### PLEASE MEET ....!

.... Mary Ann and Michael Herman, who will be honored at an international celebration which will take place April 17 through June 15, when an exhibit of some 35 folk costumes from their vast collection will be displayed at Lincoln Center Library for the Performing Arts in New York City.

For over 45 years, the Hermans have taught folk dancing and made great contributions to the development of the international folk dance movement - not only here in the United States, but abroad also. In 1931 when they began working in New York, interest in folk dancing was limited to the ethnic groups, of which of course, there were many in that cosmopolitan city. Michael became acquainted with these groups through playing his violin, and as a result of these contacts, he acquired a wide knowledge of music and the dance of many countries. Before long, he was teaching at the New School for Social Research, and became founder of the Folk Dance Council of New York. By this time, Mary Ann was also teaching folk dancing.

By the time that fateful year 1939 rolled around, they had become two noted leading figures among international ethnic music and dance movement in New York, and due to this success, were asked to direct folk dance activities at the New York World's Fair. That in turn led them to open a school where they continued to teach folk dancing to large groups. They started at the Ukrainian National Home with friday night sessions, then on the lower east side at the Polish "Dom". Finally, they found a building on 16th St. when Folk Dance House was born, and there it was that so many, many of our folk dancers first saw the light of their folk dancing day.

During World War II, Michael entered the Armed Forces and Mary Ann led the sessions at Folk Dance House. She held classes for children in arts and crafts and folk dancing during the day, and continued to collect costumes, literature and folk art, as well as notes on the customs of many ethnic groups.

Following his return, Michael resumed teaching and writing books on folk dancing. The "Folk Dancer" records were initiated by Michael and his orchestra - and to many of us, his Folk Dancing for All (1947) was about the first guide on how to folk dance for teaching among our co-ops. In addition to the weekday sessions, the Hermans would conduct family folk dances on occasional Sundays. This brought people of all ages together and created an enthusiasm for dancing across the generations old and young.

They then initiated teacher training courses and started many young people - some of whom are among today's teachers - on their way. Many well known figures in the entertainment field have also danced with Mary Ann and Michael - Damon Runyon, Mike Todd, Jerome Robbins, Gene Kelly, Burl Ives, Martha Schlamme - to name a few. When the Moiseyev Dance Company from the USSR performed in New York the first time, they visited Folk Dance House in order to learn American dances. It was here they learned the 'Virginia Reel' used in their concerts.

In 1956, the U.S. State Department chose the Hermans to tour Japan, where they taught classes to over 21,000 people in some 19 cities. This was a cultural triumph in both countries - and the beginning of a new era of cultural ethnic exchange between the two countries. It was around 1950 that Michael was featured on the staff at Stockton Camp, and among the dances we learned was the original Czech 'Beseda'. Returning to California at the Santa Barbara Camp some several years later, Mary Ann completely captivated the campers with her charm and fun loving personality.

Presently, the Hermans continue to teach classes in Manhattan and on Long Island. They also conduct the famous Maine Folk Dance Camp near Bridgton in that state. This is one of the oldest of all - and also, one of the best known. It is practically a summer-long event, with dance weeks going continuously, (except for a break around early August,) from June through Labor Day. To those folk dancers who return, year after year, to Maine, this is the real way to go "folk dance" camping.

And, when all is said and done - whether you have been folk dancing for the past thirty years or so, or are a brand newcomer to the recreation - much of what you do or have done was influenced by Mary Ann and Michael Herman - they are among the "roots" of the folk dance tree.

### SPECIAL EVENTS WESTWOOD FESTIVAL

The Westwood Co-operative Folk Dancers'\* annual spring festival will be held, Sunday April 27, in the auditorium of the Veterans' Memorial Hall in Culver City. The Westwood group will be the hosts for the afternoon, and the event is sponsored by the Folk Dance Federation of California, South, Inc., in cooperation with the Parks and Recreation Dep't. of the city of Culver City. Festival time is 1:30-5:30 p.m. and it is free to the public and folkdancers.

This will be the thirty-fifth spring that this club has presented its noted folkdance event, having started the series back in 1946. During the entire time, these festivals have always been of high quality and of appeal to all levels of folkdancers. A good program, well-balanced, with interesting highlights, has been the hallmark of the Westwood Co-op dance events, whether festival or a normal weekly dance meeting, at Emerson Jr. High school in West Los Angeles, where the members have met weekly since the fall of 1945, with but few interruptions. ### FRED BERK 1910-1980

Folk dancing in general, and Jewish and Israeli dancing in particular, lost one of the most respected members and leaders February 26, when Fred Berk passed away suddenly as a result of a heart attack. Fred had been in ill health for some time, and had had to cancel plans to visit the West Coast just recently, but it was not those illnesses which caused his death.

