#### NATIVE AMERICAN DANCE Pow Wow

In recent decades (until the Pandemic arrived), the Pow Wow has been a major vehicle for Native American dance. At first a summer event, it now occurs year round. Its format may be a day-long singing-dancing event, or a weekend-long mini-fair with food and merchandise sales, fashion shows, midway rides, and dance exhibitions. The Pow Wow, drug and alcohol free, attracts participants from all tribes and from well outside its locale, along with Native Americans and Whites as spectators.

The Drum, the source of music for a Pow Wow, usually consists of five or six drummers, a few instrumentalists, and a group of singers. When the Pow Wow is held in a large arena it is stationed along one side, leaving the central area for dancers. If the Pow Wow is held in a large field, the Drum will be in the center and dancers will perform in a circle around it.

At the start the performing area will be blessed by a tribal leader. The Grass Dance, an age old Native American dance will likely then be presented. The dancers bow low to the ground, bounce on one foot while dragging the other foot out and around the body and tapping it on the ground (sometimes referred to as "flattening the grass"). At first only men who had been initiated into the Grass Dance Society were allowed to perform; now it is open to anyone wearing a native costume.



A grand opening parade will be led by veterans of the U.S. military carrying the American flag, followed by tribal leaders, and honorees. The colorfully adorned dancers, most of whom have been dancing since childhood, will enter and a series of dances, some all women, some all men, some mixed will take place. A portion of the dances will be inter-tribal using steps common to all tribes. Others will be specific to a particular

tribe. There is one basic rule for Pow Wow dance performances: whether the dance is patterned or free form, slow and gentle or fast and vigorous, dancers must be in sync with the rhythms of the Drum.

Out of the vast array of Native American dances, the following six are Pow Wow favorites, performed by dancers grouped by their age.

Men's Traditional Dance: a slow to moderate progression around the dance area usually composed of steps, taps, and hops. The dancer may incorporate bodily movements to illustrate life events such as a hunt. A dance for men of all ages.

Women's Traditional Dance: Some dancers will bounce in place. Others will walk straight ahead or zig-zag around the circle keeping one foot on the ground at all times to illustrate their connection to Mother Earth.

Men's Fancy Dance: Fancy means fast, vigorous, free form, with lots of leaping, turning, splits. Considerable endurance is required for the dance will last a long time and will accelerate at the end. A dance primarily for young men.

Women's Fancy Shawl Dance. With arms fully extended, dancers display their large, colorful, ornate shawls as they dance energetically in their dance space.

Women's Jingle Dress Dance. A legend tells of a medicine man with a very ill granddaughter whom he could not heal. In a dream four women appeared wearing dresses covered with objects which jingled as they danced. The medicine man made a similar dress for himself, replicated their dance before his granddaughter. She was cured. Today jingle dresses are festooned with metal cones. The dance is considered a healing dance and often its dancers will have a particular person in mind to whom their healing efforts are directed.

Man's Prairie Chicken Dance (not the Chicken Dance we know): The springtime maneuvers of a courting chicken are put on entertaining display. Participants report that the dance is very challenging because of the many contortions required.

Videos of these dances are available on the Web. In watching, keep in mind the hoary folk dance saying: "That's how it's done in my village (tribe)."

Today the Hoop Dance may be performed as an exhibition by one dancer who manipulates a dozen or more large hoops with a series of spell-binding maneuvers. (Camille and I witnessed an impressive presentation of this dance at the Gene Autry Museum in Griffith Park.)

The day's agenda may include Round Dancing in which a circle of men and their (usually) unattached partner dance beside each other around the grounds. The introduction of dancing contests, with cash prizes, a few years ago, opened the opportunity for some of the more talented dancers to create a "Pow Wow Circuit" in which they and their families travel even year round - to one Pow Wow after another, sustaining themselves on their contest winnings.

Once COVID-19 is history you will be able to attend a Pow Wow as a spectator.

In the literature describing Native American Dance are numerous comments by dancers elucidating what performing their dances means to them. Two themes recur: Through them I feel connected - to my family, to my ancestors, to my Creator. Dance is a powerful way to display the pride that I have in being me.

