JIM REMEMBERED Elayne Sidley

The music selection changes to a Haisapiko "teaser". As if by signal, eyes search the hall, seeking out a slenderfigure, arm raised in classic readiness. The line forms quickly and Jim Lee is once again leading us in one of his beloved Greek dances.

This is the way I remember Jim Lee and this is the way that most of us at South Bay Folk Dancers remember him. A loyal member since the early 1970's, Jim served as president for two terms in 1970-71 and 1980-81, in addition to holding numerous other offices and organizing festivals in 1981 and 1982.

Jim's love for dancing went back to his youth when he briefly considered ballroom dancing as a career. In light of his family's opposition, he opted to go to sea at nineteen where, in the Merchant Marines, he progressed from 3rd engineer to chief engineer in his mid-twenties. In the span of his 45-year life at sea, Jim, who was born in Missouri in 1913 and grew up in Mobile, Alabama, visited innumerable ports all over the world. One of those visits was through an ammunition run up the Mekong Delta in the 1960's.

Jim lived life with such spirit and zest that, upon his death on February 3, 1988, that sense of spirit is well remembered by his three loving daughters, four granddaughers and the many friends he left behind.

Goodbye, Jim Lee. We see you dancing still.

He has been dancing around the Southland for a couple of years now, having started with the Griffith Park group. Some of his early affiliates included Berendo, IDC, the Virgilers, and, of course, Westwood Co-op Folk Dancers. He also is, or has been, a member of the Hollywood Peasants, Intermediates, as well as numerous other local groups.

To the Federation, Ed has been an invaluable help. If you look back over the past di-rectories, you will find Ed's name moving up the line of of-ficers until he became president, 1962-64, and again in 1977-78. For about nine years Ed headed the Federation's special project for patients at Gateways Hospital. He was also the chap who finally, after years of urging, prevailed upon the council to have a facility for the Federation archives and Hilton sound equipment that he has maintained and taken to countless folk dance events ever since the San Diego Conference purchased it for the Federation about 10 years ago. Of great importance to everyone that reads this magazine is Ed's dedication to the thankless task of collalating and mailing Folk Dance Scene.

Ed recently celebrated his 84th birthday. He goes folk dancing at least twice a week - always with Westwood, and then with some other club and/ or at a Federation festival or event. No wonder he is in such great shape.

And right beside Ed for many years has been Perle Bleadon-Feldman.

Perle came to California in 1954 from Chicago. There was folk dancing in Chicago, but she never heard about it until she came west to California with her brother and family. They had taken an apartment near the newly opened Westside Jewish Community Center. When she was there one evening, she heard this different but beautiful music, followed it, and found folk dancing. Herman Weiner was the leader of the group (with her next teacher being Carolyn Mitchell). Near the end of the evening's dancing at the center, a nicelooking man always came in to wind up his evening of handball and swimming with folk dancing. That is how Perle met Ed Feldman in 1954. Folk dancing from that time on became a very important part of her life.

She was Director of Publicity for the Folk Dance Federation of California, South, for 19 years. To my knowledge, no one has ever been a Federation South officer for that long! She also wrote the column "Echoes of the Southland" for "Let's Dance" magazine at the same time.

Perle and Ed have served on many committees together -Santa Barbara-San Diego Conference, Gateways, and Institute, and were founding mem-bers of the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society, Los Angeles Branch, which began at Hollenbeck School in East LA in the early 60's. They've also worked on many committees with Westwood Co-op that go pretty far back - Monte Vista, Aillbilly Lodge in Idyllwild, Lake Gregory and Hess Kramer weekends. Both Perle and Ed have been awarded life memberships in Westwood Co-op, and Perle is by Ed's side at almost all of the groups. These two found time to squeeze a wedding into their very active schedule on August 21, 1984, and are now "living happily ever after."

We, the Federation wish to salute and thank both Perle and Ed for their many years of devotion and work in the folk dance community. Indeed, the Federation is much indebted to all of the Perle and Eds out there. For without such devotion and help not only to the Federation, but to folkdancing as a whole, we would not have developed to the high point we hold here in the State of California.

HIGHLIGHTS

The February 21, 1988 Council meeting was hosted by the Laguna Folkdancers at its annual festival and institute weekend at Laguna Beach High in Laguna Beach. There was good attendance all weekend and everyone had a good time.

Jill Michtom, Director of Membership, presented Pas de Fox for membership in the Federation, and the reinstallation of the China Lake Desert Dancers. The motion was made and passed by council, and both are now members of the Federation.

Historian Kayso Soghomonian reported that Laura Smith presented him with albums on Federation happenings and events which can be incorporated into our collection. A note of thanks is being sent to her. Anyone with any historical information or photos, is welcome to contribute them.

Costume Chairperson Lucille Vestal's report was given by Dorothy Daw. The lecture and display on Greek costumes by Ioanna Papantoniou in January was well attended, very informative and very interesting. The next workshop will be held at Veselo Selo in Anaheim on Saturday, May 7, from 1-5 pm. It will be on "Costumes of Eastern Europe", and given by Anthony Shay. The workshop will be limited to 25 people, so if you really want to attend, get your reservation in early.

