THE VIRGILEERS FOLK DANCE GROUP

If you hear the clicking of castanets when you approach the boys' gym at Virgil Jr. High School, don't be concerned and think you are in Spain - it is only the members of the Virgileers Folk Dance Group. When several members asked for instructions, Josephine Civello, director of the club, started a class before the regular dancing program began - and now you should see and hear them dancing the "Jota Tapatia".

That is only one reason for our fun club.

The Virgileers originated from a suggestion by members of the Bachelors 'N' Bachelorettes to Josephine in 1960, that she start a folk dance class. A small group, under the banner of the B 'N' B's began meeting at Thomas Starr King, moved to Bancroft and then, when the class became too large, moved to Virgil Jr. High. About 1963, the folk dance section separated from the Bachelors 'N' Bachelorettes and the Virgileers Folk Dance Group was formed, became a member of the Folk Dance Federation, and the next year, a co-op under the direction of Josephine Civello. This made three Federation clubs for Jo, as she was also the director of the folk dance clubs in Huntington Park and El Sereno. (She has also served as Director of Extension and worked on several committees for the Folk Dance Federation, South.)

The Virgileers have been honored from time to time by many prominent folk dance teachers -Millie Libaw, Ralph Miller, Ruth Oser, Roy Johnson, Sheila Ruby, Leo Stowers, Kay Dobrinsky, Ed Feldman, Lydia Seitz and Gus Krupka - and many others who have given of their time and energy to bring new dances to the club membership. It has always been a special evening for the Virgileers when we have had a guest teacher.

In 1965, the Civello Tarantella Dancers came into being. Although Jo was the only Italian in the group, still, with their colorful costumes, tambourines and enthusiasm, the group is always in demand for Italian dances. They have danced for many clubs, hospitals, senior citizens' groups, the Fisherman's Fiestas in San Pedro, and Columbus Day programs, and a highlight was when the group was invited to dance at the big Italian Festival in the Hollywood Bowl.

Have you ever seen any of Jo's beautifully decorated cakes at the club's parties? Not only are they beautiful, they are scrumptuous - and you should have seen the Christmas buffet -- roast beef, rice pilaff and other mouth-watering delicacies - wow! - no wonder we have all gained weight.

Don't be alarmed and think you have wandered into a Federation Council meeting if you happen to see Federation President Al Dobrinsky, Vice President Roy Johnson, Corresponding Secretary Elsa Miller, Historian Mildred Walter, Librarian Monica Johnson or Beginners' Class Chairman Ralph Miller all there together - they are just members of the Virgileers enjoying themselves. (By the way, Ralph and Roy are getting pretty darn good on the castanets.)

Our next party will be on Tuesday, February 13, with special refreshments, and special entertainment by Dorothy Giraci. Don't tell anyone, but we will also be honoring our own Valentine Birthday gal, Josephine Civello. We would love to have you come and visit us then or on any Tuesday evening at 8 p.m. Remember, the boys' gym at Virgil Jr. High, 1st and Vermont in Los Angeles. See you there.

THE JUNIOR DANCERS INTERNATIONAL

The setting is the high ceilinged gym of an Oakland school. Walls that a few minutes before echoed the sounds of music and children's voices, but where always existed a feeling of concentration and dedication, now fall quiet. A large circle of children --- all ages --- all colors and nationalities --- hands joined and faces shining --- speak these words - We go now, each to his own separate place -- taking with us friendship, knowledge of dance, and social grace." And so ends another hard working two-hour session of the Junior Dancers International. Saturday after Saturday these children come, not because they have to, but because they want to; because they love to dance, and because the friendships from this alliance are good and meaningful.

Junior Dancers International have been in existance for three years. Although there are occasionally a few who for some reason or other must drop out, and, on the other end, those who keep joining, the main body has been with the group from the start. The youngest in age at the beginning was six and the oldest sixteen. This broad band of ages somehow never had any bearing on the inner-cooperation of this group. At their head is a both well loved and highly respected teacher of folk dancing, Mrs. Millie von Konsky. She is employed by the Oakland Park and Recreation Department, which felt that her idea of bringing together these children in the spirit of the dance was an excellent one - as it proved to be. She has molded and trained them to a polished perfection rarely seen in groups of this size and latitude. The children are members

of the Folk Dance Federation of California, and of the Greater East Bay Folk Dance Council.

