The Xochiquetzal Dancers come here directly from Mexico; the Royal Canadian Legion gives us Scottish pipers, dancers and drummers; Spain is by courtesy of Esparza and Sevil-

PASADENA CO-OP FESTIVAL

The annual Pasadena Co-op Folk Dance Festival will be held, just as it has been for the past many years, at the Glendale Civic Auditorium. The date is Jan. 19, and the time will be from 1:30 to 5:30 p.m. Since 1948, the Pasadena group has been the traditional host club for the first monthly festival of the calendar year. Formerly held at the Pasadena Aud, the festival moved to Glendale when a combination of high rentals and a slippery floor necessitated the change. The Glendale Civic is really easy to reach, being just a couple of hambos away from the Ventura-#134 Freeway at the Glendale Ave. off-ramp, or up Verdugo from the Eagle Rock and Glendale Freeway areas.

The dance program lists some 50-plus participation dances, and there are some exhibitions also planned. (For the list of dances, see the flyer along with this issue.) A nominal donation of 50¢ is requested to help cover the hall rental. For those individuals involved in Federation business, there will be meetings preceding the dance program. Besides the monthly business meeting of the Council as a whole, there will be a Nominating Committee meeting. This will be before the Council meeting, so it is earnestly requested that if you are involved in either or both of these gatherings, please be on time - a lot of work must be done. Pasadena Co-op's activities are always family-oriented, so don't be afraid to bring your young set along, too - you'll all enjoy your afternoon.

AMAN INSTITUTE

If you haven't already done so, please set aside the dates of Jan. 31-Feb. 2 for the 6th Annual Aman Institute, which will be held at the Croatian Hall on South Budlong in Los Angeles. This is just south of Imperial and west of Vermont, in the 11600 block. Plenty of free parking is available on the premises inside the gates.

Friday night will start with teaching, followed by a party with the Aman Orchestra. There will be teaching sessions on Saturday, both in the morning and the afternoon. Lunch and dinner will be available, as prepared by Barry Glass, master chef. There will be a singing class and, in the evening, a special session of a lecture and demonstration in Bulgarian folk music conducted by Mark Levy. Another dance party concludes Saturday evening. Sunday morning will have more teaching which will be followed by a picnic. Featured in the material to be taught



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will be dances and music from Tunisia, by Mardi Rallow, and dances from Iran. The Appalachian songs and dances which Jerry Duke showed last year (see photo) will be reviewed.

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TEACHER TRAINING SEMINAR

The Folk Dance Federation of California, South, in cooperation with the Faculty of Dance at California State University, Fullerton, will present a Teacher Training Seminar on Saturdays, Jan. 11 and 18. The hours will be from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. each day, and will be in the Ballet Studio, Room 228, Physical Education Building. The fee is \$15 per person - and an additional \$9 for one unit of University credit. This latter is optional. Registration starts at 8:30 a.m. Bring a lunch and towel.

Emphasis will be on teaching techiniques, movement and rhythmic analysis and dance folklore. There is a limited enrollment of 60, and every effort is being made to have an equal balance of women and men. Public secondary school teachers and recreational dance leaders are encouraged to attend.

The faculty includes Jerry McCulloch with Maori songs, dances and games; Bill Pillich, couple dance forms; Ruthe Pluckson and Frank Hatch, movement exploration and body awareness; and Anthony Ivancich, Balkan dances and folklore.
