CLUB OF THE MONTH

STARRKING FOLK DANCERS

In December, 1972, a new 'Starr' was born - the Starr King Folk Dancers. In September of that year, Ralph Miller, chairman of the Folk Dance Federation South Beginners' Committee started a beginners' class at the Thomas Starr King Junior High School in the East Hollywood area. At the end of the thirteen-week period of instruction, the members of the class decided that they wanted to continue dancing on Friday nights and together, and thereupon voted to become a full fledged folk dance club, which would be under the direction of Ralph, and with the assistance of Elsa Miller. This is how the Starr King Folk Dancers were formed. The members of the club were so enthusiastic about folk dancing and of their club that they host/hostessed their first folk dance festival the next fall at the civic auditorium in Glendale.

Every year, when the school closes its buildings for floor refinishing, the Starr King dancers continue to meet - outdoors under the 'starrs' and end up with a put luck dinner on one of the occasions. Everybody is always welcome - to these and also their weekly dances which are at the gumnasium of the school, 4201 Fountain Avenue. (You would enter from the rear off Sunset Drive). Hours are from 7 to 10 p.m., with the first hour given over to beginner level teaching, followed by regular dancing and instruction.

On July 25 of this year, there was a very special night (see elsewhere in this issue of 'Scene'. It was a surprise party, hostessed by Virginia Saar, honoring Ralph and Elsa on their 50th wedding anniversary. It was a memorable evening with a surprise visit from their son Wayne and his family and over seventy five friends joining in to congratulate them and share in the beautifully decorated Anniversary Cake. Sheila Ruby, Federation South President presented the Millers with a certificate of appreciation.

The success of the Starr King Folk Dancers is an example of what may be accomplished when a group of people who, meeting together to study - in this case, folk dancing - find enjoyment in each others' company and with their leaders, and discover that they wish to continue that friendship and pleasure, even after the original reason for gathering has ceased to exist. Now, though no longer beginners themselves, the Starr King Dancers welcome other beginners to their weekly dance sessions.

* * * * * * MUSEUMS-FOLK ARTS

This is a new section of 'Scene' for those interested in the arts related to folk dancing and the folk arts around the world. It was suggested to us at a festival some time back, and upon looking over things, there certainly is a wealth of material always being offered for view. Primarily, this will relate to events of interest to the Southwestern area, but other interesting displays will be noted as we hear of them. Meanwhile, we hope that this column will eventually be handled by the very knowledgable person who suggested it to us.

FROM THE LAND OF THE SCYTHIANS is at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, 5905 Wilshire Blvd. in Hancock Park. It is a display of the ancient treasures of the Scythians, a tribe that inhabited the vast area from the Danube to Central Asia, concentrating north of, and along the coast of the Black and Caspian Seas, beyond the dawn of recorded history and until the early days of the Christian epoch. On loan from the U.S.S.R., it consists of over 200 objects of art, in gold, silver, wood, iron, leather, felt and other materials. They are exquisitely wrought and some of the goldsmithing is so miniscule that it is indeed difficult to imagine how it was done with tools of the day, although some was created by Greek slave artisans. Most of the objects were discovered, buried with the chiefs of this warlike, nomadic people, and remarkable preserved (in the case of the perishable items) by the stern Russian snows. The show started in early August, but it runs through September 4 so there is still time to view this very unusual collection of ancient folk art.

SOUTHWEST MUSEUM, 234 Museum Drive in Highland Park area of Los Angeles is close to Figueroa, just off Sycamore Park area. There is a continuing display of American Indian prehistoric arts and crafts, costumes and other related materials - primarily of the southwestern part of the country. Open Tuesdays through Sundays, 1 1-4:45 p.m.

HEBREW UNION COLLEGE SKIRBALL MUSEUM at 32nd and Hoover in Los Angeles has an exhibit of illuminated/illustrated Haggadahs dating from the middle ages to the present. On display until September 28. Closed Mondays and Saturdays.

SPECIAL EVENTS

SAN PEDRO JUBILEE FESTIVAL

The Los Angeles Department of Recreation and Parks, through its Harbor District, will offer an International Jubilee, representing the many ethnic groups who have worked together to help build the city, and will show the dances, music, songs, oostumes, arts, crafts and the foods of these many cultures. The dates are September 20 and 21, and it will be held in Peck Park, San Pedro. The hours are from 1 p.m. until dark for the stage performances both days, and there will be a fireworks display on Saturday night about 9:15 p.m.

