

#### CLUB OF THE MONTH CLUB INTERMEDIATE FOLK DANCERS

The Intermediate Dance Group "makes the 'Scene'". Let's put it also into the past tense - and say "made the 'Scene'" as well!

This Friday night group, under the direction of Nate and Lila Moore, came into being as a workshop to teach both the new and the old intermediate level dances, with a special emphasis on styling. This was in March, 1963 - just ten years ago this month.

Bill Rosenthal, one of the original organizers, was in charge of publicity, and began the publication of a monthly mimeographed newsletter, "The Intermediate Folk Dance Bulletin", outlining the activities of the group, and listing the dances that were to be taught. Two months later a column was added, enabling announcements of activities from other groups to be included. Soon there were additional pages for news items as well as flyers, and by now Bill, with several volunteer assistants, did the publication, collation, addressing and mailing of the paper at the group's expense. The original name soon no longer fitted the publication, and after discussion at a coffee-meeting one evening, the name "Scene" was selected along with an editorial policy saying that any folk dance group, whether a Federation club or not, could "make the 'Scene'". Due to the mounting expense and work load, the project became too heavy for Bill and his coterie of volunteers. "Scene" was offered to the Folk Dance Federation, South as a going concern and was ultimately accepted. "Folk Dance Scene" was thus established, and publication has continued and grown ever since under the successive editor-ship of Bill, then Liesl Barnett, Dick Oakes, and the present chief editor, Paul Pritchard.

Meanwhile, the Intermediate Dance Group continued to operate with its policy of teaching, under the direction of Nate and Lila, first at Webster Junior High in the Mar Vista area, then, about a year ago, moving to the highly acceptable wooden floor of the gym at Emerson Junior High School in West Los Angeles, where they have been meeting ever since. Every year the directors take a two-week break - perhaps it would better be called a "busman's holiday" to go to Mexico where they teach at the University, and in turn learn, bringing back interesting material which is available to the Intermediate Group.

Their Friday night programs generally follow the format of review dances, as per request, for the first half hour, starting at 8 p.m. This is followed by the scheduled teaching program, new dances and reviews (see this month's program under "Teaching This Month"), and this is followed by a request program and numerous unannounced interspersed "goodies" until the closing time of 11 p.m. (This sort of keeps the Moores a bit busy, so to speak, since Nate has a beginners' class in La Canada on Mondays, an exhibition group in El Monte on Tuesdays, and teaches the Millikan Mixers in North Hollywood on Wednesdays.)

The group is open to all and has a large regular attendance. There are no officers and no meetings other than sporadic ones, but the club does have annual weekend gatherings. It has gained the reputation among regulars as the "most organized, disorganized, X-rated folk dance group in town".

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#### CAMELLIA JUNIORS

Camellia City Juniors is one of the youngest groups (in years as well as organization) in the Sacramento area, dating from October, 1970. Members are provided with the opportunity to participate in a social experience, learn poise, good physical posture, tolerance and perseverance, and the mental stimulation they receive enables them to hold their own with the adults at Festivals and at local party nights.

The Juniors, numbering twenty-six, range in age from 8 to 16 years. Their parents assist with the club activities and, with the club, co-host two parties a year, one in June and the other in December. These parties are exhuberant and hilarious affairs, and the boys certainly perform a mean "Kapuvari Verbunk"! Parents also help with shopping for costume material and in their production.

The exhibition group's introduction to the public came at the 1971 Camellia Festival when they presented "Tinikling" on the Saturday evening program. They have since appeared regularly at Federation and regional festivals, most recently at the festival in Napa on February 4. They performed two years at San Jose, Sonoma, Santa Rosa, in Sacramento at Cal-Expo, and also at the 1972 Treasurer's Ball. They dance "Tinikling", "Tiklos" and the Swedish "Weaving Dance", and at this year's Camellia Festival will do the Polish "Tompany" on Saturday evening, and the Swiss "Analle Walzer" on the Sunday Pageant program. They also assist churches in fund raising events by appearing on their programs, have sold Camellia Buttons, and have participated in Camellia Pin-on Day at the Metropolitan Airport.