They are proficient in many dances - Russian, Philippine, Austrian, Bavarian, Korean, Guamanian, Scottish, Hawaiian, and in American Square Dancing. They have performed all over Northern California - they have danced by invitation at the Camellia Festival in Sacramento, one of only two youth groups to perform in this almost entirely adult pageant. They have performed all over the Bay Area in such varied programs as Citizenship Day at Lake Merritt Park in Oakland and at the BART opening day celebration where they danced a program of an hour and a quarter. Their skill and love of dancing is evident in their performances. The moral structure, devotion and dedication of the group is a joy to behold.

In 1972, the Junior Dancers International presented their complete repertoire in an "International Mini-Concert".

These youngsters have not only acquired a great knowledge of the dance, but they have learned how to function well in a completely democratic, 'let's talk about it' group. The children share in decisions and learn to carry a responsibility to an end. Some come from great distances and sometimes completely on their own. As in every group, there is a time for plaudits and a time for criticism; the Junior Dancers have learned to cope with both these extremes very well, thanks to the more than able guidance of Mrs. von Konsky.

Behind it is a loosely knit group of mothers who handle almost all the physical details involved in the performances of the group. Costumes have been provided both by the Oakland Park and Recreation Department and the mothers of the children. Careful thought and exact specifications have gone into each costume, resulting in each being completely authentic according to the country and/or dance being performed. Mrs. von Konsky was recently presented with a testimonial "From the Mothers of the Junior Dancers International", excerpts of which follow:

"We mothers, whose children belong to the Junior Dancers International dance group, directed by Mrs. von Konsky, are pleased to offer you our heartfelt and grateful comments, each in her own way expressing 'What it means to me to have my child in this program'. ... LAGUNA BEACH FESTIVAL VALENTINE PARTY

The Israeli dance "Dror Yikra" - A Call for Freedom - keynotes this year's festival in Laguna Beach, February 9 through 11. Freed from weekly duties, folk dancers can explore Israeli dancing with Shlomo Bachar during the Institute on February 10 at 1:30 in the Laguna Beach High School girls' gym. Donation will be \$2.00.

Energetic, dynamic Shlomo Bachar will be remembered by his folk dance friends from the Mendocino Camp, Idyllwild, and Santa Cruz where he recently instructed. His recording, "Back From Israel", features four of the dances to be taught in Laguna - "Hora Cheffer", "Sham Hareh Golan", "Tzadik Katamir" and "Hora or Bien Nehar Prat". In addition, he will also teach "Hashachar", "Hora Medura" and "Shibolet Bassadeh". A fifth generation Sabra, he was born in the old city of Jerusalem, and as a young adult was on the Habima Theatre faculty. He specialized in choreography, style and movement, while creating dance works for musicals. During this period, Shlomo also pursued a pantomime career with Israeli pantomimist Shai K. Ophir. While pantomiming, he toured the U.S.A. and found his way into the American theatre world - you've seen him in numerous American movies and have seen some of his works at the Pasadena Playhouse. He currently teaches in several Southern California universities and workshops.

Hearts will be light during the Elizabeth Sanders Valentine Party on Saturday night. It begins at 7:30 and runs until 11 p.m. It is <u>also</u> in the girls' gym of the High School. A dollar donation will be accepted, and these proceeds will go into the Elizabeth Sanders Scholarship Fund. (This is the traditional February event which raises finances to enable several deserving scholars of folk dance to attend the California State University, San Diego Folk Dance Conference each year. At least, that is the name <u>this</u> year. Previously known as the "San Diego State Conference", it was originally the famous Santa Barbara Camp. Elizabeth Sanders, a most active folk dance enthusiast and a wonderful personality as well, was one of the leading lights in getting this camp started. As almost everyone now knows, it is one of the best known folk dance camps in the country. After her death quite a number of years ago, it was decided by the (then) Santa Barbara Committee to hold an annual Valentine Memorial Festival or Party, raise funds, and send students on tuition scholarships to the summer folk dance camp at Santa Barbara each year with the proceeds. Elizabeth had always worked with young people and newcomers to folk dancing, and the committee indeed felt that this type of a program was something with which she would have been most happy.) Your participation in this year's event will be a most welcome one. Among the exhibitions to be presented will be the Cygany Dancers of San Diego, directed by John Hancock; the Yugoslav Demonstration Group of UCLA, directed by Elsie Dunin; and Los Rancheros, directed by Maria Reisch and Jose Faget. Johnny Savage will be calling squares.

