The Corner

HIGHLIGHTS OF FEDERATION COUNCIL MEETING, PASADENA, CA April 15, 2018

President Pauline Klak's Report: Election of new officers 2018 to 2019: all previous officers have agreed to continue for another year.

Vice President's Report: Diane Baker reports she has updated the list of festivals for the website. She will notify Dick Oakes.

Fiscal Committee Report: Marshall Cates: The fiscal committee met April 7 and produced a budget with the following highlights: 1) Proposed income = \$5075. \$3300 for insurance plus \$1775 spendable income. 2) Expenses \$6580, \$3300 for insurance. 3) Deficit balance \$1505. 4) \$18,403 in unallocated special project funds. 5) \$13,511 in unallocated scholarship funds. 6) Elimination of the Federation phone. 7) Elimination of National Folk Organization membership.

The budget has a provision for a contingency payment to clubs that do not bring in the expected revenue from festivals. Some clubs have used this as a subsidy from Federation instead. Some do not use it at all. Should we make funds available to clubs on a regular basis? Should it be just for losses, or make it a benefit for member clubs to subsidize all festivals at \$2 per person? Westwood is losing location of Brockton School and will need Federation help. Pasadena has not lost attendance despite a \$10 charge for festivals. Marshall put forth the motion that: 1) Only clubs whose events are preapproved are eligible for funding. 2) Funds should be for unexpected shortfalls, not ongoing budget expenses. If a club is unwilling to raise rates, should we still pay? Small clubs like West Valley would suffer. This would be a good use of Special Funds. For clubs with regular events, they should be able to meet budget. Narodni gave up the summer festival and raised prices to cover others. Remind clubs that they are responsible for loss unless this is negotiated. The festival application form will be updated by the VP to include conditions of special funds and webmaster will add it to the forms page.

SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA FOLK DANCE BANDS

KOROYAR FOLKLORE ENSEMBLE:

Koroyar [the name is made up of the word "dance" in Serbian (kolo), Bulgarian (horo), Turkish (oyun) and Armenian (bar)] was founded in 1968 by dancer/ teacher Richard Unciano after multiple trips to Eastern Europe and the Balkans. Koroyar started as a dance troupe using recorded music. In 1970 pianist/accordionist Ronald Muller joined Koroyar, and, together with Richard, formed the live music component of the group. Up through the late 1990s, Korovar remained both a dance and live music group. However, in the early 2000s, the dance component was dropped and Koroyar continued as a live music group. Richard Unciano passed away in 2006, but the remaining membership of Koroyar have stayed together and are continuing with Richard's vision of preserving the musical traditions of the Balkans and surrounding areas.

Koroyar's extensive repertoire consists of over 500 pieces of music from multiple areas including Armenia, Bulgaria, Romania, Greece, Turkey, the former Yugoslavia, Israel and the Jewish diaspora. Many of these pieces were recorded firsthand by Richard, touring these areas with both camera and reel-to-reel tape recorder. Of specific note in Koroyar's repertoire are firsthand transcriptions of Shqiptar tunes from Kosovo, and music of the Crimean Tatar people. To the best of our knowledge Koroyar is the only group in the United States performing the latter repertoire. We are a recreational folk dance band, started over 35 years ago by the Laguna Folkdancers. We have continued, uninterrupted, and are now members of the successor club, Laguna International Dancers, playing music and dancing. We enjoy dance, as an added dimension to our music, and the feeling of connectedness with the dancers while we play. To one of our members this brought up the image of "High Society" which, coupled with "folk" seemed a meaningful combination. And so, our name became "Madison Avenue Folk".

FEDERATION MINUTES (CONT.)

Scholarship Report: Marshall Cates reports about \$1100 in revenue this year. Deficit budget is larger than usual this year: \$1505. Only some of the income is from the \$1/dancer donations. Committee decided to request more donations. The board discussed the Festival/Institute budget, the intent, and typical use, as well as two other funds available from donations. It is vital that fundraising efforts be increased in the coming years. Ideas include Treasurer's Ball, donations in memory of dancers and Associate memberships. The Scholarship review will be by Rick and Lynn Bingle, Marcella Lawson, and Pauline Klak who will read and evaluate applications. Criteria for scholarships: Pauline Klak observed that people who are involved and promoting dance are deserving of scholarship. Dancing is not a prerequisite and no other definition is necessary. There are so many ways to promote folk dancing.

Camp Beverly & Irwin Barr Report: Marc Rayman is the new chair for Federation Folk Dance Camp. The members of the committee are Marc, Marcella Lawson, Jan Rayman, Gerda Ben-Zeev, and Sandy Helperin. (The first three are present at this meeting.) We could not find an acceptable date for holding camp at Hess Kramer in 2018. We are investigating an alternate venue for the end of November 2018 and hope to have a decision on it in early May. (Ed's Note: for further developments since the meeting see article in On the Scene) The president clarified in this meeting that Marc has an appointment as committee chair for three years. Given that, this week the committee will put down a deposit for camp at Hess Kramer in autumn 2019. It is likely, but not yet assured, that we will not have use of the hotel style rooms, although we would prefer to use them. We will have an article in the June Scene with news about our

Equipment Report: Marshall Cates is storing equipment.