North-South Coordinator, Valerie Staigh, reported that the last meeting was basically about the next Statewide Folk Dance Festival. It will be in Palo Alto, sponsored this year by the Folk Dance Federation of California, Inc. (North) over Memorial Day Weekend, May 27-30, 1988. It promises to be a really fine event, so get your reservations in ahead of time, even for individual events, and save yourself time standing in line.

Fran Slater, Chairperson of the Idyllwild Folk Dance Camp, gave this year's camp dates. They are June 24-July 1 for the entire week, and June 24-24 for the first weekend only, for those who cannot remain for the entire week. The terrific staff is as follows: Bo Peterzen, directly from Sweden with dances of Sweden; Jaap Leegwater with Bulgarian dance; Michael Ginsburg, Jugoslavian dances; and Jerry Helt with Contra Dances. There are a variety of optional programs to choose from during the free time periods each afternoon, or one could rest, swim, shop, etc. Some people registered too late last year and could not come, so register early and guarantee yourself a spot!

Ray Augustine, Scholarship Chairperson, handed out scholarship application forms to each delegate. The completed forms are due in by May 1, so he suggested that the delegates get them to their clubs as soon as possible and remind applicants about the due date.

The next festival is the Ojai Dance Weekend, April 8-10 in Ojai, with a festival, institute and Federation Council Meeting on Sunday, April 10 at 10:30 am. Westwood Co-op will host another Federation Council meeting before their annual festival on April 24 at the Veteran's Memorial Aud in Culver City. The Council Meeting is at 11 am and the Festival is from 1:30-5:30 pm.

Stockton Folk Dance Camp

Stockton Folk Dance Camp, which just celebrated its 40th anniversary, actually came into existence in 1947 at a College of the Pacific sponsored camp at Asilomar, California, on-campus facilities being unavailable at the time. The following year the new venture was shifted to the lovely campus at Stockton. There the camp picked up a full head of steam as a five-day, \$33 total cost, jam-packed, hotter than Hades (no air conditioning), folk dance and square dance camp with a furious 8 am to 11 pm schedule and a top flight faculty. Everyone left Stockton in advanced stages of exhaustion!

Now, after some 40 years of calming down, maturing, list-ening to and acting on suggestions of literally thousands of campers, of attracting dance leaders worldwide who, in turn, attract hosts of campers, Stockton has attained a position best characterized by our friend Vyts Beliajus, "largest and most complete camp in the country". It has had a stable, talented, and dedicated committee that meets all year and organizes details of future camps and faculties. Of great importance to Stockton's remarkable success is the large, experienced staff of seasoned workers that literally "oil the works", ensuring the smooth operation of the camp. All of these several dozen people, with the possible exception of the director who is part of the University faculty, are volunteers; all are experienced dancers.

How did Stockton Folk Dance Camp come about? One person was the guiding light, the inspiration, the architect, the unquestioned founder...Lawton Harris. Yes, he had able assistants in establishing this remarkable organization..Walter Grothe, Vera Holleuffer, Mildred Buhler, Lucille Cznarowski, Buzz Glass, Sally Harris and myself, to name a few, but Lawton deserves top billing. He came to Stockton in the early 40's with substantial experience in the fields of religious education and recreation and with a fair knowledge of the Bay Area folk dance repertoire such as it was in those days. Factors that motivated Lawton, and us, were these: the war was over and there was an unconscious casting about by many people for recreational activity (no TV yet!); there was a real need for wholesome, invigorating family-oriented activity that could also be enjoyed by singles. Lawton felt that there was a need to bring these people together under wholesome conditions (church, school, recreation hall, etc.) with attractive programming. He recognized folk dancing for the healthy, cultural, social and friendship-generating activity that it was. He realized that there was not only a sad lack of good music but, more important, a lack of teachers.

Working with Stockton YMCA, where he started folk dance classes, and with the College of the Pacific, much later to become the University of the Pacific, Lawton initiated a number of workshops, institutes and festivals with help from San Francisco Bay area leaders and even importing our friends, the Hermans, from New York, who were most helpful.

Lawton's talents were recognized by the College and in due time he was employed as a professor in the field of religious education. The college was, and to a certain extent is today, under Methodist Church sponsorship. Here he served the College well and, as Director of Folk Dance Camp served the Folk Dance world equally well until his untimely death of a heart attack in 1967.

Jack McKay was selected as camp director and, after 20 years of outstanding service, elected to step down in 1987 with Bruce Mitchell of Sacramento taking the helm. Bruce has attended camp since 1952, invited to committee membership in 1968, has extensive experience in the folk dance field as a dancer, teacher at all levels, a director of several exhibition groups, and has three times been invited to the Orient as a guest instructor in International Dance. No doubt Stockton will benefit from Bruce Mitchell's experience and leadership abilities.

Details of the 1988 Stockton Folk Dance Camp can be found elsewhere in this magazine. The annual flyer with much more information is being printed and will be available soon. Assuming that you have a reservation for either or both of the two identical one week sessions, arrive and check in on Sunday, get your room assignment, schedules and syllabus, stow your gear and get ready for your opening party. Keep in mind that Stockton has been sold out in recent years and that picking up a last minute no-show slow, while possible, is risky. Newcomers receive special treatment and escort service detailing where everything is and who's who on faculty. The opening party is a fine get-acquainted experience for newcomers and a heartwarming homecoming for veterans.
