OJAI, WESTWOOD & MUSIC CENTER EVENTS - APRIL

OJAI FESTIVAL

It was in 1946, many moons ago, that the first big folk dance festival which drew together dancers from all over the State was presented in the lovely little town of Ojai in the hills back of Ventura. There had been three or four prior festivals in the southland that spring, but this was the Big One - it was the first "Statewide". From then on, everyone began to become aware that there were folk dancing and folk dance festivals in Southern California.

This April 4 and 5, Ojai will again play host to folk dancers - it will be its 14th Biennial Festival, and while not a Statewide, it will certainly draw dancers from all over. The activities start with a kolo party on Saturday afternoon, under the direction of Rubi Vuceta, in the Art Center; then on to the Nordhoff High School gym in the evening for general dancing and exhibitions. After this, there will be an afterparty at the Art Center. The Festival closes on Sunday afternoon with dancing at the school gym from 1 to 5 with more fine exhibitions ... (A word of warning! Soft shoes are mandatory for dancing in the gym, except for the exhibition groups, who will use a floor-cover.) The tennis courts, formerly used, are unavailable this year because they are being resurfaced, and the gym floor must not be marred by hard shoes.)

Our flyer in the last issue of "Scene" had the complete program of dances. It appears that there is something for everybody. The exhibitions sound exciting - we note that they include "Betyarok", (HunWESTWOOD CO-OP FESTIVAL

Running Ojai a close chase, another perennial - let us say annual - festival is that of the Westwood Co-operative Folk Dancers. The spring of '46 was the time of their first festival also - on the green in front of the U.C.L.A. gym. (There was parking and plenty of wide open spaces in them days, pardner!)

This year, however, as in the past few years, and through the courtesy of the Culver City Parks and Recreation Dept., the Westwood Festival will be held in the lovely Culver City Memorial Auditorium, at the corner of Culver Blvd. and Overland in Culver City... Date, Sunday afternoon, April 19.

This festival, the Silver Anniversary Festival, will commence with a council meeting of the Folk Dance Federation, South, at 11 a.m. All council members and delegates are urged to attend, as it will be ballot counting time... Following a brief hiatus for lunch, the festival proper will start at 1:30, and run until 5:30 p.m. We have been promised exciting exhibitions by top demonstration groups, and from past experience we know that the dancer participation program will be excellent. Westwood is the largest Federation club, and its years of experience have taught its members how to run a fine festival.

Along with this issue of "Scene" there is a flyer concerning the festival, plus a reservation blank for anyone interested in attending the post-festival dinner at the Cafe de Paris. There is always additional dancing at these affairs, but we understand that reservations well in advance are advisable. Don't forget the date. See you in 1 Culvertown April 19:

INTERNATIONAL FOLK DANCE CONCERT AT MUSIC CENTER

The first of the big folklore presentations here in Los Angeles by the International Concerts Exchange Foundation this spring will be the 23rd annual Folk Dance Festival, more familiarly known to most folk dancers as the "Parnes Concert". A full year in preparation, it will bring hundreds of colorfully costumed dancers, singers and musicians in dances, ceremonials and pageantry of five continents and the seven seas on April 11, 8 to 11 p.m., to the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion of the Music Center. Miss Anne Baxter is the narrator who will introduce the stars representing the world from A (Armenia) to U (the U.S.A.). (We hope to catch Zambia one of these years to complete the alphabet.) Here is a must for folk dancers!

And here is another <u>must</u>! As we have pointed out for the past several issues, the Folk Dance Federation has an arrangement whereby any tickets purchased through our Federation Scholarship Committee will result in ONE DOLLAR being allotted to the Federation Scholarship fund - through which some deserving young folklorists may be selected to have their tuition furnished at one of the summer folk dance camps. IDYLLWILD BACCHANAL

Here we have a festival so close to the beginning of May that we feel we should include it in this issue. The date is Saturday, May 2, 1970, and the whole day's activities begin with a Federation Council meeting at 11 a.m.

