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

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Teacher Corner

Marilyn Smith has been a teacher of international folk dance at Santa Rosa College in California since 1970. Marilyn traveled extensively in Bulgaria, Greece, Hungary, Ireland, Portugal, Romania, and the former Yugoslavia.



In 1981, Marilyn began her first of many trips to France to research traditional music and

dance, studying in master dance classes, and meeting with musicians and instrument makers. Her hard work and passion have created a joyful dialogue between the very active French folk culture and the United States. She has helped coordinate visits to the United States for many French dance teachers and musicians. Marilyn's dances represent a wide assortment of dance formations, including lines, circles, couples, and sets.

Marilyn has been invited to teach at major folk dance camps in the United States and Canada. She organizes and directs an annual folk dance camp in Northern California. Outstanding folk dance teachers and musicians come from throughout the United States as well as Europe to teach at her camp.

Among Marilyn's publications are

French Bourrée Lark in the Morning
Traditional Dances and Instruments of the
Gascogne Lark in the Morning

Dances that Marilyn taught in the United States include bourrées from Auvergne including La Tournijaire, La Crouzade, La Chapelotte and La Montagnarde; bourrées from Berry and Bourbonnais including La Tournante des Grandes Poteries and La Brande; dances from Gascogne, including Rondeau de Casteljaloux, Rondeau de Garein, Mazurka de Samatan and Scottish from Gascogne; dances from Alsace, including Le Maitre de Maison, 5-Time Waltz, Le Porcher; dances from Béarn and the Basque country, including Mariana and Carnval de Lantz; other dances include Scottish-Valse, Marin-Congo, Mazurka de Ste. Marie.

She is director of the annual Razzmatazz Folk Dance Weekend at Mendocino Woodlands. This was the 35th year. Over the years it has brought dance teachers and musicians not only from the U.S. and Canada, but also from Bulgaria, France and Sardinia. Razzmatazz also sponsored two week-long summer camps in the 1980's with a staff of international dance teachers.

French Dance

WHAT IS FRENCH FOLK DANCE?

The *bourrée* from Berry is probably the most well-known French folk dance in the U.S., thanks to its introduction to our folk dance community by the wonderful teacher, **Germain Hebert.** With the passion he instilled in me for this dance, I knew I had to go to the source and experience dancing it in France. So one summer I found myself in a small dance hall where hurdy-gurdys buzzed, bagpipes droned and accordions cranked out the tunes and we danced the bourrée in a whirling swirl of dancers. I was in French dance heaven - or at least in one little corner!

Many people have asked me "What is French dance?" There are as many answers to this question as there are regions of France. As you travel to different parts of France, you will find that each region has its own repertoire of dances. There are a few dances that are common throughout France like the waltz, schottische, polka and mazurka. But even these dances may have regional differences or variations.

The bourrée itself is a dance form that spans several different regions of France: Berry, Bourbonnais, Auvergne and Limousin. The bourrées from Berry and Bourbonnais have a different structure and form than those from Auvergne and the Limousin.

I learned my first Breton dances, *An Dro* and *Laridé*, from **Yves Moreau** at Mendocino Folklore Camp. I still remember that experience because it was such a revelation to me to hear the music of Alain Stivell for the first time and to see these "French" dances that were so different from anything else I had thought of as French. Dances with little finger hold? Dances leading to the left? Was this from France? But this was just the beginning of discovering how rich and varied the folk dance repertoire is in France and how deeply regional it is.

The next revelation for me was when I went to France to learn dances from Gascogne in the southwest of France. I was fortunate to study with a wonderful dancer, teacher and researcher--Pierre Corbefin. He was director of the Conservatoire Occitan in Toulouse at the time and he wrote me a letter inviting me to come to France and work with him. He taught me several forms of the dance from this region, the *Rondeau*. Pierre was an integral leader of a group of dancers and musicians who set out in the 1960's to "discover" their own dances. Many musicians in the area played the tunes and sang the songs of the

region that they remembered their grandfathers playing. But they didn't know the dances that went with these tunes and songs. The traditional dances had almost died out in the countryside and if they were going to be able to resurrect these dances before they were totally gone, they had to act. Seeking older villagers who might remember the dances, they discovered a treasure trove in the tiny village of Samatan. So it was in the early 1960's that they set out to research the Rondeau and other dances from the area. I was lucky to be able to see some of the original black and white films that were taken to record the dances during that time.

