CLUB OF THE MONTH & PLEASE MEET!

THE EIGHT TO EIGHTY FOLK DANCERS....AND THE CALSBEEKS.

As is our Marchly wont, we head north to the Sacramento Council, where each year at this time, the world famous Camellia Festival transpires. There is a slight difference however on this occasion because we not only slip across the border into the Silver State of Nevada, but co-feature our "please meet" personalities along with it. This Nevadan club is not only a very active part of the Sacramento Council and the Federation, but the Calsbeek family is likewise a very active part of Nevadan international folk dancing and folklore, so rather than attempt to seperate the Calsbeeks, the Eight to Eighty Club, and their relation to the Sacramento Council and Federation, we've put the whole story into one. (The Camellia Festival is to be found under our "special events" for March.)

Harriet and Al Calsbeek have been active in dancing or related activities all of their lives and are devoting a large share of their time and interest to keep folk dancing "alive and kicking" in Northern Nevada. Harriet (Fonda) started formal tap and ballet lessons at the age of six, and as a teen-agers, moved into the realm of recreational leadership, in the 4-H program, and received training in the organization and teaching of games, folk and square dancing and folk singing and continued this in classes and extra-curricular ways during her years at Cornell (as well as classes in modern dance and attendance at a Martha Graham concert as well). Following graduation, she used this training to enrich the 4-H programs in several counties in New Mexico, and was a member of a square dance club in one. As a graduate student at Oklahoma State, she joined a square-and-round dance club for single adults, then the next move was to Penn State as a staff member where she was a member of the folk dance club there led by the Shephards. It was the next move, to Reno, Nevada, where, after joining a folk and square dance club, she met Al Calsbeek who asked for a date and Harriet suggested they attend the Moonlight Festival at Feather River Camp. (And this was the start of a tradition that has been broken only once since their marriage).

After Feather River Camp added the von Konskys as the folk dance instructors some years ago, the Calsbeeks began attending for the entire week each year, taking along their records and equipment and assisting Millie and Von' in various ways

Al's experience began with roller-skating on Iowa rinks where he became professional in rink-work at the venerable age of 9, and he maintained his interest in this through his years as a student and as a military man - becoming proficient at skate dances and pageants featuring his students. He learned to square dance during neighborhood barn dances in Iowa and after arriving in Reno, became active as a caller and as president of one of the largest groups in the Silver State. Working together after their marriage, they directed a roller-skating program for young people, pre-schoolers through late teens, and within theor church group's junior high youngsters. There was a spin-off from this which they called the "squareskaters", a group which performed square dances on roller skates. They were also active in the Near andFar Folk Dance Club for a dozen years as officers and instructors, but that club disbanded in 1969, having discontinued offering beginner lessons.

Harriet and Al had been running a "workshop" in the interim to fill the gap, and later in 1969, decided to form a new club. This new group was called the Eight to Eighty Folk Dancers to indicate the difference in approach from the old club. It has a few "survivors" from the old group and many beginners. The Eight to Eighty Folk Dance Club meets every Friday evening and is open to people of any age, with or without dance experience. A frequent sight is a circle consisting of perhaps two or three grade school youngsters, several teen-agers, some young adults, and the aforementioned "survivors" of the old club. Some of these are defenitely in the senior citizen bracket now. The number present is not usually very large and often there may be a ratio of one man to two women, but sometimes the unexpected happens and the men well outnumber the girls. The Eight to Eighty group has expanded and similar sessions have been given as programs of the Recreation Departments of Carson City, Incline Village and Tahoe City. Other members of the club often go along to assist Al and Harriet.

The club holds an annual Holiday Party between Christmas and New Years featuring a buffet supper, punch "with" and "without" wine, and dancing. Summer schedules usually include less frequent meetings but have picnics and other outings. Special events include folk dance demon-strations at various civic events, one night stand parties for church socials, and various ethnic celebrations.

