#### CLUB OF THE MONTH CLUB BESEDA

Beseda traces its origin back to 1947, when a UCLA University Recreation Association club, called the International Folk Dance Club was begun by Dave Slater (now of Westwood Co-op fame), meeting on or near the UCLA campus. During the 50's, an offshoot of this club became a performance group called the Village Dancers and included Elsie Dunin and Anthony Shay. Slater, Dunin and Shay all eventually went to work with other groups in the area, and the International Folk Dance Club continued as a UCLA recreational folk dance group.

The mid 60's saw the club move to the newly-opened International Students' Center. While there, the club grew in size, and the leaders included Maria Reisch and Charles Feldman. Later, in 1973, the club returned to meeting on the UCLA campus. Then, one year ago last month, the group found a new home in the parish hall of St. Alban's Episcopal Church on Hilgard at Westholm, across from the campus. Many thanks go to the Reverend Norman Ishikazi, the staff, and the congregation of St. Alban's for providing the facilities for the group's use.

The International Folk Dance Club of UCLA changed its name in February of this year. The new name of Beseda, after a period of several weeks' suggestions taken from members, and the group vote selected this name from more than a dozen final suggestions.

Beseda is an informally-structured group with open membership. Leadership responsibilities are shared currently by Lisa Eldred, John Martins, Linda Kahn, Walter Ferrell and Joyce Belkin, with a lot of help from many of the members who play records, teach, and help where needed. Teaching is provided by a variety of local teachers - most recently, Michael Bekoff, Fred Bialy, Margit Csanky, Gary Coyne, Sam Jones, Jim and Edie Kahan, Eric Kujawsky, Roo Lester, Dave Owens, Herman Pinsky and Binki Van Zak.

Beseda's regular Friday night sessions begin with an hour of lessons and then go on for three hours of open dancing drawn primarily from request lists. Each evening includes many dances of many nationalities, and of varying degrees of difficulty/easiness. Any Friday night will find at least 60 dancers at the club and more often, more than 100. Most of the dancers range in age from mid-teens to mid-thirties, with some younger - some older. They come, not only from the UCLA campus and West Los Angeles, but also from the San Fernando Valley and as far away as Pasadena and Long Beach.

Beseda has sponsored an International Folk Dance Festival last March which featured an afternoon workshop and en evening of dancing, with music furnished by Pečurka and Westwind, and an exhibition by the UCLA Yugoslav Performing Group directed by Elsie Dunin. The club also features Saturday afternoon workshops from time to time, led by such teachers as Richard Unciano, Jim and Edie Kahan and Gary Coyne. Gary just recently taught a workshop featuring Hungarian dances on the afternoon of May 3.

There is no charge for admission on the Friday night meetings or the workshops.  $D_{\rm O}$  nations are accepted, which go for equipment, materials, special needs and band engagements. (May 16 found Pečurka playing live music for the club).

Beseda aims at providing: 1. International folk dancing, based on the dancers' requests. . . 2. instruction by various teachers, many of whom have been encouraged by Beseda to become teachers and to develop their skills by teaching in the group. . . 3. Opportunities to find out about other folk dance activities elsewhere (the latest 'Folk Dance Scene' is always available for reading - flyers for folk dance related activities may be brought to the club for display. Car pools have been organized by individuals within the group to enable members to attend events). . . . 4. A relaxed, friendly atmosphere in which to learn and enjoy folk dancing. (Many people have started their folk dancing with the Beseda group). . . 5. Work&hops for more intensive teaching than can be provided in the regular Friday night sessions. . . 6. Live music by fine folk bands on occasion. . . 7. The opportunity to share the joy of folk dancing on a non-profit basis. For example, one member of the group is starting on a list of sources of folk dance records and materials, seeking the best sources and prices available for these items.

All interested persons are invited to come on any Friday night and dance with us at Beseda. The location again, St. Alban's Episcopal Church in the Parish Hall (on such rare occasions that it is necessary to meet in an adjacent facility, there would be a notice posted to that effect) - 580 Hilgard Avenue, at Westholm, opposite the UCLA Campus, 8 p.m. to midnight. You will be most welcome.

