SAN DIEGO FOLK DANCE CLUB

The San Diego Folk Dance Club is 25 years old. It was formed back in 1947 and is still going strong - promoting and sponsoring folk dancing in the San Diego area.

Some of the members of an early ethnic Scandinavian group became the nucleus of the original San Diego Folk Dancers. A few of the earliest members were Norma Heck, Keith Fink, Glen Beamer, Frank and Evelyn Provasnik, and also Carl Clive, and Kenneth and Dorothy Starr who still dance.

Several of the club's dancers of the early 50's are still enjoying folk dancing. Among them are Maude Sykes, Ann and Bill Farrell, Andy and Walter Moffitt, Jack and June Savary, Gene and Enid Fowler, Hirsh Segal, Annette Parziale, Louis and Nancy Denov, and Victor Richmond, current president of the club.

The group has always met in Balboa Park, but until recently has never had a real "home". Over the years, it has met in about eleven different locations in the Park, and, sometimes in the early years, the members didn't know until they arrived which building would be theirs for that evening. You might have found them in the Recital Hall, the Federal Building, the House of Charm (where one dancer went through the floor once), Conference Building, Electric Building, Balboa Club, or the old Food and Beverage Building where they sometimes danced alongside hundreds of pianos stored there for a citywide piano recital, or among the towering pieces of scenery to be used for stage productions in the Park, or perhaps in puddles of water under a leaky roof. There is now a new beautiful building to replace the old "Food and Beverage", but the folk dancers are not in it. However, today they have a "home" in the newly refurbished and brightly decorated Recital Hall where, ironically, they started dancing back in the 40's.

In the original group, Norma Heck did some teaching, and then Keith Fink, who came from Fresno, acquired records and a player and taught Federation dances. The Club soon came under the sponsorship of the San Diego Recreation Department. The San Diego Folk Dance Club started and sponsored an advanced class taught by Art Dass and Vivian Woll. In August 1951 they sponsored a new beginner group, a large friendly class led by Evelyn Prewitt and Walter Rephun. For several years Louis and Nancy Denov, with their sparkle and enthusiasm, did a beautiful job of teaching the Monday night San Diego Folk Dance Club. When they retired from teaching (but not from dancing) in 1965, the club turned to co-op teaching, handled mainly by Maude Sykes, Arlie Yewchan and Alice Hauserman (now Stirling). The club soon recognized the need for a beginner night, and in June 1966 it became a Monday-Wednesday club, with Alice taking over the establishment of the Wednesday night Beginner Class. It is operated at present with a rotating program of beginning teaching from 7 to 8:30 p.m., and a program to complete the evening with review beginning and intermediate dances. Occasionally Alice has been assisted by Ray Garcia, and by her daughter, Jane Rainwater (a folk dancer since the age of 6 - some 15 years!). The Monday night class is an advanced one and is directed by John Hancock, now in his third year of teaching this group.

The San Diego Folk Dance Club has participated in many folk dance festivals, the earliest being in July 1949 at Balboa Park and at La Jolla Cove Park. In 1952, a bus load of club members travelled to the Holtville Carrot Festival (see the July "Scene" cover!). They have hosted several festivals over the years. As early as 1950 and 1951, they were held on the lawn in Balboa Park (6th and 7th Ave.), and the club has assisted in the sponsorship of Statewide Festivals in 1957 in Balboa Park and in 1965 and 1969 at the San Diego Community Concourse.

San Diego Folk Dance Club members have always performed in demonstrations and exhibitions, often as a public service. These performances have been for various Senior Citizens' groups, Navy Hospital programs, UN programs, Girl Scouts, Campfire Girls, convalescent homes, Armed Services programs, YMCA and USO events, Junior Chamber of Commerce Christmas programs, the House of Pacific Relations Sunday programs, etc. In 1949 they appeared at the Orange Show in San Bernardino, and in 1952 at the Coronado Viennese Ball. There have been numerous performances for folk dance festivals, school teacher groups, and city sponsored seasonal and historical events and celebrations.