Signed up to appear, as of the end of August, are groups representing the Ukraine, Guam, Sweden, Russia, Mexico, China and Samoa, as well as the United States. Stage plays from Russia and France will be seen in the auditorium in the evenings - put on by the T.A.P.L.A. During the daytime, the building will be the scene of displays of arts and handcrafts. Meanwhile, booths outside will feature food from approximately 20 different lands.

The children's center has a baby elephant, a pet lion, and a bump-car ride to keep the kids happy. It will be a fine weekend for the price is right - free, no charge for any of the entertainment except the kiddy-rides. The food and artifacts will be on sale, too.

Take the Harbor Freeway south almost to the end, at Gaffey. Exit and turn left on Gaffey, then right at First, until you get to Western. Right again to Crestwood, then one more right takes you right into the parking area.

B. Y. U. INTERNATIONAL FESTIVAL

Brigham Young University is presenting its first International Folk Dance Festival concert September 4-6 at Marriott Center, BYU in Provo, Utah, with nightly performances at 8 p.m. This will be BYU's Centennial salute to international friendship when over 200 dancers from around the world gather for some outstanding performances of folk dancing.

Thursday evening will be a salute to Israel. While the spectators will see all nations performing nightly, the spotlight for this occasion is turned to the colorful Haifa Municipality Folk Dance Group, which will perform dances going back into ancient tradition of the time of King David, dances of the Jews of Bokhara, and of the Druses of Djebel and debkas of the Arabs. In addition, the Polynesian Dance Ensemble of Laie, Hawaii, will dance the Samoan Fire spectacular, the Warrior's Dance from Tonga, and Tamure, a love dance from Tahiti.

Friday is Poland's night, when the award-winning Folk Dance Ensemble of the University of Marie Curie-Sklodowska from Lublin, Poland will be starred. This is one of Eastern Europe's top performing groups, highly acclaimed in the European press. The other troupes will be dancing Friday night also.

Japan becomes the center of interest on Saturday. A superb exhibition by the Ensemble of Japanese Folklore Association will feature the brazen movements of Samurai warriors in a dance that is the delight of the group. The organization is essentially the creation of Eili Yamasaki, a warm and personable folklorist and philantrophist who had a compelling desire to promote world friendship through the medium of folk dance and folk music. The host group, the Brigham Young University International Dancers will perform some of their vast repertoire. Founded in 1965 by Mary Bee Jensen, the BYU's are one of the most talented and prominent folk ensembles in the United States and has made numerous goodwill tours abroad. The University has a student enrollment from nearly 70 nations, and over 650 students participate in its performing and instructional divisions.

Marriott Center is located at BYU in Provo, and for ticket information, the telephone is (801) 375-8888. You just don't get the best seats in the theatre to see a performance of this quality for \$3.50 any more - except in this case - and organized groups and the BYU Student activity people pay even less!

KPFK FESTIVAL

It's hard to believe that five years have passed since that first Folk Festival and Ethnic Bazaar produced by Mario Casetta for the benefit of non-commercial, listener-sponsored radio KPFK (90.7 fm), but it is that time again and there is a big three-day event, Friday thru Sunday September 19-21 at the Pasadena Center, 300 East Green Street in Pasadena, California.

Opening at 6 p.m. on Friday evening with an exciting Greek Glendi, the evening features bouzoukee bands, instruction in Greek dancing by Louise Bilman, and special guest appearances by the Gandy Dancers, Aleko and the Greek Group, and other highlights.

KPFK FESTIVAL, Con't.

Saturday, entitled "Many Worlds", runs from noon until 1 a.m. and features, among many others, the exciting new group, Bessarabia, directed by Mihai and Alexandru David, the Croatian Tamburitzans, the Hungarian Kaloćsa and the Fiesta Mexicana Junior. Other activities will include two performances by the Tahitian Otea group, and an on-the-spot wedding from the ranks of Pečurka when Bob Atwood, the director will marry Barbara Deutsch, and the rites will be conducted by KPFK's Herschel Lymon of "Come To Life".