The club is the product of the devotion of one couple to International Folk Dance. For a number of years, members of local folk dance clubs looked for involvement for their children, who often accompanied their parents to Saturday night parties and were anxious to learn to dance. Finally, Cleo and Walt Baldwin were prevailed upon to organize and teach a children's class,

#### FEDERATION FESTIVAL

GANDY DANCERS BALL

"Oh, they danced on the ceiling and they danced on the wall at the Gandy Dancers' Ball" - so goes the song popular a couple of decades back, and which was adopted as the official club song of the Federation group of the same name.

They may not be dancing on the ceilings and the walls of the auditorium at the International Institute, 435 S. Boyle Ave. in East Los Angeles on the Sunday afternoon of March 18, but dance they will otherwise. Now, come to think of it, at the March 1969 festival there, so many people turned up maybe they DID have to transgress the laws of gravity. But it was a good festival - as this club's festivals always have been - way back to the one in Exposition Park in 1950! Festival Chairman Jean Pixler promises this to be another of the same caliber, and to show what she means, the flyer attached has the dance program right there on the back, so you can warm up ahead of time. (We see "Pandogo" on the list, too, in keeping with our West African issue!)

In the forenoon, at 11 a.m., there will be a Federation Council meeting. An aside to those activists in the Federation - see that your club delegate is in attendance, and with the name of any candidate for office willing to run - for this is the last chance to make nominations from the floor for next year's officers. Then, following this meeting, there will be food available, catered by the Philippine organizations

there will be food available, catered by the Philippine organizations affiliated with the Institute. (As a matter of fact, the food will be there starting at noon, before the Council meeting is over, for any early-comers to the festival.) There will be displays (no costumes this year, though) and records, etc. on hand. Two exhibitions are planned, one Scottish and the other Mexican. The latter, we know, is by one of the Institute dance groups, but don't have details on whether the former is or not. The festival runs from 1:30 to 5:30 p.m. While there is parking adjacent, it fills quickly, and it behooves one to get there earlyish to grab the available alternate street space.

There is a donation involved in this case, but the funds derived do NOT go to either the Federation or to the Gandy club. All proceeds, both from the entrance admission and from the food sales, go to the International Institute, a member group of the United Way. It is a volunteer social agency, serving people from all lands, with the objective of assisting the foreign born to become adjusted to life in America and in (



Los Angeles, of course. One of the big activities extant in the Institute is folk dance, in which the ethnic groups of quite a large number of countries participate regularly with their social or exhibition performances. There is usually a "festival" of some specific nationality each month, but the Gandy Festival is the one which is representative of <u>all</u> nations, and has become a sort of liason between the Folk Dance Federation and these ethnic colonies. And, by sponsoring this festival, the Federation becomes a supporter of the International Institute program.

#### DANCE IN WEST AFRICA

LEONA WOOD

#### Artistic Director, Aman Folk Ensemble

West African dancing is being brought to the attention of American audiences with increasing frequency in recent years through performances of the touring dance companies launched by several justifiably proud West African nations. The Ghanaian company, under the distinguished direction of J. H. Kwabema Nketia, sometime lecturer in music at UCLA, is possibly the finest, if not the most commercial. Its repertoire consists principally of Ashanti and Ewe music and dance, and reveals the contrasting cultures of the two most influential ethnic groups in the country.

The Aman Folk Ensemble performs a representative dance from each of these groups: "Sohu Adahu", an Ewe dance, is an example of the cult (Yeve) funerary dance, as well as of the energetic Ewe style. It should be noted that funeral party dancing constitutes a very large part of all West African indigenous dancing. "Kete Atene" is only

of all west African indigenous dancing. "Kete Atene" is only one of a great number of aristocratic Ashanti dances, and is performed by the ladies of the court, often especially for the Queen Mother. Many West African dances are strictly regulated by protocol and numerous complicated social and religious restrictions.

The Guinean and Sierra Leone national companies both include dances from Soolimana, of which Major Alexander Gordon Laing wrote in the first quarter of the last century. He astutely observed that the graceful and vigerous dancers performed with "...the body and knees being bent into the shape of a Z...", a recurring posture in most West African dancing.

