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Federation Corner



Jeanne Cate was first introduced to International Folk Dance in her junior/senior vears of high school by a wonderful PE teacher in Chula Vista, CA. (Won't admit what years those were, but

long enough ago to have forgotten the teacher's name.) She loved every minute of the high school classes and so continued to take folk dance as an elective every year while working on her Elementary School Teaching Credential at SDSU.

Strangely enough it was after moving to Brawley, Ca., for her first teaching assignment (where there was no folk dancing) that Jeanne found out about the many recreational folk dance groups in the San Diego area. It happened when one of her co-teachers took her to a **Cyngani** performance in El Centro, where she was introduced to a Cygani performer by her friend-- who then invited both to a Sunday afternoon program in Balboa Park the very next weekend.

That introduction, to Sunday dancing in Balboa Park. was the beginning, in that, when Jeanne moved back to San Diego three years later, she was able to find and attend as many folk dance classes as would fit into her schedule. Jeanne has been folk dancing ever since. She plans to continue folk dancing as long as she can put one foot in front of the other to the music. After her move back to San Diego, Jeanne joined Cygani for their final performance year, as well as Graham Hempel's performing group at San Diego State University until it disbanded.

Now that Jeanne is retiring from the San Diego Unified School District, she decided that it was time to become involved in supporting International Folk Dance from "behind the scenes", in recognition and gratitude to all those who "did the work to make folk dance happen" for so many years and enabling her, and others, to experience the enrichment and fun during those years. Jeanne, along with Carol Edginton, shares the job of Secretary for the FD Federation of California, South.

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Emil Genov



The office of Balkanfolk is at 74 Ulitsa Upolchenska, in Sofia. I go there to meet **Emil Genov** (above), founder, director, master teacher, and choreographer of Zornitsa, Bulgaria's "number one amateur ensemble." (Bulgarians are by nature very modest people; what they call an amateur ensemble is equal to or better than most professional ensembles in the US and other countries!)

Picture a wide, modern boulevard – Ulitsa Upolchenska. On one side is a small grassy area and an ultra-modern grocery store; on the other side, offices and apartments. In the middle of the block there is a small, run-down building with a balcony. The only indication that the Balkanfolk office is here is one small sticker with a Balkanfolk logo on the door. The hollow metal door from the street opens into a short, dark entrance way, and then onto a courtyard. I go up a flight of broken stairs, to the office with the balcony – and there is the "world headquarters" of Balkanfolk. "Folklore" says Emil, gesturing to his building amidst the surrounding larger edifices that were built during the Communist era.

Emil Genov is the number one choreographer and dance master in Sofia. Daniela Ivanova, who is now well known in the U.S., was at one time a member of Zornitsa. Emil teaches his students year-round, and when he is not teaching at Sofia's Technical University, running the 60-member Zornitsa Ensemble, which holds rehearsals five nights per week, he is managing the Balkanfolk Summer Institute for Practical Folklore. Emil is also an expert accordion player and composer, and is currently writing a book on Bulgarian folk music, with music notation, terminology, words to songs, and notes for dances.

With his "number one" student, Boris Dimitrov ("Bobbi"), now a dance teacher in his own right, Emil maintains the extensive website www.balkanfolk.com,



one of the oldest such websites to offer music, on-line shopping, costumes, Bulgarian "ring tones," information about dance workshops all over the world, and an extensive directory of ethnic dancers in every country. When you order merchandise through the Balkanfolk website, you also receive extra "goodies" in your package – stickers, magnets, coupons for your next purchase, and a lovely note from the "Balkanfolk Family." Indeed, to be at the summer institute, be included in the directory, receive monthly newsletters and emails from Emil and Bobbi, it certainly does feel like being part of an international Bulgarian family! And, speaking of family – Emil just became a grandfather in October.

Steve and I have gotten to know Emil over the past two summers, when we have been at the Balkanfolk summer institute. This past summer (2006), I had the opportunity to interview Emil for Scene, and after Balkanfolk, spending two evenings in Sofia, dancing with Zornitsa and watching their rehearsals.

When I asked Emil where Zornitsa practices, he laughed and said, "The end of the Earth!" When I visited their rehearsals, I found out why...

I get a ride in Emil's little red Renault, speeding along the boulevards. First we pick up Plamen, the accordionist who plays for classes after he finishes his day job as a security guard. After about 25 minutes we reach the "end of the Earth…" well, actually it is the outskirts of Sofia. But the metaphor aptly describes the location. It is a broken down martial arts studio, with no running water, no working toilet, no mirrors, and poor lighting. The doors to the dressing rooms don't close completely, and the dance floor has holes in it. Not just nicks and scratches – actual holes, in which the heel of a shoe could easily get stuck. **Club Directory**

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Master Bulgarian Teacher



Hey, the dancers tell me during a break; this is an improvement. Up until two years ago they were practicing on concrete!

