

FOLK DANCE FEDERATION OF CALIFORNIA, SOUTH COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES, OCTOBER 8, 2017, PASADENA, CA

A word of support for Shana, we wish her the best. She resigned due to health concerns. Pauline Klak is assuming the role of president.

President/VP report: This year brings an opportunity to promote folk dancing, the hobby I love over all others, to the greater community. I would like to look at the art of the successful Beginners Festival more closely, explore the idea of beginner events focused on age groups by generation, shorten length of the festival to 2 to 3 hours max, emphasize the social aspects of dancing and learning. We will try to learn from the successful efforts that the Foothill Dancers have pointed out to all of us in the June 2017 Folk Dance Scene. We also look to the dynamic Cerritos Folk Dancers, who have added so much to dancing in So Cal, with two festivals per vear and a performance/demonstration group which is active in community events in their area. These are two examples of groups that are trying new things and reaching a wider community of dancers. Most 2018 festivals are already approved: Pasadena Winter Festival, Jan 14 2018 (with council meeting), by Pasadena Folk Dance Co-op; Lunar New Year Festival, Feb.11, 2018 sponsored by Cerritos Folk Dancers: Laguna Folk Dance Festival. March 3-5. 2018, sponsored by Laguna International Dancers; Westwood Spring Festival April 15, 2018 (tentative); 9th Annual Cerritos Festival East meets West June 16, 2018, in Cerritos (with council meeting).

Secretary's report: Minutes were emailed, copies available to review. The recent virtual meeting concerning the appointment of Mindy Belli as treasurer was detailed in an additional handout. Minutes approved and appended.

Treasurer's report: The details and balance sheets for the quarter were emailed to members with the minutes. There has been very little activity in the accounts except for a transfer of \$5,000 from the savings account general fund to cover the \$2554 loss incurred by the Statewide Festival and this year's scholarships. Scholarships have been paid (in the last 3 years) from the checking account without

transferring from the savings account. At this time, there are no outstanding checks or deposits. However only one scholarship has been paid: \$405 of a total of \$1000; thus \$595 remains to be paid. No category is over-budget currently. The General Fund is still much higher than in prior years due to the \$25,000 donation in June of 2016 by James Kaumeyer. However, it is now \$5000 lower and will be further reduced by scholarships. A motion was made to accept the treasurer's report. It was seconded and the motion passed. Discussion of the treasurer's comment on scholarships not paid out resulted in the following: "Scholarship recipients will have up to three months after the date of the event to submit receipts. The club that recommended the scholarship will notify the Treasurer the awardee name, event name and date for which it was granted, by email or mail." The policy vote passed.

Membership report by Bob Altman: Bob supplied a written report: Membership packets were sent by email on 10/1/17 to all clubs and most associate members. Membership packets have been sent by postal mail to the two associate members who don't have email (Frances Ajoian and Michael Norris). I've gotten back a handful of applications and a couple of checks (see below). I've helped a couple of folks deal with computer issues related to opening and printing or filling out the forms. This year the process is guite a bit different from past years: Clubs are encouraged to fill out the forms on their computer and email them to me. Of course, they can print the forms and mail them to me as they have in the past. In the past, clubs sent forms and payment to Rick (the treasurer). This year, forms and payment are being sent to me. I am depositing the checks and coordinating with Mindy (the treasurer) and Julith (insurance) to ensure they get all of the information they need from the membership packets. Once the dust settles, I'll also let the secretary (for meeting minutes) and the Scene know who gets what. Discussion: Bob was concerned that checks for membership/Folk Dance Scene subscriptions are accumulating on his desk. Might they be submitted electronically? This would require access to accounts and permissions from the treasurer and president. The system at present requires periodic trips to the bank, not always at convenient times. Mindy says

she can look into it. Bob's second concern is the directory. To respect the privacy of members, it will include only those who wish to have contact information published. Generally, though, names should be made public on the website for clubs seeking teachers, dance info, etc., and it will eliminate paper. Motion was made and passed to do both a printed directory and digital directory in the coming year 2018.

