

#### CLUB OF THE MONTH CLUB LAGUNA FOLKDANCERS

The Laguna Folkdancers held their Tenth Anniversary Party on Wednesday, October 4, at the Laguna High School Girls' Gym. Special guests at the party were Nate and Lila Moore, who for many years were the group's leaders.

The Laguna folk dance group was begun by Mark and Helen Pines and Keith and Ruth Robertson, still Laguna residents and folk dancers. They had been active in the Mountain Dancers, a Pasadena-area based club, and missed their dancing after they moved to the beach. Among those on hand the very first evening, Elma Warcholak has remained active to this day. Subsequently, after interim moves, the dancers found a home in the girls' gym at the high school, where they now hold meetings every Wednesday.

Shortly after the founding of the group, the leaders contacted Nate Moore, then as now a capable and popular dance teacher, and asked him to take over its direction. Nate and Lila participated actively in Laguna affairs, commuting from their home in La Canada to do so, with Nate coaching the group through several Winter Revue appearances. Some of the dances that were performed by the club were the Irish "Sweets of May" on the lawn at the Summer Festival, the Russian "Polyanka", and the Bavarian "Schuhplattler". These, plus many other old favorites, were on the program for the Tenth Anniversary Party.

Beginning in the fall of 1969, the Laguna Folkdancers shifted to a "co-op" type of teaching, with members of the group presenting new and review dance material and with occasional special guest teachers. During that period, a Beginners Program was instituted during the early part of the Wednesday evenings. In the fall of 1971, the pressure for a more concentrated session for the many newcomers resulted in the addition of special Sunday night workshops for beginners, taught by Carol Brand and other members of the club.

The Laguna Folkdance Festival also got its start in 1971 as the dancers joined the many local organizations in sponsoring special events during the Winter Festival. The club invited the other Southern California folk dance clubs to join the festivities, which have become an annual event each February, with about 300 participants arriving for a weekend of teaching, dancing and partying.

Looking ahead, the Laguna Folkdancers - currently presided over by Sol Wiener - will sponsor an appearance of Bora Ozkok, the exciting young teacher of Turkish dance, and members of the club will teach many new dances learned this summer at the folkdance conferences held in Southern California. Then, over the Valentine's Day weekend, there will, of course, be the big annual Institute and Festival.

The club is always open to all who care to participate, or to just watch. Meetings begin at 7:30, both on Wednesdays and at the beginner sessions on Sundays. For more information, call Carol Brand at (714) 494-3581. The school is located at Park Ave. and St. Ann's, quite close to the central part of Laguna Beach.

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#### KPFK FESTIVAL

For some time now we have been reporting on the folkloric programs on FM radio station KPFK, and the station in turn has been giving excellent coverage to Folk Dance Federation activities, through its regular cultural calendar, but especially over Mario Casetta's thrice-a-week 10 a.m. Ethnic Music Hour. This is a non-commercial, listener-sponsored operation, and is dependent upon its audience for sub-scriptions and donations, and, as in the case about to be commented upon, benefits. While we may not be fully in accord with some of the station's programming, the same might be said of most of the other stations, too. The chief difference is that we get much support, publicity-wise, from KPFK - and, too, most of the folklore on the air comes over its 90.7 mc wavelength.

Anyhow, thousands of Southern Californians are expected to attend the Second Annual Folk Dance Festival and Ethnic Bazaar which Mario is co-ordinating, to be on Sunday, November 5, from noon until 8 in the evening. This colorful event will be held on a beautiful three and a half acre estate in Van Nuys, at 5757 Ranchito Avenue, near Burbank Blvd. and Woodman Ave. The donation charges are \$2 for adults, \$1 for kids, and if you have a big family, you can really save - there's a family rate for \$5.

Among the many outstanding exhibition groups which will be appearing for the benefit will be the Westwind International Folk Ensemble; Rimaja, the Belly Dance troupe; the Liberty Assembly, representing America in song and dance; Borino Kolo Ensemble, specializing in Yugoslav dances; the Balkan Mountain Men with tamburitza taverna music; Flash Moscow and the Kossack Kido, showing Ukrainian and Russian ethnic dances; Almas, with folk and classical Arabic dances; Pitu Guli, a rural Macedonian-Bulgarian-Thracian dance orchestra; and the well known Hadarim Israeli Dance Theatre.

Between performances (which, judging from the list, will be practically continuous), Mario will teach easy folk dances for all. Additionally, there will be available a wide variety of home-made ethnic food and snacks, and booths for the purchase of items such as records, etc. from Festival Records, and ethnic costumes, opanki, books and so on from The Folk Motif. The entire profits from all types of sales are slated for the benefit of KPFK.

