PREZ COLUMN OCTOBER 2022

...on the care & feeding of camps & festivals

It started with a note from Laura and David Carman, formerly secretary and president of the Federation, that they would vacation in Door County, WI. They had hoped their holiday would coincide with the annual Door County Folk Dance festival and were saddened by its demise. "And Balkanalia is cancelled this year, too," Laura lamented. Fortunately, closer to home the Blossom Festival took place in April, Statewide and Cerritos Anniversary in May and Stockton Camp in July. Out of state. IFC. June Camp and Mainewoods all attracted CA dancers in 2022. World Camp and the Federation Day of Dance occur October 1st. Registration for both Fall Camp and Kolo Fest in November is filling up. What accounts for the success of some camps and festivals re-starting after Covid break while others remain virtual or cancelled? And, how can we recreational folk dancers nurture the events that bring us joy?

It is true that community participation has not fully rebounded, in spite of vaccinations, improved ventilation, HEXPA and HVAC filters and mask wearing. The number of spectators at college football games nationwide was reduced in the 2021-22 season. Attendance at performing arts was reduced by 40%. Clearly some folks find the risk of contracting Covid 19 at public events too threatening; others have found new and satisfying means of socializing. We have gotten out of the habit of going out! Reduced participation is the new normal for a while. Still, we local folk dancers have attended events in SoCal and beyond. We believe they contributed value to our lives.

Bora Özkök

ED'S Note: Bora Ozkok, long-time Turkish folk dancer and teacher, musician, writer and leader of folk tours, has recently passed away. Below is an article taken from the Federation website about Bora, written by Dick Oakes.



Bora Özkök, whose first name means "strong hurricane wind" in Turkish, was born and the grew up on Mediterranean coast in Adana, Turkey, where his mother was a school teacher and his father a pediatric doctor. His interest in folk dance rooted in his was childhood. his when

parents took him to watch, but not participate in, folklore shows. From the age of eleven, Bora attended a private school in İstanbul, where English was the main language. During the eight years he spent there, he was outstanding in his studies and in sports, excelling in swimming, soccer, wrestling, water polo, and ping-pong.

At the age of fifteen, Bora was a member of the Turkish Olympic swim team in the Rome Olympics of 1960. Bora represented Turkey in nine different events as a member of the national team, breaking many records in the backstroke and freestyle events. One accomplishment was winning the 20-mile Turkish Marathon Swim in 1966 in eight hours (he lost 28 pounds during the event!).

Upon graduation, Bora continued at a private architectural school for a year. Then, in 1965, he came to the United States on an athletic scholarship granted by the University of California at Berkeley, where his major was in architecture. At Berkeley, he was an All American in soccer in 1967 and won the Most Valuable Player award for that year. In 1969, Bora was selected as one of the twelve outstanding foreign students in America, chosen from 1,000 Middle-Eastern nominees from 500 universities and colleges in the United States, and the outstanding representative of Turkey. He graduated from Berkeley in 1971 with a Bachelor's Degree in Architecture.

Bora began folk dancing at Berkeley in 1967, and



learned his first Turkish dances during a visit to Turkey in 1970 from members of the Turkish National Folk Dance Ensemble. After his return that same year, he taught at the San Francisco Kolo Festival and the rest, as they say, is history. He was quick to give credit to his friend Tom Bozigian for

guidance in folk dance teaching.

Bora was not only an outstanding dancer and inspiring teacher, he was a talented musician, playing music for the dances he taught. Adept at using various ethnic musical instruments, he accompanied his teaching by playing the Turkish zurna (horn), tulum (bagpipe), kaval (flute), and davul (drum), as well as the saz, clarinet, mey, recorder, harmonica, banjo, and mandolin.

In 1975, Bora played the zurna as accompaniment

to famed Jamila Salimpour's danse orientale dancers at the San Francisco Renaissance Faire. In 1976, Bora arranged and accompanied the performing tour of *FOTEM* (Folk Training



and Education Center of Istanbul) across the United States. It is unfortunate that anti-Turkish factions in the United States at the time used these artistic and cultural events as their forum.

After returning to Turkey in 1976 to complete his Turkish military obligation and retain his Turkish citizenship, Bora spent years doing research into the dances of his native Turkey with the Turkish *State Folk Dance Ensemble*, and collecting dances and music in Turkish villages.

