

Through the Committee for Cultural Relations with Armenians Abroad, I was accepted to study Armenian folk dance and choreography in Yerevan, capital of the Armenian SSR. Following my northeastern U. S. teaching tour in the fall of 1973, I departed for Ar-menia via Paris, Warsaw and Moscow. It was dead of winter when I arrived in late November - a most exciting feeling. After a short stay at the Hotel Armenia where there was a contingent of Americans touring with a U. S. recreational exhibit, some officials of the Cultural Committee took me to the Sayat Nova Choreographic School where I met the director, Merited Artist in Dance of the ASSR, Teresa Gregoryan, a very delightful person who was later to be very helpful and inspiring, and with whose husband I would be working in Armenian dance and travelling into the in-terior of Armenia to collect and research village dances and music. Students qualify to enter the folk dance program through interviews and

auditions. Only a handful of students of Armenian descent from outside Armenia have taken the course. It is of four years duration for Soviet citizens heading for a diploma in dance choreography and the certificate of "Professional Dancer of the Soviet Union". Generally, for the non-citizen, one to two years is suggested. In addition to Armenian folk dance, students study classical ballet plus character and international dance forms. Various types of examinations are given periodically during the four year period and the final examination is made up of a large concert at the Philharmonic in Yerevan.

FOLK DANCE OF ARMENIA

There are three state dance ensembles: two in Yerevan and one in Kirovakan, upper Armenia. Many schools and factories throughout the Republic sponsor dance organizations and the majority are quite good. Folk dance in the villages throughout the regions is still very much a part of the daily pattern. Most of the new in-coming dancers of the state ensembles are selected and auditioned from the list of graduating students of the Sayat Nova school. However, some exceptionally talented factory and even village products have made the grade.

Armenian folk dances are divided into two forms - the Eastern, or "Kavkaz" Armenian, and the Western, or "Anatolyan" style. And, going further, these are in turn subdivided. The Eastern Armenian dance styles are of three regions - Leninakan, Lori and Karabakh-Zangezoor; while the Western divisions are four - Sassoun-Taron, Vaspoorakan, Shatakh and Kareen. The map will show the general location of these areas.

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Ed. note: This article is an introduction to a more comprehensive article on Armenian folk dance, folklore and historical folk culture to come. Since his return to California this summer, Tom has been busy assembling his material learned during his Armenian stay, and racing from camp to club to coffee house on teaching assignments, and there has not been a lot of time for literary activities. His current plans include a teaching tour of the western part of the United States in early fall, then the East, and eventually, via Australia, a return to Armenia for his 1975 studies there. OUR COVER THIS ISSUE

This month we salute our neighbor to the south, Mexico, which will celebrate its independence on September 16. Our cover depicts two eras in Mexican costume history.

Here is an example of costume evolution. The hombre on the left is wearing the so-called "charro" costume common in present-day Mexico and southwest USA. The costume is solid black with silver trim. He wears a bright red sash around his midriff and a large black sombrero on his head.

In contrast, the vaquero on the right is from the same area, but the period in time is the mid-1800's. His costume is of bright blue velvet lined with buckskin and trimmed in silver. His showy, snowwhite colzoncillos (underdrawers) are visable through the split in his trouser legs. He carries his best serape over his right shoulder, a bright red kerchief is worn on his head, and a shiny red satin sash circles his waist. To complete his wardrobe, he is wearing a pair of black deerskin slippers.

(Several years ago, the Mexican Red Cross issued a set of 50 Christmas Seals, each depicting a different costume of Mexico. If they are still obtainable, they would be a very interesting addition to your costume material collection.)

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SPECIAL EVENTS

SAN DIEGO STATE UNIVERSITY AFTERPARTY

The San Diego State University Conference Reunion and Fund Raising Party will come to Los Angeles on Saturday, September 14. It will be held in the Eagle Rock Playground Recreation Hall, 1100 Eagle Vista Drive in Eagle Rock, California (a map will be found on Page 7 for your convenience). Originally scheduled as an evening event only, it will now include an afternoon teaching institute which starts at 2 p.m., and a noontime Federation Council meeting. Evening dancing starts at 7:30 p.m. This will be, in effect, a full festival-type program. Many old favorite dances will be programmed plus some of the new ones from folk dance camp. Festival doors open at 7 p.m. and the donation is \$1.