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## Gerda Ben-Zeev



Gerda Ben-Zeev, a long-time folk dancer with Westwood Co-op and Tuesday Gypsies, dance teacher and hard-working member of the Scene Committee passed away in October. Below is a bio of her, written years ago by Laurette Carlson:

At the end of WW II Gerda was born somewhere on the road from Czernovitz to Vatra Dormei as her

parents and sister were escaping on the last truck to Rumania before Czernovitz became part of Communist Russia. When a violent new wave of anti -Semitism arose, Gerda's father, a doctor, seeking anonymity, packed up and moved the family to Bucharest. This marked an abrupt end to the happy part of Gerda's childhood. Speaking German only, she knew no Rumanian and was taunted in kindergarten because of her clothes and language. Long lines of people tried to buy scarce food, the milk was diluted, chicken was an unusual treat.

When Gerda was 13, her family managed to get out of Rumania and cross into Yugoslavia. Although the border guards took away the few possessions they had, they felt light and liberated. Then, it was on to Athens and Tel Aviv, where Gerda had to switch to a third language, Hebrew. After high school, during service in the Israel army in the Judean Mountains by the Dead Sea, another happy period began. Gerda studied desert flowers and fauna, participated in archeological digs and built hiking trails. The group's 25 soldiers were like a family; they still hold reunions.

Later, at the University of Jerusalem, Gerda majored in biology and met her future husband. They were married in 1967 after his miraculous return from the Six-Day War. Gerda received her master's degree in biochemistry just one week before the birth of Oren in 1970. He is now an aerospace engineer. Daphna, her daughter, was born in 1971. An attorney, she is newly wed to another attorney. After graduation from medical school, Gerda's husband took his pediatric residency in New York, so she had to leave her beloved Jerusalem and learn a fourth language. Tal was born in New York in 1975. He is now finishing his law studies and soon to take the bar exam.

When Gerda's husband was awarded a fellowship at UCLA in Pediatric Hematology-Oncology, the family was uprooted again. Needing intellectual stimulation, Gerda began working at UCLA doing research in biochemistry. She has continued this absorbing work at the same lab ever since. At that time Gerda's family bought a home in Westwood. Ten years later her husband decided he had had enough of marriage and walked out on her and the children at the time the entire house was being torn up and remodeled.

At this, the lowest point of her life, Gerda discovered folk dancing. Never having danced before she was at first hesitant and shy. The transformation, as she became one of our outstanding teachers, is indeed a marvel. Adding to her profound interest and expertise in dance, she has developed many warm friendships among folk dancers. Gerda is deeply grateful for these positive effects on her life and hopes to maintain her bright outlook for years to come.

# Below are some thoughts and feelings about Gerda and her passing:

I met my dear friend Gerda the first year we both started dancing - 1988! Gerda's daughter and my son dated for a while and we had hoped to teach our future grandchildren to folk dance. That never happened yet we remained close friends all through the years. I will miss her terribly.

Gerda had an insatiable curiosity and in her retirement she pursued intellectual enrichment. She became a member of UCLA's Plato Society, researching and presenting in many areas such as art, music, history... Gerda also became more involved in her temple and would present to the congregation as well. Although she was fluent in four languages she also began to study Italian.

Friendships came easily to Gerda. She loved travel and made friends everywhere. On a trip to Norway with Lee Otterholt she met three other folk dancers and they became close. The "Norwegians", as she referred to them, often met and traveled together over the years.

Family always came first to Gerda. She adored her six grandsons and began a tradition of taking each on a trip to the destination of their choice when they reached age twelve. Only her youngest grandson missed this wonderful opportunity because of Gerda's health issues. It was a great disappointment to her that she wasn't able to travel with him.

Gerda not only taught folk dance but was an invaluable member of the Folk Dance Scene committee for many years. She continued to work on Scene until the last month of her life.

Gerda was a very private person and that, combined with the isolation of COVID, meant not many of her friends were aware of how sick she had become. She was a fearless fighter against the onslaught of her illness. Her three children flew into Los Angeles to be with her when she decided the time had come to give up the fight. They were with her constantly to comfort and support her.