A third member of the Calsbeek team is son Don who started attending classes at 3 months à la car-bed, and who rode Al's shoulders through many circles of 'Doudlebska' as a toddler. Early dance skills enabled him to overcome coordination problems resulting from illness and now, a high school junior over six feet tall, is a living testemonial of how folk dancing can contribute to confidence and maturity. With the senior members of the family less able to do the most vigorous dances, Don is responsible for teaching those dances requiring such as plattles and Balkan gyrations.

Currently, Harriet, with Don assisting, is giving an in-service teacher-training course for the Washoe County School District - "A Nation of Nations in Folk Dance for the Bicentennial", based on the six eras of U.S. history, to a class of 45. Last year was based on Folk Dance and Social Studies. The family is much involved in the Bicentennial, and Harriet is Festival co-ordinator for the City of Sparks observance (see last month's "Scene" for story on the warm-up party and observances). The Folklore Festival set for Sparks High School in April will be an enlargement of the warm-up event, with sales of ethnic foods and crafts, costume and heirloom exhibitions and performances of many of the nationality groups which, despite the relatively small population of the Reno area, the ethnic groups are legion and the Calsbeeks are well known to many of them. The Folk Dance Federation, North, and the many unattached dancers of Balkan and line type dances will be taking part in this festival (watch next "Scene" for this). Another upcoming Nevada Bicentennial event will be in July. The Silver State Square Dance Festival, one of the largest in the country and one in which Al and Harriet as well as other square dance inclined members of the Eight to Eighty are involved (Al was once chairman) will have a Bicentennial theme in 1976.

Other activities include building a collection of color slides and photos of dance and festival events, service on the Federation costume research committee, crration of a folk dance library, etc., dance research while attending Stockton naturally, and another aspect especially - the use of folk dancing for groups with some form of physical disavility - the monthly party at the Nevada State Mental Health Institute for several years; weekly programs for children in treatment plans at the Easter Seal Center, and programs over the years including dance teaching for mentally retarded adults, a summer camp for young blind people, the sheltered workshop, and other situations of comparable nature which involved folk dance and its related forms of music and exercise as part of a therapeutic solution. . . . We are glad to see that folk dancing is alive and robustly healthy along with the Calsbeeks, the Eight to Eighty Club, the ethnic communities, and in the minds of the civic and cultural leaders of Northern Nevada!

FEDERATION IN FOCUS

In March, 1946, the previously rained-out festival was held with Westwood Co-op hosting, and the second organizational meeting of the Folk Dance Federation, Southern Section was held. Walter Grothe and Henry Koopman from the Federation (North) attended to give assistance and information. Tex Carter was acting president, and during the festival at which 181 dancers signed in (many more danced though, and over 300 watched from the side-lines, Bing Chin took pictures and Willard Tidwell took many color slides. Seven groups were represented, including the Hollywood Peasants, the Westwood Co-op, the Pasadena Cooperative Folk Dancers and the Whittier group. And that's the way it was, thirty years ago this month!

COMING UP - an updated list of couttesies in folk dancing which has been requested by several groups and individuals which is felt would be of a benefit to clubs and dancers, new to the scene, who may be unaware of certain things which are done or not done, as well as older ones who have perhaps forgotten. It will be available through your club delegate and the minutes, as well as possible inclusion in an issue or issues of Folk Dance Scene.