A unique event in San Diego is the Sunday afternoon folk dancing in the Balboa Club, a program for all folk dancers before hundreds of walk-in spectators every Sunday in Balboa Park. This tradition, instituted in 1949 by the San Diego Folk Dance Club, has been a major Sunday attraction in the Park for 23 years. They extend a warm and friendly welcome to you - drop in and dance with them - and a sincere invitation to attend their 25th Anniversary Party at 8 p.m. on Saturday, October 21, 1972, at the Tiki Hut Room, Town and Country Hotel, Mission Valley on Highway 8. Cost, \$2.50 - (members \$2).

FROM THE EDITORS

Again, muchas gracias to Valerie and to Ann and Eileen Bartold for their help in collating the last issue of "Scene" - and also to the stalwarts who helped "rubber stamp" this batch of mailing envelopes at the Gandy Camp Review - the same Val and Ann, plus Dorothy Daw.

We have had some problems with mail again this month - apparently the highly touted new system isn't foolproof after all. A batch of foreign ones were returned for insufficient postage (which was an error on the part of the post office), and in a couple of local areas (both having been notoriously irregular in the past), some "Scenes" were way late in being delivered. We mail so that under normal circumstances you should receive your copy on or before the first of the month. Most do. If you find that yours is habitually delivered late, such as on or after the 5th - and, inasmuch as everyone else gets his on schedule - the fault obviously lies with your own office - and we have absolutely no control over that. You will have to jump them for it, and good, too! In an early issue, maybe next month, we'll include a flyer describing just how we go about producing and mailing "Scene", and it will probably clarify not only this one particular problem, but also any others that you may have encountered with the postal service.

Once more we must ask you to "up" the number of flyers you send in for inclusion. We passed the 750 mark suddenly and are now asking for 800. Club leaders and publicists - you have been very good of late about getting your material in on time and this does help a lot, especially if it comes in a few days in advance of the deadline - we can then start "making-up" early. A specific teaching schedule is definitely an enticement to potential guests and visitors, and if you want to include the first part of the following month, that's fine, too. . . And advertisers, please, CAMERA READY COPY! Call us for new size specifications and costs.

INSTITUTE

The Institute Committee of the Folk Dance Federation of California, South, will be tres actif during October. First, it presents Bora Gajicki at the Chula Vista Festival, as mentioned on our front page. He will be teaching a selection of exciting Yugoslav dance material at the Folklaenders' Oktoberfest, a biennial affair, this year on the weekend of October 7 and 8. The Institute, which is engineered by the Committee, will be held from 1 to 5 p.m. in the Municipal Gym at 385 Parkway in Chula Vista, and there will be a \$1.50 donation.

In honor of the Oktoberfest theme, Bora will teach a couple dance, "Potrkan Ples", of Slovenian influence - Slovenia, of course, sharing the Alpine characteristics of neighboring Austria. The dance is not difficult, and includes a fun pivot-turn figure and some stamping. Bora, who is Serbian, will also teach three Serbian line dances - "Divčibarsko Kolo", a little tricky but not too fast; "šasino Kolo", faster, but not so tricky; and "Čuburka" which was introduced at the Borino Festival last March and has been popular with those who learned it. It moves quickly, has only three figures, and has a very nice light kind of feeling. The final number comes from Croatia, is quite simple, and is for trios joined in a circle - it is called "Sokačko Kolo", not to be confused with "Sukačko" or "Sukačica".

CAMP KRAMER

Mary Judson and Anthony Ivancich at Camp Hess Kramer on October 20-22 is the second presentation of the Committee. This Friday-through-Sunday weekend Institute will include some fun and exciting teaching by these two fine teachers. Camp Hess Kramer is just off Highway 1, about 25 miles north of Santa Monica. Reservations are coming in nicely, many repeating last year's attendance, but there is still room at \$25 per person, all-inclusive. See flyer herein for registration form. In addition to the material taught by Mary and Anthony, new and old favorites will be danced at the Friday and Saturday night parties, which will be hosted by Carol Brand and the Institute Committee.