Fred Berk was born in Vienna and studied at the State Academy of Dance there, and from 1930 to 1933, performed with Gertrud Kraus, Viennese modern-dance choreographer, winning the bronze medal as the most promising solo dancer at the Viennese State international dance competition in 1934. He came to America in 1941, and performed first with Hanya Holm thenwith Katia Delakova for 10 years. In 1949, when on his first visit to Israel, he and Katia became the first American dancers to perform in Eilat.

Fred organized many projects and was associated with many organizations which were devoted to Jewish/Israeli dance arts. He was a member of the Israeli Ethnic Dance Board - founded the Jewish Dance Division of the 92nd St. YM-YWHA; he compiled a bibliography of all Jewish dance materials in the New York Libraries; and after having been dance instructor at the Camp Blue Star in Henderson-ville, North Carolina, organized an Israeli folk dance leadership there in 1960. This camp is one of the more flourishing in the country. He established the Israeli Folk Dance Department of the AZYF in 1968, and was editor of the magazine "Hora". He had written many books and tracts - and his "Holiday in Israel", published by the Dance Notation Bureau Press is being restaged in England. Fred was planning to go to supervise its production in May.

A number of memorial scholarships have been set up in his name already, in New York, Los Angeles, and elsewhere, in tribute to the man who was the dean - the father of Israeli folk dance in America.

### FEDERATION IN FOCUS

Along with Statewide and the summer camps, an important part of the Folk Dance Federation's activities and program at this time of the year relates to the selection of awardees for the scholarships to summer folk dance camps and conferences. There are several of these scholarship programs in effect - some offered by the separate clubs, some by individuals, each of the Southern California conferences have one (Idyllwild and San Diego), and then there is that one offered by the Federation itself. The words "one" above could be misleading, for there are actually several awards given in some cases. Annually, the Federation scholarships may total anywhere from four to eight - depending upon the total of revenue raised at the various fund raising activities.

These scholarships are given to persons who have in the opinions of the members of the Scholarship Committee doing the judging, shown fine potential, outstanding service, high quality of teaching, ability to absorb detailed instruction - any or all of these qualities and maybe more. The candidates are vouched for by their club, or at least, by some qualified Federation member/group, and the selection(s) are then made by the Scholarship Committee. The award consists of tuition-paid at any one of the recognized West Coast Camps, Federation-supported, or approved.

If you or your club is interested in submitting the name of a candidate for a Federation Scholarship, please send to Karen Codman, Chairman Scholarship Committee, Folk Dance Federation of California, South, 9580 Pacific Ave., Bellflower, CA. 90706, for an application form. This should be done quite soon, as selections, examinations, etc. must be completed in time to be presented at the Statewide meeting in May. You may phone Karen at 213/920-2713. Other members of the committee are Ted Martin, Beverly Barr, John Tiffany and Flora Codman. This year, ten scholarships are expected to be awarded.

Other action taken at the Laguna Beach Council meeting included the admission of a new member club - the Luther Tower International Folk Dancers, led by Kay Soghomonian. This group meets mornings at Luther Tower, 1455 2nd Ave in San Diego (Fridays). Admission is 25¢. In other matters, on a previously discussed suggestion to hold a spring beginners' festival in May, it was found that no suitable site could be found in time to mount such an event, so it was decided to wait until 1981, and then plan for a spring beginners' festival. These are really well appreciated and attended events, worthy of solid preparedness, so it's 1981!

### FEATURE ARTICLE

### EASTERTIDE - LATIN AMERICA

One of the more colorful of Brazil's many colorful fiestas takes place annually on Easter Monday in the town of Aparecide do Norte, in São Paolo State. Here, São Benedito, patron saint of blacks, is honored with a series of processionals, masses, feasting, music, and especially, dance. While many of the participants and celebrationers who come to the fiesta from the town and state and even beyond are black, many are also white. The two principal figures are the king and queen of the fiesta, and usually, one is black, the other white - and they alternate from year to year, keeping it integrated by color as well as sex.

As is the case in most processionals or parades, especially in Latin America, there is much pomp and ceremony, mixed in with considerably hilarity. The king and queen of course, are the centres of attention, along with the parish priest - for this is his big day, too. The music of bands and singing fills the air of the town square, as the dance groups - the congadas and mozambiques perform their dances to primitive rhythms, based in part on the dances and legends brought over by their slave ancestors from West Africa. Some mozambiques are old warrior dances and others are rituals denoting the freedom from slavery, which was not legally abolished in Brazil until 1888, and in many cases, not de facto until some time after that. They tend to be somewhat gymnastic, stressing agility and grace of movement - i.e., a sword dance involving skill at stepping over the blades, or one of fencing. The congadas on the other hand tend to be less stress on physical skill and more towards the art and mime in telling stories of life in old Africa.

São Benedito dancing goes on well into the late evening, and the fiesta is climaxed with a display of fireworks, after which, more music, with the violão and the babácue playing áte à vista as the celebrants start for home.