Everyone I meet in Bulgaria, it seems, is quick to explain to me how, during the Communist era there was money for the arts, but now there is none, outside the Koutev Ensemble (national ensemble of Bulgaria) or the degree-granting universities. Emil teaches a two-year course for supplementary qualification in the theory of music, folkloric dance training, and theory of choreography at Sofia Technical University. But for his beautiful student ensemble the university gives no funds. The Zornitsa budget comes from the few leva they receive for performances, and the small monthly tuition of ten leva that students pay for the privilege of belonging. This is the oldest amateur ensemble in Bulgaria, founded by Emil in 1981. Originally started as the dance ensemble of the Technical University of Sofia, Emil soon opened it up to students from all universities, graduates, and foreign students.

The Zornitsa rehearsal begins with a series of folkloric footwork exercises which Emil developed to train every part of the feet and legs, to warm up and strengthen. These exercises are now standard in all Bulgarian dance academies, from "amateur" groups to high school dance groups to the universities where one can earn a degree in dance performance, dance teaching, or choreography. The dancers' training is based on classical exercises, but with the style of Bulgarian folk dance. Unlike Macedonia, in which the ultra-stylized technique of dancing almost completely on the half-toe, which evolved in Tanec (the national ensemble) and is now the "norm" among the new generation of dancers, in Bulgaria they have worked

Laguna FolkDancers Festival

February 9-11 it will be time, again, to gather at Ensign School for the annual Laguna Folkdancers Festival. This is one of the few multiple day folk dance festivals remaining in Southern California. Preregister before February 1 for only \$42 for the entire weekend of workshops and dance parties (see ad and registration form in this issue).

Lee Otterholt will teach dances of eastern Europe and George Fogg will teach English country dances and maybe throw in some contras during the weekend. This will be George's first workshop in California. He says "I did do a couple of school affairs when I visited Arizona once, that was a close as I got to California."

A couple of local motels offer discounted rooms for festival participants if you mention Laguna Folkdancers when making reservations. The Travelodge at 1951 Newport Blvd. is has about 58 rooms with outside entrances. The Cozy Inn is new on the list for this year. Cozy Inn is at 325 W. Bay St. just west of Newport Blvd. and has only 29 rooms, all of which are nonsmoking. Make your reservations early, before they fill up. The Ramada, used in past years, is still available but no longer on the discount list.

Who is George Fogg?

George A. Fogg was born in Newburyport, MA, and began English dancing with the Country Dance Society, Boston Centre, Inc. In 1968, he became the teacher/leader of the "Cardigan Dance/Hiking Weekend" held near Bristol, New Hampshire, and has been teaching English Country Dance ever since.

Besides teaching hundreds of "one-night stands," George has taught many organizations, dance camps, and workshops. He has also reconstructed Early American dances and steps. George is well known as a regular at the Mainewoods Dance Camp, whether he's on the staff or helping wherever needed or teaching at the evening parties. Although George is quick to remind you that he teaches English Country Dance and Colonial dances, you might find him teaching a Scottish dance occasionally, too!

George is particular about finding great recordings for the dances he teaches, so the music is often a beautiful experience in itself. He has a talent for teaching style with a wry smile, and, with his thick New England accent, has a real knack for getting you into the spirit of these dances.

DANCING WITH TWO LEFT FEET (20)



Some times writing this column just happens. I get a thought and the words just flow. And, sometimes nothing happens. I would like to share a moment with you when nothing happened:

A blank page is your friend. It is a stranger that comes into your life

with a promise of a lifetime opportunity. Treat it with kindness. Don't fight it.

Open your soul to it. Let it know who you are, where you have been and where you dream of going. How are you going to get there? What will you see on your journey? How will you feel during your trip? Whom will you meet on the way? What are their stories? Where have they been?

And, when you get there, what will you see? As you cross the mountains, lakes and rivers, look around. Take a stroll through the countryside. It is quiet, peace-ful. It is even safe to close your eyes and daydream.

Suddenly, like a clap of thunder, a flock of birds darkens the sky as their chirping is drowned by the rhythmic sounds of drums and trumpets. The darkened sky gives light to a village filled with happy people moving in unison to the music. They are dancing to the beat of a gypsy band. The smell of roast lamb wafts through the air. You join hands in the winding dance circle next to a beautiful girl. She smiles at you. You smile back. She says something to you, but you do not understand. It is a foreign language. You respond, but the words are lost in the noise of the music. She smiles at you. You smile back.