On Sunday, from noon to 10 p.m., all the stops will be pulled as KPFK presents its first Israeli Festival with the famous Israeli recording star, Dody Tal. Also featured will be the Aman Folk Ensemble in a suite of North African dances, the Hadarim Ensemble, Nirkoda, The Mishpoche, and Ami and Meshe.

Arts and crafts from around the world, genuine ethnic food (Greek, Persian, Israeli, etc.) and beer and wine will be featured daily. So will folk dance inatruction, including some new dances Mario will be bringing back from Serbia and Greece. Daily adult admission is \$2.50 and kids, $50 \rlap/e$. There is an advance-sale package of \$5 (\$1 for the youngsters). This is for the entire event. Send your check to - Festival, KPFK, Universal City, CA 91608.

A Fandango, an early Californian rancho fiesta, is planned by the Well-Wishers as a fund-raising benefit for Sunday October 12. This will be in connection with, and presenting the new material of the Aman Folk Ensemble. With many hours of planning and hard work done, and yet still much to do as we write, this promises to be one of the most exciting events of the Bicentennial season. The day's events start at 2:30 p.m. and continue well into the evening. Among the activities planned will be the premiere performance of a suite of early Californian dances of the Rancho period - circa 1835-40. This presentation and the production number have been designated as an official project by the Los Angeles Bicentennial Committee.

There will be available, true and authentic food of the era, lavishly catered and prepared - barbequed beef, sweet tortillas, etc. such as one might find at a fandango on one of the ranchos along the Alta California coast. No, no avocados, for they didn't appear for another forty years. An Enramada will be built - a type of arbor structure such as would have been used for a traditional fandango, and this will be used for the performance of the contradanzas afterwards. One of the contras, 'La Contradanza' will be taught. Attendees will be guests at the affair, not merely onlookers. The cost is \$12.50 per person, and half-price for children under 12. A tour of the historic premises is included in the admission.

All of this takes place at the historic old Leonis Adobe in Calabasas - a beautifully restored home of Miguel Leonis and his wife, Espiritu - the first Cultural Landmark of the City of Los Angeles. Leonis was a Basque who rose in prominence to the stature of "King of the Calabasas". If you have an early Californian costume, why not come dressed for the occasion and become part of the whole picture. The San Diego State University Folk Dance Conference will present another of its great afterparties again this fall. The date set is September 20 and will be at a new location - this time, at the West Hollywood Playground, 647 San Vicente Blvd., West Hollywood - home of the Peasants and the West Hollywood Dancers (that's thrown in for a plug, amici!). It will be jointly sponsored by the SDSUFDC Committee and the Folk Dance Federation of California, South Inc. Each year, following the camp, an after-party-festival has been held. This year, it will include a teaching institute and, preceding that, a morning Federation Council meeting.

The dance program in the evening, starting at 7:30, will feature many popular dances already known plus some from the Conference itself which will have been taught earlier in the day. At that time, the institute, which begins at 1:30 p.m., will feature instruction in some of the most popular dances from San Diego itself, retaught by those leaders who have been there and learned from the original sources. This will enable anyone attending the institute to get some quality instruction in the more popular dances which will soon be appearing on the scene here. Institute admission is \$2.00, and this includes the syllabus. Your donation to the evening's festivities is \$1.00. Come and enjoy dancing on the excellent floor of West Hollywood's favorite dance spa. The institute teachers are to be Maria Reisch and Dick Crum, who will be teaching, as we said, camp dances, - names unknown at this moment.

SPECIAL EVENTS, Con't.

THE UCLA FINE ARTS PRODUCTIONS will present the Chinese Acrobats of Taiwan at Royce Hall on September 9 to 14 in several matinee and evening performances. The program encompasses a medley of intricate ribbon dances, tumblers, kung-fu, juggling acts and levitation, all in costume. This the group's debut in the United States.

BALLET AZTIAN DE MEXICO, the 'other' big national dance group from south of the border, will appear at the Ahmanson Theatre during Mexico Independence week, September 15 to 20. Dances from various areas of Mexico will be programmed - Jalisco, Yucatan, Xochipitzahuatl, Vera Cruz, Sonora, etc. In the Los Angeles Music Center.