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#### KOLO FESTIVAL IN SAN FRANCISCO

This year is the "coming of age". Yes, the country's most famous Kolo Festival will be presented for the 21st consecutive time in San Francisco and, as traditionally, over the Thanksgiving weekend. We remember the modest start, way back in 1952, when John Filcich had the idea of holding a two day event as a benefit for Vyts Beliajus who was at the time very seriously ill in Denver. Since that time, the event has, like Topsy, just growed and growed - the duration has extended so that with the Kolo Festival and affiliated pre- and post- festival activities, you can start on Wednesday night and keep going through Sunday! And it likewise keeps outgrowing its physical facilities. This year (as last) it will be at San Francisco State University, but this time in Phelan Hall which has plenty of room for all. And listen to this - no restrictions on footwear! (Oh, well, I imagine they'd take a dim view of hobnail boots or baseball cleats, but otherwise you're okay!) USF is situated on Stanyan St., but we don't have the exact location of the hall itself, other than it's right in the middle of campus.

As for the schedule and teachers: undoubtedly there'll be a "pre-party" on Wednesday, hosted by someone in the Bay area - probably a coffee house. This used to be Madelynne Greene's traditional party night. Thanksgiving Day you have to yourselves, to visit and eat your holiday dinner wherever you please. In San Francisco, dining out is an experience, so you should make the most of it. Then the Kolo Festival starts at 7:30 Thursday night, November 23, with an opening party and live music - Pitu Guli of Los Angeles will be one of the orchestras for the festival. Friday and Saturday will have afternoon and evening activities and parties (including kolo institutes, of course). There will be a Saturday morning institute also, we understand. The big concluding event will be the Concert presented by the Koleda Ensemble of Seattle, Dennis Boxell directing. Teachers include some great names, too. First we have Pece Atanasovski, currently in this country from Macedonia, and one of the foremost dance leaders of Yugoslavia. He appeared here first as a member of "Tanec" in 1956, and a few years ago, when "Lado" was at the Greek Theatre, he was with that ensemble. Pece's folk dance camp in Macedonia is one of the most popular in Europe. Another well known teacher is Romania's (now our) Mihai David, who will teach some of his newest Romanian material. Koleda's director, Dennis Boxell, will be teaching Croatian and other Balkan dances. Dennis first appeared on the scene here in Los Angeles as a visitor. He had been dancing in the Monterey area where he was studying Czechoslovakian languages at the Army Language School, but was even then an ardent Balkan addict. Later he was the featured teacher at the L. A. Kolo Festival in the early 1960's. . . THE MILWAUKEE HOLIDAY FOLK FAIR will be held in the Arena-Auditorium November 17-19. This year the nationality being honored will be the Germans, which seems most appropriate for Pabstville. Jointly sponsored by the city's International Institute, their well known brewery, and some 40-plus ethnic groups.

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#### "STATEWIDE"

Here we go again!!! Would you believe it's that time of the year already? Camps and conferences are over, the Treasurer's Ball is just around the corner, and your Statewide '73 Committee has been at work for more than two months making all sorts of exciting plans for next year's Statewide Festival.

Those of you who were at the Installation Dinner in Sacramento will remember Statewide Chairman Vivian Woll asking everyone to light a single match: "There," she said, "are the lights of San Diego, welcoming you to Statewide '73." With this lovely memory in mind, the Statewide Committee chose "Lights of San Diego" as its theme. (With Federation President Al Dobrinsky present at that meeting, "Lights" was promptly punned into "De-lights of San Diego", and someone else went even farther to "De-lights on der feet in San Diego"!!)

Statewide dates are Friday, May 25 to Monday, May 28. Headquarters again will be the U. S. Grant Hotel which has been completely renovated through the ninth floor, with lovely king-size or queen-size beds in every room. Pre-registration forms are available (and here begins my monthly cry - "PRE-REGISTER NOW!"). Not only do you save money by pre-registering, but by registering early, it gives your committee both working capital and a rough idea of how many people to expect. Note this: the registration fee has been split into general registration and registration plus afterparties. If you do not sign up for the R & A, the afterparties will cost a dollar per night. Note this too: the Registration Committee says that if you wish, your badge may have the city or name of the group you dance with rather than the city you live in - as well as your own name, of course. (After all - what good does it do to say that I live in Buena Park or Kalamazoo - what folk dance groups exist there - well, in Buena Park, anyhow?) Don't give them more information than your badge can hold, though - it is a badge, not a biography. And, yes - badges will be required at <u>all</u> events.

