



1989 NORTHWEST FOLKLIFE FESTIVAL

Over 5,000 participants and 180,000 visitors are expected at the 18th Annual Northwest Folklife Festival, from May 26 to May 29 at the Seattle Center. Because so many give of their time to help put on the event, the Festival is free of charge and open to anyone.

There will be 19 stages with continuous performances day and night, featuring over 750 groups presenting dance, music and storytelling from across the country and around the world. In addition, there will be more than 165 craftspeople offering their finest handmade wares at the Folklife Marketplace. Chefs at 30 food booths in the Ethnic Food Village serve freshly prepared Anyone international foods. can learn dances or music at one or more of the over 100 workshops during the weekend, and there will be the Roadhouse, featuring square, contra and swing dancing, rollicking until midnight every night.

SYMPOSIUM HIGHLIGHTS

Santa Barbara's Labor Day Week International Folk Dance Symposium is unique in many ways and stands out especially for its outdoor presentations and evening functions.

The picnic at Goleta Beach Park on Friday, 9/1, has been an annual event since the first year of the camp - 1975. Director, Tom Bozigian, has assembled over the years an excellent group of musicians who have provided ethnic Balkan music for the dancers. The event draws a large crowd consisting not only of the Symposium people but also of ethnic groups from throughout the

community. This year's picnic has the backing of the Santa Barbara Chamber of Commerce. A similar Armenian picnic will occur on campus on Sunday.



an Introduction

INDONESIA

Claudia Immerzeel

The rich and unique cultures of Indonesia are among the most fascinating anywhere, and yet, the average American cannot say where, or what, Indonesia is. Modern Indonesia is a republic comprised of approximately 13,000 islands, situated along the equator between Australia to the south east and the Phillipines to the north. Although the official language is Bahasa, a variety of Malay, it is not an

ethnically homogenous country. There are many ethnic groups existing throughout the islands, each with its own language and set of customs.

The Hindu and Buddhist cultures came to Indonesia nearly 2,000 years ago and left a rich cultural legacy, especially in the arts. Their influence in the arts is still strongly felt, even though 90% of the population is now Moslem. The Europeans controlled

Indonesisa from the 17th century to 1949, when Indonesia declared itself a republic. They, too, left their mark, as did the ethnic Chinese, 15 million of whom are currently living in Indonesia. The cultures of Indonesia have been popular with anthropologists and tourists, since Margaret Mead studied Bali in the 19-20's, and are well worth study for for their uniqueness and depth.

Indonesian classical dance is an art form as highly developed and technically oriented as Western ballet, and can be difficult to appreciate at first viewing. It is an extrapolation of the vivid religious and ethical life of its people. Many Westerners are familiar with films and photos of Balinese temple dancers but there are many other types of Indonesian dance. Although Sunda is a region of Western Java, the Sundanese have a separate ethnic identity and culture.

It has been said that ballet's aesthetic impact lies in its weightlessness--in being "off the ground", even to the illusion of flying. Sundanese dance's aesthetic is in describing the weight of personal character through movement. Though any one performance can be seen as a small portion of a very large repertoire of dance drama, which includes stories from both Indian and indigenous sources, an individual dance always displays a particular character as he or she exists in their external emotional state.

All dances are proscribed patterns of gesture, without improvisation. Particular movements and gestures have names: robah tatak (shoulder rolls), kuda kuda (bent knee stance),

godeh (head rotation), and so on. Although these gestures are used by each character, the style in which a particular gesture is done is unique to each character.

These stylistic differences can be clarified by comparing three dances.s Linyepan is an unmasked dance of a female character. On the Sundanese scale of values, she represents the most alusan (refinement). Pangawa, is a male dance of a petty official or bureaucratic type, and Rowana is a red masked dance of an insulted king.

All Linyepan's movements are circumspect, slow, and well-considered, as this is the e-pitome of proper moral and aesthetic action. The shoulder rolls are small circles compared to the large, quick and abruptly ended ones of Rowana. Linyepan's head rotation is a precise figure—8 movement of the nose, while that of Rowana is a symbolic gesture of humility to the audience and the powers—that—be, barely represented by a quick twist of the head.


The philosophic premise underlying Sundanese dance is that all men are alike in what they do; it is how each does it that reveals inner character. Therefore, the greatest dancers are those with the technical ability and control to change from character to character with ease and distinctiveness.

