FISCAL COMMITTEE REPORT-DONATIONS

The fiscal committee met and prepared a budget for the Federation. Alas, once again we have proposed a deficit budget. This may work for the federal government, but it won't work forever for the Federation.

The main function of the Federation is to support member clubs. To that end, we provide scholarships for folk dance related camps with the recommendation of the clubs, we provide insurance for the clubs, we provide a subsidy to clubs that put on festivals and don't cover all of the costs with admission, and we provide a subsidy to those clubs who want to hire a visiting master teacher. We publish this magazine, and we sponsor beginners' festivals and camps. Do you have suggestions for other things that we should be doing?

Our only stable income, beyond insurance, is \$1 per dancer at member clubs. How can we do so much with so little? In one word, donations. Many years ago, several prominent dancers donated funds to establish scholarships to honor deceased loved ones: vearly a few individuals make modest contributions when renewing their associate memberships; and last year we received a substantial donation which has allowed us to put on a beginners' festival, undertake the master teacher program, as well as digitizing our collection of old video tapes for easy access on the Federation website.

So here is my pitch. If you want to support club folk dancing for all of the joy, comradery, stimulation and exercise that it has given us, please consider making a donation. We are a 501(c)3 organization; vou will receive a receipt for tax purposes, and you will be helping your favorite activity to continue to keep us nimble of body and mind.

English country dancing (ECD), as the name implies, was the social dance of the country folk, popular in England and the Colonies from the mid-1500s up through the early 1800s. Of course, country dancing wasn't only for the farmers and the milkmaids; Henry VIII enjoyed country dances, as did George Washington more than 200 years later. Dancing was a favorite pastime of Jane Austen, as evidenced by her novels, in which dancing is an important part of the story. Watch any version of "Pride and Prejudice," and you'll see just how important dancing was. ECD runs the gamut from elegant to rowdy, stately to silly, simple to complex. The Jane Austen movies show the social nuances and romance of ECD. Go to a Renaissance faire and you'll see how lively and boisterous the dancing can be.

The marvelous tunes that accompany the dances are likewise filled with variety. In ECD, unlike many other folk styles, each dance has a specific tune that goes with it. In the 1700s, many of these tunes were popular songs, such as the subversive Liliburlero, or the tune that later came to be known as the carol "Masters in the Hall." Dances were also set to original compositions. ECD written today is as likely to have an original melody as to use airs taken from Handel, Purcell, O'Carolan, or other classical composers. In olden times, dancing was more than just a popular pastime; it was one of the most common ways to socialize, to meet new people and hear new gossip. Before television, before radio, and in towns that lacked theaters and racetracks, dancing (and the music that goes with it) was the prime form of entertainment. Today, with so much variety at our fingertips, the ECD events must compete with the cornucopia of other arts and culture programs.

So what is the attraction of this archaic form of dancing to a modern society with so many choices for its leisure time? Pretty much what it was 400 years ago: having a good time meeting nice people while dancing to live music. Danced in lines, or sometimes circles or squares, the dancer is interacting with the entire room, not just with his or her partner. And because the steps are basically the same for both the men and the women, no one has to worry about leading. The dances are fun and accessible to beginners, but also have subtleties that appeal to experienced dancers.

The popularity of ECD has been growing in the Southland over the last eight or ten years. From virtually no public social dances, there are now monthly and bi-monthly dances in Santa Barbara, Pasadena, Monrovia, Culver City, Anaheim, Riverside and the San Diego area. These dances continue the social tradition of country dance by welcoming everyone of all ages and all levels of dance experience. Every dance is taught and prompted, and it is not necessary to come with a partner. These dances are informal affairs, with casual clothes and soft-soled shoes the order of the day. Most of the communities also host balls or special festive dances where period attire is "admired but not required." There are several noexperience-required historical-themed balls throughout the year, such as the Jane Austen Ball in Pasadena, the Admiral Nelson Ball in Fullerton, and the Victorian St. Nicholas Ball in Pasadena. There are also experienced-dancer all-era balls produced by the Santa Barbara, Culver City, and San Diego communities. Lots of other special events are scattered throughout the year and across the country. English Folk Costume

We folk dancers all know about German lederhosen and dirndls, and maybe about Swedish men's yellow knee-britches, Dutch lace caps, and Hungarian full skirts. But did you ever stop to wonder what English folk costumes look(ed) like?

The reason we can stop and wonder, and not come up with anything, is because England basically did not have a "folk costume." The village peasants for the most part wore clothing that looked pretty much like that of the rich landowners, if a bit shabbier. How that happened is rather interesting and somehow very British.

