





Köroğlu ("Son of the Blind Man") was a hero who lived in the north western mountains in Turkey, like Robin Hood, in the 17th century. When Köroğlu was ten years old, he worked with his father as a blacksmith for a cruel governor of the city of Bolu. For a little mistake Köroğlu's father made, this tyrannic governor ordered his father blinded with hot tongs. Köroğlu saw this happen to his father and made a solemn vow to avenge his father's blindness by challenging the despotic governor. Today, this ballad is popular throughout Turkey and is played at every festive occasion. The words of this long, story-telling song promote the idea of how to be a brave man when in a difficult situation and your people need help. This dance was first introduced in London in May 1985 by E. Kılıç.

1	Facing center, arms comfortably extended to both

2	Extending arms to sides, step and sway to R on
	ball of R, snapping fingers (cts. 1,2).
	Sway to L. taking weight on ball of L and snapping