WEST VALLEY FOLK DANCERS will present their first annual Federation monthly festival at Taft High School, just off the freeway in Woodland Hills, October 19. The theme will be "Autumn in the Valley" - watch for a flyer complete with the program in next issue.

THEBROADWAY DEPARTMENT STORES will sponsor a major fund-raising party for the benefit of over 75 chapters of the American Field Service located in Southern California. This gala will be held on October 11 in the Broadway Plaza store, downtown Los Angeles, in connection with a two-week import program promotion. Folk dancing and folk musical entertainment will be featured on all three floors of the store during the party which will be in the evening. Over 75,000 families and students have participated in AFS programs in some 60 nations and all 50 of the United States.

SANTA MONICA AIRPORT will be the scene of an international fiesta October 10-12, with a preview on October 9 at evening. This is in triple celebration of the nation's Bicentennial, Santa Monica City's Centennial and the airport's Quinquagennial. Admission will be free and there will be demonstrations by many dance groups, booths displaying ethnic arts and crafts and foods. Sigi Rodman is in charge of the dance and music department, along with his Continental Orchestra. If your group has not been contacted yet, either because it is new or Mr. Rodman has been unable to locate the proper contact person, please contact him at (213) 662-8368. He was in charge of the Oktoberfest in the Valley last year and another big turnout is expected here, too.

THE AMAN FOLK ENSEMBLE will be in concert on September 26 at California State Fullerton. It is open to the public and will feature the entire group. For ticket information, you might contact the Office of Student Affairs, CSU Fullerton in that city.

PASADENA'S VILLA PARKE FOLK DANCE INSTITUTE AND FESTIVAL - that's the title of a new festival, co-sponsored by the Pasadena Department of Recreation and the Pasadena Folk Dance Co-op, which will be held at Villa Parke Recreation Center on October 4, noon to midnight. It will include workshops in the afternoon and dancing and exhibitions in the evening. More info next month, but in the meantime, contact Lauri Fiedler at the Recreation Dept., 1501 E. This year, it will be over the Columbus Day weekend, October 10-12. 





RECORDS & BOOKS IN REVIEW

Westwind International has come out with its first album of 'Dances of Europe' - WI-3331, played by the orchestra of the Westwind International Folk Ensemble under the direction of Anthony Ivancić. Recording engineer is David Grove. Many of you have seen and heard Westwind, and know the musicians involved, so are quite aware that their live performance is excellent. Well, so is the recording - and it is quite interesting to follow the musicians across Europe with the 16-page handbook included, as your guide. You will read about the origin of the dances and see the pictures of some quite unusual musical instruments. Starting with three dances from England, we proceed to Belgium for suites of Flemish and Walloon dances; thence to Spanish Estramadura in the Badajoz region for three more. We flip for some Slovenian dances which represent Jugoslavia, including a very defenite 'varsouvienne'. Next move is back to thePyrenees for a series of Basque dances, which include the 'Fandango' and 'Arin-Arin'. The final two are dances from the Auvergne in France. All lovely material. It is to be hoped that Anthony will have dance descriptions for these before long - perhaps even an institute.


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The other records heard are also under a new label - "Folkdance Underground". F.U.l is an album of 15 re-recordings of dances that are, according the the sleeve, in public domain - examples for instance, 'Bavno Oro', 'Arkan', 'Gypsy Wine', 'Lesnoto', 'Scandinavian Polka', 'Dobrudjanska Reka'. The engineering quality is good and made from fresh and clean originals properly monitored and filtered. The complete selection is a good mix, even for a festival. It comes in a 'plain white wrapper' - an unadorned jacket in the interests of economy, and the album notes are rather interesting although you may not be in full agreement with what is said. The second album, F.U.2 follows right on the heels of the first and is also a series of re-recordings. As the producer states on the jacket notes, the 16 dances are "of the endangered species" - i.e., either never produced on American labels or in the case of those which had been, are no longer obtainable. Examples are 'Sayenu', 'Vossarul', 'Narodno Oro', 'Le Bal de Jugon', 'Bumps-a-daisy'. The source of each has been duly noted and credits given. The final paragraph on this album states "...Folkdance Underground is a non-profit, non-organization dedicated to the people who dance. If you pay more than \$2.00 for this album, you are being ripped off. Happy dancing!!!!". (You can't buy yachts at that rate!)