Other Latin American festivals of Eastertide and April include the Fiesta de San Marcos on April 25 in Aguascalientes, Mexico. This was for many years, one of Mexico's most important folk festivals. Taxco, Mexico's famous silver town, celebrates Holy Week fully, starting Palm Sunday and going through Easter Sunday with something each day. Popáyan, in Colombia has also been having week-long Eastertide celebrations, at least since 1558 - but that town is noted for its fiestas at various times of the year. 

### BOOKS IN REVIEW

"SOUTH SLAVIC DANCES IN CALIFORNIA: A Compendium for the Years, 1924-1977", by Elsie Ivancich Dunin. (Ragusan Press, San Carlos CA. soft cover \$10).

This compendium is testimonial to the monumental volume of work Elsie Dunin has done in research and of collecting date regarding the folk dance picture in California, of Yugoslavian and Bulgarian dances. The 209 pages consist of five sets of tables which list the dance names with publication in which the description may be found; publications (including books and syllabi); teachers with year and location where the dances were introduced; geographic identification of the dances. Every dance listed (and there are 1810 entries for over 600 different dances) has at some time been written up and/or distributed for public use in California. All have at some time been danced and/or learned by Californian folkdancers.

Devotees of Balkan folk dance will be highly interested to trace the rise and fall of some of the dances; of some revivals; to see that since Morry Gelman in 1949 taught 'Croatian Waltz', there have b33n 382 teachings of South Slavic dances at Stockton Camp; or 'Seljancica' was the first Yugoslav dance taught at a Federation event, back in 1948(at Poinsettia) in Hollywood. Over 56% of the dances were taught at the camps and institutes sponsored by the two California Folk Dance Federations. Which would seem to give the dispute to those who contend the Federation is antikolo. . .The volume should be of great value to those who teach Balkan dance and dancers who love to do them.

### LA CARTE

The Valley of Hunza lies high in the Himalayan Mountains where the borders of China, Russia and Pakistan meet: and the old road travelled by Marco Polo on his way to Cathay, still winds its way thru the towering peaks.

Deserters from the army of Alexander the Great, found the valley & camped there, finding it a convenient place from which to plunder & raid the passing caravans of China Traders. They took wives (perhaps carried them off from the caravans) and eventually over the years, lost their savagery and settled to a

2 tablespoons saf-flower oil

½ cup hulled millet\*\*

½ cup diced green pepper

1 cup diced carrots

MILLET CASSEROLE HUNZA (HIMALAYAN)

1 teaspoon vegetable salt 1 teaspoon dried oregano

½ teaspoon thyme garlic powder

½ cup whole almonds 1 cup sliced mushrooms Heat oil in heavy skillet, add the millet and stir til slightly

Add the chopped vegetables and salt and herbs (use your own selection) and cook, stirring for three minutes.

Add enough water to cover one inch above the mixture. Add almonds. Cover and cook over low heat for 15 minutes. Then place the covered skillet in  $400^{\circ}$  oven for an additional 15 minutes or til millet is tender. Millet will puff up like rice. Casserole should not be too watery but watch so that it does not become dried out. Serves 6.

peaceful existence. Now, every Hunza family has its own plot of land on which to raise food. One man in the Village is the weaver of cloth; one man runs the grist-mill that grinds the Village grain. One man is in charge of the Village apricot trees. His responsibility is the quality of the young trees, the sweetness of the fruit, the excellence of the kernel within. The kernel, the heart of the apricot, is pressed by hand for its golden unsaturated oil, the only oil used by the Hunzacuts.

The fundamental precept of the people of Hunza is the development of healthy minds and bodies. There is a school in every Village where the children are taught the prayers, the 3Rs, four languages and a regimen of vigorous exercises. Everyone in Hunza, works and everyone joins in activities such as polo, volleyball, and archery and dancing.

Hunzacuts usually eat only two meals a day -- a simple diet of fruit, grain and vegetables. Meat is rarely eaten. They drink the highly mineralized water of the Valley's glaciers that they call 'glacial milk' because of the water's opaque and pearly appearance.

Many elders in Hunza are reported to be as much as 130 years old (some, even 150 years). They are active in daily Village council meetings to which they walk 10-15 miles up the mountain. Their stamina is remarkable. They participate in volley-ball games and some are even said to searching for new wives!

Hunza is called a real-life Shangri-La. Because of its beauty, yes; and because of the incredible workable life-style of the inhabitants, yes; but the real miracle in Hunza is the amazing strength and the extreme good health of the Hunzacuts which is attributed to their activity and to their frugal but nourishing diet. We could all learn and benefit greatly from their example.

Research: Hunza, the Himalayan Shangri-La by Taylor & Nobbs. The millet casserole recipe is adapted from the above book. It is wholesome, filling and delicious and can be varied by using different vegetables and herbs or spices. I have discovered millet for the first time and I love it in everything(poor Wes) and it is wonderful cooked in the morning for a hot cereal breakfast. 'Bye!