One summer I was able to learn dances from Béarn, a region next to the more well-known Basque region of France. Though many of the tunes from Béarn were the same tunes I heard in the Basque country, the dances had their own unique steps and styling that surely weren't Basque even though they shared some strong similarities with Basque dances. This was yet another "French" dance form that was new to me.

If you travel east from Paris to Strasbourg, you notice a change right away. Some of the town names or street signs look more German than French; you'll find sauerkraut and sausages on the menu and German-style white wines. One of the dances the Alsatian's do is a 5-time waltz, similar to a Swiefache and you know that you are as far away from bourrée country as you can be and still be in France.

One warm summer night I was in Perpignan on the Mediterranean coast and saw in the local newspaper that there was going to be a dance workshop teaching the Sardane, the dance of the Catalan people who live in this part of France. (The dance is known as Sardana in the Catalonia region of Spain.) I had seen the Sardana danced in Barcelona when I was a high school A.F.S. exchange student in 1963 and I was thrilled to actually have the chance to learn it decades later in France! On the eve of St. John's day in June, you can dance the Sardane in many of the towns and villages in this part of France. The cobla band sets up in the square and the "Sardanistas" celebrate their Catalan culture with circle after circle of dancers. They dance long into the night and end the festivities with a big bonfire.

So, we ask again: "What is French dance?" It is as varied as the country of France herself. It changes from region to region; it reflects the local culture, local

HISTORY OF FRENCH DANCE

Breton and French folk dancing

Julius Caesar wrote of the Gauls' love of music and dancing. In Britany, the old Celtic Region in western France music and dancing has been an integral part of the culture since pre-Christian times. Today it survives and thrives in this remote stronghold of the remnants of the old Gallic tribes. They still speak Breton, an old tongue closely related to Welsh Gaelic, and like their ancient ancestors and modern day cousins in other celtic lands, are mad for the music and dancing. The dancing and the music are lively and have the magical ability to mesmerize your spirit. Every weekend there are fest noz or dances held all around Britany where the whole community, young and old - from toddlers to the eldest elders - pack into school gymnasiums and dance and sing together, arm in arm until morning. Breton dancing at a fest noz is one of the most mesmerizing and magical dancing experiences.

Traditional French Folk Dancing

Many of today's American folk dances have their origins in the popular 16th and 17th century French country and court dances such as the *quadrille* or squares, and the *contre danse*. Dance terminology such as promenade, chaine, alemande, balance, do si do, hay - were coined by the old French dance masters of the 17th and 18th centuries. Many of the dances survive today in our American folk dancing tradition.

History

France has been the cultural centre of Europe since Medieval times. Under the reign of Louis XIV, ballet flourished, and the "French" style of ballet was born. Dancing was a popular pastime for the court, therefore ballroom and square dances also became popular during this period. As time went on, dance moved out of the court and into music halls and venues where the

audience would often participate, such as with the *balmusette* or the *can-can*.

The Baroque Period

The *gavotte* was a popular dance in the Baroque era, so named as it originated amongst the Gavot people. It was of moderate tempo and consisted of a step pattern where feet were crossed twice after each step, and then a hop would follow. This dance was popular in the court of Louis XIV, and typical instruments were violins and bagpipes. The gavotte compositions by Bach are possibly the best known. The *Rigaudon* is another lively dance, performed by couples. Also fashionable in the court during the Baroque period, it remained popular in music halls until the 19th century. The *courante* is a lively dance performed in both France and Italy. The name literally means "running" due to its fast steps.

The 19th Century Onwards

When the can-can first appeared in Paris around 1830 it was a dance for couples. The energetic dance had performers doing high-kicks, therefore earning it its name, which literally means "scandal". There were attempts to repress this dance for a while, and occasionally groups of men performing the can-can would be arrested. It later became a popular form of entertainment, however, it was still performed by couples or individuals. Can-can featuring chorus-lines first appeared in the UK and U.S. rather than in France, and this style was later imported to France for the benefit of American and British tourists.

Bal-musettes were usually performed in small music venues, and were characterized by fast, small steps. The music typically consisted of an accordion and bagpipes, and later on it was influenced by the waltz, polka and pasodoble styles.

Other Dances

There are many folk dances particular to different regions of France. While much French folk music has been revived in the last few years due to interest from tourists, remote areas such as Auvergne and nationalistic regions such as the Basque area have kept folk dances alive. The Bearnaise and Breton dances are just a couple of the most famous ones. Some of these dances have Celtic influences, hence the use of bagpipes and hurdy-gurdys as musical accompaniment.