Starting way back in medieval times, it seems, the nobles in the manors had a tradition of visiting their tenants on December 26, the day after Christmas, to share with them (in good Christian fashion) a little bit of their wealth, which they often put into boxes for easier carrying. Hence, to this day in Britain, Canada, and other parts of the erstwhile British Empire, December 26 is called Boxing Day.

Some of the boxes carried food and drink. Since there was no refrigeration to speak of, the meat from the animals butchered for the great Christmas feast would not keep very long, so some of it was distributed to the tenants the next day, rather than waste it. The part of the animal that would spoil first was what my father called the *innards*—the liver, heart, and other organ meats. At that time, however, these innards went by the name of *numble*, and were typically baked into pies that could then be carried conveniently to the surrounding cottages. Since the tenants didn't get meat very often, they viewed it as a great joy to be given a numble pie to eat. Eventually, cuisine changed, and so did the foods distributed. And people forgot what numble was, or what it meant to eat a numble pie. Er, what was that? *Eat an 'umble pie??* (Speak proper: don't drop your H's, dear: that's *humble*!) They so completely forgot what the expression meant that they reanalyzed its meaning, as well as the sounds: Why, that must have been terrible for the landlords to force people to *eat humble pie!!!* (And thus do languages, and gracious acts, change their significance.)

Some of the boxes, however, carried the clothing no longer needed by the people in the manor house. The peasants gratefully took that clothing, mended it here, and tucked it up there to fit... and ended up wearing exactly the same thing as the lords and ladies of the manor, even if the fashions were a tad out of date. And that is why the English have no discernible "folk costumes" except for very special events like Morris dancing (see *photo*).

Morris dancing was traditionally done *only* by men, in teams ("sides") of 6, sometimes with ancillary characters (hobby-horseman, fool, leader, musicians) who did not dance. This ritual was a crucial part of the *male* contribution to the "luck" of the village—that is, to the agricultural abundance for that year. (In college,

When I finally saw a genuine Morris team in a Shropshire lane years later, I saw how wrongly we danced: these doughty men whaled on each other's staves so hard that chips were flying!)

The most common costume is/was a white shirt and pants with colored ribbons tied crossways across the chest, and pads of bells tied to the shins. This costume is very close to the ritual costumes of men in both the Basque area of the Pyrenees and along the two banks of the Danube as it flows between Romania and Bulgaria—men who also are dancing special rituals to ensure "luck" or abundance for the

Since aspects of the dances, too, are similar, and can be traced way back to the prehistoric farmers of Europe with their attempts to survive, one has to discard the 19thcentury scholars' guess that the word "Morris" came from "Moorish." The Moors didn't enter Europe until medieval times. and the fact that in a few areas Morris dancers blackened their faces stems from quite another source. Since the Morris men danced for the good of everyone, not for their own glory, they often disguised their faces in various wavs-bv blackening them or otherwise covering them (see sketch). In fact, it was usually considered "unlucky" to say aloud that you recognized any of the disquised dancers!

BRUCE HAMILTON



Bruce Hamilton is a thoughtful and energetic teacher of English and Scottish country dancing. He started dancing in college and took up teaching in the early 1970s. He founded the San Jose English dance group and has taught English country dancing all over the United States and abroad.

He is a founding member of the Deer Creek Morris Men, a 15

-year participant in The Christmas Revels, and past president of the Country Dance and Song Society.

Bruce has been focusing on non-choreographic elements of English Country Dance (ECD). He doesn't teach many new or complex dances (claims he can't remember them!) but instead focuses on skills that apply across all dances. He is interested in how the dancers move, how they give weight (provide resistance or tension when hands are joined), how they match the music, how well they work with their partners, etc. In workshops Bruce also reviews the fundamentals of turns, heys, rights and lefts, using dances that will help these people work on those skills.

He carries this focus into his sought-after callers' classes, which he's done for the last three decades. Training English country dance teachers is relatively unexplored territory, and he finds it very exciting. Learning to teach takes years, but even in a weekend or week-long mini-course, he's been able to point students in useful directions, and some have made great strides.

By day, Bruce is a retired computer scientist and now helps out with his wife's dog and cat rescue organization.

He has taught at Mendocino Folklore Camp, Pinewoods English Dance Week, Family Week at Timber Ridge, and Stockton Folk Dance Camp.

Along with Steve Kotansky, Bruce will be teaching at this year's Statewide Festival in Sacramento.