The music stops. She holds your hand and leads you to a table with her relatives. She offers you a glass filled with wine. They raise their glasses and toast you. You lift your glass and sip the wine. They laugh. One of the men offers you a plate of roasted lamb. You try to refuse. He insists. You reluctantly accept. There are no forks. You grab the bone and take a bite. The meat melts in your mouth. They refill you glass of wine. You take another drink. The music starts again and the young girl leads you into the circle. The beat is fast and you can barely keep up. You don't mind. The dance circle spins faster and faster. The faces are a blur. Slowly the village melts and you are staring at a page brimming with words. Your blank page friend is gone, only to return tomorrow.

WANING FOLK DANCERS

In addressing the question of waning folk dancers (Folk Dance Scene, Nov. '06), I find myself fortunate to have learned to dance at an early age as a teenager in the late '50s. I was living in Stockton, CA which I realize now as being a major hub of folk dancing.

At that time **Bea Mitchell**, mom to the director of the Stockton Folk dance Camp **Bruce Mitchell**, was teaching at least two dance groups, a youth group and an adult group. **Ardith "Cookie" Mitchell** was my dance partner for a while in that youth group.

That was many years ago and the girl "got away", actually so did "Cookie", alas but I was hooked on folk dancing, even danced for a short time with a performance group in San Francisco known as Sokoli, in the early 60s.

But had it not been for that youth group, I probably would not have stayed interested in folk dancing. I mean dancing with a group of kids my own age was a definitely way cool. Also in those days, anyone over 30 was, you know, over the hill, eh? Well, has that thinking changed any these days?

Dancing the Tango



Why in the world would anyone with a sore leg choose to attend the Stockton Folk Dance Camp? To learn to tango, of course! After learning a little about its history, (see Let's Dance! Mav/June 2006) I decided why not. It looks so elegant when done properly, while at the same time so

natural. It should be easy for an experienced folk dancer to blend right in.

In Stockton one week later: "Yeah - right!".

A murmur overheard on the dance floor: "I found him so into himself in the tango. He turned to his left. When he turned back to the right I was gone."

Murmur No 2: I asked a woman what it was like to tango with another woman. "It was so good," she responded, "I asked her to marry me."

Murmur No. 3: Man: "Tango is easy. There's nothing to it". His Partner: "He simply would not lead! It was quite an experience dancing with him."

In tango the man leads. No question about it. The woman responds. No question about that either. Occasionally she will find herself standing motionless, waiting for something to happen. Her partner has to move first and doesn't. It can be even more difficult for the man who has never before been concerned with deciding exactly what he will do next. But this is tango, and now he must lead his partner into what he wants her to do.

It's all up to him. Initially, the woman finds herself standing, held close in her partner's arms. A tango embrace is a warm safe feeling, she loves it. He, on the other hand, feels very much in control while at the same time more than a bit unsure of himself and his immediate future. She can do nothing until he decides to move. He stands holding her close. He has learned three, four, perhaps five dance patterns in rapid succession. So has she. Hers, however, are different moves entirely. Aside from a smooth floor they have nothing but the music in common.

He really has to begin now. The music is playing. Which pattern shall he start with? It has all become a blur. The music plays on. It offers no help. There is no fixed point at which one begins the tango. The dance simply begins when the man begins. How simple can it get?

Begin, already! Finally, a decision. They begin to move with the music. The woman follows her partner using her strangely different, yet uniquely blending footwork. It looks and feels marvelous. They do the chosen pattern twice, three times. They are delighted. He, the macho in charge, now finds himself trying to recall another pattern. Any other pattern. Can he lead her smoothly into it? Perhaps. Who knows? But which pattern? They keep dancing. They repeat the old pattern once more.

He smiles at her while waiting for his brains to function. Suddenly he remembers, no one smiles when doing the tango. Now he knows why. He realizes there is a lot of time and practice ahead of them. Tango is a soulful, serious dance not to be learned in one session, not two, or three, or even more. Finally, they sweep into a new pattern. The music continues. They glide smoothly around the room. The music is wonderful. It is very much like the man. Macho. Intense. In charge. It glides smoothly ahead. It does what it wants. It pays no attention whatever to the dancers who must join with it whenever and wherever they can.

The result of it all is that at any given moment, if there are five couples on the floor, there will be five different expressions of tango in progress. The music itself may be considered yet a sixth expression in that it has completely ignored the dancers and is also doing its own thing.

The man's relation to his woman, her response to her man, their individual relation and response to the music, and the music's response to an unseen god causes one to wonder what can it be like in Argentina? It is true, the man in that country is the "Macho", but who exactly is the "Jefe"?