#### VITÁME VÁS DO TÁBORA



In Tabor, there is nothing unusual about dancing to Bohemian music in the street or in Beseda Hall. Taborites eat kolaces and knedliky all the time. Pretty girls abound, and "Vitame Vas Do Tabora'" is the year round password in this small South Dakota town.

But once a year, when the rolling prairie in the James River Valley turns green, the Bohemians "put it all together" and 10,000 people join in a madness known as 'Czech Days'. Just a stone's throw from Highway 50, the banners "Vitame Vas Do Tabora" and "Welcome to Tabor." flank Lidice Street, the route of the grand parade which opens the two day festival.


It takes a full year of planning to make this festival the success that it is. Months before the opening parade, men and women of the community busy themselves with the carving and sewing of souvenirs. Kitchen lights burn for many nights just prior to the occasion while the women cook and bake the many delicacies of the old country.

The Czech-Americans are a happy people and it shows in their celebration of the memory of a country that but few of them have seen. They all take great pride in their heritage. As Mrs. Kostel, one of its very active members once said, "I wish other ethnic groups in the area could join with us some year in a grand celebration." That would be a spectacle indeed since most towns in South Dakota are made up of one ethnic group or another. Predominant among these are the Swedes, Norwegians, Germans, Dutch and Danes. Mrs. Kostel's dream would see all of these groups dressed in their national costumes and celebrating the land of their forefathers.

It is traditional for the event to be blessed with beautiful weather. The crowd gathers in Sokol Park after the parade has gone by, to honor the resident who has been selected for the year as the special leader of the community. Candidates for the Festival Queen mingle with the crowds during the two days, and the coronation, who is selected from the three finalists is one of the final events.

Dancing folk dances and polkas to the music of the Tabor Community Band and other noted groups goes on through the night. Wherever you may happen to be in town, you will hear a band nearby. Whether you prefer eating, dancing, or riding on the midway attractions - or just

will hear a band nearby. Whether you prefer eating, dancing, or riding on the midway attractions - or just walking up and down Lidice Street, the feeling of celebration is the same. The pride and the hope of the Czechs lies in their children, and the kiddies parade, featuring their colorful red and white costumes, takes place during the morning of the second day, after which comes the crowning of the 'Czech Days Crown Prince and Princess'.

You will find other celebrations by the Czechs in the miswestern parts of the country throughout the summer - in Wisconsin; and in Nebraska - in late July in the town of Dwight, and in Wilber early in August.

#### GRIFFITH PARK SPRINGTIME FESTIVAL

'When its Springtime in the Meadow, I'll be coming back to Griffith Park" - Let that be your theme song during the coming week! Yes, on Sunday June 8, the Third Annual Festival, "Springtime in the Meadow" will be held in Los Angeles - in cool, sometimes uncrowded, Griffith Park. 


#### CAL POLY POMONA

#### BALKAN WORKSHOP IN THE SIERRAS

An intensive five day residential workshop for folk music and dance enthusiasts who wish to expand their appreciation of Balkan folk culture through performance will be presented June 16 through 20 under the auspices of the University of California Extension, Santa Cruz at the Sweet's Mill Camp, east of Fresno in the woodlands of the low Sierras near Auberry, California. FOLKSTONE INTERNATIONAL FOLKLORE FESTIVAL

Sometime during the forenoon - perhaps all day, on June 21, a reverse D-Day will take place as some 200 or more folkdancers and musicians invade the Kentish shores above and below the White Cliffs of Dover and Folkstone to participate in the Eightn Annual Folkstone International Folklore Festival. Promptly at 18:00 hours (England uses the Continental time system a lot now), there will be the usual Processional outside the Civic Center for the grand opening by the Mayor. So far, it has never been rained out, and let us hope this one won't be either. Anyhow, it is the omly evening event to be held outside - each subsequent evening (except Tuesday) will be held in the Leas Cliff Hall, and there will be a Grand Farewell Barn Dance on Friday. Numerous other folklore events and exhibitions will be going on in town during the period. Countries which will have performing groups present include Austria (a team from the Salzburg area); France (Brittany); Czechoslovakia (Moravia); Spain (San Sebastian); Poland; Germany; Sweden; and of course, dancers and musicians from all over England as well as those members of the Folkstone District Dance Group who will also be in attendance. This is the first of several important folk festivals to be held this summer in Great Britain.