Although the Yoruba and Ibo of Nigeria possess very rich dance and music traditions, American audiences have not yet had the opportunity of enjoying them. The Hausa of Northern Nigeria share a cultural heritage with their Moslem co-religionists in Niger, Upper Volta, Mali, Guinea and Sénégal. Music and dance of these areas is sufficiently similar within the Moslem population to be grouped in a generalized way.



This presents an interesting point for those who have recently seen the outstanding Mali Ensemble and look forward to the Sénégalese: - - - the existence of two separate music and dance styles in the countries south of the Sahara. The indigenous style is best exemplified by peoples with a unique and unbroken tradition, like the Ashanti. The imported style is the result of a millenium of Islamic influence in the Sudanic empires and emirates.

The attitudes toward music and dance differ considerably within these two cultural structures; the Moslem peoples fostering a caste of professional entertainers, and the indigenous cultures integrating music and dance into the whole complex fabric of their social patterns.

This latter attitude has encouraged the proliferation of social dancing in the larger coastal cities such as Accra and Lagos. This dancing, known variously as "High-Life", "Pandogo", "Palungo", etc., developed from such village debutante dances as the Ashanti "Sikyi". Completely secular and international in flavor, "High-Life" has become the sophisticaled social common-denominator for a modern West Africa where Cyprian Ekwénsi (in "Jagua Nana") can write of a night-club in Lagos where "The band was playing a new hit tune from Ghana..."

#### MACEDONIAN SUMMER BOB LEIBMAN

#### Folklore Department, UCLA

With the approach of summer, I have been asked to say a few words about the folk dance festivals and camps which are regularly held in the Balkans, and in particular, Yugoslavia. I agreed to write something on the basis of my past trips, but found that a really informative article on the subject on the do's and don'ts and the hows and whys would take much more space than could be allotted, so I have decided to present a summary here and, if time permits, prepare a small pamphlet separately which should be available by April 1st at a nominal cost. Interest in such a pamphlet may be expressed to the editors or directly to me.



The following calendar contains the dates of a number of the major festivals at which traditional folk dances and songs are presented in a fairly unchoreographed manner, two folk dance camps, and a few traditional folk gatherings where dancing normally occurs. The latter is one of the traditional settings for folk dancing and will allow you to both watch and to participate in folk dancing by real folk. The festivals are not participatory events for the spectator.

Participatory folk dance groups do not exist. "Folk dancing" refers to ensemble dancing, professional, amateur or village. The actual folk refer to the dancing that occurs at weddings or other gatherings just as "dancing" and not "folk dancing" - and could be confused by the term. People do dance "folk dances" at the gatherings I list and at other similar events - at weddings, and at certain rituals, but this does not mean that they are always dancing, and many American tourists have been greatly disappointed when they went to Yugoslavia to see "the happy peasants dancing". The dancing occurs at different times and with different frequency in different areas and one needs to be in the right spot at just the right time, which is what this article (and the pamphlet in more detail) is all about.

Here is a calendar:

1. Sabor Narodnog Stvaralaštva - a four day festival with performances by a large number of village groups from throughout the republic of Serbia. Held in the city of Leskovac in South Serbia (on the Beograd-Nis-Skopje road and rail line). The first annual one was in 1972, on June 21-24. Dates and information for this year could most likely be obtained in Beograd from the Serbian Academy of Sciences, Knez Mihajlova 35.

2. A large folk gathering at the monastery of Sveti Naum on Lake Ohrid at the southwest corner of Macedonia, in honor of its Saint's Day, July 3. The people begin gathering during the day of July 2 and the peak of the dancing may find up to ten circles of dancers, each with its own musicians. Remember, the dancing is on the evening of July 2. If you don't get there until July 3, you'll be disappointed.

3. Balkanski Folklor Festival - a six day festival, July 3-8, of groups from all six republics of Yugoslavia, and from the adjacent countries, Italy, Austria, Hungary, Romania, Bulgaria, Albania and Turkey. The groups vary from village groups to semi-professional ensembles. Ohrid is a lovely old town with many interesting sites to visit during the daytime. (Inset is a drawing of an old hillside home and veranda.) This event conveniently follows the gathering at Sveti Naum.

