either the chicken kabob plate or the vegetarian plate, both of which have various Greek goodies, and the price includes drink and dessert. Although we can take last-minute lunch reservations until Saturday morning, please reserve with your registration if possible so we can give Daphne's an early count.

The concert schedule (same as last year): two separate concerts, one on Saturday evening and one on Sunday afternoon, with three different performance groups each day. More information on our web site.

There will also be all-request afterparties both Friday and Saturday nights with lots of food.

For those of you coming from out of town, the Travelodge in Newport Beach is offering a special rate for folkdancers. Look for more information and registration form on the ad that is in this issue.

- *The Federation should partially fund events such as: Laguna Festival, Statewide, Camps Review weekend, etc., so that the cost of these can be greatly reduced.
- * There used to be many camps in the area, now Camps Review is the only one. If it is a financial problem, the Federation could underwrite some of the expenses.
- * Hire a bus to transport people to remote events.
- * Purchase a supply of Loui Tucker's bumper stickers and distribute them.
- * Hire someone to make short videos about folk dancing and put them on YouTube
- * Print posters and flyers and distribute them For future Scholarship Balls I would suggest a different approach. Have the event focus on the scholarship recipients. Ask each one to take 5 minutes during the course of the festival and relate what they got from the experience. Either teach a dance they learned at the camp, show a video they made there, or tell about the camp and what it meant to them etc. If the timing is right it might even be possible to announce the new recipients.

The Kabile Experience

How lucky we were to dance to a traditional Bulgarian folk wedding orchestra. On their 2nd national tour Kabile played for folk dancers from coast to coast, and up and down the west coast. With 57 gigs and almost 20,000 miles traveled, their music was enjoyed by hundreds of folk dancers.

Starting out with a slow Pravo, they progressed to a lively *Eleno Mome*. We danced Lesnoto to several of my favorite Macedonian songs - Bolen Lezi Mile Pop Jordanov, and Ako Umram il Zaginam. At the Veselo Selo Halloween party with Kabile, the kaval player noticed that I was singing along on the sidelines. He pulled me and Anna into the center with the other musicians and insisted that we join them in singing Makedonsko Devojce. Wow! My singing debut with Kabile! Dancers enjoyed Devetorka, Rachenica, Trite Puti, and other favorite Bulgarian folk dances. The

sheer joy which Kabile provided was absolutely priceless.

Based in Yambol, Thrace, the musicians are: Nikolay Doktorov (kaval), Ivan Handziev (accordion, vocals), Dzhenko Andreev (gajda). Tapan player Angel Krastev was ill and unable to travel on Kabile's 2nd US tour. Sadly, he passed away in early November while his fellow musicians were still on tour. Nikolay Kolev and Donka Koleva now live in New York, but Nikolay (gadulka) joins the orchestra from time to time. Donka (vocals) not only sings beautifully but is the driver, coordinator, interpreter, and all-round den mother. My hat's off to this wonderful orchestra and to this awesome woman.

OPEN LETTER TO THE FEDERATION COUNCIL

In recent years the Federation has been increasing the use of some of its resources to actively promote folk dancing. That is as it should be, and, to my way of thinking, is the prime reason for having a federation. I am thinking of items such as holding a beginners festival and underwriting the costs of a club having a festival.

I would like to see that trend continue, and increase, because what has been spent is a small fraction of the assets the Federation has; lots more can be done. I was surprised then when the recent Scholarship Ball was announced as a way for the Federation to raise money. I know that the funds for scholarships have come from a separate source, and that the income from that has decreased, but that loss could easily have been made up from the general treasury. I don't think that individual dancers should be asked to pay (and rather heavily I might add) to support what the Federation should be doing.

Also the folk dance calendar is a pleasant idea, but it should not have been a fund-raiser. If it is desirable then it should be offered free or at a small cost.

I would like to see the Federation's attitude change from 'How can we get more money?' to 'How can we spend what we have to further promote folk dancing?' Here are some things I would like to see considered:

- * If it is determined that scholarships are a worthwhile thing to be supported (and I know there is some question about this), then the Federation should fund them completely without fund-raising activities and increase the number of scholarships awarded, and the amount of the grant.
- * Clubs should be further encouraged to hold festivals by the Federation raising the amount of the reimbursement compensation from \$400, or agree to underwrite the entire cost. This way there would be more festivals, and they could be free.
- * To encourage new dancers, free events should be held several times a year. I envision an afternoon of a dance performance, followed by teaching beginner dances. Live music, food, etc. would be paid for from the Federation's account. These could be stand-alone events, or be in conjunction with a multi-day festival; such as Laguna's festival in February, or Statewide.
- * Master teachers can be brought in to hold a oneday institute, either free or at low cost.
