Auld Reekie Hornpipe

A 32-bar Reel for 3 couples in a 4-couple set

Bars 1 – 2	1 st couple set
3 – 4	1 st couple dance down the middle (nearer hands joined) while 2 nd couple set.
5 – 6	1 st couple (nearer hands joined) dance up the middle to top place, while 2 nd couple cast off one place.
7 – 8	1 st couple cast off one place to finish facing in. Meanwhile, 2 nd couple, joining nearer hands, dance up the middle to top place to finish facing out and 3 rd couple set, woman pulling back left shoulder, man right, to finish facing out.
9 — 16	2 nd , 1 st , and 3 rd couples dance mirror reels of three on the sides of the dance. 1 st couple dance in and down, 2 nd couple dance out and down, and 3 rd couple dance out and up. 1 st couple finish facing first corners, corners make long turns.
17 – 22	1 st couple set to first corners, set to each other across the dance, set to second corners. 1 st couple finish facing each other, man between 2 nd couple, woman between 3 rd couple.
23 – 24	1 st couple turn with the right hand, to finish in second place on own sides.
25 – 32	2 nd , 1 st , and 3 rd couples dance six hands round and back.
	Repeat having passed a couple.

"Auld Reekie" refers to the chimney sweep business run by Marianne Taylor and Don Gorman. "Hornpipe" recalls Don's days as a sea captain. Marianne began her association with Scottish dancing as the pianist for Branch founder Jeannie Carmichael, and has been a Branch member, teacher, pianist and general all-round cheerleader ever since. Marianne devised this dance to go with the tune written for her and Capt. Don by Barbara McOwen.
