We are fortunate in Southern California to have dance teacher Iliana Bozhanova, and musician Todor Yankov visiting from Bulgaria this month. They will be giving a series of workshops in various locations (for a full list see the Calendar section of this issue). Information about them follows.

ILIANA BOZHANOVA

Ed's Note: The following bio was taken from the SoCal Folk Dance Federation web-site, created and maintained by Dick Oakes.

Iliana Bozhanova is a native of Galabovo, Bulgaria, and comes from a family of South Thracian musicians and singers. She graduated from the National School for Art Instructors and completed her Bachelors and Master's Degrees in "Bulgarian Folk Dances and Choreography" in Plovdiv at the Academy of Music and Dance Art, the oldest in the Balkans and the most prestigious Folk Art Academy in Bulgaria.

Since her childhood, Iliana has been a member of Folk Dance Ensemble *Râčenica* in Plovdiv which gave her unforgettable opportunities to introduce folk art during many performances in Bulgaria and



International Dance Festivals in Belgium, France, Greece, Holland, Italy, Poland, Portugal, Russia, and Serbia. Iliana says she will never forget the wonderful people from "Râčenica" and the fact that with the Ensemble she made her first steps as a dance teacher!

In 1981, Iliana became the Choreographer and Artistic Director of two children's folk dance ensembles: *Radost* from the village of Loakim Gruevo, and *Roza Dimitrova's Orphanage Kids*. For these children she made her first dance choreographies and introduced the ensembles in the Festival for Amateur Folk Art in Plovdiv. Besides her work as a dance teacher and choreographer, Iliana works as a Technician of Architecture and Civil engineering. She is married and has two sons.

Since 1995, Iliana has worked with the *Bosilek* Bulgarian Folk Dance Ensemble in New York gaining opportunities to create, develop, share, and enjoy the richness of Bulgarian Folklore. Iliana is grateful to "Bosilek" because in 1995 they "opened the door to the World" for her International teaching career! She has worked as a choreographer with Ensemble "Zarove" in Najmegen, Holland, since 1995 and was invited to create a Bulgarian dance choreography for "Het International Dance Theater" in Amsterdam with Artistic Director Maurits van Geel.

Other Folk Dance Ensembles Iliana has worked with include "Kitka" Ensemble for International Folk Dances in Oslo, Norway (1999); "Da igramo" Ensemble for Balkan Folk Dances, Rochester, New York (1997 and 1998); and "Planina" Ensemble for International Folk Dances, Los Alamos, New Mexico (1997). Iliana is well known as a dance teacher at dozens of folk dance clubs in many states in the U.S. including New York, Washington DC, Maryland, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Ohio, California, Oregon, Utah, Washington, New Mexico, Pennsylvania, and Vermont.

Iliana also has taught in the United States at several folk dance camps, including Mendocino and Ramblewood Balkan Camps (1996, 1997, 1998); Folklore Dance Camp, Mendocino, California (1998); Pinewoods Dance Camp, Massachusetts (2001); Mainewoods Dance Camp, Maine (1998 and 2002); and Stockton Folk Dance Camp, Stockton, California (2001 and 2002). In addition, Iliana has taught Bulgarian Folk Dances in Holland (1995 and 2002) and Norway (1999).

As a lecturer, Iliana has introduced Bulgarian Folk Art at several universities in California, including UCLA in Los Angeles (1997); UCSD at San Diego (1997); UCSB at Santa Barbara (2001); University of the Pacific in Stockton (2001 and 2002); California University of Art in San Fernando (2000). She also taught at Eastman University in Rochester, New York (1998 and 2000); as well as at several High Schools in Rochester, New York; Yakima, Washington, and in Vermont.

lliana has had several Asian teaching tours that included Japan (2002 and 2004); Taiwan, as the first Bulgarian teacher of dance in that country, working with "Pojas Folk Dance Ensemble" in Taipei (2002 and 2004); Hong Kong for "Legacy European Folk Dance Troupe" with Artistic Director Yeung, Kwan Yu, Frederick (2002); and Indonesia at the Bali Folk Dance Camp (2004).