Mary Judson will be teaching her English Country Dance material to live music, but every dance is available on recordings (and our local dealers will have them!) so material can be taken back to groups not lucky enough to have their very own accordionists. Mary's dances have such interesting names as "Jack's Maggot", a success at Stockton this year, "Nonesuch", "Queen Victoria Country Dance", "The Rifleman", an easy fun dance, and "Picking Up Sticks" which Mary taught at Mendocino in 1971. Some simple party dances will also be taught for warmup. These dances seem to offer all the fun of Scottish dancing (please note, you RSCDS-types) without the mind-boggling complications, so if you haven't had an opportunity to sample Mary's teaching at The Museum, now is your chance to get acquainted with her and English Country Dancing.

Anthony Ivancich really picked up on the request to give us a "silent dance" and is going to present three!!! Many of us have heard of "Licko Kolo", a silent dance with a beautiful song - "Pjevaj mi, pjevaj, sokole, salaj sokole" - which the leader sings and the rest of the group choruses, so you don't really need to learn the words, but perhaps you've missed an opportunity for instruction. It was originally introduced at Stockton back around 1955. Anthony is excellent at teaching and leading this dance. In another vein, he will teach "Szeki Lassu", a no-partner Transylvanian dance, from Andor Czompo - in this one, the dancers hummmmm the music. A third one will be from the Philippines with a rhythm accompaniament, "Benguet and Ifugao". This sounds interesting and fun and really something different - also no partners needed. Last, but definitely not least, Anthony will be introducing a Spanish dance he researched himself - this one for couples - called "Quita y Pon".

All in all, some challenging material from all three fine teachers and we look forward to these Institutes with great anticipation. See you there!

(Ed. note: Good to see some of these fine oldies returning. When Dick Crum brought "Potrkan Ples" to the coast in '55, it was the only Slovenian dance we knew, but somehow sort of disappeared - why, no one knows for 'twas fun. "Picking Up Sticks" was a top-favorite of Pasadena and IDC back before they even had folk records for it, around 1947. And "Ličko", if it is reintroduced under the right circumstances - i.e., feeling, mood, etc. - should be the hit of the Institute, and will be nostalgic for ages to come. For many moons after Dick introduced it, it was the unofficial closing dance of the evening at Gandys and Westwood! (We do hope the dance from the Benguet tribe is not the one we saw (for all men) on film one time - they's be crippled for life! Wish we could be there ourselves, but that, again, is "Scene" writing weekend!)

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FRESNO REUNION

Closing out October, the Fresno Council will once more present its annual Festival and Camp Reunion. After all these years, due to economic cut-backs, the groups have lost their sponsor, so, as they say, it's "Back to the Good Old Days" - the theme of the Festival. No longer available, the auditorium will be supplanted by Holmes Playground as the arena of activities. This is located at First and Huntington in Fresno. As usual, the Saturday afternoon (October 28th) will feature the Stockton Folk Dance Camp Reunion, which starts at 1:30 p.m. (For early comers there'll be coffee and donuts, courtesy of the UOP Camp for the preceding hour.) We don't have the list of teachers, but they are usually selected from the most popular - or of the most popular dances taught - at the Stockton Camp. This is a chance for campers to get together and renew auld acquaintances (and likewise compare notes to see how much they still remember). In the evening, there'll be the Folk and Square Dance Festival from 8:00 to 11:30 p.m., and, after a break, an afterparty (two in fact, one for kolos and one for general folk) lasting from midnight until 2 a.m.

Sunday noon will start the Council meeting (North), followed by a children's half-hour at 1 p.m., then the main festival until 5:30 p.m. There will be a closing party at 8 p.m. Sunday night, hosted by the Central Valley Folk Dancers at the Danish Brotherhood Hall - Voorman and Yosemite Streets. There should be a flyer attached with all this information, but we are about 30 short for our issue so there is a chance that you may be one of the few who will find it missing. If you want to spend a most enjoyable Hallowe'en weekend, unbothered by hobgoblins and witches, by all means, hie to Fresno!

