GANDY DANCERS' BALL

Can you remember the last Gandy Dancers' Ball? If so, you've been folk dancing for a long time. It was all of 12 years ago. However, we'll all remember the next one which will be coming up, March 16, at the Los Angeles International Institute, 4th and Boyle Sts. in Los Angeles.

On this occasion there will be an admission charge of \$1 for adults and 25¢ for children. This money all goes to the International Institute, which is a United Way organization, dedicated to the purpose of bringing the newcomer from foreign and distant lands into the Los Angeles community, and to encourage his interest in his ethnic heritage. For many years, in October, around Columbus Day, the Institute was the scene of an annual International Folk Festival, and this is hoped to (please see page 6)



From samurai Kendo sword play of Japan to the country dances of Scotland, exciting traditional folklore from far parts of the earth will be performed by sixteen fully costumed groups, soloists, and five chorales in the 22nd. annual International Folk Dance Festival slated for Saturday evening, March 15 at the Music Center Pavilion, 8 to 11 p.m.

Narrated by the famous singing actress, Miss Eartha Kitt, the festival will introduce to the United States, I. Made Bandem, one of Bali's most celebrated temple dancers. Among the groups included are the famous Chinese Folk Ballet of San Francisco; famous cantaor from Malaga, Pepe Segundo, appearing with the Genaro Gomez Cuadro Flamenco; Hadarim Israeli Dance Theatre in a biblical dance from ancient Jerusalen; Mapu Polynesian Dancers, choir and percussionists in a wild combat ritual from the Tonga Islands (Friendly Is.?) and a passionate love dance from Tahiti; OUT own C. Stewart Smith and his Scottish dancers, accompanied by the Glengarry Pipe &

FROM THE EDITORS

It would seem that the best laid plans of Mice and Man and Ralph Miller gang aft agley. Despite the energetic work and the enthusiasm of Ralph and his cohorts, plus the promotion by the Folk Dance Federation and "Scene" in recent issues, the Teachers Training Seminar failed to materialize once more. Nowhere near enough registrants had signed up before deadline time; consequently, the college had to cancel it again. Despite the similar experience last year, many would-be attendees again put off enrolling until too late. Perhaps some sort of poll could be taken to try and determine just what prospective teachers desire in a teacher training program, and what were their problems. We are sure that your club and the committee would appreciate some guideline to steer by when and if planning in the future.

Due to a recent question that arose at a Federation council meeting, it might be well to reiterate here, the principles re advertising in "Folk Dance Scene". There is to be no advertising of products, etc. in the news letter itself, and only flyers relating to folk dancing or folkloric activities are admissible - at present, those of a commercial nature such as for concerts, coffee houses, private institutes are usually okay - records, no - that would open the floodgates technically to anyone who had a single folk record in stock.

Among the reports at last council meeting was the announcement that the new folk dance directories were out. They may be obtained from your club's council delegate, from our director of publicity, Perle Bleadon, who always has a handful, or you can get them by mail for 65¢ each from Virginia Saar, director of extension of the F.D.Federation, 2224 Brier Ave., Los Angeles, Calif. 90039.

This being February, a short month, and no time for leeway, we're typing tonite and hope to finish before 10 in the morning.

After Avis Tarvin has collected the popular dance list from all the leaders, North and South, and has decided which dances will be done in what order on which program, then Luther Harris must start borrowing records and taping all those dances. Then Valerie Staigh, who has sent out invitations to MCs all over the state, (and after she has their replies), must co-ordinate all of her people with all of the programs!

Between now and Statewide, Janet $D_{I_{\mathcal{E}_{\mathcal{O}_{\mathcal{O}}}}}$ Between now and Statewide, Janet Phillips must decide the menu for the Installation Brunch; John and Flora Connau must arrange transportation for everyone

coming to San Diego from beyond driving distance; Nancy Denov must make all of the arrangements for the Friday night Institute; and the Cygany Dancers must plan for three separate afterparties. Meanwhile, Alice Hauserman has to co-ordinate everything! It looks as though the Statewide Committee is going to spend a busy next three months.

Vital Statistics: As of the last meeting, only 90 people had pre-registered, mostly from out-of-the-area people. What's holding up the rest? We made \$63.53 from donations at the Preview Party. Thank you, every one who helped. . . Although the Federation is not sponsoring a bus to Mexico, Flora Connau reports that Greyhound runs a bus to the border every fifteen minutes. The cost is \$1.10, then you walk across the border and grab a taxi from there. We've been told that there is a Mexican bus at the border - very ethnic, people, chickens, etc. - a folkloric adventure, indeed, that should be:

Back to the pre-registration again. Vivian Woll reminds you again that <u>each</u> and <u>every</u> person must register separately, no "Mr. & Mrs. & family" applications. We'll have a form in this "Scene", and your folk dance club will have plenty as well. • And, oh my yes, the other kind of registration - hotels! Memorial Day is always a busy holiday anywhere - especially in San Diego - and with the Fiesta 200 celebrations taking place this year, it is imperative that you make your reservations early. Your requests should go to the San Diego Convention & Visitors Bureau, % Mrs. Menko, Housing Supervisor, 225 Broadway, San Diego, Calif. 92101, no later than April 20th, and of course, be sure to state that you are attending the Folk Dance Federation's Festival. Your club has a full list of hotels and motels also.

All kinds of activities precede the folk dance weekend, including parades, the beautiful Camellia show itself, regatta, etc.; then on Friday night, in the realm of dance,

the Camellia City Ballet takes place at Hiram Johnson Migh School. Saturday is when the folk dancing starts, in the afternoon with an institute. It starts at 1:30 p.m. when Gordon Engler and Ruth Brown will conduct a "no-partner" institute, which should



be quite an attraction to those soloing up there. Having seen some of Gordy's recent dances and how well they have been received, we can certainly expect only the best. This will take place in the Memorial Auditorium at 16th. and J Sts., as well as will all of the other folk dance activities.

The festivals will be on Saturday evening, 8 to 12 midnite; Sunday eve, 8 to 10; and Sunday afternoon from 3:30 to 5 p.m., following the pageant. The BIG attraction of the week-end of course will be the famous (please see next page)

The entire "living room" will be devoted to displays of beautiful costumes, both ethnic ones from other individuals and those created by Gandy members from past exhibitions. The Federation's Historians books will be on display, and the record dealers will be in the side rooms.

Actual dancing will start at 2 p.m. and run until 6 p.m. Prior to that, the Federation Council meeting will be held in the lounge at 11 a.m. This, by the way, is the time for final nominations for officers for the Federation for 1969-70, and anyone wishing to submit a nomination from the floor at that time must have the consent and a written biography of the nominee.