#### SMITHSONIAN FESTIVAL OF AMERICAN FOLKLIFE

The 1975 Festival of American Folklife will feature the traditions of seven ethnic groups in Old Ways of the New World - one of several festivals exploring the folklore of the American people. Representatives of ethnic communities across the United States will be joined by folk performers from as many as ten foreign countries in this project commemorating the Bicentennial of the United States. The first of these two events coming in the immediate present, which are part of this series under the development of the Division of the Performing Arts of the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, will be on the mall in that city, and will feature a Haflah wherein both Lebanese, both from the ethnic communities of this country and from Lebanon itself, will participate in this distinctively Lebanese-style party. The celebration will include traditional music played on the oud, bouzuk, rehab, ney and darbuka - dances such as the debka, and songs and special foods of the Levant. The fieldwork has been completed in New York, Pittsburgh, Boston, Detroit and other cities by their local Lebanese-American leaders as well as in Lebanon itself - and in this, much of the deep research was made by Tony Shay of Aman Ensemble here in Los Angeles. The week's events will be shared by the German-American communities, and, as in the case of Lebanon, leaders both here and in Germany have contributed their efforts and knowledge to present the German culture and its effects on American folklife.

Participants from as far distant as Wisconsin, Nebraska and Texas will bring their instruments and their songs and join with visitors from Germany itself in a celebration of customary activities which surround, for instance, traditional old-home German wedding celebrations.

The second session will be held July 2-6, and will feature the Italians and Japanese. We hope to have more about this by next issue's deadline. Meanwhile, groups or individuals who may wish to visit the festivals, can contact the Division of Performing Arts, "Dld Ways in a New World", Smithsonian Institution, Washington, D.C. 20569. Later on, Panama, Haiti, Mexico, the Caribbean and Africa will be explored. There will also be 'on tour' programs in which the foreign performers will participate in a tour of up to four weeks in length. We have heard that the group from Lebanon will appear in Southern California, but have had no confirmation or details at this time.

We seem to have forgotten to give the dates for the first occasion. It will be held June 25 through June 29, 1975. The location, the National Mall in Washington, D.C.

#### SANTA MONICA CENTENNIAL SQUARE DANCE



Santa Monica, the city which hosted the world's largest square dance ever back in 1950 at the time of its Diamond Jubilee will again become the square dance capital of the world when it holds a Centennial Square and Round Dance in the Civic Auditorium on May 30, and an outdoor event the following night, Saturday May 31, which will stretch along four blocks of Ocean Avenue, from Wilshire to Colorado. Although this is an end-of-May event, we think that 'Scene' will reach many of its readers in time for them to plan to take this big "do" in.

Featuring some of the top callers, it will get under way Saturday at 8 p.m. and continue until midnight. The full four blocks will be roped off and converted into one giant dance floor, and the sidewalk area on both sides will be reserved

for non-dancing spectators. The dance is free to dancers and spectators alike. Some of the square callers will be Osa Mathews, Herb Lasher, Glen Story and Lee Schmidt. Round dance leaders are Mr. and Mrs. Cohen, Merle Cramlet and Gerry Boswell, all of Los Angeles. An elaborate sound system is to be set up so that no matter where you may be, you will be able to hear the music and caller and dance with no problems.

Masters-of-ceremonies will be Mr. and Mrs. Harry Caruthers of Newhall and Mr. and Mrs. Bob Osgood of Beverly Hills. It will be preceeded by a barbecue, fashion show, and other entertainment at the Auditorium, 4 to 7 p.m. Mrs. Osgood will narrate at the fashion show. The tickets for the auditorium events are available at the Centennial office, 200 Santa Monica Blvd. in Santa Monica. A big turn out is expected for all programs, and hopes are that the attendance at the street dance will exceed the estimated 18,500 people who attended the 1950 event. After all, one doesn't often get a chance to attend a city's centennial square dance, and probabilities that most of us won't have a chance to attend the next one in 2075 A.D.!