Old Business: Renaming the folk dance camp. This is a change to the standing rules and requires a vote. The motion was put forth and unanimously passed to rename the camp the Beverly & Irwin Barr Folk Dance Camp no matter where it is held. Mail Chimp has been

proposed as a way to broadcast to all members any "Special Announcements" from FD Federation. Uneven contact could be a reason for a drop in attendance at events. Clubs don't all have email info for all members and some don't send info anyway, some do. FD Scene already informs subscribers. People may not want email alerts, but twice a year might be OK. Mindy was encouraged to write to FD Scene or contact clubs to get consensus.

New Business

Statewide Festival 2019-Theme Ethnic Treasures. Location Edmunds Ballroom on the Pomona College Campus, Claremont, CA. Dance department chairperson Tony Shay has offered to co-sponsor the festival. Dates May 31, June 1, June 2, 2019 (preferred date coincided with college graduation) Teachers cameo appearances by Mihai David, Yoni Carr, Israel Yakovee, and new teachers Sevi Bayraktar and Filip Petkovski with more in-depth instruction by Bata Marcetic, and Sunday afternoon Salsa Rueda workshop by Cesar Garfiaz. (Ed's Note: Since the meeting it has been learned that Bata is unable to come. Peter Iliev will be teaching instead.) Committee: Pauline. Diane. Marshall. Darlene Wheeler, Brent, Kathy Draper, and Stefanie Holzman. We are seeking qualified participants for treasurer, decoration chair, refreshment chair, audio & equipment manager, concert chairperson, publicity, admissions. We have received offers to take charge of registration, luncheon table centerpieces.

We have discussed in the past more Beginner Workshops, and I still want to encourage this idea. Potentially at all clubs. Bringing new people and bringing young people will generate excitement and keep our favorite hobby alive. I have talked with Valerie Daley about a potential return to the lovely venue in Somis where we had the Officer's Ball a few years ago. She is checking on price and availability for an event in the fall. The early part of the festival would be devoted to some basic dances that can be welcoming for beginners and a good warmup for experienced dancers. Valerie has had success in bringing beginners into her classes in Ventura area. This would also be a fundraiser for the Federation.

Availability of Somis Grange Hall for Officer's ball or fund raisers is being investigated by Valerie Daley. Goal of this ball is to invite beginners, attract new dancers and start with easy dances. Valerie will see if her group is willing to host. Addendum: We have an opportunity to pick a date for the Officer's Jamboree in the Fall of 2018. This would take place in the same hall in Somis where we had a successful Officer's Jamboree Festival and a Board Meeting in September 2015. The address of the hall is 5380 Bell St, Somis CA. This is in Ventura county, a pleasant drive through the country. Here are three dates we could have: (I numbered the choices according to my preferences, but all of those dates would work for me.) 3. Sunday, Oct. 21 from 1 to 5:00 pm with the board meeting at 11:30am should be okay, 2, Sunday, October 28, 1, Sunday, November 4th, Valerie is contacting the venue, and it sounds like she has a committee eager to bring a festival to the Ventura area. (For once, they won't have to drive far to an event!)

Please be specific as to which date would work best for you and warn me if there is any other festival or conflict. This would be our fourth and final board meeting of the year and I hope that officers will be able to be there. Thanks for your input. No further business was on the agenda. Pauline closed the meeting. Meeting adjourned at 12:30 pm.

DANCERS SPEAK

10 FUN FACTS ABOUT DANCING

- 1. The "Dancing Plague" of 1518 was a mania that lasted a month and killed dozens of people in Strasbourg, France through exhaustion or heart attack. People just danced uncontrollably until they collapsed! One other famous case involved people dancing on a bridge. Eventually so many people danced that they broke the bridge and fell into the river.
- 2. A world record for the longest conga dance line was set by 119,986 people in Miami in 1988.
- An English man tragically died during an office Christmas party. The cause of death? He
 overexerted himself dancing to Psy's megahit Gangnam Style. The lesson here is that if
 you have certain health conditions, you should not stray outside of your comfort zone.
- 4. You may know Tupac Shakur as the late rapping legend of the late 80s and early 90s, but what you may not know is that he used to do ballet! He became a member of the 127th Street Ensemble, a Harlem based theater company.
- 5. In 2008, the world's first "sustainable" dance floor opened at Club Watt in Rotterdam, Sweden. The floor's tiles each sit on springs hooked up to generators. The harder people dance, the more the springs are compressed and this converts into energy, which runs the LED lights in the floor.
- 6. The dance world is full of superstitions. By saying "break a leg" before a show, people are saying the exact opposite of what they hope will happen on stage.
- 7. The Hindu religion has a very close relationship to dance and music. This connection can be seen in their countless Bollywood movies that all celebrate dancing.
- 8. African slaves that were brought to Brazil 300-400 years ago were prohibited from practicing martial arts. Therefore, they developed the mix of dancing and fighting that is known today as capoeira.
- 9. Breakdancing was first created as a "less lethal" form of fighting between warring African-American street gangs in 1970s Bronx area of New York City. This form of dancing reemerged into worldwide popularity during the 1990s.
- 10. The most sensual dance of modern times is without a doubt the tango. It originated in the 1890s in Argentina, but it quickly became very successful in Europe.