TODOR YANKOV

Todor Yankov (accordion) was born in 1962 in Plovdiv, but he grew up in the village of Dobralak in the Rhodopi Mountains in a large family. His father, Vasil Yankov, was a well-known

gaida player in the area. Todor began to play gaida, like his father, and then when he was 10 years old, he took up kaval. Soon after that he became an orphan and had no one to send him to study at Shiroka Lûka Music High School, which had been his dream. When he was 16, he discovered the accordion and began to teach himself to play. He is also a wonderful singer. For many years he played with the Hisar folk orchestra at different holiday celebrations. He has been the accordionist for the following folk dance ensembles: Rûchenitsa, Hebar, Pûldin and now-Ensemble Voivodintsi. In 1980 he graduated from the Construction Trades High School in Plovdiv, where he studied electrical installation. He currently works as a machine operator in the Plastics division of Liebher Corporation.

Iliana and Todor met each other in 1984 in Ensemble Ruchenitsa. Soon after that their roads of life went in different directions. In 2004, Todor invited Iliana to be his colleague and work as a choreographer in the village of Voivodinovo. Both of them have founded Ensemble Voivodintsi with 30 dancers and singers. Now the members are 150. The villagers are proud of their Ensemble!

Since 2007 Iliana and Todor have been traveling and teaching together around the World. They are leading tours in Bulgaria for their friends-folk dancers and musicians.

COSTUME CORNER

STARA ZAGORA, BULGARIA



The region of Stara Zagora, Bulgaria, long retained a very striking women's costume with remarkably ancient features (*Photo 1*). The town sits just south of the Balkan mountain range (called *Stara Planina* in Bulgarian), which runs east-west across the entire middle of the country (see *Map*). North of these mountains, in the broad agricultural lands sloping down to the Danube River, women traditionally covered their basic white chemise with two aprons, one hanging in front, the other in back. But in the colder mountain zone to the south, women wore a dark, sleeveless, scoop-necked jumper, or *sukman*, over their chemise, and a front apron over that.

The Stara Zagora aprons, usually of heavy black fabric, are thickly ornamented with colorful flowers embroidered in an unusual technique. Each yarn is passed flat across the back and hooked through to the front in fluffy loops to form the design, rather like a chenille bedspread. ("Chenille", incidentally is French for a fluffy caterpillar and came to refer also to fat, fuzzy yarns!) Sometimes the flowers form sprays emanating from a small vase at the bottom (*Photo 2*), and this pattern has its own remarkable history.

In the early 1600s, when England's East India Company started buying up cheap, colorful, local cotton cloth in Hyderabad, India, they didn't think the particular floral designs block-printed on the cottons would sell well at home. So they brought crewelwork pattern books from England to India and asked the locals to use these instead. Returning the next year, the

merchants were horrified to find that although the available cottons indeed carried crewel designs, they did so in a great hodgepodge of colors instead of the traditional English restriction to two or three hues of *one* color. But that was all there was to buy. Presently, however, their dismay turned to glee when these wildly colorful Indian "chintzes" became the rage of all Europe.

Unfortunately, this huge popularity so cut into the sales of *European*-made textiles that various European countries began instituting draconian laws (including even imprisonment) against wearing the

Quite unwilling to give up these wonderfully bright patterns, however, women began to *embroider* the polychrome flowers onto their clothes (usually in satin-stitch). In fact, women resorted to this all across Central and Western Europe and even in the Hispanic colonies of the New World. Which is why, when we in California were short of Hungarian blouses or aprons for a dance show, we could buy flowered Mexican blouses at the thrift stores and remake them to fill in nicely for Hungarian! And on the Stara Zagora apron in *Photo 2*, the little vestigial vases from which the sprays of flowers spring are a tip-off that the ultimate source of the embroidery design was the banned Indian chintzes.