Since 1979, Bora directed the Turkish Dance Seminar at Lake Abant, Turkey, followed by a tour of Turkey. He was also the director of the Mid-America Folk Dance and Music Conference (M.A.D), which was held annually in August at the University of Windsor in Canada.

Bora taught at most of the major folk dance camps across north America, such as: Holiday Camp, the San Diego State University Folk Dance Conference, Santa Barbara Folk Dance Conference, and Stockton Folk Dance Camp in California, and at many colleges and universities. He taught in Taiwan, Hong Kong, Japan, and Australia. He also was invited to teach a Black Sea suite to the Pittsburgh-based Duquesne University Tamburitzans.

Bora was the director of Cultural Folk Tours, Inc., conducting tours to Turkey which took you to see the Ottoman Military Band in İstanbul, the spiritual Whirling Dervish ceremony in Cappadocia, native folk dancing, a live gypsy orchestra, and much more. He eventually sold his tourist business and was comfortably retired.

Ed.s Note: The following information was obtained from Wikipedia and tikabasamuzik.com. Much of Balkan music shows heavy influence from Turkish music.

Turkish folk music is the traditional music of Turkish people living in Turkey influenced by the cultures of Anatolia and former territories in Europe and Asia. Its unique structure includes regional differences under one umbrella. It includes popular music from the Ottoman Empire era. After the foundation of the Turkish Republic in 1923, Turkish President Mustafa Kemal Atatürk ordered a wide-scale classification and archiving of samples of Turkish folk music from around the country, which, from 1924 to 1953 collected around 10,000 folk songs. Traditional folk music was combined with Western harmony and musical notation to create a more modern style of popular Turkish music.

Turkish 'folk music' was not a unified form of music until the state construction of the early Turkish Republic. The foundation of the Turkish Republic also saw attempts to collect folkloric stories, and to create a more unified and pure Turkish language by removing many Persian and Arabic words to construct a vocabulary supposedly closer to that of ordinary people.

Scales

Although some of the scales employed in Turkish folk music melodies are similar to some of the scales of traditional Ottoman/Turkish Classical Music, not all of the folk music scales have Classical music counterparts, and there are important differences between the two concepts. The 'makam' of Turkish Classical Music is not just a scale, but has certain rules of progression, which in some cases are quite detailed, and in the course of the development the whole scale of the makam is used. Though sometimes referred to as makams by exponents of Turkish Classical Music, the scales of Turkish Folk Music are more properly called 'ayak' (foot) and are simply scales, with no rules of progression, thus bearing closer comparison with the concept of medieval church modes than do makams. Furthermore, in many Turkish folk songs only part of the scale is used. Both forms of music are diatonic, but use notes that are additional to the 12 semitones of western music. In Turkish folk music, for example, some scales include a note roughly halfway between B and B flat.

Time signatures

A wide variety of time signatures are used in Turkish folk music. In addition to simple ones such as 2/4, 4/4 and 3/4, others such as 5/8, 7/8, 9/8, 7/4, and 5/4 are common. Combinations of several basic rhythms often results in longer, complex rhythms that fit into time signatures such as 8/8, 10/8, and 12/8.



Turkish Folk Music Instruments

Ed.s Note:Turkey has a wealth of folk musical instruments. Here are some of the common ones (for a more complete listing go to: Turkish Folk Music Instruments - Tikabasamüzik

Davul - a big, round drum with two membranes. The davul is the ancestor of the Western bass drum. It is beaten with a stout stick in the right hand and a more slender one in the left hand.

Zil – Turkish finger cymbals that are played in pairs, attached to the thumb and index finger. The term zil means "cymbal", but is most commonly used for small finger cymbals.

Gayda – is the term for bag pipe in Bulgaria and Macedonia. (Sameyda. Turkish radio's folk music orchestra, used the Bulgarian bag pipe.) The gayda, like other eastern European bag pipes, has a melody pipe and a drone pipe with a simple reed. The bag is made of goat or sheep skin.



Zurna – a wind instrument resembling the

oboe, the zurna is made from a slightly curved piece of wood. The double reed is of bamboo. Just below the reed is a round metal plate. The player puts the whole of the reed in his mouth and rests his lips against the metal plate. This technique of playing oboe instruments (also known as shawns or schalmeys) is commonly employed in all the Asian countries. Zurna players have a breathing technique which enables them to breathe in through the nose while continuing to blow from the mouth. In this way a zurna player can keep going for half an hour without even pausing to take a breath. The zurna plays an important part in village festivals and is almost invariably combined with the davul. It also used to be an important military instrument.

