FOLK DANCE FEDERATION COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

Held on 9/19/2015 at Somis, CA 93066

President's Report:

There will be no Federation South Meeting in San Diego at the end of September. There is a meeting in January in Pasadena.

All dance syllabi for Idyllwild Camps 1983 and 1984 will be added to Federation website. All of Camp Hess Kramer dance notes have been added already. All of these will be available on our Federation South website.

A survey of Federation-owned equipment is needed to locate and account for all of the resources which can be available to all federation groups. For instance, we have file cabinets containing syllabi and videos which clubs can access for research purposes. These items are being maintained by President Marshall Cates. He also has posters of every Statewide Festival which were used to decorate at the recent San Diego Statewide. There are also international flags, decorations, 2 wireless microphones, 2 speaker stands, 250 watt amps and speakers. The purpose of the survey is not to centralize these items but to inform all members that may need to use them in the future.

Vice President's Report:

1/24/2016 Federation Winter Festival, is being held at 150 N. Madison, Pasadena from 1:30-5:30 p.m.

2/2016 Laguna Festival is moving back to Ensign Middle School. Exact dates and times have not been worked out as yet. It was moved and seconded to support the event.

Secretary's Report:

Treasurer's Report:

The major activity during this reporting period was Statewide 2015. The in/out entries reflect only this period. There was some Statewide activity previously reported. Due to production problems with the CDs, the books are not closed, but as of now, Statewide was a \$3056.24 profit.

Thirteen new members have been insured. One club overpaid and the treasurer is carrying their \$5.00 credit for the next member that they insure.

PASADENA CO-OP

PASADENA FOLK DANCE CO-OP

Our Pasadena group started in 1941 as a pacifist food co-op, then provided dancing for USO soldiers. In 1942 it became an international folk dance group under the leadership of Allan Pelton, who then also became president of the Folk Dance Federation of California (south). It has continued since then as a regular provider of music, teaching and dance as a club affiliated with the federation – benefiting from and supporting the federation – in the same location at Throop Unitarian Church for the last thirty years. Before that, the venue was Holliston Methodist Church, which had a hard floor that discouraged attendance. We typically have 35-45 attending, often including a few new to the group. I was welcomed into the group when I first came, and have found it to be my community of friendships through mutual enjoyment of dances and socialization.

Cooperation with the federation has continued through our members' individual commitments as officers and in other capacities: Marshall Cates is currently president of the federation and vice-president of the co-op, and maintains a voluminous federation archive of dance notes, music and costume books; we have many members as past and present officers and committee chairs of the federation – Marshall, Marsha Fenner, Sylvia Stachura; Rick and Lynn Bingle, Valerie Daley, Leslie Halberg; Pat Cross and I participate in producing Folk Dance Scene – the federation's monthly magazine; chairpersons for the biennial southern Statewide Festivals include Marshall (4), Valerie, Marsha, Sylvia.

The Pasadena Folk Dance Co-op is organized with and by a board – with the usual officers – Ann Armstrong is president – a federation representative and two members-at-large who now are charged with signing up volunteers as M.C.s and publicizing our group. There is also a position for signing up volunteers to provide refreshments. Our repertoire of dances includes about 300 regularly programmed plus another 100 that can be requested. All these dances are listed on our website, many with links to videos as reminders. Selection of dances became gradually computerized starting with a Commodore 64 – which displayed 4 dances for consideration, and now evolved to an 18-week cycle of programs gener-

ated and printed for the direction of the M.C.s – who have spaces to fill with requests from the attendees.

The plan of our Friday evenings begins at 7:45 with teaching – first simpler dances, then intermediate – then a break for refreshments and announcements – followed by the rest of the program, including repeats of dances taught in the current and previous months, which continues until 11 p.m.

Because some of our members want extra help with set dances, we now include set dance reviews on the second Fridays of the month beginning early at 7 p.m. There is a suggestion box for authored general suggestions and for ideas our members may want to propose for a 15-minute session of **And**

Now for Something Completely Different. Several presentations have been on costumes and customs in European folk dance by our resident expert Betchen Barber, African drumming, Phillipino stick dance, Samoan, Maypole, cup song and Chinese dragon dances, ASL signing with singing Silent Night.

On fifth Fridays there is a break from the four repeats of the teaching of the month – we enjoy a party with an all request program, and live music.

Membership in the Co-op pays for insurance through the federation, and is sweetened by reduced admission – lately from \$6 to \$5. Rick Bingle takes care of memberships – which have ranged from 36 to 79 over several recent years. He is also the federation treasurer.