What else is new and different about Statewide '73? The Installation Dinner will be held Saturday night so that new officers can be introduced to the Federation. The Concert, which co-chairpersons John Hancock and Elizabeth Ullrich swear to keep down to an hour-and-a-half, will be held Sunday night. Theatre doors open at 7:30 for correctly badged folk dancers; the general public will not be admitted until 7:45. Show up on time and claim a seat.

More details next month - and the month after that and so on. After all, "Lights of San Diego", Statewide '73, is only seven months away!

What's up down in San Diego? Well, lots of things are up and we'll try to jot down what's up over the next few issues of "Scene" down there under this column.

One of the newest attractions - in fact so new that it isn't really completed yet - is also a sort of adjunct to one of the oldest attractions of San Diego. The San Diego Zoo has been famous for a long, long time as one of the finest zoological gardens in the country. (Wonder if my old friend "Kangy" of '57 is still there? I imagine the little koala and the kiwis have long departed for zoo heaven!) We will talk more about the big zoo later. Right now, it's about the new Wild Animal Park. Come Statewide time, it will be a year old, and will doubtless have become more developed then. This is another in the line of "Lion Country" type preserves springing up around the nation - but it has the advantage of having observed the experiences of previous operations and has taken corrective measures where needed. One thing most important is that it is traffic free - no automobiles are permitted within its confines. You leave your car at the gates and can then travel by foot to view about a third of the animals in seminatural settings, just as in Balboa Park. As for the larger animals, you board an electric tram which will take you on a five mile tour roundabout the area so far developed - this constitutes almost a square mile of the projected three square mile area. Inasmuch as the vehicles are quiet and smogless, the animals are not bothered and thus behave in a normal manner.

The park is located some 30 miles from San Diego's civic center (but owned by San Diego), in the San Pasqual Valley near Escondido, in that rolling hill country, mixed with flatlands, that, with the live oaks and other flora in the area, is somewhat reminiscent of East Africa. In fact, when you reach the area (via Route 78) you enter Nairobi Village - and, indeed, it could be a replica of an East African village - perhaps a larger one. The designers and architects of the place went into much research, including trips to Kenya and other East African lands, and then translated what they learned into a reproduction of something similar. You will find gift shops, restaurants, etc., all housed in buildings compatible with the surroundings. No, the rest rooms are not "African style", at least not in the way you may be wondering about! However, the animals are not limited to African varieties - and you'll find the fauna from other continents roaming in areas that are visually in harmony with the type of surroundings they would be in in their native state. If you have a day free before or after Statewide - and especially if you have young ones in your family - a trip to the San Diego Wild Animal Park is a "must" for you.

But it was when the ancient Mrs. Solole from Room 3 next door came over and joined in... that was it! I quickly shot out to the record file in my car. I snatched my favorite 'dermish' record and when I returned there were even more who had joined in --- it was an 'Epidermish'! In fact, next week I am returning to Sleepy View with a whole new theoretical framework to experiment on... I call it my 'hop-step-step' theory."

Closed Mondays, but open Tuesday to Saturday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Sunday afternoons 2 to 5. The display is scheduled to be taken down right after the first of the year and sort of "mothballed". From then on, some special arrangements will have to be made to see the costumes.

#### COSTUME CORNER

From Elsie Dunin (and thank you, Elsie), we have some information concerning the costume on our cover this month - and also much about the characteristics of the dance being performed as well. Maybe this should be under the heading of "Our Cover This Month", but as we've used up that heading, and don't have one yet for "Dance Descriptions", here we are in the costume corner.

\*\*\*\*

The name of the dance depicted is "Sestorka", which means "six" or "sixgome". There are many "number" dance names - e.g. "Trojanac", (threes); "U Sest", (in six); "Osmica", (eight). Usually the number refers to the numbering of steps in the dance. I'm not sure if that is the origin of the name of "Sestorka", however, for Kolo Ensemble staged the dance with six performers. . "Sestorka" was included as the East Serbian portion of the Serbian Medley in the Kolo Ensemble repertoire, choreographed by Olga Skovran. The suite became the model for the Serbian Suites performed by other groups throughout Yugoslavia. I do not know Skovran's source material.

As for background material, the dance comes from Eastern Serbia, in the area around the city of Nis and extending toward the Bulgarian border. Nis is now a large city located on a major highway, about halfway between Beograd and Skopje. I was told by Kolo Ensemble dancers in 1957 that the dance imitated movements of the shepherds. I haven't come across any written sources that substantiate this information. There are, though, other sestorka dances in this area, described by the Janković sisters during the 1930's.

