ABOUT THE CHOREOGRAPHERS

Born and raised in Fullerton, ROBIN BRYANT received training in contemporary dance technique from Gloria Newman, Pauline Sugine, Jean Pyatt and Ethel Winters. For several years she taught creative dance to children through the Fullerton Community Children's Center, and is presently teaching contemporary dance technique to teenagers and adults at Fullerton Junior College in cooperation with the Fullerton Parks and Recreation Department. For the last two years Mrs. Bryant has been teaching master classes at high schools and colleges throughout Orange County and the Los Angeles area. With the desire to create, she understood the need for a concert stage for both the "young" choreographer and the professional to present new works. This led to the creation of Choreographers' Concert which she has co-produced with Suzanne Joseph, dance instructor at Orange Coast College.

ELSIE DUNIN received her M.A. in dance ethnology from U.C.L.A. and is presently on the teaching staff of U.C.L.A Dept of Dance. Upon graduating, she studied Balkan dances in Yugoslavia and worked as a performing member of a professional folk dance ensemble, "Tanec." Since 1958 she has taught recreation, exhibition and master classes in folk dancing throughout the West and for two years had her own half hour radio program on folk dance music on KPFK-FM Los Angeles. During the past few years Mrs. Dunin has made four trips to the Balkans on dance research projects. Mrs. Dunin is particularly interested in the challenging problems of presenting the folk dance idiom on stage, since the folk dance is taken completely out of its traditional context when placed in a theater setting. As director of Betyarok, a Hungarian dance group, Mrs. Dunin arranges traditional dances taught by Andor Czompo, who researched the material in Hungary.

BETSY HAMILTON is currently choreographing and teaching dance for the Theatre Arts and Dance Department at California State College, Long Beach. She received her B.F.A. from the University of Texas and her M.F.A. from the Mary Wigman school in West Berlin, Germany. She also studied with Hanya Holm in Colorado Springs. While in Germany, she co-organized a group of dancers who traveled through Germany performing their own works. In the past two years she has choreographed the movement for "Mother Courage," "The Visit," "The Night Thoreau Spent in Jail," "Royal Hunt of the Sun," "Mid Summer Nights Dream," "Irma la Douce," "Carnival," "Apple Tree," and the dance drama "Genesis". She was assistant choreographer for the Ashland Oregon Shakespearean Festival. Currently she is choreographing a dance drama "BAKXAI" at California State College, Long Beach, to be presented February 18, 19 and 20.

CARLTON JOHNSON has had an extensive background in performing, teaching and choreographing. He has appeared on most every musical variety show on television, conducted master classes in Modern Jazz at colleges and high schools throughout this area and was a faculty member at the Long Beach Summer School of Dance in 1968-69. Mr. Johnson has choreograph-

ed several shows for Las Vegas, Mexico City and Lake Tahoe. "Barbara McNair Special," "Frankie Avalon Special," and the "Buddy Greco Special," are some of the television shows he has choreographed. Mr. Johnson recently staged the new "Supremes" act and is currently staging a new vocal group "The Coming Age." He will be teaching jazz for the dance department at Long Beach State College starting this February. He is presently teaching Modern Jazz at Pacific Ballet Theater, 2328 Westwood Blvd. in Los Angeles.

Performing in Mr. Johnson's contemporary work is LYNDA DAVIS who has taught at Orange Coast College and Ball State University and is now studying and teaching at California Institute of the Arts. While in Indiana last year she shared a concert with Bruce King in "An Evening of Dance." While living on the West Coast Mrs. Davis performed with Gloria Newman Co., Carlton Johnson Co. and has just returned from a tour in Ohio with the Bella Lewitzky Company.

RENA CLAHR KILPATRICK received her dance training in New York City. She was a member of the Paul Sanasardo Dance Company in 1963-64. In 1967, Mrs. Kilpatrick organized and became co-director of the New Haven Dance Ensemble, a repertory company that is still performing in the New England area. She presented a work in the "Young Choreographers" concert in New York City in 1968. Mrs. Kilpatrick came to Los Angeles in 1969 and is presently teaching dance at East Los Angeles College.

STEVEN PECK began his dance career in the streets of New York. A strong love for the classics and travels through Cuba and Brazil, where he was introduced to authentic Afro-Cuban and Batucada rhythms, strongly influenced his style of Jazz. From that time, through his dance and acing career in Hollywood to the development of the Steven Peck Dance Repertory Company, a rare blend of freedom and discipline has been nurtured—a unique style with a driving energy, which he has instilled in his dancers.

Featured with the dance company is SAYH-BER SARES, protegee of Steven Peck. At nineteen, Miss Sares is now playing the lead in Mr. Peck's original musical "Above The Garbage". Hama, originally from Tokyo, comes to the company from N. Y. with extensive broadway and television credits, has performed the works of Jaime Rogers, Claude Thompson and was associated with Luigi. Both are now teaching for The Steven Peck Theatre Arts, located at 2855 So. Robertson Blvd., Los Angeles.

PAULINE SUGINE—Mrs. Sugine has been teaching dance both in professional studios and in the Los Angeles City School System since 1956. She has done teacher's workshops and institutes for the L.A. City Schools and for C.A.P.H.E.R. She is currently teaching at East Los Angeles College; and is working with dance personnel from the other Los Angles Community Colleges to bring about a full dance and performing arts curriculum at the junior college level by 1972.
