We do not recall that they have participated in any exhibition program in a Los Angeles Federation festival before, but they are specialists in Balkan dancing - the Jasna Planina Folk Ensemble, from Claremont, directed by Nancy Ruyter. Come join in the festivities and have a most enjoyable evening.

For members of the Federation Council, there will be a business meeting at 4 p.m. in the same building. Please be prompt so that it can start on time and end quickly in order that those handling the festival can go to dinner or other crepuscular activities before commencing their labors.

And - we mentioned at the start about the Ball in Hayward. We believe the same purpose exists there, too. Since last issue, however, it has been changed from its previously planned location in Napa to Hayward - at Centennial Hall, 22300 Foothill Blvd., just across from the City Hall. The first important folk event of November is one which actually occurs on the first of the month. On that Friday evening, the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion of the Music Center in Los Angeles will feature a return engagement of the noted Aman Folk Ensemble. This will be Aman's fourth appearance at the Center (the second at the Pavilion). Last time, tickets sold out days in advance, and early sales indicate that this year will prove a repetition. At this late date, it would be advisable to contact your ticket agency immediately and not take a chance at the box office on the night of the performance.

There are some new additions to the repertoire some of which will be premieres and others, though presented by the company while on tour and at regional showings, will be new to Los Angeles theatre goers. And, some of the wonderful old favorites will be programmed too.

We are proud that, with this group of 85 extraordinarily talented young dancers, singers and musicians, we here in Los Angeles have an ensemble which can stand with any of the tinseled, imported ethno-acroballetic state companies, and without any of the gimickry - just sheer, straight folklore in its more pure form, carefully researched by its co-directors, Leona Wood and Anthony Shay, and all the many members who have lent their knowledge to help make Aman what it is - and make an evening spent watching them in concert an unforgettable experience.

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NATIONAL DANCE COMPANY OF SÉNÉGAL

The forty members of the National Dance Company of Sénégal have returned to North America on their third coast-to-coast tour. This Company, under the direction of Maurice Senghor, nephew of Sénégal's President, Leopold Senghor, appeared first in New York in 1971 as part of that city's Afro-Asian Festival, and have since presented over 300 performances in nearly every major city in the United States and Canada.

This ensemble includes dancers, singers, drummers, acrobats and "stilt-walkers", and has been on tour throughout Africa and abroad for 15 years now.

In a role of good-will ambassadors, they have presented the rich and diversified cultural heritage of their homeland on every continent, and have invitations to return, not only to America, but to Japan, Australia, the Soviet Union, Eastern and Western Europe, and Latin



America. For this 15th anniversary tour, the Sénégalese have arranged a new program. When Mr. Senghor first assembled the company, he researched the villages and the far reaches of the country, and prepared an outstanding repertoire of varied and exciting indigenous talent of Sénégal. For this newer edition, he again went from one end of the land to the other on a trip of some 10,000 miles, and the new program thus includes batteries of drummers from four different regions of Sénégal, performing on the diakhanke, soce, wolof and diola. There are stilt-walking acrobats who dance to the rhythm of the tam-tam on eight-foot high stilts. This year's program also includes an authentic 'talking drum'. It is said that very few artisans of this rare art form still exist in West Africa today. The attractive Sénégalese men and women will also be performing high-energy dances from the Sénégalese savannah and forest.

The Company has added some new singers to the cast, and has retained from the 1973 tour the unique Peuhl Acrobats and Djimo Kouyate, cora virtuoso, and their sensational harvest dance (see photo).

The Company has just concluded a special performance before the United Nations Assembly for Human Rights Day, and has been invited to return to the United States as the representative of Africa, to dance at the Bicentennial Festival in Philadelphia in 1976.

The National Dance Company of Sénégal will appear in UCLA's Pauley Pavilion for a performance on Sunday, Nov. 10, at 8 p.m. Tickets are available from the UCLA Ticket Office, 650 Westwood Plaza, and ticket agencies. For info, call 213/825-2953. Since the Georgians' appearance in early October, the seating arrangements have been completely redesigned to enable views to enjoy the performance to the fullest. In the event you can't make the UCLA show, you might check to see if there are any other Southland performances. Last visit, there were one or two Community Concert bookings as well as one at ELAJC.

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ORANGE COUNTY WEEKEND

The Linscotts will appear in Orange County. Yes, Dean and Nancy have graciously accepted an invitation extended jointly by the Laguna Beach Folk Dancers and the Orange County Folk Dancers to officiate at an incredible folk dance weekend extravaganza, starting Dec. 13 and ending Dec. 15.

On Friday evening, Dec. 13, Dean and Nancy will conduct a mini-workshop at Santa Ana College Dance Studio during the Orange County Dancers' regular Friday evening session.

The next day, Saturday, under the joint sponsorship of the two clubs, an institute will be presented with the Linscotts teaching. That evening, the clubs will conduct a benefit program to "Save the Mendocino Redwoods" and the Mendocino Camp Association (of which Mendocino Folklore Camp is a member), for, if the latter fails, the former will fall! All monies received will go toward the preservation of this unique forest wonderland - and this preservation will help ensure the continuance of the equally unique folklore camp which it houses.