Following the Valentine Party, an after-party is scheduled in Laguna's Legion Hall, at 11:30 Saturday evening. The admission and supper tab here is \$1.50. Dancing is expected to continue until 2:30 a.m., or perhaps until "Hashachar" - the Dawn.

Sunday, February 11, a council meeting for the Folk Dance Federation is scheduled for 11 a.m. (Some of you Associate Members who don't often get a chance to attend a meeting but who will be down in Laguna for the weekend, will have the opportunity to be at this one and see how your Federation is run. You know, it doesn't just "happen"! - Ed.)

The main Laguna Folkdancers Festival will begin at 1:30 Sunday, continuing until 5:30. This event will also be in the gym, and admission is free. You who attended last year's event will remember it as being a most happy occasion. . The Laguna Dancers will get the weekend into motion on Friday night, February 9, at a warm-up party, beginning at 8 p.m. in the Legion Hall. This is on Legion Ave. in Laguna Beach.

There is a flyer in this issue of "Scene" giving all the details - times, locations, and also some concerning accomodations, both at Vacation Village, Festival headquarters, and on how to contact other places in town. Inasmuch as this is a

The flyer also has a map which should help you to locate your destinations in Laguna's interesting maze of streets, hills, and beaches. 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"STATEWIDE" LIG HTS OF SAN DIEGO

Happy birthday, Abraham Lincoln, George Washington, and to you, too, St. Valentine. How would you like a Statewide '73 pre-registration packet as a birthday present? What? - you can't attend because you're no longer with us? Tell you what - if you buy a pre-reg package, I'll even dance with your ghost!

Seriously, though, all you folk dancers whose ectoplasm is still in firm, solid shape - you wouldn't believe how many people have already pre-registered - and from the North, too! Why not join the group? If you can't give St. Valentine a present, give one to your own love (and/or your partner). If you're as leery of the mail service as you have some right to be, Elsa Miller will happily accept all applications at the Laguna Festival and Valentine Party.

Bits and pieces of information - teachers for the Institute on Saturday afternoon will be Tony Shay of Aman, and another yet to be selected. More details on that next month, when we feature the Institute Committee and how it works. The concert plans are being set, with more than 20 groups having been invited - John Hancock and Elizabeth Ullrich are going to keep the compart days to any set.



to keep the concert down to an hour and a half (!). Because of many gripes that performers have had to miss favorite activities in favor of a rehearsal, John said that there would be practice time available Saturday morning (no other event scheduled then) for those who want it, and a general run through on Sunday morning (again no other event scheduled) for everyone. Remember, the concert is on Sunday evening - no admission charge, but registration is necessary in order to get into the section of the concert hall reserved for folk dancers. It is also necessary to show up to claim your seat before 7:45 - the doors will then be opened to the general public.

At the last Statewide meeting, the question of whether ladies will be permitted to wear pants on the dance floor was discussed. While the committee was overwhelmingly against ladies dancing in pants, slacks, jeans, etc., the general consensus was that other than <u>requesting</u> <u>most strongly</u> that ladies wear skirts (signs at the door), there is no way of enforcing a general edict. We are not, after all, a reform school. Vivian Woll, however, has made a magnificent offer! Any girl who wants a skirt made for her - just give Vivian the material, tell her the length you want it, and she'll make your skirt for you at no charge whatsoever. Isn't that a grand gesture? See her at the next festival or find her address in the directory. No excuse for no skirts with that kind of generosity. (Also see "Classified".)