Tanbur, tambur or tampur – a lute with a neck that is over a yard long. The sound chest has a rounded back and is covered with skin There are two types of tambur; yayli



tambur that is a string tambur, it has leather on the cover but the usual tambur is without skins. The tanbur has eight strings tuned in pairs. This is the instrument ranking highest in art music, and it should not be confused with the popular tanbura saz.

Ethnic Food

Ed's Note: For many years Gloria Harris had a column in Scene called: "A la Carte", which contained recipes from various ethnic areas. This one, from Turkey, appeared in the September, 1979 issue of Scene.

iMAM BAYILDI (Braised Eggplant with Tomatoes and Onions) Ingredients 2 med. eggplants, (1lb. each) Salt 4 med. onions sliced and separated into rings 3 med. tomatoes, finely chopped 1 green pepper, cut in strips ½ c. olive oil Directions

2 Tbsp. chopped parsley 1 Tbsp. tomato sauce ½ tsp. paprika ¼ tsp. allspice 1 c. water 4 garlic cloves

Cut off stem and peel each eggplant lengthwise in inch-wide strips, leaving inch- wide strips of peel intact. Cut each one in half. Cut side up, make 3 or 4 slashes through the thickest part of each half. (Tomato mixture is stuffed into these slashes,) Sprinkle with 1 Tbsp. salt, set aside for 30 min., then rinse off. Place onion rings in a colander, sprinkle with 2 Tbsp. salt and turn about so as to coat them evenly with salt. Let stand for 30 min., then rinse under cold running water and squeeze gently dry.

In ¼ cup olive oil, sauté onions, green pepper and garlic til tender. Turn into a bowl with tomatoes, tomato paste, paprika, allspice and parsley and toss together.

Fry the eggplant gently till it begins to soften, then transfer it to a baking dish that will hold the pieces in one layer. Put as much of the tomato mixture into the slashes as you can, then mix the remaining tomato mixture with 1 cup water. Pour over the eggplants. Sprinkle with a little olive oil if desired. Bake in a 375 oven for 45 min., or til soft. Sprinkle with chopped parsley. Serves 4.

The name of the dish, **İmam bayıldı**, means, "The Imam fainted." The Imam in question--as the story goes-had married the daughter of an olive-oil merchant because the eggplant dish she had made, awash with her father's olive oil, was the most delicious thing he had ever tasted, and her dowry would be 100 huge jars of olive oil. The first night after the wedding, he ordered her to make this dish, which she did. And likewise the second night, and so on. But on the tenth night, she told him she could not make it again. "Why not?" he demanded. "Because we have run out of olive oil," she said. And the Imam fainted.

TURKISH SQUASH FRITTERS

2 lbs. zucchini olive oil (or light cooking oil, but NOT fat!!)

1 bunch dill 3 eggs

1 bunch mint 1 cup flour

1 bunch parsley salt to taste (start with ½ tsp)

1/2 cup feta (or very sharp cheddar)

Grate squash; chop herbs; mash or grate cheese. Mix all those together.

Beat in eggs and salt.

Mix in <u>about</u> 1 cup flour, until consistency is runny batter (like for muffins).

Heat frying pan with much olive oil until a drop of water will skate on it (=very hot). Drop batter in by large separate spoonfuls (they spread!).

Fry until brown, turning once or twice.

Drain fritters on paper towel before serving, while spooning in a new batch (you may have to add more oil!). Serves 6. (But we love any leftover fritters cold for breakfast!).

(Recipe collected over 50 years ago, still a family favorite. We use a Salad Shooter to grate the cheese, herbs, and squash together in that order.)

BORA ÖZKÖK (1944-2022) - SPECIAL ZOOM TRIBUTE

Bora was one of the first persons to introduce Turkish dance and music to recreational folk dancers in the 1970s and 1980s. He presented workshops across North America as well as in Europe, Japan, Taiwan, Hong Kong and Australia. He was also the founder and director of the Mid-America Folkdance and Music Conference (M.A.D.) held in Windsor, Ontario. Some of the dances he taught us include: Ali Pasa, Kendime, İste Hendek, Baris Halay, Çepikli, Delile, Gün Ola, Bir Mumdur, Keçiko, Konyalı, Yaylalar and many others. In the mideighties, he retired from active folkdance teaching to set up his own travel agency which offered a program of cultural visits to Turkey. In recent years. he became the owner of a hotel in Göreme (Cappadocia) where he passed away on August 8, 2022 at the age of 78.