4. A folk gathering on the late morning and afternoon of July 4 on a hill near the village of Belćiste, about 20 miles northeast of Ohrid.

5. The Macedonian folk dance camp at the resort of Oteševo, conducted by Pece Atanasovski, who recently toured the U.S., and Professor Zivko Firfov - a 10 day camp at which Macedonian dances and songs are taught. Cost last year: \$20 plus \$5 a day room and board at the hotel, preferably paid in U.S. dollars. Held July 9-18, immediately following the Ohrid Festival. For information, write Pece Atanasovski.

6. Smotra Folklora - a weeklong festival in Zagreb, capital of Croatia. This is the largest and most comprehensive of all the festivals. Besides the evening performances, there are also free performances at various sites throughout the city during the day. Performances by Yugoslav village groups are usually held on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday evenings. Two evenings may be devoted to Croatia only, and one to representatives from the other republics. Other days one may see performances by foreign groups and also special evening concerts of instrumentalists or singers. Showings of ethnographic films may begin as early as the Friday before the official opening of the festival. According to the pamphlets distributed at previous Zagreb festivals, 1973 may see the transformation into a truly world-wide event, with groups from all

continents, or at least most of them. Whether this would augment or replace the high number of Yugoslav groups, I don't know. It usually takes place the last week in July, which would mean July 22-29, 1973. For more information, write to Arto, Ilica 5, Zagreb, Yugoslavia.

7. Macedonian Republic Festival - a 4 or 5 day festival of Macedonian village groups and amateur ensembles in Bitola, southern Macedonia, July 29-August 2.

8. Large folk gatherings in various places in Macedonia on August 2, St. Ilija's Day. One is held in the village of Lazaropole in western Macedonia. Another is held on a hill above the town of Kruševo in central Macedonia.

9. The folk dance camp on the island of Badija presents two ten-day sessions, each dealing with one of the six dance regions of Jugoslavia. This year should be the Jadran (Adriatic) zone - the islands and coastal region, and the Vardar zone of Macedonia. Dances are taught by leading academicians. The course is aimed at Yugoslav dance leaders and physical ed. teachers with a special section for foreigners where someone translates into English or German (there are always people who then can spread it into the other Western languages). Last year, the cost had risen to \$40 for each session, I believe, plus room and board. Among the groups are the fiery Kitka Dancers, representing Bulgaria; Manjusri, an Indian "Isadora Duncan", direct from New Delhi; Shlomo Bachar's Hadarim Dancers of Israel; James Lomath's Dancers and Pipers in a Scottish performance; Teodoro Morca, Spanish Flamenco sensation; and as a special added divertissement, Jass Hakoshima, Japan's great master of pantomime. The choir of California State University at San Jose will accompany with folk songs.

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#### SÉNÉGALESE DANCE COMPANY

One of the finest of the African dance ensembles, the Sénégalese National Dance Company from Dakar, is currently touring the United States on a return trip, after a most successful visit in the fall of 1971 when it was seen in the East and Mid-west.

This troupe was brought together some thirteen years ago after much endeavor and research on the part of the directors, and in co-operation with the Government of Sénégal itself. During the course of its creation, over 200 villages, representing all of the many tribes and languages of the country, were visited. Over 2000 dancers, musicians and singers were auditioned. One could just about time the advent of the ensemble with the independence of the Republic of Sénégal itself. Moreover, the director of the company is none other than Maurice Senghor, a nephew of Leopold Senghor, the President of the country. The ensemble has not remained static, either. Ever since its creation, there has been a policy of continued search for new talent throughout the land, for new material, and to rediscover traditions of the people - in order to portray them in dance and song. Naturally, much new talent has been added to the organization, too.

Their program is a feast of rhythm, with the continuous beat of four different kinds of drums - bells, some attached to the drummers' wrists woodblocks - and gourds. Djimbe virtuosities accompany the dances, with tales and rituals that compose Senegalese folklore. An instrument of unique appearance is the "kora", which somewhat resembles a gourd, yet is not unlike a lute, and has a sound comparable to a zither.