Not trying to blow my own horn, but I do want to focus this issue on how the Statewide program is put together - that happens to be my job this year. If you've ever done the program for your group, you'll have some idea of how much of a job it is. There are four days of festival programs. With the exception of the Hambo and, perhaps, a Last Waltz, there is no duplication of dances. Not only does the program have to balance so that the new and intermediate dancers are not inundated by advanced dances (let's admit it - it's a temptation for a program maker, who should be an advanced dancer, to load up a program with his favorites - but Statewide is for all of us, not just a few), but also there can't be an evening of dances all from one area (Balkan fans, the afterparties are for that purpose - the kolo parties will run as long as you like), nor can there be an out-of-balance proportion of one kind of dance. On top of that, this is a "Statewide" program - in other words, what dances are they doing in the North? They

There are two ways of answering that last question. One is easy - look in "Let's Dance" for the monthly festival program. So we did. The other is to write letters to all the Northern groups. We did that, too, particularly to find out what <u>new</u> dances were being done. How many down South here know "Jack's Maggot" or "Mason's Apron"? At least half of the forms that came back listed <u>both</u> of these dances. It's interesting about the forms sent out inquiring about dances. Some groups never answer at all. Others answer long after you need the information. We asked that the forms be returned by the end of last year. We're <u>still</u> getting answers. A couple of people said that no one from their groups were coming down so they didn't feel qualified to give the information. By the way, Pomona people, how did it work out with you and your questionnaire?

Anyhow, after accumulating all this information, the next step is to make a tentative (very!) program. It is really a one-person job, especially when there are a hundred or so miles between committee members who, in this case, happen to be the San Diego teachers. That done, we get together, tear it apart, put it back together again, and snip a bit here and there, finally emerging with a dance program that - we hope - you will enjoy as much as we do. Once we have the idea of how the program will go together (not necessarily in its final form), we turn that

information over to Valerie Staigh who is in charge of emcees and square dance callers. The Masters of Ceremonies are generally Past Presidents or other prominent personalities of the Federations North and South, and, of course, there is no way Valerie can invite her callers until we tell her how many squares will be on the program. For people who have never attended a Northern Festival, they often have one tip (two squares) between every ten dances. We won't have that many, but there will be more than you see at most festivals here. Compromise! . . . Once all these details are settled, the program is typed, given to our printer, John Holmes, and you finally find it when you open your pre-registration envelope in San Diego!

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INTERNATIONAL FOLK DANCE FESTIVAL

"Art is long and time is fleeting" - the art in this case being the folk dance pageant to be held in the Music Center, presented by International Concerts Exchange and Mr. Irwin Parnes the time fleeting is just that. The curtain time is 8 p.m. on March 3, only a month away. After frantically attempting to establish contact with each other, we finally did - in Portugal - but the mail arrived, too late to let us get the story in last issue, even though it was posted in time. So we're left with only one month to <u>BUY THOSE TICKETS</u>! We're stressing that phrase at the beginning of this article because, again, as in many times past, Mr. Parnes is making it possible for the Federation and its Scholarship program to benefit from the sale. You know - or should know by now - that the Federation sponsors scholarships (tuition) at variout folk dance camps during the summer, and one of the principal sources of revenue for this program comes from the dollars received for each ticket <u>sold by the Scholarship Committee</u> of the Folk Dance Federation. Naturally, you could get tickets at the box office (though I am told that the performance is already one-third sold out and, besides, we have a choice block of the best seats available), but it is to our interest to promote the sale through the Federation program. A ticket application blank is appended on the back of this page.

Now for the program. Following his letter from Portugal, Irwin was on the phone within hours after his arrival at LAX with the details of the festival. Then came the official news release, and there's a flyer in this "Scene". (But like we say, use <u>OUR</u> ticket application form!)

The narrator is scheduled to be Barry Sullivan, noted film and stage actor. Performers will include the Rimaja Belly Dancers; the Hanayagi Japanese Classical Company in "The White Heron", a 200-year-old tour-de-force; the Jazz Dance Ensemble of the L. A. Jubilee Singers who will show "Puppet Man", the hit of their recent European tour; while the Liberty Assembly, the Westchester Lariats, and the American Indian Intertribal Pow-wow will round out the American entries. Mapu brings his Polynesian dancers; Karpatok has Hungarian dances; Athan Karras has his Greek folk dance group. Westwind presents its English suite; the Aguilar Ballet has Aztec creation rituals; and the Krakusy Polish Ensemble will exhibit a competitive dance from the Tatras. Many others are on the program as you may see in the flyer. The date, again - please remember as it's rushing upon us - Saturday evening, March 3, at 8 p.m. in the Music Center, Los Angeles.