Doors will open for registration for the afternoon institute at 1:30 p.m., which will allow time to get "signed in" before the teaching starts at 2. Tom Bozigian, who was one of the teachers at the San Diego Conference, will be making one of a limited number of engagements in the Los Angeles area before the start of his tour in the East and abroad. The second teacher will be Chris Harris, who was one of the San Diego Conference scholarship winners. Camp dances will be taught for those who were unable to get to San Diego - or for those who did, but wish to "brush up" on the material. Donation for the institute is \$1.50.

Delegates and officers are urged to be on hand for the noon council meeting, for this is the first one since July 4, and considerable Federation business has accumulated which should be attended to.

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K P F K BENEFIT

Radio station KPFK-FM will present its 4th Annual International Folk Dance Festival and Ethnic Bazaar on September 29, the last Sunday in the month, at the new Pasadena Center, next to the Pasadena Civic Auditorium. The address is 300 E. Green St. The hours will be from noon to midnight, and will feature exhibitions by noted dance and musical groups, an ethnic bazaar, and ethnic arts, crafts and foods. SPECIAL EVENTS

THE NAVAJO NATION FAIR will be held at Window Rock, Arizona, September 5-8. It will feature a ceremonial in honor of Miss Navajo Queen's debut. This is, as far as Navajo involvement, the biggest event of this nature in the southwest. It is Navajo, for Navajo fun and entertainment. It will feature both Indian and western dance, traditional games and competitions, a rodeo, and (borrowing from the Caucasians) the aforementioned coronation of a Queen. This Fair, as a rule, has not received a large number of non-Indian visitors, being somewhat off the beaten track, and probably never will, although the fairgrounds at Window Rock is being rebuilt in preparation for the 1976 Bicentennial - it isn't a "white man's thing". Our correspondent for Najavoland, Reed Huddleston, will keep us posted on activities in that part of the country.

THE NATIONAL BAND OF NEW ZEALAND and the Aotearoa Maori Dancers will share joint billing at a performance on Tuesday evening, September 24, at 8 p.m. at the El Camino College Auditorium, Redondo Beach Blvd. at Crenshaw, Torrance. Brass band music is truly a part of New Zealand's cultural heritage, for today every city, town and high school in the country has its own band. The National Band of New Zealand is selected from the cream of the country's bandsmen and is acclaimed internationally as one of the world's foremost concert brass bands. . . The Aotearoa Maori Dancers are a small group of entertainers which accompany the band, and they - seven girls and a man - provide fascinating glimpses of the art, culture and dance of New Zealand's Maoris. The picture we have shows the group in traditional flaxen geometric costume, but we have no dance program so cannot say how much of the evening will be devoted to dancing. A quote from the Palm Beach Times says, "the finale of illuminated poi in an otherwise darkened house brought applause and cheers from the fascinated audience." Shades of Tangaroa! - do you suppose they celebrated at the Treaty of Waitangi with illuminated poi balls? An additional note on Maori doings is that there will be a special show presented by the New Zealand Travel Commission at the L. A. Convention Center, September 4-5. Tickets (free, we understand) are available through your travel agent or the Commission. Films and dances will be presented.

<u>GEMUTLICHKEIT AT THE OKTOBERFEST!</u> We have been waiting for the details of this 2nd annual Busch Gardens event, and though we don't have all the details, we must go with what we do have at hand. This year, Dick Preimsberger is director in charge. (Some of you will remember way back when, after Lawrence Welk left the Aragon Ballroom, Dick programmed a folk dance activity there. Later he was with the Ralph's Hofbrau Party program on TV.) Anyhow, back to unser grosser Sud-Kalifornien biergarten kermess. The dates run from Friday, September 28 through Sunday, October 6, and Van Nuys will ring with the sounds of beer-drinking songs and marching bands - orchestras and choirs as well as individual entertainers and combos. Folk dancing will be very much a part of it, of course. It will not be limited to German culture either. Virtually every corner of the globe (that is, if a globe had corners) will be represented, with the Chinese Bugle Corps and Marching Band and the Folklorico Ballet as a 'frinstance. By now, most Federation exhibition groups have been contacted, some of which appeared in last year's festival.