INTERNATIONAL INSTITUTE OF LOS ANGELES

The International Institute of Los Angeles, at 435 S. Boyle Ave., presents its monthly festival on Sunday, October 15. It is sponsored by the Polish National Alliance, and is one of a continuing series of monthly festivals being revived by the Institute along nationality and ethnic lines. The intention is to try to, wherever possible, program these for the third Sundays of each month. The October one is, as you will see from the flyer, a "Polish Festival", with the usual music, dancing, exhibitions, food, and singing. There is a donation of \$1 for adults and 50¢ for kids, all of which goes to help support the Institute programs of easing the newcomer to the United States into the mainstream of life in this country, and to help him maintain his native ethnic cultural heritage, yet at the same time help him become used to our way of life. The recent Queensland Convention was well represented, and the next one, No. 14, is planned for Newcastle in New South Wales next summer (winter down there). We see that among the Round dances to be taught then will be "Tamara Waltz" (which some Gandys, Peasants, and probably many Coloradans remember) which was introduced by Lloyd Shaw and his Cheyenne Mountain Dancers back in '48 - and a new one (for some), "Somewhere, My Love"! And, ere we leave "Down Under", there will be an All-Southern-Hemisphere Square and Round Dance Convention immediately following the British Commonwealth Games in Christchurch, New Zealand, over the weekend of Feb. 8-10, 1974. (This for those who really plan ahead!) Not so distant, though, either in mileage or time, is the American Square Dance Championship Festival at Fontana Dam, North Carolina, again on that big weekend - Oct. 20-22!

FOLK DANCE CAMP

We are down to the two remaining ones which we reported on in the last issue - the TEXAS INTERNATIONAL FOLK DANCE CAMP in Midlothian, Texas, over the long Thanksgiving weekend, and the CHRISTMAS CAMP held at Berea College, Berea, Kentucky, the week between Christmas and New Year's. All things considered, they do have most of the features of a regular camp such as parties, dance sessions and teaching, and those little "extra somethings" - food, impromptu songfests, etc. - that make a popular folk dance camp what it is. It also gives those unfortunates who cannot take time off (or afford) a whole week an opportunity to participate in a folk dance camp after all.

Or music of the Holland barrel-organs!)

We've given you the KTYM caturday programs before - these are some new ones. Sunday has "Little Tokyo" on KALI, 1430 kc, 8:45 to 10 a.m., followed by an Armenian hour. Also on Sundays on the Glendale station, about 800 kc, an hour of Greek music starts at noon. Irish music on KIEV from 3 to 4 p.m., also on Sundays, and you can get all the Western and country music you want on 550 kc (don't have the station's call letters). "Hawaii Calls", 2 to 2:30, about 790 on your dial, and polkas on KIEV at 5 p.m. And we are informed that KFAC has a potpourri of music and talk presented by the Jewish Federation at 11:30 a.m., and a British comedy/music program immediately following.

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ON THE BALKAN BEAT

We have Jan Maslow again this month "doing the Balkan beat", plus a few wanderings on the side. Now there are several Balkan guestings lined up, but prying their stories out is something else! Anyhow, here are Jan's impressions:

August 12 found us in Santa Barbara for the afternoon Institute with Yves Moreau. What a satisfying teacher! It is a delight to watch him - he loves the dance so much and has the ability to make the patterns very clear, spending just enough time going over the steps so you're neither rushed nor bored. He gives a little review to shed light on a difficult rhythm or illuminate a background. Someday I hope he will explain how come a French-Canadian wound up teaching Bulgarian dances to Americans! We had made other plans for the evening - not having figured on staying for the festival - but when we heard Pitu Guli was to play, plans were changed at once. (Pitu Guli, we are sure you know, is a Los Angeles-based Macedonian-Bulgarian folk orchestra.) We're glad we stayed - we didn't realize what a swinging Balkan town Santa Barbara is. Lots of young people, many outstanding dancers. I was quite surprised and not at all displeased to see the usual order of program reversed - mostly line dances interspersed with an occasional couple dance. When the orchestra arrived and began to play, they caught up the entire roomful of people and infected them - with the magic of music. It was fantastic - everyone dancing as though possessed - I think they were. When we left at 10 p.m. they were still going strong, and we wished we could have stayed longer.