THE NORTHWEST FOLKDANCER

The Northwest Folkdancer is published monthly except in June by the Northwest Folkdancers, Inc. Members receive it as part of their dues, and other interested parties may subscribe at the rate of \$2.00 per year. It is mimeographed on electronic stencil of both sides of the pages in typescript, same format and size as 'Scene', and has quite a long list of names on its staff. Michele Anciaux is the Editor-in-Chief, and the rest all have some section to be responsible for - features, calendar, circulation, membership, cuisine, etc. Our recent copies have interviews with Glenn Bannerman and Atanas Kolarovski, sketches on life in Russia by a travelling correspondent who was born over there; interesting menu ideas, dance notes, etc.; a calendar of northwest events and several reports of club activities. I can't begin to imagine how the Northwest Folkdancer can be produced and mailed for such a small sum - it seems the postage and paper alone would exceed that much. ETHNIC AFFAIRS OF EUROPEAN BACKGROUND, featuring dancing in part which are coming up in the thither and you parts of this country during September and October include the Bethel College Fall Festival of German and Swiss folk arts, music and crafts in North Newton, Kansas October 10-12, and the Svensk Hyllningsfest of Lindsborg, also in Kansas, the next weekend, October 17-18, which has something of everything - dances, costumes and other aspects of Swedish folklife - including a big smorgasbord. Free - except the smorgasbord.

THE THIRD BORDER FESTIVAL will be at Chamizal National Memorial in El Paso, October 3-5 and will feature American, Indian and Mexican folklore and arts. It is an NFFA-CNM sponsored activity.

THE SEATTLE PERFORMING ARTS will have as part of its expanded ethnic residency program, one featuring Yves Moreau, October 21-26. It will run four nights, Tuesday-Friday with a master class, as well as a weekend festival with several workshops, folklore lectures, films and a party. THE CRAFTSMAN'S FAIR of the Southern Highlands will have its second session of the year - this time in Gatlinburg, Tennessee, October 21-25. It is an ideal spot for a fall vacation. The town lies at the foot of the Smokies, near the North Carolina border. A small town, but it can and does accomodate up to 20,000 visitors because of the large number of facilities. During the Fair, the site is the city auditorium - the autummal colors will move right into the building and be seen in the stitchery and pottery, the browns of the leather, the colors of the batik and block prints - of the cornhusk dolls, wools dyed from the juices of the pokeberry, from pine needles and various barks. Fiddle music and mountain dancing will make you feel at home, and you should be thoroughly relaxed yet refreshed at this event among the performers and producers of traditional American music-dance art and crafts.



CALLERLAB, the International Association of Square Dance Callers is still young but has accomplished/ or is in the process of accomplishing many steps forward for square dance activity. Some achieved to date include the establishment of a clearinghouse to screen all new movements, which researches and recommends on a quarterly basis, any two (or one or maybe no) movements felt worthy of being used in mainstream dancing. It is composed of a group of responsible caller/leaders and tests many movements each year before making its selections. The goal of the Committee has been to cut down significantly on the over-abundance of new and often awkward or non-descriptive movements that have been flooding the square dance activity in recent years. Apparently the project is accomplishing its goals because dancers from many parts of the square dance world have expressed their relief that such a significant step has been taken.

THE AUSTRALIAN-AMERICAN ASSOCIATION is sponsoring a month-long Festival in celebration of the American Bicentennial, March 26-April 24, and there will be a special square dance program, series of tours and convention. There will be a special Convention Festival in the auditorium in Sydney, New South Wales at which the American visitors as well as the host groups of the N.S.W. Square Dance Association will demonstrate, and later, a visit to the National Convention in Hobart, Tasmania. This is recognized as an official Bicentennial event by the American Bicentennial Commission and bears the approved seal.



FEATURE ARTICLES

WHERE HAVE THE BUNTE TÄNZE GONE?

Once upon a time, many years ago, like twenty five or more, there were a lot of very popular dances done in California. They had come to this country from their homelands over a period of nearly 300 years - from Westfalen, Silesia, the Schwar wald, Rheinland, Hesse, and other states, duchies, landgraves and kingdoms of the German confederations, and were danced by the early settlers, first in Pennsylvania, in North Carolina, then in New York, Wisconsin, the Midwest and the Plains. Until the 'international folkdancer types' began doing them in the mid-1940's, they remained with these immigrants and their descendants - except for those few occasions where they were taught in schools as recreational subjects.