To those readers who are not members of exhibition clubs and may not have heard about it already, this is, as previously mentioned, an annual event at the Gardens, timed to somewhat coincide with the big event in Munich. It is one of its major "shows" of the fall season and, naturally, all the usual rides, etc., will be available for those who want to do more than just dance, watch or listen. OKTOBERFESTING is not limited to Van Nuys and Munich, either. Over the weekend of October 5-6, the Folklaenders of Chula Vista will present another of their excellent festivals. This will be entitied "Winzerfest", and Director Elizabeth Ullrich has a full schedule for you. There is to be an institute of teaching on Saturday afternoon, 1:30-4:30. The festival is on Sunday afternoon, 1:30-5, this preceded by a Federation Council meeting at 11:00. These are all at the Municipal Gym in Chula Vista, 385 Park Way. There will also be pre-parties, afterparties and exhibitions - a good time for all.

<u>UCLA</u> opens its 1974-75 "World of Dance" Series with an appearance of the Soviet Georgian Dancers and the Tblisi Polyphonic Choir, a company of 80 now making its long-awaited American tour. This is a young group (we don't mean kids, though) and will perform some of the most fascinating and traditional dances of Georgia and other nearby regions of the Caucasus. The Tblisi Polyphonic Choir, Gordela, will sing songs of haunting beauty which have their roots far back in the ancient and medieval culture of the Caucasus - mountain dance airs, marching songs, and their version of a yodel, "krimanshuli". Note: this performance, as well as the balance of the series, will be held this year in Pauley Pavilion instead of Royce Hall. The UCLA event is on October 5 at 8:30 p.m., and ticket information may be secured by calling 213/825-2953. There will also be a performance at the Shrine Auditorium on October 4, the previous evening. Call 213/748-5116 for info on this showing.

<u>A GREEK FESTIVAL</u> will be held in Pasadena at the Greek Orthodox Church, Saturday and Sunday afternoons, September 14-15. Greek dancing, music and refreshments of course. Another well known Greek festival is the one in Torrance which we have reviewed before. No info so far on this year's occasion, but it has generally been the first weekend of October at the Torrance Recreation Center.

ITEMS OF INTEREST

SACRAMENTO SUMMER SOUNDINGS! July 4 opened the Village Green program with a great new concrete dance area in William Land Park - no more patched up blacktop. It is beautiful. And the city does well by Sacramentan dancers in other ways, too. There are the indoor classes at Clunie Clubhouse, twice a week, September through June. In addition, the folk dancers enjoy the hospitality of Camp Sacramento in the High Sierras. This year, 120 delighted people enjoyed refurbished cabins, good weather, excellent food, supervised activities for the kids on Saturday, and dancing for the adults Friday evening, the Saturday afternoon institute, and again dancing on Saturday night. A Sunday brunch concluded the weekend. Still to come will be the dancing program at the California State Fair which will close out summer folk dance activities on September 8.

COSTUME CORNER

MEXICAN CHARRO

The horse, introduced to Mexico by the Spaniards during the conquest of Latin America, became the campesino's best friend - in his work, his defense, transportation, and as a symbol of social position.

The horseman, regardless of class, sought the most elegant garb possible. In colonial Mexico, the native hacendados (or landowners) of noble birth wore cloth of the best material and de-sign and with the finest accessories they could acquire. This also was a period when banditry was widespread, and the ringleaders of these roving bands adorned their jackets and trouser legs with silver buttons. They were called "plateados", or the "silvered ones".

The charro outfit is very complex because of the numerous equipments required for the rider and his horse. The suit consists of: A broad-brimmed sombrero with a high, pinched crown, banded and ornamented with silver plaques; the hat is kept on with a chin-strap sustained between the lip and chin - A cotton or linen shirt and silk cravat made of a strip over a yard long and about six inches wide, usually of red or green, and often black or white, tied at the neck in a huge bow - A jacket of woolen cloth fastened beneath the lapels with a frog of double silver buttons - Tight fitting woolen trousers bordered with an inch-wide flap a-long the outer side. When full-dress trousers are worn, they are studded with silver buttons along this bordering flap - Shoes are of a single piece of leather, and the spurs are of blued iron and silver.

The saddle on the horse has wooden bows, lined with a fine-grained lambskin and adorned also with silver. Leather parts are, as a rule, ornately engraved and sometimes decorated with a fringe. The stirrups and other hardware are usually of iron and silver, like the spurs and the bit and bridle. The colorful serape is tied to the hind of the saddle during travel.

The traditional charro never lays aside his revolver which he wears at his belt. That is why the poem says:

"There is nothing in the world As close to the charro As his pistol, His faithful companion Throughout life".
