PLEASE MEET!


Last month, your editor mentioned the various reasons for our selections of people who we feel you would enjoy meeting. One of the reasons given was a uniqueness of the personality. To be sure, our selection to start of this new decade of the 20th. century is definitely in this category - what does unique mean - one in a thousand - ten thousand - a hundred thousand? How many folk dancers do we have in California and the West? And how many of them are going into their 10th decade? Well, one of our most active persons in the area, Herman Schatz recently celebrated his 90th birthday - and many of his friends and acquiantances, along with family members, joined together to help him celebrate.

Many of our Southland dancers know Herman by sight, if not as fellow club members, for Herman manages to get to numerous clubs and most of our Federation festivals and activities. You probably thought, as we did, that he was a healthy, young-looking 70. Imagine then, he was born in 1889 in the Ukraine!

Herman came to the United States as a youth of 19 - the first of his family of brothers and sisters, and worked to bring the rest over - starting as a milkman. Before leaving however, he had won a scholarship in the Academy in Kiev - it was felt that he had a voice like the world noted tenor of that day, Carouso. Even after his arrival in America, he studied, and was offered an opportunity to study voice in Italy, but acceeding to the wishes of his mother, turned down the opportunity, in order to keep the family here intact. He went on into sheet-metal work, but his "hobby" so to speak was also inventing, and has always been creating various "gadgets" and things.

He has always been very conscious of keeping physically fit, eating good health foods no smoke or drink - plenty of exercise and fresh air. He started into folk dancing about the age of 60 - and has been at it ever since. When he lived here by the ocean until quite recently, used to take a dip mornings, summer or winter. And for breathers, he works on his house and patio, doing the cement work and other construction and gardening.

Folkdancing can't take all of the credit of course, for Herman Schatz is assured by endowed with some classic Slavic hormones or vitamines or something to make him that way, but still, it can be said that it is one way to health, and Herman is our fine example. Our many congratulations to you, Herman, and we hope that many of us are still around at the end of this new decade to help you celebrate your 100th birthday!

The Bayanihan Philippine Dance Co. will be featured in a 2 pm. performance Sun Jan 6 in El Camino College Auditorium, Crenshaw at Redondo Blvds. in Torrance. The company of 28 dancers and 12 musicians first appeared in Brussels at the World's Fair in 1958, and has toured the world ever since. This visit to Southern California is part of the ensemble's 8th tour of North America.

One of the top folkloric dance companies, Bayanihan has received acclaim throughout the world for its color, costumes, music, and the intricate steps and interpretation of the dances which cover a wide range of the island republic's history and many ethnic cultures, including Arabic, Malayan, Chinese and Spanish, as well as of its native tribes. The 33rd. annual presentation of the original International Folk Dance Festival as produced by Irwin Parnes will be offered at Dorothy Chandler Pavilion in the Music Center of Los Angeles on Saturday January 26, for one performanceo only, 8-11 pm.

Bali's hypnotic 'monkey' dance ritual; a Senegalese witch doctor's leaping rite to wake the dead; West Indian voodoo; East Indian Kathak; a Korean Monk's dance; Cuban rhumba; Swedish weavers' and Israeli fishermen and Greek butchers' dances. And there are Viennese waltzes Polish mazurkas and Spanish flamenco - a sampling of what is in store for those viewers who will attend this dazzling festival of international dance, music and song.

Distinguished actor, Lew Ayres will narrate the program. Performance groups new to festival audiences include - Calcutta's dynamic master of kathak, Chitrish Das; the imagery of the Two-snake Dance and Design Company in their "Bestiary"; the L.A. Knockers, today's hottest, flashiest disco group; flamenco virtuosa La Margo with Chinin de Triana and Benito Palacios; Gloria Monaghans Blue Danube Waltzers; the popular Rikudom Israeli Dance Co. from San Francisco and the Panegyri Greek Dancers - (these last two are familiar to many of our Federation members both North and South). Also, Jete's gymnasts with US champions Rhonda Schwandt and Suzy Kellens.

Returning - some have appeared numerous times before, are other dance groups - past or present members and friends of our Federation dancers and festival concerts - Ote'a Polynesian Dancers; Krakusy Polish Ensemble; R'Wanda Lewis Afro-American Dancers; the Swedish Folkdance Club; and the Hallmark Americana Dancers. MILAN OBRADOVIĆ FESTIVAL

The Eighth annual Milan Obradović Folk Festival will be held in the old gym, U.C. Santa Barbara, Goleta, on Saturday February 16, 1980. There will be classes, 11 am to 3 pm., and the traditional dance party, 7 pm to midnight. Host club is the Merhaba Folk Dance Club. Teachers for the institute will be Dick Oakes and Tony Biedul. A flyer is attached.