Then, inasmuch as Bob and Carolyn Brent are two of my favorite people, I decided to look in on their Monday night group - having seen Carolyn at the recent UCLA Balkan Dance workshop and knowing she is interested in teaching Balkan dances. So I wound my way up into the Brentwood hills one balmy Monday evening. Carolyn waved "hello" to me, thereby blowing my cover - now I'll never know if the group treats all newcomers with such warmth. Everyone was so friendly, and the facility is just the right size. Bob and Carolyn are teaching oldies and goodies as well as new ones - somewhat beginner oriented. I really envied those beginners - I had forgotten how much fun folk dancing was when I first discovered it - and how satisfying and exciting as one mastered each new dance!

Anyhow, folk dancing is scarce there, so she is going to do some pioneering. A nearby Hungarian area has a costumed festival in November, and, of course, there are the Cajuns. (By the way, she's about to learn some of their dances herself.) She had intended to be at San Diego but was unable to make it. However, she does hope to get to the Aman Institute in January.

SEEN ON THE SCENE

AMERICAN SAMOA ARTS COUNCIL FESTIVAL - 1972

American Samoa, about as far as one can get from California and yet still remain on United States governed soil, is about to become indoctrinated with the fever of International folk dancing - and it is quite possible that no innoculation to cure it will be found. At least, so it might seem from what we have heard.

Our information comes to us from several sources and individuals, including a fascinating six page mimeographed bulletin from Pago Pago, which seems to be the official daily newspaper. The mere rustic
appearance of this periodical conjures up visions of an idyllic place where tempus <u>never</u> fugits. Our
main source, however, is Mrs. Jean Haydon, wife of the Governor of Samoa, and head of the Cultural Arts
Council.

Flag Day down there is a big event - the holiday of holidays (although any good excuse for a holiday will readily be accepted). And this year, the celebration was planned long in advance, to run for three days, with a few days of "preliminary" warm-ups. Among the new activities in the cultural line was the idea of introducing International folk dancing to the inhabitants. As Mrs. Haydon says, the Samoans live for music and dance (and you who have seen our Los Angeles group in performance, thoroughly enjoying every amplified note of music and vibrating in dance to its rhythm, know exactly what she means!).

For several days prior to the festival opening, two members of the Honolulu Folk Dancers were "imported" to instruct the "locals", principally the school children, in the dances of Greece, Yugoslavia, Mexico, the Ukraine, Scandinavia and the United States itself. They also taught the kids the Minuet - and according to all concerned, you never saw a Minuet such as that one when the kids finally appeared on stage the night of the performance. Apparently the Samoan children had their own interpretation of how a French dance should be done - and that's the way it came out! True, at the first rehearsal the kids stoically marched in rigid posturing of the days of old King Louis, but the twitching and hip rolling increased as each successive run through went on. But it was fun, and they were left to their own interpretations. To quote Mrs. Haydon, "The Samoans find any kind of rhythm irresistible and so they gave a distinctly Polynesian flavor even to the Middle Eastern and European dances." Oh, yes, the teachers learned Samoan dances, too, and, should George Segedin (one of them) ever return here to visit the Santa Monica Folk Dance Club, we'll have him show us some of the finer points of wiggling and pinch-

The first event was a performance of all the performing arts at Lee Auditorium in Pago Pago on the Thursday night. Geveral schools were in the competition, and there was an exhibition by the visiting teachers. People rise early in the islands, and Friday's activities started at 8 a.m. with speeches, invocations, flag raising, etc. by all the numerous officials (whose names we can't begin to pronounce), by Governor Haydon, and by the Prime Minister of nearby independent Western Samoa. The Farrington High chool Choir and Dancers from Honolulu did their bit, and during the rest of that day and the next, the cultural arts native to the islands were demonstrated - weaving, carving, and so forth. Dancing again on caturday night as late as conscience and stamina permitted - but it was rest on Gunday, for that is what Gunday is meant to be for there.