Dances include ritual dances pertaining to harvesttime, work and occupations, of the competition between the sexes, and funerary dances - and some which display an athletic prowess that



would put many of the touted Eastern European groups in a secondary spot. Others, were they not done with such artistic taste and a natural grace and exhuberance, might almost be considered as warranting an "R" label. Their costumes are natural - that is to say, do not suffer from the tinsel and gaudiness often seen in other stage productions - yet, some are most elaborate and show all the influences of the cultures that have seeped into the villages from European and Arabic sources, as well as from the splendors of the ancient African kingdoms themselves.

We understand that the group will be making several appearances throughout the State during their California stay. The performance at UCLA is on Saturday evening, March 24, at 8:30 p.m. in Royce Hall. See the large ad on page 7 for full ticket information.

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From Chicago, we hear "Ballets Africaines" will be in that area next month. If they plan to come to this coast, we'll let you know.

#### ON THE BALKAN BEAT

One of the major events of the year is the anticipated trip to California by Mr. Dobrivoje Putnik, currently the Artistic Director of Ansambl Kolo. Mr. Putnik is highly respected and is considered to be one of the finest professional choreographers and folklorists in Yugoslavia today.

After Kolo was formed in 1948, Mr. Putnik was appointed its choreographer, and is the only one who has ever officially held that title in the field of Yugoslav folk dance. During this time, he was also very closely associated with Madame Olga Skovran who was the General and Artistic Director of Kolo from 1948 through 1965.

His vast knowledge of traditional dances and his many research trips into the villages of Yugoslavia have earned him the well deserved name of "The Encyclopedia of Yugoslav Dances". Ansambl Kolo's repertoire contains over 80 choreographies, of which almost half are products of Mr. Putnik's genius. He has choreographed suites from most parts of Yugoslavia - his specialties include Eastern Serbia, Croatian Posavina and Baranja, Vojvodina, and Macedonia. Critics in Yugoslavia have called these choreographies "Pearls and Masterpieces".

Mr. Putnik's first appearance will be at the Second Annual Borino Kolo Festival on March 24 in San Pedro. He is scheduled for a radio interview on station KPFK with Mario Casetta, and he will be making a guest appearance at that station's Kolo Festival on April 21. Other scheduled appearances will be at Hadarim Folk Dance Coffee House on March 30, Santa Cruz on April 7, and Santa Barbara on April 14. Since he will be here for six weeks only, his number of appearances is limited. He is available for a few special workshop sessions with dance groups who want the opportunity of working closely with a real master of Yugoslav dances. ritualistic backgrounds based on spring planting, fertility rites, Druidic lore, the vernal equinox, and so on. As unreasonable as this whole thing may have seemed, I returned home proudly and ready for my first rolling pin rehearsal. . . It did-n't take long before I decided the task was impossible. It was just at this point in the rolling pin rehearsal when the most painful experience of all occured. I warned her strongly, but she refused to listen and insisted that she was capable of being responsible for herself. "Besides," she added, "I can do it!" . . . ## Let's Eat!

From Sénégal, all down the West Coast of Africa to Gabon, a prime ingredient in the menu is peanuts - along with chicken and fish. When the Bal- I lets Africaines were here a few years ago, they were hosted around town by the Gandies. They reciprocated with a dinner - West African style - at the home of Nikki Paisner. The main course was a Chickenin-Peanut-Sauce. Here is a version almost the same from the Ivory Coast. Sorry we don't have the one from Senégal.

#### IVORY COAST

1 - 3 1b. fryer, cut up 3 tbsp. peanut or salad oil z cup chopped brown onion 3 scallions, sliced 1 large tomato, diced 1 tbsp. tomato paste

Poulet a la N'Gatietro

1 tsp. salt 1 tsp paprika Dash allspice 1 bay leaf 2 cups water 1 cup peanut butter

Brown chicken in hot oil in heavy pan. Add next seven in-gredients. Cover and cook slowly on low heat 10 minutes. Add water, simmer 15 minutes more, until almost tender. Remove from fire. Cream peanut butter with some of the chicken stock in a separate bowl to a light, smooth consistency - pour over chicken and cook over low fire about 10 more minutes, until tender. (If serving for company, we recommend you use legs, thighs and breasts - less messy. And if you're doubling the recipe, you won't need to double the peanut sauce - try 12 times.)
