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

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

1998 NORTHWEST FOLKLIFE FESTIVAL

This year's Northwest Folklife Festival, Seattle's unofficial leap into summer, is gearing up for another Memorial Day weekend celebration of traditional and ethic arts, May 22-25, 1998 at the Seattle Center in Seattle, Washington. This is one of the largest no-admission charge celebrations of ethnic and traditional arts

in North America. From 11 am-11 pm, the Festival packs 4 days with dance and music performances, visual arts, handson ethnic children's activities, music and dance workshops, handmade crafts, imported items, international foods, and demonstrations of traditional arts.

Norte y Sur, un solo pueblo: The Chicano/ Mexicano Legacy into the Millenium, is the special focus of the 1998 festival. There will be an in-depth examination of the Chicano/Mexicano community of Washington state and their contributions to the cultural fabric of the Pacific Northwest. Included will be historic and fine arts exhibits, a concert of Maestros del Son: Festival of Mexican Regional Music, a symposium, traditional dance performances, and workshops, amongst other features.

Norte y Sur is only one of the many programs at Folklife: others include Japanese taiko drumming, blues, Irish step dance, bluegrass, African marimbas, old time fiddle music, Native American Storytellers, HipHop, reggae, and more, all filling the Festival's 18 stages with over 1,000 dance and music performances and activities. 38^{TH} TOPANGA BANJO FIDDLE CONTEST

This year's event is set for Sunday, May 17, from 9 a.m.-6 p.m. at the Paramount Ranch near Agoura in the Santa Monica Mountains. This is a day-long family event featuring bluegrass, old-time music and folk songs, folk dance, and craft and environmental booths. Each of the four stages houses different aspects of the festival: one, the contest stage, is where the banjo fiddle competition and professional entertainment takes place; the dance stage is where Clog, Contra, English Country, Square, International and Scottish Country dancing occurs; the railroad stage highlights drinking songs, Scottish and Irish songs, songs about women, American songs of protest and California songs; and the pavilion stage is where the fiddle playoffs, cowboy poetry, country music, children's crafts and songs, and the Angel City Chorale can be heard. As in every year, musicians are encouraged to bring their instruments and participate in informal jam sessions. Food is available, but picnickers are welcome to bring their own.

Tickets are sold only at the gate. Parking and shuttle bus are free from the parking lots. To get there, take the Ventura Freeway to the Kanan Road off ramp, go south mile to Cornell Way, turn left and continue 2 miles to the Paramount Ranch entrance. NEW MEXICO FOLK DANCE CAMP

The 15th Annual New Mexico Folk Dance Camp is from August 5-August 9, 1998 at Highlands University I historic Las Vegas, New Mexico. The 5th annual Folk dance/Folklore weekend of the North American Federation of German Folk Dance Groups is planned for July 17-19th in the *Deutsche Haus* of Indianapolis, sponsored by the Indiana German Heritage Society. The focus of this year's event will be the dances and folkways of the Rhine-Palatine region of Germany. Jochen and Uschi Muller of the *Verbandfur Volkstum und Heimat in Rheinland-Pralze V*. Rhineland-Palatine) will present dances from the Rhine region, the Eifel, and the Westrich area of the Palatine. The weekend will also feature community singing, craft sessions for making artifacts used in various Palatine folk customs, and an exhibit on the subject of Rhenish Carnival. HUNGARIAN FOLKLORE & FOLK MUSIC SYMPOSIUM

This symposium takes place from June 21-28, 1998 in Pittsburgh, PA. Featured will be Szucs Gabor and his wife, Mariann, teaching the music, dance and songs from the village of Szaszcavas, a small mixed Gypsy-Hungarian village of around 900 in the Kis-K/l/lt region in the area of Kutasfvld. Two bands will provide live music; one is the Szaszcsavas Ensemble, which consists of 8 gypsy musicians considered to be amongst the finest in Hungary.

1998 Events Information for Croatia and Macedonia (listed chronologically)

May 6-11, 1998

Photo exhibit, "Romski Gjurgjovden – Erdelez in Skopje", an exhibit of 60 photographs by Prof. Elsie Dunin. Her documentation of the Gypsy (Roma) annual St. George—Erdelez celebration spans the 30 years from 1967-1997. An accompanying monograph/catalog in three languages (English, Macedonian and Romani) describes the St. George event and provides a time-line listing of socio-economic-political markers over

three decades of the Skopje Roma. The exhibit overlaps a 2-day symposium: Spiritual and Material Culture of the Roma.

Both the exhibit and symposium are scheduled to overlap with this years St. George-Erdelez. Skopje residents may observe the traditions of the multi-day event that begins early morning on May 5th and finishes by nightfall of May 9th. Traditional activities include a visit to the spring waters (utile pani) located at an Eastern Orthodox church to gather green branches, music and dancing at the crossroads below the church in the morning hours of May 5th, lamb sacrifices in the Roma communities on May 5-6, and on May 9th, late afternoon on the hillside at the edge of the old town, feasting, music and dancing.