### HIGHLIGHTS OF FEDERATION COUNCIL MEETING SEPTEMBER 26, 2021 9:30 A.M.

## Chinese New Year is Feb. 26, 2022 (Note change of date)

East West Workshop will be February 26, 2021, not Feb. 5. Currently the group is using the Cerritos Senior Center. They close at 5 pm. Usually the festival goes from 1 pm to 5:30 pm. If they close at 5, then we would need to close at 4:30 (because we need time to clean, clear, and get out). It depends on next year's schedule which we don't know yet. If it is still 1 - 5, then we will cancel the festival. Wen-Li was asked about holding a shorter festival, but indicated he didn't like the idea. Wen-Li was asked about whether this affects the presence of a guest teacher. He replied that they hadn't invited one yet. Diane asked that they keep posting about the event. Shana suggested having a guest teacher at the June event instead of the Feb. event.

### **Pasadena Winter Fest**

Pasadena is going to hold a Winter Fest, but no location has been identified yet. It may not occur depending on the results at Ojai. When asked what would be the evidence about Ojai that would affect the Pasadena event, the sponsors responded that Ojai is a measure of the number of people that may come. Currently, the rule is that Pasadena requires a mask. It was determined during the conversation that there is no real connection between the 2 events. However, Pasadena is inside, and it is a 4-hour event. Do people want to dance in masks for 4 hours?

### Laguna Fest March 4-6, 2022

It's still on for the first week in March. The committee is currently arranging teachers as well as back up teachers, and firming up the facility.

### Webmaster's Report

Dick has added website URLs to the Camps listing so dancers may contact a camp to see whether they are closed, on Zoom, or are going live. He has added, in the History section, a Camps (Closed) page. He continues to keep up the Master Teachers pages, updating biographies, and trying to keep up with folks who are deceased (please let him know of any changes!). Finally, Dick continues to update the Calendar page. Dick also takes care of any problems submitted by appreciated folk dancers! Shana added he makes changes very quickly.

Fall CampMarc Rayman and Jan Rayman,Fall Camp co-chairs

Registration opened on July 17 with an email announcement to more than 800 recipients. The dates of the camps are Nov. 12-14, 2021, Nov. 11 – 13, 2022.

US policy on entry for Italian citizen Roberto Bagnoli is planned to be relaxed in time for his travel to Fall Camp. (We learned that some people mistakenly believed there were relevant restrictions on entry to the US for Canadian residents Sonia & Cristian, but that was incorrect.)

Fall Camp continues to be threatened by the pandemic. The contract with Brandeis-Bardin specifies that if we cancel between today and Oct. 13, the Federation pays a penalty of \$7500. If we cancel after that date, the penalty is \$15,000. We requested direction from the Federation president and Finance Committee regarding how much money the Federation was willing to risk losing for conducting Fall Camp 2021 or canceling it. They established a limit of \$7500.

Well-intentioned health-based constraints on Fall Camp will be imposed by federal, state, and local governments as well as by Brandeis-Bardin. We have conducted two polls of campers to gauge the level of interest in attending under some specific credible scenarios. In addition, we are continuing to devise and consider alternate plans to aid in deciding whether we can conduct a safe, comfortable, fun camp without risking exceeding the Federation's limit. It is too soon to know.

### Scholarship Shana Winokur

Shana stated that the recipients of scholarships were announced. They received 3 requests and all 3

were approved for Fall Camp. She suggested that if Fall Camp is cancelled, then the committee could offer them other camps to attend. Scholarships were approved in Aug. for Fall. Shana suggested that they could open scholarships in April for next year's summer camps. Marc thanked the scholarship committee for its work for Fall Camp.

### Insurance Julith Neff

Insurance goes from Nov. to Nov., so any active clubs need to send in forms to Julith by mid-Oct. Diane added that the insurance contact could go to the Federation website, then to publications in order to find the insurance forms. Since our current insurance provider has a contract period that runs from November 9 to November 9 of the following year, Julith will need to send for new certificates for any active clubs around mid-October. She states that some groups may have changed venues since starting up again. Therefore, she would like to receive written certificate requests from all clubs who will be dancing from now to the end of the year with your current dancing location.