This has become probably the major annual dance event of the Santa Barbara area, and it attracts folk dancers, especially those of Balkan bent, from all over the Southland. It derived its name from an idea of the Santa Barbara folk dancers to memorialize the name of Milan Obradović, a well-known and much beloved Montenegrin dancer of Santa Barbara and surrounding territory. Milan was dancing his native dances there before many of his fellow townspeople even knew where the Balkans were, let along know what a kolo was. Now, Santa Barbara and Ventura counties probably have a greater percentage of kolophiles among their folk dance population than any other area. Don't let this article mislead you however, for there will be other dances programmed besides Slavic - but no matter what your particular dance feel is, you should have a most enjoyable time at the Merhaba's party for you.

AMAN INSTITUTE

Another eagerly awaited annual event for folkdancers is the Aman Institute '80, which will be held at the International Institute, 435 S. Boyle Ave., Los Angeles, just off the Santa Ana or Golden State freeways at 4th St. The dates and times are Friday January 25, 7:30 pm to past midnight - and Saturday January 26, 9:30 am clear through the day and evening, also until after midnight. See an attached flyer for more complete details.

Teachers for the institute sessions are to be: Dick Crum, Balkan dances on Friday night; Harry Brauser, New England dances also Friday night. Saturday's instructors are: John Gibson, old Aman classics; Graham Hempel, dances of the Caucasus area; Barry Glass, Croatia. Elsie Dunin will present a series of slides; there will be singing with Susie North, Trudy Israel and Richard Rowland. Coming specially from New York will be a workshop of Dobrudjan/Thracian folklore by Martin Koenig. Music for the dance parties in the evening is provided by the Aman Orchestra. Lunch and dinner are by prepaid reservations only.

As you know - or we hope you do - Aman is our resident nationally-known folk dance ensemble - specialists in folkdance, music and lore, of the Balkans and almost everywhere else too. It is a non-profit organization, and proceeds from this institute will go to further support the company's research projects. For additional information, the Aman phone is 213/936-7127.

POLISH FOLK LEGEND

ADA DZIEWANOWSKA

An old Polish legend explains why Polish, Czech and Russian languages are so similar. Three brothers, Lech, Czech and Rus - left their father to find lands of their own to settle down on. It happened many centuries ago. They travelled for a long time, until one evening when they opened camp for the night in a wild forest, Lech went for a walk. He was suddenly startled by a noise in the branches of a high tree. There was a mother eagle sitting on her nest, her white wings spread against the red background of the sunset. He considered this a good omen. Next morning he told his brothers that he liked this spot and and would settle right here. The brothers bid farewell. Czech went south, and Rus went east. When Czech settled, he founded Czechoslovakia, and Rus, Russia. Poles were first called the Lechici (Lechites). only later, has Poland been named after the word, "pole" - a field, or plain - as Poland is generally quite a flat land. The first Polish capital was Gniezno (derives from the noun "gniazdo" - a nest). And a white eagle on a crimson background is until this very day, the badge of Poland.

She sent the above short story in, along with corrections of the translation we gave for the Czech song, "Cerešničky". (so much for using our record album sleeves for reference work!) Ada also gives us the Polish words to the same song as she translated them from the Czech:

"Czeresieński, czeresieńki, czereśnie, Wyście mi sie rozsypaly na dróżce, Kto was znajdzie, ten was pozbira, Ja se miałam wozoraj wieczór kawalira."

Ada also sent a greeting card - a very unusual one with paper cut-out applique(?) for the design - and wishing - Wesofych Świąt i szozesliwego Nowego Roku - to the Editors and to the readers of Folk Dance Scene. . . We all thank you, Ada, and though Christmas is now past, we do hope yours was merry - and to you too, we wish a happy new year.

Before leaving Ada at this moment - we were just reading the latest issue of the Folk Dance Scene in Baton Rouge, and Vonnie Brown's review of the institute just held there with Ada Dzienowska. The dances were presented in total context, with all elements - costumes, songs, folk art, tales, customs, etc. in the one big picture. One should read Vonnie's item itself to get the full story of the presentation - but how great it all seemed to be - to be able to come away from such an institute or workshop - and feel that one had learned something about the people who dance those dances thousands of miles away - a sort of oceness with them - and not merely added four or five new "scalps" to an already swollen collection of dances. (By the way, does one call someone who has a "collection" of 2000 dances a "philochoreoist"?).