ARCHIVES had its 'finalizing' meeting and the situation is practically "go" for the presentation of the Federation Library collection of memorabilia to UCLA in April on our anniversary date. The supplementary and/or duplicate collection which will be considered the Federation's own archives will be in custody of the respective committee thus San Diego Conference, Research and Standardization, Folk Dance Scene, the Historian, etc. will all have their respective material for record and research purposes, leaving the UCLA prime collection undisturbed. Several items are still needed however, and these include the Idyllwild Conference syllabi for 1958, 1962, 1965, 1968, 1970, 1973 and 1974; the annual Federation directories for 1950, 1952, 1954, 1958, 1967 and 1970. Some early Institute notes are needed. All isgues of the Intermediate Folk Dancers Newsletter until April 1965 when it developed into Folk Dance Scene are needed; some very early Let's Dance copies are also missing (prior to August 1948). Three volumes of the Historian's Books have gone astray - 1956-57; 1957-58 and 1961-62. Also, no trace of any volumes covering the period June 1969-May 1971 have been discovered. In order to complete these (Historian) gaps, our current Historian, Bertha Gold, will assemble whatever material she can get to substitute. So if you have anything of historical note - flyers, programs, photos, news clippings, etc. covering Federation, club, or related activities June 1956-May 1958; June 1961-May 1962 or June 1969-May 1971, the Archives Committee would appreciate having them. Likewise, the other aforementioned material. Please contact our committee members - Dorothy Daw, Bertha Gold, Bill or Judy Campbell, Sheila Ruby or Paul Pritchard (latter here at 'Scene'), by the time of the Ojai Festival. Your donations will be much appreciated.

FEDERATION SPECIAL THIS MONTH

OJAI FOLK DANCE WEEKEND

There were a lot of irate motorists in the Ojai Valley on May 11, 1946. The avenue had been blocked off in front of the arcade to accomodate a throng of strange looking people in odd costumes who had decided to hold the first Statewide folk dance festival in the state. Naturally, nothing went right. The fire department had so watered down the street that nobody could stand up on it for well after the festivities were to begin. Then the public address system failed to function. In the end though, they had a jolly old time.

And that was the beginning of what has turned out to be one of the best biennial busts in the State of California. They come here by the thousands to participate or simply watch. It's all for fun. Early one morning, the Fire Department was serenaded in Serbian by certain parties from San Diego. Then there was that traffic jam on Ojai Avenue when Pasadena's Tartans decided to present a Highland Fling in front of the Oaks Hotel. At the same time, a lonely piper from Santa Barbara was blowing his heart out in front of the Village Drug.

Under the leadership of people like David Young, Mary Williams and Mary Nightingals, the Festival has always striven to obtain the finest exhibition groups in the state. It hasn't failed. Such organizations as the Gandy Dancers, the Cyganys, and the Polish Youth Alliance keep coming back in their beautiful costumes because they like to perform here. The Ojai Festival is held once every two years in even numbers, usually in March or April. Looking back on 1946, and to cop somebody else's words the folk dance people say about the event - "you've come a long way, baby!" - Ed Nightingale -


This year, thirty years later, the festival will be held in mid-March. Caesar was warned to beware the Ides of March. Contrariwise, we urge you welcome them, and this always fine Ojai event. The dates are Friday 12 through Sunday 14. Activities get under way with a pre-party at the Art Center, 7:30-11 p.m. the first evening. Saturday afternoon, 1-5 p.m., there will be a big Kolo Party at the same location, which will entice the many kolophiles from all over and especially in the Ventura-Santa Barbara County area where they are legion. This will be a donation/admission event. In the evening, 8-11 p.m., there will be a full dance program with exhébitions. There is an admission charge for this - \$1.50. It will be in the gym. Afterwards, there will be an afterparty at the Art Center with food served at 75¢ per plate. It starts about 11:30 and continues until either the dancers or the programmers give out, which should probably be before sunrise.

Sunday's dancing will be back at the gym. (Did we neglect to mention which gym? Well, it's at Nordhoff High School). Time is 1:30 to 5 p.m. and there is no charge for this one it is the official monthly Federation South Festival. Federation officers and delegates might take note that the council meeting will be in the Art Center at 11 a.m. that morning.

Please remember, soft shoes are necessary at the high school gym events. There may still be motel accomodations available in town, but it is advised that they be reserved immediately. Help celebrate thirty years of folk dancing in Southern California by attending this long standing, ever popular festival. Ojai is a beautiful place in the spring.