An institute follows at 2 p.m. (We don't have a list of the teachers at this moment, but they always offer something interesting.) This lasts until 5 p.m. We return at 8 p.m. for the Bacchanal, which will last until ?? p.m. There are always lots of surprises and comical activities at these events.

The occasion is to provide a scholarship or scholarships to the Idyllwild camp this year, and this one will have a special Memorial Scholarship for Madelynne Greene who was for so many years one of the camp's most popular teachers.

Oh, yes, the location is the Town & Gown Hall on the U.S.C. campus, Figueroa and Exposition Blvd. in Los Angeles. See under "Folk Dance Camps" for information concerning the summer conference there, and also the two flyers attached to this issue with information on both events.

SCOTTISH WEEKEND

The Sixth California Week End Institute of Scottish Country Dancing will be held over the week end of April 24-26 on the ISOMATA grounds in Idyllwild, during which time classes for all levels will be offered by three excellent teachers certified in the teaching of Scottish Country Dance - Doris Robertson of Glasgow, Scotland; Sandy Bain of Toronto, Canada; and Mary Brandon of Los Angeles. There will also be a Ball on Saturday night at which the well-known Thistle Band will play. Those attending will arrive Friday evening and there will be classes both Saturday and Sunday. Activities will be over Sunday afternoon. Various types of accomodations will be offered (see flyer and registration forms attached to this "Scene" issue), which include two nights lodging and five meals, as well as instruction. An interesting feature is that non-dancing spouses, friends, and children may attend at a discount, but it is necessary to know well in advance (especially in the case of the children because of baby sitters) just how many will be attending. Final registration date is April 10, but there is a discount if your application is postmarked on or before April 1.

Of course, many already know how to get to Idyllwild, having attended the Idyllwild Conferences every July, but for others, if coming from Los Angeles, take the San Bernardino Freeway to Banning, then turn left at the Idyllwild sign up the mountain 'til you get there. In case of snow, head east to Riverside, then on US 395 south to the Hemet turn-off, thence to Hemet and up the hill. From San Diego, come up US 395 to Hemet, etc. Transportation may be available from the train or bus terminals at Banning or Hemet, or the airports at Ontario or Riverside upon adequate notice. For further information, call Jack Rennie at (213) 393-3890 or David Brandon at (213) 799-6626.

One item not included on the flyer, but which should have been, concerns those who have their own cabins or campers in or near Idyllwild - what would it cost if they wanted to attend the week end but did not need accomodations? The answer is, \$18 for both days or \$15 for one day only, with no meals. There would be an additional \$10 if any or all meals are desired.

UNIVERSAL STUDIOS PROGRAM

Action concerning the International Summer Festivals at Universal Studios is progressing rapidly. Committee Chairman Sheila Ruby has things very well organized, and there have been several definite decisions made since last issue's report. There are three festivals lined up plus the nine participation days (one each week - some on Saturdays, some Sundays, and one on a Friday).

The Studios will be providing Federation participants parking and free admission (this package normally costs \$2). There will be other things of great interest to the folk dancer and the folk dance movement also. However, all participants must wear a satisfactory costume - not necessarily authentic, but so that the apparel distinguishes the folk dancer from the audience and the others present.

It is felt that this exposure to folk dancing will encourage a vast number of recruits from among the spectators, as well as publicize us favorably to a degree hitherto never attained. If the enthusiasm and cooperation of the participating folk dancer matches that of the Federation's planning committee and the people at Universal itself, there can be no question of its success.

"STATEWIDE" 1970 - SAN JOSE

With little less than two months standing between the present and <u>Statewide, 1970</u>, plans are firm and we've got a winner of a week end in store for you. The details not previously published are presented here for your information.

Friday, May 29: - Dancers' Picnic at Senter Park in San Jose. Beginning with organized (?) baseball games at 9 <u>a.m.</u>, there will be a pot luck at noon. Be sure to bring utensils and dishes, some type of dish to add to the pot luck table, and an oldfashioned ice cream churn if you have one. The picnic committee will furnish coffee and ingredients for ice cream making. Our friends from the South will be our guests at this event. Dancing in the afternoon is planned, and will last until 6 p.m.

