The Stanford University Dance Division offers an unabbreviated Grand Tour through the entire spectrum of 19th and early 20th century social dances. Victorian dances will include their Regency and Romantic era antecedents. Ragtime dance will continue into the 1920s. This will be the first time that the entire collection of vintage social dances will be covered in a single week. Participants will spend six days immersed in the dances, history, lore, music and technique of these romantic dance forms. The schedule will include illustrated presentations on dance history, costuming, period deportment, dance research, performance practices and guidelines for teaching vintage dance, along with daily review sessions and evening dances.

This will be a definitive workshop on the couple dances that blossomed in American and European ballrooms from 1800 to 1930. Classes and seminars will provide complete fundamentals for beginners as well as the latest discoveries for historians, re-enactors, instructors and professional dancers.

Richard Powers is one of the world's foremost experts in the history of social dance. A native of Vermont, he began his study of historic dance twenty years ago, and later founded the Flying Cloud Academy of Vintage Dance and the Fleeting Moments Waltz & Quickstep Orchestra in Cincinnati. He has taught numerous dance workshops throughout the U.S., Europe and Japan, and is currently a full-time instructor and dance historian at Stanford University. As serious as his research is, Richard Powers never loses sight of the central fact that these dances were originally done for sheer pleasure, usually in the gentle arms of another. He emphasizes this spirit of fun and romance without sacrificing authenticity or attention to detail. This exuberance is only historical accuracy, he insists, but it also makes his classes as much fun as the evening dances. His smooth, quietly authoritative teaching style is a delight to historic and folk dancers alike.

Tuition will be \$190, with various on and off-campus housing options. Gender balance will be maintained, with a limit of 70 participants. Deposits of \$75 are being accepted now, payable to the Stanford Dance Division at 375 Santa Teresa, Stanford, CA 94305. Past Stanford dance weeks have filled, so early registration is recommended. In the Beginni

This is an update of an article I wrote for a Teacher-Training Seminar a few years ago. If any of you readers have attended one of these seminars, this may help to cement some of the things you learned. If not, it may be a help anyway, but please take advantage of the opportunity when these seminars are offered.

Teaching international folk dance to <u>any</u> group is a skill that requires practice, flexibility, and a sincere desire to communicate what you know to your class. Teaching beginners is not much different at all, except in a very few particulars.

The most common mistake most groups make is to assign the teaching of beginners to a beginning teacher. In fact, beginning dancers need the best, most experienced teacher you can give them. Advanced dancers can learn from anyone, even a teacher who cannot speak English, because they already know how to move. Beginners, for example, often have to be told how and when to shift their weight from one foot to the other. For this reason, they require a teacher who is used to watching a crowd and sensing how much of a breakdown a step needs.

The following ideas on running a regular beginners class are the result of teaching a beginners class for 26 years. However, I find that most of the ideas apply equally well to an intermediate class. I'm not going to discuss a One-Night-Party for a non-dance group, such as a church social, etc. That's a special case which requires a separate article.

The most common mistake most groups make is to assign the teaching of beginners to a beginning teacher.

TIME! Don't penalize those who arrive on time by a wait for those who are late. Rather, start playing a ce on the MINUTE the class is supposed to start -a dance the class has learned recently. This d two things. First, it gives them a chance to practice e already learned, and second, it gets them warmed up. reginners' dances are not very demanding physically, dance is enough, although in an intermediate class, be more appropriate before starting to teach.

AN. Know what you are going to teach and in what your progression of steps and dances in a logical 'ou can be flexible. If the situation warrants it, you can having a plan makes things a lot easier. It's important



to know ahead of time what cue words you're going to use in prompting the class. Some people find it difficult at first to dance and talk at the same time. For this reason, you should practice at home, dancing while cuing the steps, OUT LOUD, to an imaginary class.

Beginners learn slowly, but they're not babies. don't teach something easy <u>only</u> because it's easy. There are plenty of easy dances that are fun to do. challenge the class a little, but make sure they succeed.

As far as the progression goes, some dances lead logically into others. A few examples: The buzz step in *Ve David* can be followed by the Swedish-Finn Mixer. The opening step in Hot Pretzels can be followed by almost the same movement in Road to the Isles. Also, the rhythm of *Setnja* -- slow, slow, quick, quick, slow -- can be followed by the basic tango step, which has the exact same rhythm.

However, save the Waltz for last. It's my experience that of all the basic dance steps, the waltz is the most difficult for beginners to learn. For that matter, most experienced folk dancers waltz badly. They do an American-style side step waltz instead of the true European waltz.

Most teachers know that it helps to be able to slow the music a bit while teaching, so make sure you have a machine that has this capability. Then, after they've learned the dance fairly well, you can slowly bring the music up to normal speed. Beginners need a lot of prompting, so, after you've taught the dance, it's a big help to them if you go back to your machine and use your microphone to cue them while they're dancing to the music.

IV. Make absolutely sure you know your material. Where did you learn the dance? Have you studied the notes? Try to do the dance with style. With beginners, don't drill on style because it's more important that they have a good time and feel a sense of achievement. Tell them and show them what the style of the dance should be, so at least they can see what the dance ought to look like.

A few final comments. If you teach beginners, you must be patient and compassionate, up to a point. In any beginners' class, there may be a few people who simply cannot keep up with the rest of the class. As much as you may wish to help them, I suggest that

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I you teach beginners, you must be patient a point. In any beginners' class, there is simply cannot keep up with the rest of a may with to help them, I suggest that when 80% or more of the class has learned something, go on. don't hold back the whole group for one or two people. The same applies to answering questions from the floor. Make sure the whole class understands the question and answer it for everyone.

USE PRAISE. And lots of it! whenever they've accomplished something, tell them so. People need positive feedback.

I believe beginners should be exposed to as wide a variety of dances, from as many different countries as possible. Don't censor their first experience by not teaching line dances, or couple dances, or whatever. Remember, a teacher projects his or her attitudes in many ways and on many levels. If you teach only line dances, your class may well think there's something wrong with couple dances, and vice versa.

A final note on attitudes. Remember to show your own enjoyment and enthusiasm. Help your class to feel the same way. Keep your class exciting by not wasting time between dances. Encourage them to change partners, and use some humor. Remember that folk dancing is primarily a social and recreational activity for the majority of international folk dancers.

In the final analysis, your class should be able to walk out saying, "I had a good time tonight!"