It was suggested that we could send out the information to club presidents. If a club has not changed location, then send information to Julith that the location is the same, and who the contact person is with their email address. Julith stated that NFO insurance is cheaper because we are not paying by member. Shana asked in the past we needed to keep the old sign-in sheet for 5 years, is that still necessary under NFO? Julith will ask about this as we no longer submit rosters. Mindy suggested that people should still sign-in for insurance purposes. Diane added that the membership packet for 2021 did not include insurance information. Julith is now asking for insurance information because she wants to stay current so that clubs are covered. Diane will send a letter to all club delegates; if the delegate is not the insurance rep, they need to forward it to the person who is in charge of insurance ONLY if the club is currently dancing now. Diane stated that the insurance policy continues through Feb and that we are just doing a continuance of insurance.

### **Old Business**

#### Membership Renewal/Insurance for 2022

Packets are to be sent to Delegates on October 31, 2021. Renewal dues and forms to be submitted by **Dec. 15, 2021**. Diane researched about the

Federation paying for 6 months of membership after they resume dancing as stated by Marshall during June 27 meeting. Diane could not find any evidence of this. Marshall stated that the Federation Relief was about insurance starting in the middle of the year. The Federation would pay for all insurance for the year for 2021. However, Marshall commented that the membership dues were never covered. It was the insurance that was covered.

It was clarified that if a club starts dancing, then the club needs to start paying membership dues. The Federation sent out a package for membership for 2021 to each club. Diane commented 7 or 8 clubs have already paid for their membership.

Amy Dale reports that 8 clubs have renewed Federation Membership. The membership packet was sent out on April 7, 2021. The due date is 1 month after dancing has resumed in person.

## Resumption of in person dancing. Report from clubs

- <u>Fantasy</u> just started dancing last Sunday. We plan to dance every Sunday from 3 -7. We ask everyone to wear a mask and to check their temperature. We are thinking about asking for vaccine records.
- <u>Tuesday Gypies</u>- nothing so far. We did a 1-time afternoon dance, but we haven't decided on another one. The facility is available, but we are waiting.
- <u>Vintage Israeli</u> We've met once, we're planning to meet next Saturday. Not too many people have expressed interest; there is lots of fear. We require vaccination proof. It's optional to wear masks. If we require masks, we would only have a handful of dancers and we couldn't pay for the rent. Diane asked if the facility was ventilated? Yes, it has AC and the windows can be opened. The Fire Dept. has checked it out and said it was OK.
- <u>Conejo Valley</u> We started in July, dancing weekly. We have about half the people we normally would have. We are not required to wear masks. Some do, some don't.

Ethnic Express - Not dancing yet.

Prescott – Still active, but it's a small group.

Mountain Dancers are disbanding.

<u>Veselo Selo</u> – Started up in Aug. We are dancing weekly for 2 hours instead of 3. In the past, most people left after 2 hours so we shortened hours. We require proof of vaccination, but we don't require masks.

- <u>Laguna International</u> We are dancing every Wed. 5 – 7 outside. Zooms on Sunday.
- <u>West Valley</u> –We are hoping to resume dancing at a private facility, reasonable price, nice floor. We will ask for proof of vaccination and may also ask for masks.
- <u>Cerritos</u> –We started in Aug. every month 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Thursday from 1:30 – 4:30 at Cerritos Senior Center. We are following the cities requirement's – 6 feet distance, and wear masks. The city didn't ask about vaccination status, but in our club we have our own regulation and require members to sign that they are completely vaccinated. The city doesn't allow us to check the certificates, so we just ask the people to sign the declaration. We will continue the Zoom class on Tuesdays as long as the Senior Center

allows us to continue. We will not meet in November because the Senior Center is not available. Also in Dec. the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> Thursday because of Christmas.

#### <u>Other</u>

Steve Himel reminded people that they should send updated days, time, and place to the Folk Dance Scene and Website so the information is up to date. Steve will send the info to Dick Oakes if clubs want him to.

Membership packet includes new contact name, email address, time and place of dancing, insurance contact and email. Mindy stated that the forms need to include all this information. Diane responded that it is all on the form, but not everyone reads this information.

After some [not too much] deliberation Jay and I took the beautiful drive to Ojai for the first in-person festival since Covid started. We wondered would many people come? Would we be wearing masks?