At 7:30 p.m., the Dancers' and Teacher's Institute at McCabe Hall, next to the Civic Auditorium. Three top instructors will present new material. This will be followed immediately by general dancing until 2 a.m.

Saturday, May 30: - Meet at 9:30 a.m. at the Sainte Claire Hotel; a tour of the Paul Masson Winery is planned, including a wee bit o' tasting for those so inclined. Following this, a trip to Old Town in Los Gatos, with a choice of eateries for lunch, El Gordo's or Mimi's. There will be time for shopping in Old Town before returning to San Jose for general dancing from 1:30 to 6 p.m. in McCabe Hall.

The Concert: Beginning at 8 p.m., top exhibition groups presenting new dances in new costumes, representing lands throughout the world. Following this, general dancing from 10:30 to 12:30 in the Auditorium, then on to the Sainte Claire across the street for more dancing until 4 a.m.! The Balkan party will begin immediately following the concert at McCabe Hall and continue until 2 a.m.

<u>Sunday, May 31</u>: - Installation Brunch at the Sainte Claire Hotel, 10:30 a.m. until 12:30, with installation of new officers, North and South, the high point. General dancing will begin again at 1:30, lasting until 6 p.m.

In the U.S.S.R., don't miss the magnificient ethnographic museum in Leningrad if you can arrange for it. SEEN ON THE SCENE

"AMAN"

Lots of water has flowed beneath bridges since the days of the old Village Dancers of U.C.L.A. back in the mid-50's. This was especially apparent to those who attended the recent "Aman" Institute at Plummer Park. There was something for everybody, especially for those who were glad to get back to the type of Jugoslav dances that everyone can do. Not that there weren't challenging dances a-plenty on the program, but one could perform them without fear of a coronary or hernia ... The dances were taught by teaching couples, well teamed and working together in excellent coordination. They were taught crisply, concisely, cleanly, and - on schedule! Tony Shay gave a preliminary sketch of the dance styles of the area before each set was presented, and a most interesting new concept was the manner in which they were grouped, along logical geophysical boundaries rather than geopolitical ones; i.e., Alpine, Vardar, Pannonian, Jadran, etc ... There was some crowding in the morning because the large hall was unavailable, but in mid-afternoon and evening, the Great Hall was free and there was plenty of room from then on ... Lunch was available, as was dinner for those who has signed up, so there was no need to even leave the premises all day. The evening started with films showing village dances of Jugoslavia, many of them new to much of the audience. The evening "kolo party" featured live music by the "Aman" Orchestra and most of the dances taught during the day were offered. The night concluded with everyone (still able) adjourning to wind up festivities at the Hadarim coffee house.

I join others in the hope that a syllabus will be ready for their next institute it makes things much more convenient to follow as we have long ago found out at Federation institutes, but due to unavoidable circumstances one was not available in time for this occasion. "Aman" informs us, however, that a syllabus of all dances taught, including those on the records, will be mailed out to guests shortly... A "good show, Aman", and we're awaiting your next "kolo festival"... Likewise, your concerts in May at the Wilshire Ebell.

Our Polish expert, Jan Sejda, returns again with dances of his native Poland, paper cutting, and sessions on theatrical effects and staging ... Nate Moore and Vivian Woll will present review teachings as requested by attendees; their material covers all levels of proficiency ... New to ISOMATA as an instructor is June Schaal, who comes to "the Hill" from the Northern Federation. June spent two years in Europe collecting dances, recording music, etc. She will delight participants with material new to this area, and with her sparkling wit and personality. June has some lovely material from Finland and other countries as yet not well-represented on our festival programs.

Idyllwild offers an incomparable learning experience in unmatchable surroundings, with an excellent staff, good friends, and a relaxed atmosphere in clean mountain air. One unit of college credit is available for the workshop. No credit is given for the week end. Housing in the small community and campus is limited. The campus administration will assist persons in obtaining housing on and off the campus, but we strongly advise early registration and reservation, especially for the week end which once again covers a national holiday.