Please join me together with Ahmet Lüleci and Melanie Goldberg for a special "Remembering Bora Özkök" Zoom session on Sunday, October 16th at 8 pm East Coast time (7pm Central, 5pm West Coast). Marshall is putting together the Playlist – currently at 64 dances, including the ones taught last year.

Fall Camp Report by Marc and Jan Rayman

This report covers the time since the Federation council meeting on April 24, 2022.

Fall Camp registration opened on July 17 with an email announcement to more than 800 recipients.

A registration form and short article were in the August *Scene*, and a registration form and four articles will be in the September issue. Articles and notices have also been published in *Let's Dance!*, *NFO News*, and the Folk Dance Events Network, and camp has been publicized elsewhere.

Visiting Master Teacher Report – Jay Michtom

Now that things have opened up, the Visiting Master Teacher program has been re-activated. The program stipulates that if a member-club hires a master teacher for a workshop, the fee charged will be reimbursed by Federation for up to \$200. In May, Ahmet Luleci gave workshops at both Cerritos and Westside clubs, and in July, Jaap Leegwater gave one at Westside. The reimbursement to the clubs has been done.

If you know of a master teacher who is available to come to our location to give workshop(s), let me know and I will make the necessary arrangements.

Folk Dance Scene- Jay Michtom

The committee learned that mailing Scene in an envelope reduces the postage charged. For the August issue we tried that to see how it would work. It did require some additional work to fold and stuff in the envelope. Although there are still some wrinkles (no pun intended) to be worked out, it seems to be a satisfactory way to go.

In addition to reducing the mailing cost it will now be possible to include in the envelope the notice to renew when the subscription is ending. Up until now we have been sending a turn-around envelope which cost \$1.35 to mail.

We have decided to give all subscribers who get their copies by US mail to also get an electronic copy. Since there is no additional cost to us, and it might encourage some to switch, it seemed a worthwhile change. Those who have been paying for both forms will be compensated for that extra fee.

Current subscriber base is approximately 180 members.

Scholarships Report - Shana

There are currently 3 new applicants. One applicant was a prior-year awardee, so the council decided to handle that as a separate case, apart from scholarships.

Council heard a motion to make a 1-time Grant Award of \$275 to this deserving applicant, who had contributed significantly at the prior camp. This motion was approved unanimously.

There were two scholarships considered by the Council for new applicants, one for Fall Camp in the amount of \$200, and one for a leader from the Vintage Israeli Club for a Festival in Miami, in the amount of \$150. A motion was made to approve these scholarships, and the motion was approved unanimously.

Old Business

Composition and Use of Minutes

Marc Rayman led a discussion of the intent to provide the Council Meeting Minutes to the public and future/current Council Members. There was a discussion about the use of the minutes, and the benefit to understand historically what the rationale was for split decisions, or exceptions to the By-Laws. Marc argued that a key element of the Minutes document should be the archival value of the discussions, whether for the next meeting, or sometime in the future with new Council Members.

There was a discussion about what the legal requirements are in California for the Minutes Documentation for Non-Profit Organizations, and Mindy agreed to research that topic.

It was unanimously agreed that the Chair Reports should be included verbatim into the Minutes Document, rather than attached as separate documents. However, the Council agreed that the Treasurer's Report should not be included in the publicly-available version of the Minutes, but included in the reporting to the Council, Member Clubs, and available in a secured-access part of the website.

Policy Regarding Communicable Diseases – Carol Smith

There was an active discussion about the masking requirements at Federation events, given the changes in public behavior and fluid local and state requirements. There is also the increasing condition of Long-COVID. It was observed that folk dancers are generally in a higher-risk category, due to age, and that we also inhale, exhale at higher levels, and dance in close proximity, including mostly holding hands during dancing. It was decided that we should comply with any State and local requirements and guidelines, and that individual Member Clubs are free to place additional constraints and requirements on top of those.

New Business

We need to form a Nominating Committee for new officers in 2023.

We need 5 volunteers to nominate a slate of officers, and to fill vacant positions.

No one volunteered immediately, and Diane asked people to contact her directly.