Sundanese dance can be appreciated on a technical level, but its greater value lies in its embodiment of traditional and still exceptionally strong religious beliefs and attitudes to self. This culture does not separate entertain-ment frorm seeking, or prac-ticing knowledge in religious matters. The flowers which decorate the stage are also offerings to spirits. Every element of the dance has a ritual or symbolic significance. The colors of the masks and their physiognomies have elaborate symbolic meaning. Masked dances have a special magic. A finely sculpted mask can seem to change expression throughout the dance.

Any description of Sundanese dance must include a genuine, heartfelt concession that here are elaborate skills and beliefs of which we have short knowledge, in mastery and mystery.








JAVANESE DANCE

The dance and musical cultures of Java are so rich and varied that it would be impossible to describe them in only a few pages. The following types of performances are what American visitors to Indonesia, particularly Java, are most likely to see.

Javanese dance has its origins in Indian classical dance and one of the characteristics which it retains is that every part of the body is a part of the dance, even when not actually in motion. Hands, toes, the head, even the eyes, are an integral part of the dance. It is highly stylized and requires grace, strength and extreme suppleness. This means that the dancers must begin training at a very early age, almost as soon as they can walk. In former times, female dancers retired in their late teens, and male dancers in their mid-twenties.

COURT DANCES

Javanese court dances are believed to be of great antiquity, but as the kratons
(princely courts) disappeared
during the past two centuries,
so did many of these dances.
Today, dance associations,
professional groups and schools, are mainly responsible
for maintaining these traditions. Traditionally, court
dances are performed in a big
open space, with the audience
seated around the performance
area.

Ceremonial dances, performed by young girls for religious celebrations, require that the dancers purify themselves for several days beforehand, with elaborate rituals and relig-

ious prohibitions. The bedaya is a grorup dance done by 7 or 9 girls, enacting stories from historical or mythical cycles or epics, accompanied by a story teller (dalang), a chorus (gerong), and an orchestra (gamelan). Serimpi, on the other hand, are performed by 2 or 4 dancers, depicting a small part of a story, usually ending with a fight dance in which the girls dance roles of the male heroes.

Battle dances, which were originally training exercises for warriors, are performed only by men, who are required to display skill at handling various weapons, athletic a-bility, as well as artistic refinement. Dramatic dances are dramatizations of complete stories, usually from mythical epics, and are performed by both male and female dancers who alternate dialogue with a story teller and chorus. The most famous example of this is wayang wong, which dramatizes stories from the Hindu epics, Rramayana and the Mahabrata, or the Indonesian Panji epics. Facial expressions are kept tot a minimum and dancers impersonate a variety of characters, including gods, kings, mythical animals, witches, and demons.

The most famous type of court dance is the topeng (masked dance). Originally performed by only men, the dancers would change characters simply by changinig masks. It takes great skill to communicate thoughts and emotions, since the dancers cannot use facial expressions.

FOLK DANCES

Javanese "folk" dances are not recreational dances. Rather, they are theatrical performances. However, they are not necessarily done by professionals. Ordinary farmers and craftsmen can be skilled and talented performers and teachers. Young girls might dance until they reach adulthood. These folk performances are the source of the more elaborate and refined court dances. Topeng dances and battle dances featuring "horsemen" on wooden horses are especially popular at village celebrations such as weddings and circumcisions.

JAVANESE MUSIC

The most famous musical performance medium is the gamelan orchestra. The word "gamel" means hammer and the gamelan consists exclusively of per-cussion instruments. The most commonly used instruments are the drums, cymbals, and several instruments which resemble European xylophones. Among these are the saron, a xylophone of metal plates which are struck with a wooden mallet and then held down with the hand to prevent overtones; the gambang, a wooden xylophone struck with two mallets simultaneously; and the gender, with its keys strung with cords above bamboo sound tubes. Drumss are double-sided with different sized drum heads, the smaller head being played with the right hand. The drums direct all rhythmic chcanges, and the drummer often functions as a conductor.

The prime function of the gamelan is to accompany performances of comic plays, dances, or puppet shows. Traditionally these dances can last all day, or several days.

Although it is unlikely that these types of dances and music would ever be taught to folk dancers in Southern California, it is possible to participate in classes and watch dances of Java and otherr ethnic groups of Indonesia. A number of dancers, musicians and teachers connected with UC Santa Graz and UCLA offer classes and an occasional performance, both of which are well worth looking into by anyone interested in Javanese dance and music.