The embellishments on the Stara Zagora sukman, however, have even older histories. Vertical stripes all around the bottom of the skirt of this jumper can be found in a wide area around that town (see *Map*), but in the periphery those bands are usually shorter and/or plainer. In Stara Zagora. vertically placed strips of heavy woven and felted wool of differing colors have been sewn together to form the lower two-thirds of the skirt, then decorated top to bottom with short stacks of little felt circles of different colors (Photo 3). What I find so remarkable is that small clay figurines with much the same costume have been excavated from Cîrna (also spelled Cârna), a Bronze Age village of the late 2nd millennium BCE that lies right across the Danube from Bulgaria (*Photo 4* and *Map*). Each woman is depicted wearing a scoop-necked sleeveless jumper over a chemise, and on the backs of some images, where the jumper's skirt is not covered by an apron, we see similar vertical stripes and sometimes even vertical rows of little circles. Apparently a 3000-year tradition.

Another archaic feature of this *sukman*, found not just in Stara Zagora but across most of the middle of Bulgaria and in parts of western Macedonia, is the pair of long, narrow, heavily embroidered strips or streamers hanging down behind from the shoulder-blades. These are fully visible in *Photo 5*, while in *Photo 1* one embroidered streamer is caught under the girl's belt and flipped forward across her hip, over the right edge of her apron. The 2500-year story of these "streamers" I will pursue in the next issue of SCENE, comparing them to related features in Albanian, Greek, and other costumes.

ENJOY FALL CAMP NOVEMBER 10 – 12

The fourth Fall Camp, Nov. 10-12, promises to be another fun weekend of dancing and more. We have two wonderful master teachers this year – Steve Kotansky (Balkan, international) and Gergana Panova (Bulgarian). There will be some changes from 2019 -2022, but camp will still have many of the ingredients that made it such a special experience for all campers. It will still serve as both a quiet retreat where you can relax with some very nice people and a weekend dance camp where you can learn from master teachers. You can find out more and download the registration forms (and waivers) at <u>Fall-Camp.org</u>.

Fall Camp, nestled in a woodsy alcove near Simi Valley, is a lovely place where you can enjoy being close to nature while still having the creature comforts of excellent meals (upgraded from previous years), motel-style rooms (with private bathrooms, heat, and air conditioning), and more. You can dance when you feel like it, and when you don't, do other things such as catching up with friends, playing Scrabble, working on a jigsaw puzzle with others, getting a massage, completing a craft project, reading a good book, meditating, or doing nothing at all. You don't have to get on a plane or drive treacherous mountain roads to be with nature, and WiFi is available too!

Fall Camp is also a great place for those who are serious about learning all the dances presented on Friday and Saturday by master teachers Gergana Panova and Steve Kotansky. If you want an intense dance experience, you can dance Friday afternoon and all of Saturday and also dance the night away during the Friday and Saturday parties. And then you can dance again Sunday morning during the review session.

After you check into camp Friday afternoon and enjoy the welcoming snacks (which could be your late lunch), there will be some time and materials, including fall leaves, flowers, living ivy, and ribbons, you can use to create a head wreath of fall colors, decorate a hat (if you bring one), or create an easierto-make headband or corsage.

Terry Gucwa will be conducting the Potluck Band as in prior Fall Camps. It's a potluck because we don't know who will bring what, but everybody is welcome to contribute to the musical feast with an instrument to play or a voice to sing. Many members of the Potluck Band will have never played together before late Friday afternoon. Well before camp, Terry will correspond with each person interested in joining the band, finding out what instruments they play and how well. Then he will select music for a few popular folk dances, transcribe parts for each person, and send it to them to practice. They all play together for the first time on Friday and practice in one or two more sessions on Saturday before performing during the Saturday night party.

Other activities that proved popular at previous Fall Camps will be conducted again this year as well. Marc Rayman will give us a fascinating tour of the night sky. Jan Rayman will lead early morning nature walks around the scenic campus. You can also attend a brief morning warmup session just before teaching starts on Saturday. More activities may be announced in the coming months. In addition, it wouldn't be too surprising if there were some humorous hijinks during the happy hours before dinner on Friday and Saturday afternoons.

