ABARANJANI BAR

This is one of many versions of ABARANJANI BAR (Bracelet Dance), an old village dance from the vilayet of Garin (Erzeroom) in Western Armenia. This dance is known by many different names (e.g. Hos Bilizig, Voske Aparanjan, Ghoch Bilezig, etc.). There are many different, very similar versions of this dance, but every one is considered an entire dance in itself. Different versions should not be combined to create an artificial "five-figure" dance.