Christmas was over...the radio had stopped broadcasting carols. The neighborhood kids were playing with new dolls and sleds and showing off Mickey Mouse watches. Trash cans in the alley were full of crumpled ribbons and wrappings. My mother served turkey every-whichway for a week after. I loved it, but I can hear my father, half-complaining, "What! turkey again!".

Outside, even the days were icycold. The air snapped and bit at NEW YEARS EVE HORS DOEUVRES

anything not bundled up in thick layers of union suits, overcoats and earmuffs. I could hear the milkman's horse clopping up the street. He knew where to stop while the milkman delivered bottles of milk with the cardboard lid riding high on a column of frozen cream. As the milkman waved and shouted "Happy New Year!", his words hung for an instant in frigid letters, then disappeared in a thin mist.

My parents were looking forward to New Years Eve. As always, we went to Aunt Gertrude's house on that night. Each of my mother's twelve sisters brought food and we had a 'spread' (my father said so). There was sliced roast beef and pork, five or six cheeses (one of them had to be limburger for my Grandpa), and a special sausage called silcer or zilser, that was Aunt Mabel's specialty. Uncle Irvin brought his homemade breads and crunchy rolls; we had olives and gherkins, Aunt Elsie's watermelon pickles and corn relish, sliced onions and different kinds of mustards. I can remember vividly, how that smelled...that, and the boiled coffee (beer, for my Grandpa). On the sideboard in the dining room stood the fruit cake, coconut cake, linzer torte, mince pie and hundreds of cookies.

As the evening got along, the grownups played cards (pinochle for my Grandpa). They ate peanuts and drank Tom Collins. They tuned in the music of Guy Lombardo broadcasting from the Edgewater Beach Hotel, and they danced. About 11 o'clock, the radio switched to Times Square in New York City. Exactly at midnight, E.S.T., the grownups hugged and kissed with New York. When it became midnight in Chicago then, we kids blew whistles while the grownups hugged and kissed some more. An hour later, when midnight arrived in California, we called Aunt mildred in Inglewood, Happy New Year'd her, and the grownups hugged and kissed again.

That's about all I remember of that night. My cousins and I climbed onto our Uncle's big bed and fell asleep while taking turns tickling each other's backs.

Makin' whoopee is U.S. of A.'s traditional welcome to the New Year. Some of the U.S. of A.'s New Years Eve folklore is:

- 1. Partying, confetti, streamers, noisemakers.
- 2. Drinking and eating.
- 3. Hugging and kissing.
- 4. Old man with white beard to the floor, carrying a sythe.
- 5. Fattish baby dressed in a ribbon and top hat.
- 6. Listening to Guy Lombardo.
- 7. Singing of Auld Lang Syne.
- 8. Making resolutions (usually for better behaviorisms.).

FEDERATION IN FOCUS

Twice a year, the Folk Dance Federations of California, both North and South, get together at a meeting called "North-South Co-ordinating". These usually take place during the big May festival at wherever Statewide is being held that year, and in October at the annual fall festival in Fresno. At the time, representatives from both groups go over and discuss problems that may beset folkdancing in general or the organizations mutually or individually. During the past spring, (and last winter), an ad hoc committee was appointed by the President of the Northern Federation to make a long range study of the function of the organization, of problem areas, and suggest solutions. . . The report of the committee was published in several recent issues of Let's Dance and as an addenda to the North-South minutes. It made interesting reading.

It would appear that many of the problems are related to dance material - the vast amount presented each year, which no one can learn all of and still retain that already learned. The question of square dances at festivals also received much comment - some felt there should be much less - some even none at all. This created some strong reaction. A very large number of responders rated the lack of young blood as one of, if not the, major detrimental factor. Coordination between clubs - consistent presentation of dances by different eachers - methods of making the organization attractive to bring in new members - and also very much of concern - festival programming. . . Here among our Folk Dance Scene archives where some 14 folk publications cross the "desk" - we see that the situation is not unique to Californian folkdancedom alone. Similar problems prevail everywhere - and the older and more venerable the organization - the more vulnerable it is to the ailments. But, with the report of the committee in hand -(as assembled from the replies of near 200 people in the folkdance world - teachers, leaders, dancers, club officers) - it should be possible to work towards correcting things where corrections are needed and go on from there.