As we said, an application form for tickets is on the back of this page. Contact either Sol or Al, whoever is the most convenient for you, but <u>DO IT NOW</u>! These are the choicest of seats, but we must sell them by <u>FEBRUARY 20</u>! If you have any questions, please call the phone listed under either name. An Institute presented by the Folk Dance Federation of California, South will be held at the Santa Maria Festival (March 31 - April 1) to benefit the Mendocino Woodlands Campgrounds. This is the site where the Mendocino Woodlands Folklore Camp meets annually - founded by Madelynne Greene, and most recently under the talented direction of Dean and Nancy Linscott. The State has required that extensive repairs and maintenance work be done, and failure to meet these requirements - estimated expenses in excess of a couple of thousand dollars - may result in the closing of this beautiful site and the eventual logging of the redwoods.

The Institute will be held from 1 to 4:30 p.m. on Saturday afternoon, March 31, 1973 at the Veterans Memorial Building in Santa Maria. Dean Linscott and Dick Goss have generously agreed to teach without fee so that the proceeds of the affair will be much enriched. The donation requested is \$2, but larger gifts will be gladly accepted.

Dean will be teaching "Bourree Pastourell", introduced by the Heberts, (and written up in the January "Let's Dance"). His second dance will be "Kačerac", from Serbia, taught at the first Aman Institute. The third is "Syrtos Sylivrianos", a Greek dance. Dean came to Los Angeles from Bakersfield, then exhibited and directed many of the well remembered exhibitions of the Gandy Dancers while with that group from 1950 to 1960. He was co-director of the Cygany Dancers in San Diego from 1963 to 1965, then went to the San Francisco Bay area where he immediately started the Kopachka Dancers in 1965. Dean, with his wife Nancy, has helped to direct the Mendocino Camp in recent years, and taught at the Enumclaw Northwest Festival last summer. (Ed. - Dean tells me that he is bringing down some twenty Kopachkas to Santa Maria - they're hoping to charter a bus!)

Dick Goss is very active in teaching for, and is a life member of, the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society, and dances with the Scottish Dance Ensemble, this in addition to his involvement in the Museum Co-op in Pasadena. He has spent many summers in Scotland studying and researching Scottish dance, both Highland and Country. He has promised to teach two dances, both for couples in a set, which have not been introduced in Southern California previously - "The Wild Geese", a jig, and "The Sailor", a hornpipe.

Many Northern and Southern California dancers will be meeting in Santa Maria for this Institute and the Festival. CAMELLIA FESTIVAL

"Symphony of the Stars" is the theme of the 19th Annual Camellia Folk Dance Festival and Pageant to be held March 2-11 in the Sacramento Memorial Auditorium in conjunction with the 49th Annual Camellia Show - having over 10,000 blossoms on display. There will be ten full days of activities with something of interest for everyone - regattas, golf invitationals, ballet, symphony, photo and art exhibits, a children's Camellia Parade - even a 100 mile foot race!

This year the country honored is Poland, so the Saturday afternoon (March 10) Institute will feature Polish dances, which will be included on the evening festival program. Janet Flyr, Institute Chairman, has enlisted Dean Linscott and Neal Sandler at the teachers.

The theme "Symphony of the Stars", of course, pays tribute to Nikolas Copernicus, the famed Pole, born 500 years ago in 1473 and known as the father of modern astronomy. In 1543 he published a treatise in which he described the planets as revolving around the sun and the earth turning on its axis - with the resultant apparent rising and setting of the sun, moon and stars.

General folk dancing will get under way on Saturday evening, March 10, 8 to 11 p.m. The Pageant is on Sunday afternoon from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m., with the Camellia Queen and her Court seated on the stage on a cloud surrounded by twinkling stars. Last year over 250 dancers from all over California performed before a full house of some 4000 in the auditorium. Following the performance, the Queen and Court will be escorted off by the skirling bagpipers of Sacramento's own Cameron Pipes Band - general folk dancing will then resume until 10:30 p.m. Afterparties are scheduled both Saturday and Sunday nights. Both the Pageant and festivals are free and open to the general public. Everyone is welcome.