Fall Camp will experience some other changes this year. We will no longer require masks or vaccinations, but we still encourage best health practices. Because the fall weather is so difficult to predict, we are doing all of our dancing in one beautiful, heated and air-conditioned room, where many of our other activities will also take place. Although we are installing the largest wood floor possible to fit the room, it is smaller than the largest room we used in previous years, so we are limiting the number of campers to around 60. This also means that dancers will have more access to our two master teachers. The dining menu has been upgraded in quality, and the cost of Sunday lunch is included in the registration price. There will be two happy hours with wine.

Like many post-pandemic enterprises, the new management of the facility has increased the prices. They also have a new pricing structure, where the price is the same for each person regardless of whether they want to share a room or have a private room. The registration price for a single, double, or triple room is now \$535 (the same price as a single room for Fall Camp 2022). We charge only \$375 for commuters, who will be able to enjoy all the camp meals. Commuters may choose to go home each night or stay in a nearby hotel, Airbnb, or Vrbo. (Jan has some information about these options which might be helpful to dancers who wish to commute. Email her at JanRayman@charter.net.)

After 5 years of creating and organizing Fall Camp, Marc & Jan Rayman are now playing smaller roles this year, with Lee Otterholt leading the small executive committee of Kelley O'Neill and Jan Rayman. Kelley is in charge of registration and is well informed about all things Fall Camp. She can answer your questions if you email her at <u>DanceFall-Camp@gmail.com</u>. (The previous Fall Camp email Dance@FallCamp.org is no longer in use.) We also have a team of talented volunteers who will help out in many ways. (Marc is on this team but spending much more of his time on a JPL space mission.)

We are very fortunate to have Lee lead Fall Camp. Besides being a master teacher, well known outside of Southern California, Lee has quite a lot of experience leading other camps. He is well known for his organizational skills, so Fall Camp is sure to be a great experience for all who attend.

We hope you will register to join the fun before camp fills up. Once again, visit <u>FallCamp.org</u> for the registration forms and other information.

LATINO-ISRAELI DANCE CAMP

I just returned from the 2nd annual 3 1/2 day KETZEV Latino-Israeli dance camp in Cancun, Mexico hosted by Machol MX, a small group of Israeli folk dancers from Mexico City. What is unique about them is that they are all under 40 years old, now considered a very young age in Israeli folk dance circles around the world. The average age of dancers at Israeli folk dance sessions around the world is between 55-75 years old. In most places, youth are not including IFD as one of their recreational activities. This group of committed dreamers reached out to different organizations for sponsorship for their first dance camp last year, 2022, not knowing what to expect. They were unknown to the institutional Jewish community and had low expectations of even getting a meeting with the Jewish community institutions that support traditional Jewish cultural activities that have been the mainstay of Jewish cultural life in Latin America. To their surprise and delight, they were not only given meetings with funders, the funders realized what this non-traditional group represented: The Future.

They brought over 20 dancers from Mexico City, both the young and some of their parents, who also danced. There was a 20-person contingent from Uruguay, and others from Chile, Argentina, Peru, and throughout Latin America. Young dancers from both coasts of the US, Hungary, and elsewhere around the world were attracted to this dance camp that was unique in the world. Most Israeli folk dance camps are attended by an older demographic. Not KETZEV. Younger dancers dominated. The energy level was off of the charts. And the late-night and all-night sessions included sets of very energetic line dances beloved by the younger dancers. The first year's success convinced original funders and new ones to support this activity that has the possibility of inspiring younger dancers to join the Israeli folk dance community.

Though the very young dancers had left the final night's marathon dance party by 4 am, their older, 20 and 30-something, fellow dancers danced with enthusiasm until the party ended a 7:00 am, when we all went down to the beach for the "Survivors'" photo. If their energy is as contagious to their compatriots as it was to me, we will see a bright future for Israeli folk dance in Latin America, and, perhaps, the world.

The camp honored the passing of Susie Burke, and both Billy and Sean Burke attended.

Best of all, you are in the redwoods. Every afternoon, I would lay on a blanket outside just to watch and listen to the trees. Considering all of Mother Nature's sensational creations, for me, the Redwoods are her masterpiece.