URBAN MARDI GRAS WITH THE SWAMP STOMPERS

Mardi Gras in Louisiana is a colorful, festive season that runs for weeks before it reaches a high pitch of intensity on Shrove Tuesday. This period is heavily laden with debutante parties, lavish costume balls, coronations, fais-do-dos (Cajun dances), parades with elaborately decorated floats, and music of every kind-marching bands, rock, blues, jazz, and Cajun folk music. It is a time for fun, a time for the unusual, and a time for the writer to drape cameras over both shoulders and take off to film and share in the revelry.

Mardi Gras is celebrated quite differently in the urban and rural areas of Louisiana, the former of course, being the most publicized. Both celebrations are quite intriguing, although the rural version is much less commercial and more traditional. (See last month's article). Most people are somewhat familiar with the urban Mardi Gras, the New Orleans one in particular, so rather than rehashing the clandestine krewes and their hierarchy, the extravagant balls, the parades, and the incredible costs of all these mundane playthings, we thought it would be fun, and hopefully interesting, to relate what the Swamp Stompers do at the Mardi Gras and some of their impressions.

The Sunday before Shrove Tuesday is when the Swamp Stompers make their annual "stomp" to New Orleans to partake in the festivities. The reason we go on Sunday is because one of the better parades takes place that evening and because traffic is somewhat more bearable than it is on Tuesday. We go en masse, many in costumes, and loaded down with a portable sound system, casette tape carriers, and baskets of sandwiches and beverages. It is our day to be strictly unconventional and to enjoy the unconventional. We watch parades from atop traffic lights, wrestle for doubloons, find delight in the puppet shows, shoot craps in the alleys with the black children, sing songs with the various street musicians, and sip cafe au lait on the banks of the Mississippi, while university students from the North brave the cold and muddy waters and go skinny-dipping.

Most of the day we spend dancing and singing at various locations throughout the old French Quarter. We always have a large crowd of spectators who seem to genuinely enjoy us, and they show their appreciation by applauding loudly, throwing us money and flowers, and giving us sundry gifts, including bottles of wine, souvenirs and trinkets, and even checks made out to such colorful personalities as "Super Man". We seem to "collect" people as we move along, and before the day is over, we have quite a colorful contingent at our heels--folk dancers from other parts of the country, friendly little old ladies, curious tourists, nostalgic stevedores from Greek and Yugoslav ships in port, spaced-out hippies, children from the Quarter, direlicts, and even a few dogs!

We find Mardi Gras in New Orleans a fun time because we make it so. True, the crowds are many, and they will push and shove and sometimes even grab your purse or wallet (even your hat!) if you are not cautious. However, the general feeling at Mardi Gras is one of warmth and friendliness. People are in good spirits, and if you stop to enjoy the whole scene, there are many, many unusual and funny things going on that will stir your imagination and make you laugh.

CARNIVAL IN RIO ... AND OTHER PLACES

While we are still in Carnival time, a few notes on the celebration around the world (and on the adjacent picture page). The origins were probably rooted in the feast of the Lupercal in early Rome and developed, as did most of our festive events from a mixture of pagan and Christian religious reasons. Certainly, the culmination, the Mardi Gras is the "final fling" before the Lenten holiday from many worldly excesses, and as time went by, the period of celebration was lengthened to suit the mood of the people. Nowhere did the mood feel the need of "lengtheming" than in Brazil where the mad and happy Cariocans of Rio start planning in late fall and "Carnival" starts at Epiphany. The rest of the country is not far behind, and the Caribbean lands in general don't limit themselves to the few days before Ash Wednesday. Other parts of the world also celebrate, however. Middle Europe, such as Germany, Austria and Switzerland have big affairs. The former Portuguese enclave of Goa, in India (see foto) has the biggest Carnival in Asia. In Bolivia and Peru, it has a strong religious significance and real folk dances come into the picture instead of the modern balls and commercialized parades. Our picture shows a man from Trinidad in a glorious frenzy during a calypso competition on a Saturday night preceding Shrove Tuesday. Bahia, in Brazil, has a Carnival festival which tends more toward the folk element. The grandest moment of all however in the Rio celebration is the Parade of the Sambas (picture in upper right) when the many samba schools of the city and area try to outdo each other in a dance competition and parade - they will have been working on these exhibitions for months - possible ever since the last time. While it is true that Mardi Gras and the Carnival have been tremendously commercialized all over, still, it is an event that goes deep into the heart and feelings of the people, rich and poor alike, and must be considered a real folkloric event.