INDONESIAN COOKERY: The Foods of the Gods

Of all aspects of Indonesian culture, cooking is the best example of the synchretization of the historical and cultural forces that have swept through the Indonesian islands. Indonesia was once known as the Spice Islands. Nutmeg, cinnamon and allspice originated there. Other popular spices are ketoembar (coriander), cumin, laos (galangal root), djeroek peroet (dried citrus leaf), ginger and sereh (lemon grass). The trade routes from India and Sri lanka brought kerri (curry) to the islands, which doesn't refer to a particular spice, but to a type of dish, a meat or vegetable, served in a sauce. Although the early Indonesians were Hindus (and 3% of the population still is), they are not vegetarians. Fish, chicken and pork were all favorite meats.

When Islam swept through the islands, pork was prohibited, but it continues to be popular among non-Moslems, especially the 15 million ethnic Chinese. The Chinese introduced foods such as lumpia (spring rolls), pangsiet (won tons) and bahmi (chow mein). The Europeans brought corn, potatoes and pineapples to this part of the world from the Americas.

The most famous Indonesian tradition is the Rijstaffel, a Dutch word meaning "rice table". It is composed of a variety of meat and vegetable dishes, accompanied by a number of condiments including ebi (dried ground shrimp), sambel boeboek (crisp shoestring potatoes), bawang goreng (french fried onions), and seroendeng (toasted coconut and peanuts). Sambal badjak and sambel oelek (chopped fried onions and peppers) are

used both as table condiments and in cooking, and they are considerably hotter than the Mexican-style salsas to which we are accustomed. Ketjap (soy sauce) is also indispensable for cooking. It is quite different from Chinese-style soy sauce, being thick and sweet. and it is never used as a table condiment.

Indonesian cooking varies a great deal between regions, and even between families. Creativity is encouraged, and a good cook can create a dish from whatever happens to be at hand. The recipes below were provided by my mother and my grandmother, Ivonne and Juliana, and reflect the personal tastes of our family.

Many ingredients for Indonesian cooking are available in supermarkets. Even the french fried onions and shoestring potatoes are available in the canned goods section. spices may be found in Thai and Vietnamese groceries but under different names. As a general rule, Dutch import stores carry most Indonesian foods because the Dutch-Indonesians returning from the former colonies have made Indonesian foods very popular in the Netherlands.

SATE (sah-tay) Barbecued Meat

2 1bs pork (or beef) cut into 1" cubes 1 med onion, chopped 1/8 tsp garlic powder 4 tsp coriander 2 tsp cumin 1/2 tsp powdered ginger 1 tsp tumeric 2 T brown sugar 2 tsp lemon juice 2 pieces laos (galangal root) 3-4 pieces lemon grass

Combine spices, oil, sugar, soy sauce, and lemon juice in a bowl. Adjust spices to suit personal taste. The flavors should blend. Add meat and toss to coat evenly. Refrigerate overnight, stirring occasionally. Soak skewers in water for 30 minutes to prevent burning. Thread meat onto the skewers and barbecue over hot coals. If using pork, be sure the meat is very well cooked.

GADO-GADO

(Salad with Peanut Dressing) Compose a salad of any combination of the following vegetables, in any desired amount: Cabbage leaves Cauliflower, raw or cooked Cucumber Bean sprouts, blanched in boiling water cooked green beans zuchinni or coyote squash boiled potatoes, cubed Hard boiled eggs or fried or raw tofu may be added. Serve with peanut dressing.

Peanut Dressing 1/2 C natural style peanut 1/4 tsp sambel (or Tabasco) 1 tsp sugar 1/2 tsp salt 1 1/2 tsp vinegar 1/4 C boiling water

Combine all ingredients and stir until very smooth. Adjust ingredients to suit personal taste. Serve warm, since it will thicken as it cools.

NASI GORENG (Fried Rice)

3 C cooked rice, completely cooled 3/4 C cooked diced meat (beef, ham, pork, chicken) 2 T Indonesian soy sauce 1/2 tsp sambel 1/4 C chopped onion

Heat oil in wok or skillet. Stir-fry onions until golden. Add remaining ingredients and mix veryr well. Stir fry until thoroughly heated. Traditionally this is garnished with strips of cooked omelette, french fried onions and cucumber.