Following the conclusion of the festival, the Council sent a group of 40 dancers and singers to the big South Pacific Festival in Fiji, where they were very well received - and the competition there was tremendous. Naturally, the dances they did in Suva were strictly Polynesian - like us here, the International ones were for their own enjoyment.

When you go to Pago Pago, you may find that their new museum of ethnography has been completed. Many new artifacts were added during the festival. And, if all the people in the territory are as charming as Mrs. Haydon's letters indicate her to be, you will surely have a wonderful visit.

SPECIAL EVENTS

KOREA'S FAMED "AH AHK" opens the series of ethnic dance at UCLA's Royce Hall on October 13. This we reported last month, but remind you again. Billed as "classic", it actually has a great deal of folk background. In fact, most of the dances of the Far East seem to be that way - the "folk" look classic, whilst the classics have a definite "folk" flavor. FOLLOWING THIS, in November at the same place, the National Dance Ensemble of Mali will appear on Caturday, Nov. 25. The old saying about going to Timbucktu will be reversed in this instance - Timbucktu is coming to you instead. (Also dances from the other towns and regions of Mali. Once upon a time, the land was known as French Soudan.)

THE 21st ANNUAL KOLO FESTIVAL will take place over the Thanksgiving weekend in San Francisco, at the University of San Francisco. It may be at a different location than last year's gym, but it definitely will be at the University. It will follow the same format as usual, but there may be a Sunday afternoon addition this year. Naturally, top teachers from all over will be on hand. Watch "Scene" next month as it will be a feature item, but, in the meantime, if you're in a hurry for more information, contact John Filcich at 2769 W. Pico in L. A., (213) 737-3500.

THEN THERE IS AN UNHERALDED SPECIAL run in on us. It will be the first appearance in Southern California of "Dukla", October 27-29 at the Music Center, with three evening and two matinee performances. In case you've already heard about "Dukla" - yes, you heard both right and wrong! During the past 7 or 8 months, we have heard that it was a Hungarian, a Russian, and a Ukrainian ensemble, and in each source-England, Canada, New York - there was a difference of opinion when said places heard they were coming. As a matter of fact, the group is from Czechoslovakia! But it takes its name from the Dukla Province, which borders on the old Carpatho-Ukraine, or Zakarpatsky, area. (Remember the Gandy's "Rakvachanuke" of a few years back?) They call themselves a "Ukrainian Dance Company", and dances pictured show costumes of Hungarian, Ukrainian, Glovak and Bukovinan influence. If you can't make it to Fresnc, you can fill in your empty weekend at the Music Center.

THE FIRST HALLOWE'EN PARTY we had information about is the one to be put on by the More the Merriers on their usual 3rd Saturday night, October 21st. At Rogers Park Auditorium in Inglewood, 400 W. Beach. Costumes, of course, so throw away that beer can, Broom-hilda, (or recycle it if it's aluminum) and hie yourself to a great party.

INTERNATIONAL INSTITUTE'S monthly festivals for the balance of the year, besides this month's Polish, will consist of a Yugoslav one on November 5 and a Mexican one on Dec. 17. These are planned for the 3rd Gunday of each month (except the aforementioned Yugoslav event) - which may help your scheduling. And, guess what, Westwood! This year the Gwedish one does not - we repeat, does not - fall on the same day as yours does!

A DANCE TO SAVE MENDOCINO WOODLANDS is scheduled for October 20-22. (Man, is that ever a busy weekend!) There will be a big "teach-in" at the Mendocino Folklore Camp to help save the trees and the three camps in the woodlands. All the teachers are donating their time and talent, and the use of the campsite is made free to the group so that all the money received (except for food and insurance costs) can be donated to the "Save Mendocino Woodlands Fund".