"Revolution to Ragtime to Rock", an American pilgrimage in song, dance and music will be presented as a special bicentennial production of the Liberty Assembly on Monday evening March 1 at 7 p.m. and again at 9:45 in the Mark Taper Forum of the Los Angeles Music Center.

This multi-talented group of 36 dancers, singers and musicians will trace the movement from the Eastern coast - its quadrilles, sea chanties and patriotic Revolution Days ballads to Appalachia and its dulcimers and running sets - south to the cakewalk and Louisiana's Cajuns, barn dances of the Texan frontier, their interpretation of the noted and unique Shaker services, and culminating in an All-American medley of CHarleston, Black Bottom, boogie, frug, shimmy and all that sort of jazz.

A whole slew of popular (and) folk instruments will be heard - dulcimers, guitars, banjos, country fiddles, rag piano, bones - yes, even an "antique" malt shop juke box vintage 1940. Original data collected by var ous members of the Liberty Assembly, this historic and unique program is the brainchild of Robin Evanchuk, choreographer, lecturer, dancers - who served also as a consultant to the Smithsonian Institution Folklife Festivals. Their Colonial sequences were developed through the assistance of the Bicentennial Programs at the Huntington Library Art Gallery and Gardens and the L.A. Bicentennial Committee has awarded the troupe its commendation. It is being presented by Irwin Parnes, founder of the Los Angeles International Folk Dance Festivals and managing director of the International Concerts Exchange. Tickets and/or information for both concerts available at the Music Center box office and through Mutual and Liberty agencies.

CAMELLIA FESTIVAL

Guess what country is to be paid homage this year at the Camellia Festival in Sacramento? You're right - it is the United States - on the occasion of the Bicentennial - 200 years of dancing! As in the past many years, the series of festive days begins with a Queen's breakfast on March 5 and continues through the next nine days with a series of regattas, photo contests, sports events, races, sundry contests, music and ballet concerts ad infinitum. It reaches its climax as far as the folk dancing world is concerned on Saturday March 13 when a folk dance institute kicks off that segment at 1 p.m. in the old Memorial Aud. Jeff O'Connor and Bruce Mitchell will share duties teaching at that time. There will be a charge for the syllabus here. General folk dancing in the evening begins at 8 p.m. and four exhibition groups are scheduled during the evening. An all-request afterparty follows at 11:30 p.m. Meanwhile, for those never-say-nuff line dancers, a Balkan afterparty starts at 10 p.m. and runs to 2 a.m.

On Sunday, the usual coronation or at least, presentation of the Queen at the Pageant is lined up in the afternoon and she is escorted off by the Cameron Pipe Band after which general dancing is the order, between 3:30 and 5:30 p.m. Prior to this however, is the Pageant during which about 16 of the top exhibition groups from Northern California will perform. Bruce Mitchell will narrate. On Sunday evening, there will be a Balkan hour, 7-8 p.m. and general folk dancing 8-10 p.m. Dances for the participation program have been chosen from lists submitted by Federation clubs, so there should be no problem of unfamiliar dances - they are of your own choosing. It is our understanding that while many of the other events of the 9 days will take place in other locations, all of the Folk Dance Festival activities will be at the Memorial Auditorium, located quite handily.