FRUIT AND ALMOND TARTE

Ingredients

1 1/2 sticks of butter, softened

1/3 cup sugar

1/4 teaspoon almond extract

1/4 teaspoon salt

1 1/2 cups flour

1/3 cup preserves or jam

1/3 cup slivered almonds

Beat the butter and sugar until fluffy. Beat in the salt and almond extract. Add the flour and mix at low until just combined. Reserve 1/2 cup of the dough and wrap in plastic wrap and refrigerate. Press the remainder of the dough on the bottom and slightly up the sides of a tart pan. Refrigerate for about a half hour.

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Spread the preserves on the bottom of the tart shell. Crumble the reserved dough over the preserves and sprinkle the almonds on top of all. Bake for about 30-40 minutes, until golden brown. Cool on rack and serve warm or at room temperature.

SURPRISE BUBBLE RING

Although this is not specifically an ethnic recipe, it is something that I have made a few times to help celebrate birthdays at the Tuesday Gypsies. Since I have been asked for the recipe. I decided to share it in the Scene. I have no idea where the recipe originally came from, but it has been slightly adapted over time.

Ingredients:

2 packages yeast 2 cans mandarin oranges 1 cup brown sugar 1/3 cup sugar 1 teaspoon salt 1/3 cup melted butter 1 1/4 cups warm water 1/4 cup chopped nuts 2 eggs 1 1/2 cups powdered sugar Almond liqueur

1/2 cup softened butter

6 cups (approximately) flour

Mix the yeast, sugar and salt and stir in warm water. When the yeast is dissolved, stir in 1/4 cup almond liqueur, the eggs, butter and half the flour. Beat till smooth and stir in the remaining flour until a soft dough is formed. Knead the dough on a lightly continued in column 2...

floured surface for about 5 minutes and then place in a greased bowl and cover. Place in a warm, draught free place and allow to rise for about 45 minutes. Meanwhile, drain the oranges well on paper towels.

Pinch off pieces of the risen dough and form into balls around the orange sections. You should have about 25 - 30 balls. Roll each one in melted butter and then brown sugar and place in a greased 10-inch tube pan. Cover and let rise about another hour. Bake at 350 degrees for about 45 minutes, or until crusty. It is sometimes necessary to cover the pan with foil and bake longer to be sure the cake is baked thoroughly. Cool in the pan for 10 minutes. You can also remove the bottom of the tube pan and return the cake to the oven for a little longer, if necessary, after it has cooled enough to remove the bottom. Combine the powdered sugar with a small amount of almond liqueur and glaze the warm cake. Sprinkle with the nuts.



Kolo + celebration = Kolobration. This word was coined several years ago when St. Steven's Serbian Orthodox Church in Alhambra started a yearly dance concert. This concert celebrates the youth in the community as they come together to perform the traditional dances of Serbia. From the littlest "Angeli",

four to six-year olds to high school students, folklore groups from the Serbian churches in So Cal, Fair Oaks, and Phoenix, these dancers wholeheartedly perform in - Adabella Radici colorful folk costumes.



I have had the opportunity of working with Nadine Krstich, the director of "Angeli" and "Opancici", the two vounger groups at St. Steven's. Traditionally, the youngest children perform first at Kolobration and other special dance concerts. They wore a white top with a dark skirt or pants, much like a school uniform. However, Nadine wanted her little dancers to have real costumes. The first

set that I made was from Crnagora (Montenegro). Many of the parishioners are Montenegrins, and when the little ones came out dressed in Montenegrin costumes, the audience was enthralled.

A set of costumes, which I recently completed, is from South Serbia. The pink satin harem-style pants, hot pink brocade floral vest, and long-sleeved white blouses, all trimmed in gold, make these little girls look totally adorable. The boys wear white folksy satin shirts, maroon sashes, and dark baggy pants. This suite has the girls playing the tambourines as they dance, and the boys doing a great shimmy as the dance ends. These "Angeli" are always a hit!

I generally do not criticize the dancing; however, it seemed that every group danced Cacak. My main comments are on costuming - and there were some costumes that really need upgrading. Yes, there is still room for improvement.

A similar type of folk dance concert is also held at other Serbian Orthodox churches. It is always an uplifting experience for dancers and audience.