Insurance report: Julith Neff reminds everyone to fill out the forms, all lines! She needs to have the regular locations and alternate locations of meeting places to write policies that will protect people and the Federation. She is working with Bob on insurance checks which come in with memberships to speed up deposits.

Finance committee: New chairperson will be Marshall Cates, with Pauline Klak, Gordon Wall, Mindy Belli, Rick Bingle as committee members. They will meet in March and report at the April board meeting.

Scholarship report: Kathy Molga will be invited to make a case for increasing scholarships to the finance committee. 1) Show that applications for the scholarships are up. 2) Show that camp fees are rising. 3) Set up the timeline for camp payments and reservations early so selections can be made by the committees and refunds granted in a timely manner. Discussion: It was determined this should be handled by the finance committee who will have two fiscal meetings. The first will be held before the April meeting to set the Federation budget, with no figure set for scholarships. The second meeting will be set after the application deadline for scholarships. At that meeting the scholarship committee will make a request for a budget based on the applicant pool. The finance committee will then set an amount.

New Business:

1) The January board meeting will request a nominating committee to present board candidates at the April 15, 2018 meeting. Pauline Klak sent an email "I am pleased to announce that Diane Baker has stepped forward to fill the vacancy as Vice-President of the Folk Dance Federation South." Diane is well known as an enthusiastic dancer, a skillful dance teacher including at last year's Beginners Festival, and previously chaired the Laguna Festival. She is an excellent addition to the Federation Board. Thank you, Diane, and welcome aboard. 2) Special project request: \$1500.00 to convert, consolidate, video tapes and CDs to a format that would be available as a resource of archived teaching sessions, workshops, performances belonging to Federation, South. Marshall Cates has 25 years of tapes that need to be reformatted, preferably in electronic format. He has estimated fees for this service at \$1500, plus \$500 for materials and to put the archive on line. Special projects funds require officers' approval and it was so granted. The executive committee approved the expenditure. 3) The treasurer requested to seek viewing privileges, not necessarily signing authority, to all Federation related accounts to enable the treasurer to report incomes and expenses accurately to the IRS and the Folk Dance Federation Board. Currently Camp Hess Kramer and the Folk Dance Scene committees have exclusive checking

accounts. The executive committee which has responsibility, must therefore have viewing privileges. Pauline Klak, as president, authorized the action and any attendant actions (such as creating new special accounts and transferring all funds from the old accounts) necessary to ensure the Folk Dance Federation is able to report accurately and thereby preserve our non-profit status. It was decided a motion was not necessary, but the authorization was endorsed by all present. 4) Lifetime Achievement Award: Laguna Festival organizers put out a call for all clubs to submit nominations for the lifetime achievement award at the festival. Past winners have been Beverly & Irwin Barr, Donna Tripp and John Filcich.

When asked about our New Year's activities, we typically mention a midnight frenzy of horns, bells, fireworks, and other loud noises just as the year changes, after a rousing good party, and resolutions to produce a better New Year. These customs, it seems, go back to ones developed millennia ago and are still practiced in more nearly their original form in rural East Europe. Let's have a look.

Until the Industrial Revolution, Europe was basically agricultural and had been so for over 7000 unbroken years. People's main concern was always with getting enough food from their farms to make it through another year, and they viewed a new year not so much as a returning cycle as a new "lease" that they had to persuade the unseen spirits (Christian or otherwise) to grant to them.

Who were these spirits? Well, when people in your family died, you planted them underground, and you knew their spirits continued to exist because you saw them in dreams. (Remember, cognitive science is very new, and people hadn't a clue how brains recycle information at night.) So, if your ancestors were living underground, they should be able and willing to help you, their very own offspring, by stimulating the crops you planted under the earth. But the dead of your competitors in the surrounding villages might well be trying to grab all the available fertility for *their* descendants: beware!

Add one more fact and the stage is set: The spirits of the dead were thought to escape from the underworld during a short period in the dark of winter—the ancestors to visit their descendants, and others to wreak havoc. Because different ethnic groups used different calendars, the scary holidays land on *our* oft-refurbished calendar at different times, so we find similar rituals in different places at somewhat different dates. But the time of escape most often reckoned today is during the Twelve Days of Christmas, which run from Christmas to Epiphany (Jan. 6), together marking the end of one year and the start of the next. (In Celtic culture, the great escape occurs on Halloween, for just a single night fortunately not for 12!)