* * * * * * * YUGOSLAV FOLK ARTS SEMINAR

The Duquesne University Tamburitzans Institute of Fine Arts is sponsoring a symposium of Yugoslav folk arts, in co-operation with the government of the Republic of Yugoslavia as a part of the American Bicentennial Year. This will take place at Duquesne University, March 18-20. There is a very comprehensive and full program covering many aspects of the folk arts, folk lore and folk culture of that country, and the presentors of the fourteen sections of the program represent the finest scholars and lecturers from the several areas of Yugoslavia. In addition to the guest speakers, there will be a special performance in concert of the Duquesne Tamburitzans folk ensemble and a Friday evening dinner.

There are some flyers included in our issue this month - but unfortunately, not everyone will get one because in some manner, our incredible postal service managed to shred the package sent to us from Pittsburgh, scatter the flyers all over the floor (see footprints on one or two!!) and then ship the remainder on to us. We will include them as far as we can, but hope that all interested people will be among those who receive the fine details. For those who do not, here is abrief run-down. Thursday morning will feature presentations on "Transition of Folk Culture in Yugoslavia" and "Customs and Folk Arts"; afternoon will be on "Customs and Beliefs", "National Costumes" and "Ritual Masks". Evening (6:15) is a social hour with the presentation og the Yugoslav Ethnographic Exhibit. Friday morning will be on "Oral Lyric Poetry", "Oral Epic Poetry and Heroic Songs"; the afternoon, "The Ballad" and "Prose Forms of Oral Literature" (the evening as mentioned, the dinner and concert). Saturday morning will be devoted to "Folk Music" and "Traditional Musical Instruments" followed in the afternoon by "Folk Dances in Various Regions of Yugoslavia", "Plastic and Graphic Arts" and a general discussion. Interspersed through the three days will be luncheons, introductions of guests and social hours. These authorities are doctors and savants from institutes of folk arts, ethnographic museums, and universities from almost every political division of Yugoslavia, as well as those representing DUTIFA itself.

Symposium attendance (3 days) is \$30; any one day, \$15 (students, one-third these rates). The banquet and performance, \$10. It will be at the Recital Hall of the School of Music, Duquesne University, Pittsburgh. A second symposium covering Bulgaria is contemplated for the fall, so you might watch for it.

A LA CARTE

by GLORIA HARRIS

Near the famous Tigris and Euphrates Rivers in what historians call the Fertile Crescent, lie Syria and Lebanon. The ancient caravan town of Damascus is still a very bustling hub of commerce. Lebanese traders of fancy bowls and utensils, and Syrian farmers with lush fruit and fat sheep crowd the market places.

The wheat grains that have been harvested then boiled and split, can be seen all spread out to parch in the sun. This grain is then ground to a desired coarseness to produce Bulghur ARABIAN

TABBULI

Cracked Wheat Salad

1 cup medium bulghur ½ cup water
6 Tbs olive oil ½ cup lemon juice
2 tsp salt
1½ tsp allspice

 $1\frac{1}{2}$ cup green onions, chopped fine 1 cup parsley, chopped fine 1 cup mint leaves, chopped fine 2 med. tomatoes

Combine bulghur with water and allow to stand one hour or until bulghur is puffed. While bulghur is soaking separate leaves of Romaine lettuce; wash & chill til ready to use. (all vegetables should be well chilled) Mix together in small bowl, the oil, lemon juice, salt & allspice.

To assemble salad, toss bulghur, tomatoes, green onions, parsley & mint in large bowl with the oil dressing. Line a platter with Romaine leaves and pile tabbuli in center. Surround with remaining leaves which guests should use to scoop up the tabbuli.

A few variations exist depending on one's taste for certain salad ingredients. You may add avocados, green peppers, etc., staying with the basic recipe in order to fully enjoy this different salad.

(or Burghil) that is the essential ingredient for this tabbuli recipe that was sent in to us by Jane Spitzer, folk dancer. Jane advised me I wouldn't have to travel to Syria or to Lebanon for bulghur - it can be found in local Greek, Armenian or Lebanese groceries or in health food stores. Recipe contributed by Jane Spitzer - some remarks taken from "Middle Eastern Cookery", 101 Productions, publishers.