The dance characteristics: the Kolo Ensemble version was fast and exciting to watch, with many changes of direction and floor patterns; one line of six men evolved into two lines of three men, and the music fit the dance patterns. The pre-choreographed version of the Ensemble's "Sestorka" has a l4-count dance phrase which is performed to a l6-count melodic phrase so that the dance does not coincide with the music. This is a typical East Serbian dance characteristic. Other common features are belt holds, segregated dances between men and women, and fast footwork with a rocking side-to-side torso movement. . . As you are probably all aware, this is a very popular coffee-house dance here in Los Angeles. It is also always one of the most popular dances among my students in the UCLA Yugoslav dance classes.

Now to the costume. I am not able to pinpoint the exact village, but do know that costumes like these are found in Crna Trava, Bela Palanka, and generally in the north-to-south area of Serbia adjacent to the Bulgarian frontier. Basically, the outfit is of natural white wool. The opanke in the photo are of a Macedonian type, not East Serbian - an ensemble's prerogative for costume changes!

#### SPECIAL ITEM

\* \* \* \* \* \*

Since the Folk Dance Federation of California, South, Inc. became responsible for the publication of "Folk Dance Scene" some seven-plus years ago, there have been many changes made. From a newsletter averaging six pages and perhaps three or four flyers, "Scene" has developed into a newsmagazine almost triple that in size and coverage, both in the publication section and in flyers; a mailing envelope has been used instead of the old "foldover"; subscribers are notified by first class mail of expiring subscriptions; and news covers a much larger area. Our monthly printing has increased from 225 to 800 copies, which is a healthy increase indeed. Still, during the entire period, the subscription rates have never increased.

However, during that same period, other costs have gone up. The cost of stationery and supplies, for example, has increased about 20%. The cost of printing almost everywhere has risen considerably and, although our current printer has managed to hold the line so far, eventually his help will want their raises, too. A big item is in the postage costs. These have increased at least 50% - a 6% letter now costs 8% and soon will cost 9% - and the 3rd class rate has become much more. All of this has contributed to an operational deficit for some time now, and nothing can continue to operate efficiently with a continual insufficiency of income.

This is all a roundabout way of saying that an increase in subscription rates will have to be made. We should have all our facts and figures analysed and recommendations considered and acted upon by the time the next issue is due to be published. We will hold any increase to the minimum possible, as we don't want to lose any of you good people. Any such increase will probably take effect at the first of the year. Please watch for notice in the December "Scene".

The catalog promised a workshop for novice and expert alike, but most of the ladies (and one man) who attended seemed more "novice" than "expert" and the class was of necessity geared to them. I had expected a concentration on styling, but the class has difficulty just mastering the steps, so Tony Shay and the young Aman dancers present could do no more than indicate styling. Even so, I picked up enough pointers to make it worth my while; plus having an opportunity to see two films on the dance - one Bulgarian and one Yugoslav. These I relished hugely. What impressed me most about the whole experience was the fact that Aman is surely having a tremendous influence on local dancing by reason of its developing so many young, competent teachers. Bill Burke, for example, has an amazing ability to reduce complicated patterns to simple ones... There are plans for a repeat of the workshop in the future, but I do think that for a workshop situation to be really fruitful, the participants should be more or less of the same level.

He grew up in a small village near Prilep, in Southern Macedonia, where the dance tradition is still strong. One of the original members of Tanec, he toured the U.S. with them in 1956. He was again in the U.S. in 1966 as a featured performer with the Lado Ensemble. Now the director of the Radio-Telvizija Skopje folk orchestra, he is the leading advocate in Macedonia for the traditional, original Macedonian dances and music. Much of his time is now spent travelling throughout Macedonia collecting original folk material and acting as dance and music consultant to village amateur groups.

Pece is one of the world's most enjoyable dance teachers. As those who have attended his folklore institutes in Otesevo can testify, the combination of his well-researched dances, his music recorded by his own orchestra, and his dynamic and personable presentation of accurate dance stylings from each region of Macedonia, make for an exciting learning experience.

DENNIS BOXELL - has lived and studied in the Balkans and has devoted the last ten years to intensive study of Balkan dance and folklore. In 1965 he recorded over 150 dance tunes, many of which have become standards in the American folkdance repertoire. For many years he has presented dances at colleges, universities, folkdance camps, and clubs throughout the United States and Canada. In 1971 he instructed two courses at the University of Washington - South Slavic Folklore, and Balkan Dance Techniques. At present he is the artistic director of The Koleda Ensemble, a touring ethnic dance company based in Seattle, Washington. Dennis will be teaching Slavonian and Vlach dances he collected on his most recent trip to the Balkans.

MIHAI DAVID - now from Los Angeles and formerly with the Romanian dance company "Ciocarlia", is back with several new Romanian dances.