July 9-August 27, 1998

Korcula, a town on the island of the same name, has two markers to fame: it is the birthplace of Marco Polo and is a town that continues in the old traditions of sword dancing. In the town, there is a combat sword dance done in an old style play format with speaking parts (Moreska), and in each of the five oldest villages on the island, chain sword dances, "Kumpanija" will be performed. These performances will be followed by frequent presentations of dance in town and in the villages. The closing festival program is slated for August 27th. The calendar of dance events will be posted on a web site: http://www.korcula.net.

July 23-26, 1998

The 32nd International Folklore Festival in Zagreb, Croatia, will be presented on these dates. This year's festival includes dance, music and costumes of Croatian and international groups, especially highlighting groups that were unable to participate in the Smotra due to war damage and refugee status. The sponsors of this year's festival are sup-

porting the reorganization of eight groups from villages in Konvalve, Vrlika, Zadar, Glina, Baranja and Vukorar, and restoration of their costumes. As with past festivals, the artistic director of the festival, Dr. Zorica Vitez (who is also the director of the Institute of Ethnology and Folklore Research for Croatia) will coordinate theme-related activities and exhibit. No admission is charged to spectators of the performances or accompanying events.

the Korčula Sword Dance Festival

The First Festival of Sword Dances on Korcula Island – A Retrospective

My latest weekend trip was to Korcula (a rampart-walled port town) on the island of the same name, from Dubrovnik...a two hour drive plus a 20 minute ferry crossing. Sunday night (August 24) was the final event of a "first-time" three week "Festival of Sword dances [Festival Viteskih Igara]. With the realization that this island contains unique dance treasures, the Korcula Tourist Agency planned this "pilot" festival" to see if there was any potential of making their sword dances a major tourist attraction for the island.

I was hair-raisingly impressed watching a parade and program of men's dance societies from the five oldest villages on the island. They have maintained their multi-figured chain sword dances (called *Kumpanija* or *Mostra*) since at least the 16th century (exact years are unknown). Additionally, the town of Korcula has maintained its Moreska (a sword dance, but also drama displaying sword battles between the armies of two kings, who fight over a damsel). Not only are these village and town sword dances intact, but within the villages, the total ritual complexes are intact, which occur on various dates during the year (mostly in the winter). The Festival offers a compact comparative look at these village men's dance groups that have not been influenced so far by mid-20th century folk dance ensembles or amateur performance group choreographies. Nor have their sequences of dance figures been obviously altered over the centuries.

The festival was a success with the visitors to Korcula, so that next year's Sword Dance Festival is already being planned. And it will be expanded from the first week of July through the third week of August. There will be opening and closing events that include all the village and town groups; also planned next year, sword dance groups will be invited from other adriatic towns; furthermore, there will be a calendar of village events, that one will be able to "observe." So, during the two months, there will continue to be scheduled sword dance events, either in Korcula town or elsewhere on the island.

I highly recommend that any dance-oriented travelers wanting to visit the Adriatic coast of Croatia plan a stop in Korcula during the Festival, possibly attending the Festival before or after the International Folklore Festival in Zabreb, July 22-28. Even without the Sword Dance Festival, Korcula is one of the most beautiful port cities on the Adriatic.

the Ukelele & the Braguinha

Almasud Records and Dan Scanlan will be presenting the *Ukelele & Braguinha* Project, a crossover gathering of Hawaiian and Madeirean musicians. The project consists of the production of a CD and a show to be presented at the World Expo 98 in Lisbon on September 6, 1998. Following is the story:

In the last quarter of the XIX century, there was a large wave of immigration from Madeira Island (an island in the Atlantic Ocean close to both Africa and Europe) to the New World, mainly due to enormous economic problems on the island. Places like Demerara, Hawaii, the Dutch Islands, Brazil and Panama became the most important safety harbors for the Madeiran immigrants who arrived with their traditions, beliefs and concepts intact. Culturally, those influences are still "alive and well" in some areas, as evidenced by the names of little towns, hills, and families, and by certain foods and religious festivities. Almost unexpectedly, the most important Madeiran legacy in the New World has been in the form of a musical instrument, the braguinha. The 'braguinha' is a very small chord instrument (4 chords) that was carried to Hawaii for the first time in 1889 by Manuel Nunes, one of the hundreds of instrument makers and musicians from Madeira who left the island to try his luck in the Pacific Ocean.


In Hawaii, this same instrument, renamed the 'ukulele', has become one of the most important symbols of Hawaiian traditional culture. Interestingly, in the 110 years since the arrival of the *braguinha* and its adoption by the Hawaiian culture, it has become more and more important to Hawaii and less and less important in Madeira, having been replaced by more modern instruments in its place of origin.

A few years ago, an association was founded to preserve Madeiran traditional culture, and the *braguinha* was "rediscovered." The association, ALMMA (The Association of Free Madeiran Musicians), now strives to promote Madeiran culture, to show its influence in many parts of the world, and to learn of the new influences on Madeiran of those places and their traditions. The project, "*Braguinha & Ukelele*: A Father and Son Reunion", was created to gather together musicians from Hawaii and Madeira. Together, they will interact and let music flow from their instruments, merging two cultures in one similar tradition.

nce upon a time there was a man who loved to dance. From the time he was a small boy he saw movement in the sky, in the land, in the sea. Even when he began to question his choices in life, he could not help but dance, and when Joseph's bones grew old with time, he made sure that his gift was passed on to another generation. "I'm the Dancing Man," he said, "and I have a gift for you."