The Linscotts will be the honored guests of the evening. They have been the guiding lights of the Mendocino Folklore Camp since the death of its founder, Madelynne Greene, several years ago. They will show sound movies of some of the fantastic occurances at the camp. Mendocinoites will recall with joy and relish the unforgettable experiences they have had at camp, and non-Mendos will surely rush to enroll for next year's sign-up.

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MILWAUKEE FOLK FESTIVAL

Thirty years have not stunted the enthusiasm of today's ethnic groups of Milwaukee in preparing for the annual Holiday Folk Fair, Nov. 22-24. These 4,000 volunteers are looking forward to expanding into the new convention center, known as Mecca, which will be used, along with the Arena, to house this multi-cultural event. Visitors will still enter by the familiar way of the Arena however.

This event is sponsored by the International Institute of Milwaukee, along with the Pabst Brewing Company and the 45 ethnic groups involved. This new facility adds some 50,000 square feet, which should accomodate at least that many more visitors in the course of the event.

The high ceilings of the new International Sidewalk Cafe will blend the aromas of many exotic meals and delicacies to eat and drink. Those who have come to the City by the Lake from virtually every part of the world have brought their recipes with them and, though primarily of peasant origin, will provide a gourmet treat for the most discriminating guest.

This year, the Philippines are being honored. In the Folk Spectacle, into which some 25 different folk dances will be enmeshed, the audience will see many colorful barrio activities which have been traditional for centuries in the multi-cultures of the Island Republic. There will be a fiesta - men wearing grotesque masks, women selling garlands, a fiesta queen. The children will play sipa (a game with a bamboo ball), and grab for the goodies on the bitan, a version of the pinata.

There will be many other ethnic dances, too - Lindjo from Croatia; squares from the USA; syrtos from Greece; plus craft exhibits from Pakistan, Egypt and Holland to mention but a few. Tickets will be available after Nov. 1 at Gimbels, the International Institute of Milwaukee, Sears, and the Journal. For additional information, contact the Institute at 2810 W. THE FOLK FOURTH ESTATE AMANEWS

Some of the more interesting folk publications are those newsletters issued by a group or organization primarily for its own circles - perhaps in the category of a "house organ", such as the AMANews, the Ghillie Callum and the NFFA Newsletter. We'll take a brief look at the first named in this issue. We have a sort of spiritual kinship for it inasmuch as it is usually rolling off of Speedcraft's presses just as we are taking "Scene" in to be printed!

AMANews has just concluded its first year - a quarterly, nicely presented, four-pager, and illustrated with photos of Aman performances and Aman-related activities. It is in these related activities that one can find much added interest, for while we are pretty well acquainted with what the ensemble does in its concerts, rehearsals, etc., there are numerous sidelights and extra-curricular events which not everyone hears about but which are worty of note, especially the reviews of such as the Performing Tree project, and activities of some current and past members in distant corners of the world. "FOLK DANCING IS FOR EVERYBODY"

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We don't know if Olympic swimming champions go in for folk dancing or not, but if they do, they'd agree that it, like milk, has something for everybody. We knew that all along, of course. Now then. For several issues, we have had an ad listing two books which are published by the MS Method of Manhattan Beach, entitled "Folk Dancing is for Everybody" and "23 Israeli Dances". We felt that perhaps we should peruse same and report our findings.

Volume I is devoted almost entirely to a new system of dance-step notation. Maybe "step" is incorrect, because it includes symbols for head movements, hand holds and positions, arms, direction, and certain stylings. It is a charting system which could be described as a danceshorthand. After you have learned the symbols, these may be coordinated with the music and read - each specified note of music will have below it a complete picture of what is to be done, and how, at that moment. Naturally, true styling and techniques must be learned from a competent instructor, but if you learn the system (and the author tells us this can be done in a weekend), you will be able to completely notate a new-to-you dance and have it in its entirety for your use in the future, whether for teaching purposes or as a reminder to yourself. Additional chapters give a background into folk dancing as well as on the birth of the MS System itself. For those who want "already notated" dances, Volume II has a collection of 23 dances from Israel, complete with melodies.

ITEMS OF INTEREST

THIS ITEM MIGHT COME under either the category of Human Interest or Hands Across the Sea, or perhaps both. You may remember that some time back, Rivka Sturman, one of Israel's most noted folk dance teachers and choreographers, taught here on the Coast and at the West Hollywood Folk Dancers' club. Later (it was in May of this year), the group held a special Rivka Sturman Night in commemoration of her 30 years of activities in teaching, and some 13 of her dances were presented and taught or reviewed. Following the event, a scroll was engraved and sent to Rivka - a testimonial for the evening, and expressing the club's thanks for all the wonderful dances she had been responsible for giving to folkdancedom. . In the course of events, as events seem to course in the way of things, Miss Sturman could not find the address of the West Hollywooders, despite looking through all her files. Luckily she had Xeroxed, or whatever they do in Israel, the letter. She sent a copy to Pearl Atkinson up in Oregon, seeking possible contact. Pearl wrote to Sheila Ruby, and Sheila supplied Ruth Oser's address as director of the club. So back across the sea to Kibbutz Ein Charod flew the information, and very soon the West Hollywood group received a most charming letter of appreciation from Rivka Sturman. Out of curiosity, we tried translating it into miles from the dispatch of the testimonial to the receipt of the reply - and came up with between 30 and 35 thousand miles!