The Pasadena Co-op hosts a New Year's Eve party (at Throop), and a Winter Festival in January (24th this year at the Scottish Rite) as a regular federation-sponsored event. Look on our website, and in this issue of Folk Dance Scene for more information

Starting with a birthday sing-along led in 1991 or so by Bruce Bailey, we have had live music at the coop on occasion – particularly for fifth Fridays, New Year's Eve and the Winter Festival. The band has a repertoire by now of over a hundred dances. We call ourselves Fifth Friday – have a drummer, bass guitar, guitar, violin, accordion, clarinet, recorder – and some of us are singers. We get together weekly when preparing for gigs, enjoy each other's company, and look forward to playing for dancers.

Refreshments are sometimes spectacular, as we are favored by especially talented providers.



We reach out through Folk Dance Scene – the Calendar, On the Scene and ads; two Meet-up sites established and maintained by Jan Rayman; our website PasadenaFolkDanceCoop.org which Jan Rayman created and maintains; and monthly emails Marc Rayman sends to anybody who signs up for them.

Artwork for fliers, t-shirts and shopping bags have been created by Bob O'Connor, Jan Rayman, Marshall Cates, Marc Rayman, and Ellen Stern.

Nonprofit status was established by Pat Cross. She found that the filing for 501c3 can be easier with a single form now.





RECENT EVENTS

A BRASSY NIGHT AT CAL TECH

Cal Tech Folkdancers meet on Tuesdays. Our Halloween party this year was November 2nd, first Tuesday after Halloween. If you saw a flier, and I hope you did -- I mail them, Fran Prevas e-mails them -- you know we had music by Ty Rust's brass band Rakia.

Arrak strictly speaking is distilled spirits flavored with anise. Mission Liquor's shop near me, with an Armenian clientele, carries two dozen brands. Rakia in Southeast Europe can be most any strong drink. We thought of saying on the flier "This Is the Only Way We Can Serve You Rakia" but we decided not to.

If you came to the world premiere of the 2013 film Brasslands in Los Angeles, one of the two bands at the 7th & Figueroa shopping mall was Rakia. Of course a brass band plays where it's wanted. We were glad to get them between their Oktoberfest season and their Christmas season.

In Europe, besides Austria and Germany, brass bands are big in a region of southeast Serbia, north Macedonia, and southwest Bulgaria. Two thousand people live in the Serbian town of Guca ("goo-cha"), three hours by bus from Belgrade; something like 600,000 arrive for the annual five-day brass band festival. Miles Davis went there and said "I didn't know you could play trumpet that way."

Bands like to play for us because when they play dance music we dance. At an Oktoberfest or Christmas party people have other things to do. This isn't Guca.

I asked John Hertz to teach. I like the way he highlights dance basics. "Alas, beginners often think it's terrifyingly complicated," he says. "But think of a tree. Suppose you saw one for the first time. You might say 'Look at all those little green pieces! There must be thousands of them!' That's true but not very helpful. You'd be better off knowing there's a trunk and roots and branches." He taught what a little farther into Bulgaria is known as *Graovsko* (from Graovo, a Shope town) or *Pravo Shopsko Horo* (pravo means plain or true; folkdancers also know *Pravo Trakijsko Horo* from Thrace) but in honor of Serbs, who dance it their way, he called *Jagne* ("yagneh", a lamb, from a popular song); also *Sareni Corapi* ("sha-reh-nee cho-rap-ee", colorful socks,

from another song). *Kolo u Sest* ("ko-lo oo shest", dance in six i.e. six steps) and *Cocek* ("cho-chek", possibly from *kyucek* a dancing boy but that was long ago) are also big in this region and we danced plenty of them.

We always invite people to come in costume. Many did and I gave prizes. There were even Minions from the recent animated films.

We were very glad we could hold the party at home, Dabney Lounge on the Cal Tech campus. Once we had Rakia at our alternative site, nearby Throop Church, and the police shut us down. It's hard for brass to be quiet.

Not everyone in the band knows how to dance, which I confess showed sometimes during the evening. Not all of us know this music either. But it's fun and lively and considering there were thirteen people in the band you won't mind if I say it was a blast.

MY KIND OF TOWN

The 2015 Tamburitza Extravaganza was October 1-4 in Rosemont, Illinois, fifteen miles northwest of Chicago near O'Hare airport, at the Westin O'Hare hotel.

I love dancing to tamburitza music. I've joined the Tamburitza Association of America (really; both the U.S. and Canada). I go to the Extravaganza whenever I can. I saw some of you this year.

The plucked-string *tamburitza* comes from the Pannonian plains of Bosnia-Croatia-Hungary-Romania -Serbia, including Belgrade the capital of Serbia, and Zagreb the capital of Croatia. A *tamburitza* band is a handful of related instruments ranging from the high -voiced *prim* ("preem" i.e. first or leader) or *bisernitza* ("bee-sehr-nee-tsa", little pearl), to the deeper *brać* ("brahtch"), *bugarija* ("boo-gah-ree-ya"), and č*elo* ("tcheh-lo"), to the *berde* ("behr-deh") or bass. Sometimes an accordion. And singing, naturally.