During these Twelve Days, the farmers had three main items on their agenda: 1) to show friendly spirits what was needed for the new year, while keeping evil ones at bay; 2) to try to divine what was in fact going to happen next year; and 3) to chase all the spirits back to the underworld at the end of their brief holiday. We'll look at each.


1) The age-old way of nudging spirits to do what you want is by *showing* them what's needed, using analogies. You want the bright sun to come back so the plants grow and provide food? Then you must light candles (or now strings of electric lights) and build bonfires with the biggest Yule log you can find. And bring whatever living greenery you can find to decorate your house—holly, ivy, an evergreen tree. And be sure to provide food in over-abundance, to your family, friends, and anyone who comes to the door, to show the groggy and obtuse spirits what to provide next year.

But the farmers (who, in East Europe, had just sown their fields for the next summer's crops) went further, reminding the spirits that another key to this abundant food was *fertility*. After insemination, one must wait months for gestation, which will succeed only if the seed is fertile; so this is the season to strengthen the male principle. To this end, male mummers traditionally go about the villages enacting a fertility play, which—over much of Europe—runs roughly as follows.

A swaggering Bridegroom enters, using much

horseplay to court a Bride (played by an unmarried man wearing skirts). An Older Woman (man in skirts and padding) rushes in carrying a swaddled baby, insisting the baby is the groom's, but he fobs her off. Meanwhile a Rival Suitor sneaks in (dressed as anything from Napoleon to a Turk) and starts to make off with the Bride. The two suitors fight and one is killed (either one-it matters not, but each region has its tradition), upon which the Bride goes into hysterical mourning. A Doctor is called, who, after more horseplay (such as putting a soap-bar as "medicine" into the fallen suitor's mouth), revives him, and the whole troupe dances in celebrationoften with the whole household-before partaking of the abundance of the host. (Some explanations: the Older Woman represents the past year-she has used her fertility and the suitor wants fresh, unused fertility for best results. The male who dies represents the death of the crop plants at each harvest, crops which are vital to feed the community. His later revival represents the spring regrowingresurrection—of the plants from the seemingly dead seed put into the ground in winter. This agrarian story was also that of Adonis and of Dionysus in Classical Greece, and of Dumuzi among the Sumerians 5000 years ago.)

2) With so many spirits flitting about from the Other World, it should be possible to learn something about the future-no? On the one hand, events during the Twelve Days were taken as presaging what will come; thus the weather each day may tell something about the weather in the corresponding month (since there are 12 of each). Or one can attempt direct *divination* to glean the answers to specific questions about crops, marriage, and so on. Thus any Russian girl had several methods to learn whether she would marry during the coming year (and whom), whether she would have children (and how many), or if she would die first. One common ritual involved looking into reflective surfaces-mirrors or shallow water dishes (Sketch 1). Others involved assessing the movements of birds (which can fly to and from the


spirit world) or the shapes formed by pouring molten lead or wax into water (rather like reading the shapes taken by tea leaves).

3) More important even than begging for information from the spirits, however, was to wrest abundance back from the hostile ones who like to withhold it. Again analogy prevails: to scare them away, dress up as them! So all manner of huge, dark, hairy, guarrelsome beasts run about the streets of Europe during the Twelve Nights (Sketch 2). In Greece and Bulgaria, they are called kallikántzari, karakondzouli, etc., and are believed to gnaw all year on the tree that holds up the world. But when Christ's birth on Dec. 25 stops them, in fury they invade our world-during which time the tree manages to repair itself. Kallikántzari are so stupid that you can easily outwit them by giving them insoluble problems, or by amusing them-they love dancing. In other areas, analogical battles are carried out, with the Good Spirits (handsomely dressed) always winning over the Evil Spirits (hairy, ragged, and usually sooty).

At the end of the Twelve Days, various measures