This simple sweet dancing man came into our lives in a small black and white book written and illustrated about 20 years ago by one of our own, a painter, a poet, and a lover of folkdance, Ruth Lercher Bornstein. It is a gem of a children's book that can be relished by children of all ages. It seems like a very old fable, a classic. When I first came across the book, I could hardly believe that it was written by a person living nowadays and It alone by someone I know and dance with. Ruth explained it best when she said, "I wanted to tell the story of a creative life from beginning to end...and the passing on of the gift...which is my idea of a fulfilling life."

Recently, the publishers asked her to bring *The Dancing Man* back to life in a big, new colorful anniversary edition. It is a large, vividly painted eloquent book that is a tribute to the power of the creative spirit. It reached the book stores on March 23rd.

If you don't know who Ruthie is, just keep your eye out for a small bundle of energy who often carries a tote bag full of crayons, markers, papers, scissors, cardboard, and anything that can be drawn upon. She will put on a wig, funny teeth, or a wild hat with little provocation and she has bags of funny clothes and accessories that she joyfully shares so that we can all become children again. One of my favorite memories is the image of Ruth, sprawled flat on the ground, eye level with the tiny young plants that fascinated her. Next, of course, out came the sketch pad.

Ruth has already created an amazing collection of picture books. Each book expresses a wonder of nature and gentleness. These seemingly simple stories show us what is truly important in life. The illustrations pull you right into the story. They are gifts of beauty from Ruth to her many fans young and old. Her most recent book, That's How It Is When We Draw, is a collection of poems and enchanting drawings that show the "limitless possibilities of the imagination, where insects wave good-bye and a blob of brown becomes a friendly old gentleman reaching out of the page with a rose. The believably child-like drawings exuberantly celebrate the creative process." (Kirkus Review)

Books, books, books....

In addition to Ruth Bornstein, the folk dance world can boast of several other authors, two of whom have published in the last year or two. Following are brief descriptions of both the authors and their current works.

Ada Djiewanowska, well-known international dance circles for "Ada's Kujawiak #1, 2 and 3", amongst other wonderful and ever-popular Polish dances, has completed her book, "Polish Folk Dances and Songs: A Step-by-Step Guide".

Ada was born and raised in Poland, where from childhood she learned Polish national folk dances, songs, and legends. After to moving to America in 1947, she taught Polish language courses at Harvard, studied dance at the Boston Conservatory of Music, and acted as the dance director and choreographer for the Boston Krakowiak Polish Dancers. In 1979, she became the artistic director and choreographer of the Syrena Polish Folk Dance Ensemble of Milwaukee, Wisconsin. She has spent nearly ten years researching and writing this book.

Contained in its pages are historical background, step-by-step instructions and music for 80 Polish dances, including such national dances as the *Polonez*, the *Mazur*, the *Kujawiak*, the *Oberek*, the *Krakowiak* and over 70 selected dances from Mazowsze, Malopolska, Silesia, Wielkopolska and Pomorze. According to the book jacket, for each dance, there are step-by-step instructions on the dancers' positions, basic steps, and patterns. There are over 400 illustrations depicting steps and movements, and over 90 appropriate musical selections providing the musical score, lyrics in Polish, and the English translations and pronunciations for each. Each dance is accompanied by background information illuminating its historical and cultural roots, with over 28 maps and historical backdrops filled with folklore and fact – all contributing to an excellent understanding of the Polish character and people.

Says Stas Kmiec, founder and choreographer of the "Lubliniacy" Polish Song and Dance ensemble of Haverhill-Boston, "This book is not just a general overview, but an in-depth study which will be useful to tolklore scholars and enthusiasts. Background informatin gives an excellent understanding of each region presented... This is more than just dances and songs...this is helpful insight for a unique understanding of the Polish character and people."

Also published by "one of our own" is the text, "World Colors - Dolls and Dress", by Vilma Machette and co-author Susan Hedrick.

Vilma Matchette has been involved with folk costume, dance and research since she was a young girl. The knowledge she gained from her research, combined with her extensive personal library, has increased with the years, and her interests have expanded toinclude wide spreadaspects of folk and historic dress. She has worked with several museums in researchand installation of exhibits. Other work has been for many folk dance performing ensembles. Additionally, she has served as the costume judge for an annual Greek American contest in the western USA.

The dolls of a country are one of its richest visual treasures. With countries dividing and technological advances pushing the world into a different era, traditional costumes of the past are being lost. With this in mind, the authors created a full-color, highly detailed research tome to provide the readers with a record of the past and a window into the airs, spirit, and general trend of thought of the countries represented. It has been said, "Show me the dolls of a country and I will show you that country." With that thought it mind, Vilma and Susan created this text.

Organized alphabetically by country and then pinpointed to province, region, town or village, antique to modern dolls are presented in color and discussed in full detail. A complete costume commentary sheds light on the clothing traditions of each specific country.