Thursday at the Extravaganza is Welcome Night. On Friday and Saturday, there are concerts. Saturday also has the Hall of Fame awards and a dinner. Sunday has church services in the morning (most Croats are Catholic, most Serbs are Orthodox, so

these are held simultaneously; one or both may be off-site), and afterwards a Survivors' Party for anyone who hasn't had to leave and can still manage after singing and dancing till all hours.

Over, under, and around these are scheduled and unscheduled hours with your favorite bands, or maybe some you'd never sung or danced with before. This year seventeen were on the program.

Also vendors. Most folk dancers, including the Cal Tech group I'm president of, can't manage seventeen bands a night (plus Scandinavian, other Balkan, Israeli, Greek, and the rest of the music we love), so recorded music is it. Also songbooks, cookbooks, pictures, costume pieces, notecards, musical instruments. I saw them all and took some home.

Usually you'll find "Dance" on the program assigned to a hotel ballroom. Bands that like to play for dancing will take turns there; also the dinner, the awards, and concerts. This year the Friday concert was in the Grand Ballroom 7 - 9 p.m., the Saturday concert 1 - 3 p.m.; dancing 8 p.m. - 1 a.m. on Thursday, 10 p.m. - 2:30 a.m. on Friday and Saturday.

Hotels usually have smaller "breakout" rooms. We used five, with bands touring them in hour-and-a-half sets: you could follow a favorite, or stay while different bands came to you. This year we called these rooms *Bečari* ("beh-cha-ree") *Suites*. A *bečar* is a more or less handsome, more or less carefree, more or less up to no good bachelor, the sort of fellow whom songs are about and who sings them. When Dick Crum shared a big apartment in Santa Monica with three friends, they kept a sign in the window "4 Bečari".

We scheduled "Tambura in the Lobby" (*tamburitza* is a form of the word tambura) with bands taking turns in the East Foyer and the Lakeshore Room. The all-female all-vocal group *Šarena* had sing-alongs in the Michigan Room and the Executive Amphitheatre, and Željko Jergan gave dance lessons. There were after-hours parties in the Executive and in Lasalle C, and an all-night jam session in the Madison.

I never get much sleep at the Extravaganza.

It's great dancing with people older than I am, also younger. I saw lots of teens, lots of grandparents. I keep finding how much I learn by dancing with the folks whose dances they are. It's a particular joy when some ethnic dancer joins in next to me, and I can feel what's happening in the dance by "listening through my hands". Too few of us folk dancers go to

ethnic events. When we do, we hang around with other folk dancers. In a line or circle with ethnics, we don't notice what they're doing. We just stick to our own habits, even though we've usually learned second-hand, or third-hand, or farther from the source.

I learned a lot from Dennis Boxell, and I'm still learning from John Filcich, "Uncle Dennis" and "Uncle John" to me. Uncle Dennis was one of few who taught dance basics. He got tired of choreographies even though he'd made good ones. Uncle John, now over 90, dances with more life, slow or fast, simple or tricky, than people half his age.

Uncle John always teaches not to join a line at the end. There are two leaders, the *kolovodja* ("ko-lo-vo-dzha", dance leader) at the head and the *keć* ("ketch", caboose) at the tail. You may have noticed he often dances there. At the Extravaganza some people asked how I learned to dance. I said "Kolo John" or Dennis Boxell. They said it showed.

The concerts are a blast. Bands work hard to show off their best. For anyone who's received an award -- or recently passed away -- songs or tunes will be in their memory, or their honor. "Standards" will be played by more than one band, so you can really hear individual styles.

The "breakout" rooms are intimate. You're only a few feet -- or inches -- from the band. People sing with them. Another thing that may break out is dancing.

If you drink, there's plenty all weekend -- Saturday there was a \$3 beer special, and there's always \$/ivovica ("shlee-vo-vee-tza", plum brandy) of both Croatian and Serbian brands -- but you don't have to. You can tip a band with cash, or with beer or \$/ivo whether or not you drink yourself.

I always go to the Sarena sing-alongs. I don't know the language but these women are so much fun. Sometimes they have handouts with song words. People will call out a request or come up and tip the band -- naturally that happens in any session.

Now that I've been at a few Extravaganzas I'm starting to recognize people from other parts of the country. This year I couldn't go to the Survivors' party. I had a plane to catch, back to the rest of my life -- but oh boy did I feel great. Ethnic dance events are part of the folk dance scene.