These dances were the "Bunte Tänze" - quadrilles which usually were composed of several figures interspersed with one or more choruses. Some of our more popular square dance patterns may be traced directly to these dances, where they were observed and incorporated, especially in the midwestern and western parts of this country. The term "Bunte" refers to the kaliedoscopic colors of the costumes rather than to the fact that they had a certain pattern. However, the generalization was convenient and it stuck.

It was probably in 1946 - it may have been earlier in Northern California - that the first of these, 'Windmueller' became a very popular dance in the Southland. There was no commercial record available, but the Pasadena Co-op, Hollywood Peasanta and Westwood danced it regularly and one of their members made a 'cut' from sheet music score and this was used until the commercial record came out, on Imperial Records. 'Drosselnest' was another that was often danced. In the summer of 1949, the International Dance Circle introduced a new dance at a summer festival - 'Der Wolgaster' and soon, everybody was doing it. During that year and the next two or three, the IDC introduced several additional German group dances, under the direction of Paul Erfer. When the Folkdancer Records came out with a new album, 'Puttjenter' and 'Mein Mann ist Gefahren ins Heu' began to be danced. Others, such as 'Sunrose' and 'I Have Lost My Stocking' didn't make the grade. About the same time, after a visit to San Francisco, members of the Gandys brought back the 'Schüddelbüx' which became very popular for a time. It was in 1953 that Paul and Gretel Dunsing came to Stockton, then to Los Angeles with their delightful dances. 'Achtouriger mit Walzer' took hold, but 'Jaegers Quadrille' didn't.

About this time, however, the interest began to wane, and quite rapidly, too. The German couple dances remained - though not so popular as previously, and a few clubs retained 'Windmueller' and 'Wolgaster' in their repertiores for some time. A revised sequence of 'Schuddelbux' to fit a new recording created confusion and the ultimate demise of that one. One place where you could still see 'Puttjenter' and 'Man in the Hay' ('Mein Mann etc.') was at the Happy Valley School and the Ojai Folk Dancers quite regularly. The old 'War Horses" of the Bavarian region, the Schuhplattlers, 'At the Inn', 'Senftenberger' and such couple dances rolled merrily along, but the only new quadrille that was introduced - and has survived magnificiently, was the Dunsing's 'Sauerlander Quadrille'. During the past fifteen years, it has been rare indeed that any of the old 'Bunte Tänz' have been taught at clubs - and even rarer that they have appeared on festival programs in Southern California.

We cannot help but notice that there is a direct relationship between the decline of the quadrilles of Germany and the increase of the 'kolo' - (a sort of generic name nowadays for all line dances = 'kolo hour'!) Is it because the one demands that a group of eight people work in concert with each other while the other gives a dancer an opportunity to 'shine' at his own thing? A multitude of sins can be masked in a line dance under the guise of "variations" but a big mistake or a bad dancer in a set dance stands out like a - well, a bad dancer. Yet, this cannot be - for some of the most popular dances of recent years have been the Scottish dances - and they certainly call for group cooperation and precision. Perhaps we need a German Stewart Smith or Andor to reintroduce us to some 'Hobelbank', 'Schneidertanz' or 'Dunkelschatten'. How about it, camp directors?

* * * * * * * * SONGS WE DANCE TO

The fishermen of Monchgüter on the East German Baltic island of Rügen wear very voluminous white trausers, or "bux" which they flutter or "shuddel" at their corners or partners during the dance 'Schuddelbux'. The traditional words (in part) below however do not appear on either of our dance records.

Schüddel, schüddel, schüddel de Bûx Nich to langsam, nich to fix Sühst du, so so, geiht dat an, Un nu fröjt sich Fru an Mann. Schüddel, schüddel, schüddel de Büx Ohne Schüddeln is dat nix Nu. min Dirning is't to End Alles klappt nu in de Händ.

Shake, shake, shake the trousers, Not too slowly but not too fast; Look here you, so? Yes, that's fine And so all the men and women say, "Good"! Shake, shake, shake the trousers. Without the shaking, it means nothing. And now my dear lass, this is the end; Everybody will now clap his hands.
