

FEDERATION IN FOCUS

The Institute, Sunday afternoon, June 9, at the West Hollywood Playground, is now a successful event completed. It was a really hot day, yet we had 80 dedicated dancers eagerly learning Mary Judson's and Shlomo Bachar's delightful dances. I am told that had the weather been less enticing, the large contingent of dancers that headed for the beaches would have invaded our institute en masse. It really may have made the dance area overcrowded. As it was, we had sufficient room to move about comfortably.

Mary taught "Newcastle", an old favorite for four couples in square formation, "Dorset Four-Hand Reel" for two couples in a set, and "Pins and Needles" for couples in longways formation as in contra dances. This was done to live music furnished by Gene Murrow.

Shlomo taught "Yevarechecha", "Mama Lo Raiti" and "Israel, Israel", all line dances, and the couple dance "Shecharchoret". He also reviewed "Hora Cheffer", a line dance already known to many who had learned it from him at either Stockton Camp, Idyllwild, or at some previous institute.

The music to Shlomo's dances are on his most recent LP, "I Remember", except for "Hora Cheffer" which is on his previous LP. As for Mary's material, the "Newcastle" record is readily available, and the other two dances may be done to a number of different records according to the sheet provided to accompany the already mentioned records in the syllabus. We want to thank both of our teachers for a superb teaching job and extend our appreciation to Gene for his delightful playing.

Every planned event has many hard working people in the background who help make it possible. I would like to list them all and express my thanks for jobs not only well done, but so very willingly: to Barry Korn for a clear, concise and very readable flyer; Dorothy Daw and Ruth Oser for many hours spent on the dance notations, and again to Dorothy for all the typing and the presentation of a very attractive syllabus; Ralph Miller for taking care of the sound and musical equipment segment; and to Elsa Miller for being a perfect hostess and supplying the refreshments which were very much appreciated by all. And, of course, many thanks to the members of my Institute Committee for a year of fine cooperative effort - Ed Feldman, Perle Bleadon, Henry Ruby and Jean Pixler. Also, one more person who is always taken for granted and rarely thanked, our own Paul Pritchard, for the write-ups and other various publicity which spread the news of our events to the folk dancers at large.

The year 1974-75 will again see the new Institute Chairman and committee busy planning the Hess Kramer Weekend. This year, the dates are October 18-20. We do not have the teachers lined up yet, nor a cost breakdown. We know it has to be higher than last year, but it will still be very modestly priced. Because so many folk dancers have asked to be able to make early reservations, we have decided to open registrations early. Housing will be handled in accordance with date of deposit received. SPECIAL EVENTS

THE FOURTH ON THE SLAB, which has become an annual fixture for the past umpteen years, is again set for the afternoon of Independence Day. You are invited to join the Santa Monica Folk Dancer in this celebration with six hours of folk dancing. The first hour is mainly line dancing, followed by general folk dancing from 1 to 6 p.m. There is no admission charge. Avis Tarvin is program chairman.

The location is Lincoln Park in Santa Monica, Lincoln and Wilshire Blvds., but the dancing area is one block north on the California Ave. side, on the 'slab'. There are plenty of shade trees in the park, and facilities for you to make a picnic of the event - barbecue fires and tables, etc. The weather has nearly always been perfect by dance time - a good place to get away from the heat of the city. The festival appeared on the Today show on TV in 1972, and is co-sponsored by the Santa Monica City Parks and Recreation Department.

As noted elsewhere in this issue, there will be a council meeting of the Folk Dance Federation, South in the morning at 10:30. Notice of the location on the premises will be posted.

THE DANCE ON THE MALL in West Los Angeles is becoming a July fixture also. This is an outdoor festival, hosted by the Westwood Co-op Folk Dancers and sponsored by the L. A. Dept. of Recreation and Parks. It is to be held in the West Los Angeles Civic Center Mall, just south of Santa Monica Blvd. at Purdue, and admission is free. Plenty of free parking is available in the adjacent parking area.

The date is July 13, Saturday, at 8 p.m. Everyone is urged to come in costume, if possible, for there will be a large and appreciative audience. No exhibitions - no business meeting just three hours of solid fun dancing. Westwood invites everyone to join them for a full balmy summer evening of enjoyable relaxation. THE ORANGE COUNTY FAIR is presenting an opening night program of international folk dances on Friday night, July 12, at 8 p.m. - the theme is International Brotherhood. Featured groups appearing will be Polski Iskry of Orange County; Hanayagi Classical Japanese Dancers; Erev Shel Shoshanim by the Saturenskys; Scottish Country Dances by Margaret Morrison's group; and a new Bahari Troupe with Egyptian back country dances directed by Marina. Following this, the next Friday, July 19, at 7 p.m., the Fair is offering a special candlelight pageant which also features a wide range of international dances. The program for the 12th is on the Family Theatre stage, while the 7 p.m. presentation on July 19 is in the Amphitheatre. Exit at the end of the Newport Freeway in Costa Mesa, and at the second signal, turn off at Fair Dr.

THE SUMMER GARDEN FESTIVAL (there have been performances during June weekends in L. A. at the Portland St. address) will be seen during July at Will Geer's Theatricum Botanicum in Topanga Canyon, starting July 3 and running through July 7, noon to midnight all days. <u>AN ETHNIC FOLK FESTIVAL</u>, a benefit for the Westside Jewish Community Center and hosted by the Westside JCC Folk Dancers *, will be held on August 4, starting at 4 p.m. This will include various forms of folk arts, dance, music and songs, on an international level. WE HAVE SOME SAD NEWS to relate again this month. We were informed by phone just a day or so ago that Byrdie Pelton, well known folk dancer of the area, member of the West Valley Folk Dancers, and wife of Allen Pelton, the Federation's first president, passed away after a rather long illness. We have no further details at this time. . . Then, last week we heard from Lucille Pauley, who informed us that her husband, Elmer, died of a heart attack in mid-March, but she had been too distraught to notify anyone until now. Elmer was a founding (and the senior) member of the Gandy Dancers, and could be found folk or square dancing every night of the week. During the mid-50's, he became entirely involved with square and round dancing. He was one of the earlier members of the Associated Square Dancers, and was dancing every evening somewhere right up until recent months.