For those of you who were there, you will remember the Diamond Jubilee square dance (and the other dance related activities in Santa Monica's big celebration that month) was a tremendous affair. When I asked, "Howcome another jubilee so soon?" I was gently reminded that a whole quarter century had passed by, and horrors, 'twas the truth'. At that time, a coalition of the great square dance associations of Southern California, along with the Chamber and the Department of Recreation - Mr. Bright was an avid folk dancer at the time - brought off this massive meeting with an amazing success. Dignitaries and famous callers from all over were participating in the Santa Monica Jubilee. There was a Folk Dance Festival, a Spanish Days Fiesta, and - the Square Dance. Governor Earl Warren came down especially to inaugurate the evening's activity, along with Mrs. Warren and daughter (don't remember which one); Leo Carrillo, the city's most famous son also welcomed the dancers in one of the world's briefest speeches, saying that he'd rather watch the folks enjoying themselves dance than talk; Ferde Grofe was there (afterwards we met at "Sweet Sixteen" and ruminated over whether 'on the Trail' would make a good round dance theme). There were also such greats, alas, no longer among us, as Jim York, Carl Myles, Ray Shaw, and his famous brother who flew in from Colorado Springs to call a tip, Lloyd "Pappy" Shaw. Bob Osgood, then as now, was master-of-ceremonies. Other callers included Doc Alambaugh, Earl Pechin, Arnie Kronenberger, Bill Mooney, Ralph Maxheimer, Fenton Jones, Ed Gilmore, Jack Hoheisal and about 20 more. Perhaps some of these grand fellows are not among us now either - I do not know! Bruce Johnson we believe was undergoing his "baptism of fire" in a major square event - until then, he had been a co-founder of Gandy's. (Gandys, Glendale and Silverado all had crack square dancing sets in their membership and were strong in attendance). Osmyn Stout (Marge was one of the callers, too) went on to become president of the Folk Dance Federation, Southern Section. The evening closed with everyone doing the "Black Hawk Waltz" (some of the more daring ones tried the somewhat new "Betty Black Hawk" for variety, and then - suddenly, everything was quiet again as everybody left for their homes, their cars, buses, Red Cars, leaving a remarkable clean, debris-free arena alone to the seagulls.

It was a night to remember. Make May 31, 1975 one that you will remember too! This is a new one with a very qualific David of Romania; Ingvar Sodal, Norweg





PREVENCION MAGAZINE, in its latest issue, took time out to tell about the benefits of folk dancing from a standpoint of health. I had heard that there was to be an article, but have not seen it yet, nor was even aware that it was out until suddenly one day, early in May, the phone started ringing and then the mail came. In the two weeks since its appearance, there have been over fifty inquiries about folk dancimg. We have referred these inquirers to almost every beginners' class in the area - and some to more advanced classes because they had had previous experience and the story reactivated their interest. In addition, there have been letters from such diverse points as Portland, New Jersey, Arkansas, Milwaukee, Ohio (several), Texas and New York. One lady was so interested that she spent almost three quarters of an hour calling long distance from Phoenix! What with the Home, two Sunsets, Westways, and now, the Pr vention story on folk dancing, a great deal of interest has been kindled over these past eighteen months - and kept the Federation 'phone and this typewriter mighty busy!

AN IDEA FOR OUR COVERS was advanced by 'Scene' art director, Walt Metcalf. 





X101.2 or X439 Music

An intensive five-day residential workshop for folk music enthusiasts who wish to expand their appreciation of Balkan folk culture through performance. Guest lecturers and musicians will provide guided participation in music, song and dance.

Students may receive individual instruction in playing the following Bulgarian folk instruments: gaida (bagpipe), Kaval (flute), gadulka (fiddle), tambura (guitar family) and tapan (drum).
